At Hotel When Fire Was Found. The prisoner is said to have made this threat as late as May 19, the night before the fire. On Wednerday morning. May 20, the holocaust occurred, and it is a strange coincidence that the pri-scner was the first person Proprietor John Mero encountered when he was rushing out of the rear entrance of the blazing building to send the alarm.

The back door of the hotel was always open ,and it is thought that the accused man, who had been refused a drink in the house the night before, entered by this way and fired a bundle of toilet paper; which was kept

beneath the main stair. The fire was first discovered by Mrs. Mero, who awoke about 5 a.m. to call the servants. At first she smelled smoke, and upon reaching the head of the main stairway imagined she saw smoke issuing from the cellarway beneath. She ran back to awake her husband, and by the time he reached the stairway the whole centre hallway was in flames. He hurried out by a rear stairway to give the alarm and met Buckborough in the archway lead-

ing from the building.

While the building was in flames Buckborough was conspicuous among the lookers on and is said to have declared exultantly, "I've got even with him.' Chief of Police John Chillon made the arrest on the instance of Detective Miller, and at 7 p.m. the prisoner was remanded to the Woodstock jail
