Now, no more talking thru your button holes. Yesterday ushered in the period during which it is illegal to wear party buttons or badges. The supplying of such buttons or badges is also lilegal.

The Electoral Act, 63-64 Victoria, chapter 12, section 165, provides 38 follows:

No person shall furnish or supply any ribbon, label or like favor to or for any person, with intent that it be worn or used within such electoral district on the day of election or polling, or within eight days before such day, or during the continuance of such election, by any person as a party badge to distinguish the wearer as the supporter of any candidate, or of the political or other opinions entertained, or supposed to be entertained, by such candidate; and no person shall use or wear any ribbon, label or other favor as such badge within such election or polling, or within eight days before such day during the continuance of such election.

The punishment for contravention of this clause is a fine of \$100 or more, on summary conviction, or imprisonment for three months or more, or both punishments at once, at the discretion of the court.


