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OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

1. To bind together in one Society Churchwomen as Associates, and girls and young women as Members, for mutual help—religious and secular—for sympathy and prayer.

2. To encourage purity of life, dutifulness to parents,

faithfulness to employers, and thrift.

3. To provide the privileges of the Society for its Members wherever they may be; by giving them an introduction from one Branch to another.

CENTRAL RULES.

I. Associates to be communicants of the Church of England (no such restriction being made as to Members), and the organization of the Society to follow as much as possible that of the Church, being Diocesan and Parochial.

II. Associates (working and honorary) and Members to contribute annually to the funds; the former not less than sixty cents a year; the latter not less than twenty-four cents a year.

III. No girl who has not borne a virtuous character to be admitted as a Member, such character being lost, the

Member to forfeit her card.

ASSOCIATES' PRAYER.

O God, we beseech Thee to bless us and all who belong to this Society. May its Members be sheltered and protected evermore by Thy Fatherly love. And to us, who are associated in Thy name for this service, vouchsafe, we beseech Thee, the help and guidance of Thy Holy Spirit, that in all our work for others, we may work for Thee, as members of one family in Christ; and bring us all at last to the joy of Thy heavenly kingdom: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Ten Reasons for Supporting the Girls' Friendly Society

- 1. Because it is a standing witness to the possibility of purity of life and conduct for every woman and girl in the land.
- 2. Because it is a Society in which each individual Associate and Member is bound to give her help, her sympathy, and her prayers to her fellow Members, and in which the elder or better instructed are especially called upon to afford the protection of their friendship and care to the younger or more ignorant.
- 3. Because it is preventive. It supplies to independent wage-earners of different classes, a high social standard of opinion, a circle of friendly interests, introductions in strange places, aid in sickness, encouragement to thrift, and thus lessens the strain of temptation on those who are lonely, poor, sick, or out of work.
- 4. Because it is an International Society, which has been enabled, by God's blessing, to commend its principles to, and to link together in friendly bonds, over 250,000 women, of all ages, of all ranks of society, in all parts of the world.
- 5. Because it is a Church Society with an organization, Diocesan and Parochial, which follows that of the Church.

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- 6. Because, in both town and country parishes, it affords to the clergy valuable help in parochial work, especially with regard to girls of all classes who have out-grown (or do not attend) the Sunday Schools, and to the fluctuating population of girls and young women, in profession, business or service.
- 7. Because, though its Associates must be communicants of the Church, it receives and helps any girl eligible for membership without distinction of Creed.
- 8. Because the value of a systematic endeavour to band together, in purity of life, those, who, as the wives, mothers and teachers of the future, will make or mar the lives of coming generations, cannot fail to be recognized by all thoughtful men and women.
- 9. Because, by its means, lives are brightened, hearts cheered, temptations lessened, the weary recruited, the sick tended, the ignorant taught, not only through the agency of the Associates, but by that of the Members themselves.
- 10. Because the Aims and Objects of the Girls' Friendly Society, harmonize with the most loyal Church life, and the highest Christian principles, and thus entitle it to claim the sympathy and co-operation of all who value the preservation of purity, the good of their neighbour, and the glory of God.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

While we are able to report that steady and useful work has been carried on in the old Branches during the past year, it is a matter of great regret that no new ones have been formed, though doubtless this is largely owing to the fact that numerous societies for women and girls already exist in our own Church and other religious bodies. We feel sure, however, that if the wider claims and interests of this great international Society were better known and considered it would be seen that no merely local organizations could offer the same advantages.

Another hindrance to progress is found in the isolated position of many of our Canadian Branches, the Members of which feel cut off from the general interests and life of the Society and find it difficult to keep up their interest in the work. For this reason we welcome such occasions as are afforded by the Annual Meetings of the National Council and other large societies which bring together women from

distant parts of our wide Dominion and among whom are always found some of our fellow-workers in the Girls' Friendly Society.

Between forty and fifty members have been commended to the Canadian Branches from Great Britain and elsewhere during the year, the introduction thus provided proving in many instances a great help and encouragement to the newcomers.

Holiday House, at Hamilton Beach, was again open from June to September under successful management and was well filled. Several girls went from the Toronto Branches, but the majority of the guests were as usual from Hamilton and its neighbourhood. The Synod of the Diocese of Niagara at its last session, formally endorsed the work of the Society.

The Day of Intercession for the G. F. S. appointed by the English Central Council to be observed throughout the Empire by all Branches was June 22nd, and as last year most of the Canadian Branches took part in its observance. In Toronto the service was held at 8 p.m., and was preceded by an afternoon in the country; about 100 Associates, Members and friends, were present at the service.

The Society has been represented at the meetings of the Executive of the National Council by Mrs. Tilton, at the May meeting, held in Ottawa, and by the Central President, Mrs. Wood, at the meeting held in Toronto last February.

The Scripture Calendar issued by the Society in England is widely distributed among the Branches, and copies of the English and American magazines are taken.

Two ladies from Canada, Miss Wicksteed, Secretary of the Ottawa Branches, and Miss Bourne, the first Secretary of to

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of the Branch in Vancouver were present and spoke at one of the meetings during the Euglish Anniversary week last June.

The Colonial Committee of the English Central Council formed two years ago for the purpose of promoting closer union with the Branches of the Society in other countries, does much in collecting and forwarding information touching the needs and growth of the Society. Through it has come the proposal of the Parent Society of sending to Canada a lady with a thorough knowledge of the G. F. S. and its working, with the object of rousing further interest and explaining its scope and methods. The Canadian Branches, however, while fully recognizing the advantages of the scheme, fear that the expense involved would be at present an insuperable difficulty.

In conclusion, we cannot do better than quote from the Associates' Journal some remarks made by Mrs. Lefroy, President of the Diocese of Dublin, at a Conference of the Society recently held in Ireland. "There is no higher or nobler aim than the G. F. S. puts before its members, holding up to them the highest standard of purity, unselfishness, and sympathy, which should form part of the character of every womam worthy of the name. Our G. F. S. is a magnificent work of character making and character guarding." Only when the work is undertaken on this highest ground can its missionary, parochial, and social objects fall into their proper place, and the best kind of success be secured, not that of mere numbers but the strengthening and deepening of the moral and spiritual lives of Associates and Members alike.

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The following item has just reached us. When the British Association met in Toronto two years ago, Mrs. Foster, an English G. F. S. Associate, accompanied her husband, now Sir Michael Foster. Through Mrs. Williamson, President of the Toronto Board of the Woman's Auxiliary to Missions, and a former G. F. S. Associate, she heard of the interest taken by some of the Canadian G. F. S. Branches in the Blackfoot Hospital near Gleichen, N.W.T. Recently, Mrs. Williamson received a large parcel of dresses for Indian women, and other things, made by the Members of Lady Foster's Branch in England, and thus a pleasant link of work and interest has been formed.

MEETINGS IN HAMILTON.

During the Annual Meeting of the National Council of Women which took place in Hamilton at the end of October, two G. F. S. meetings were held. One was a Conference held in the Council Chamber of the City Hall from 2.30 to 4 p.m. on October 23rd. About fifty Associates and others interested in the Society were present, including the Central President and Secretary and two other Associates from Toronto, Mrs. Hamilton, the Diocesan President for Ottawa, and Miss Murray, an Associate from St. John, New Brunswick.

The Rev. Canon Bland, Chaplain of the Society, opened the meeting with prayer. Mrs. Wood read the Central Rules of the Society and gave examples of its practical benefits, referring especially to the commendation of Members from one Branch to another. She also quoted the "Ten Reasons for Supporting the G. F. S.," urged the spread of the Society among girls in shops and factories, and the importance of forming Candidates' Classes. She

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referred to the observance of the Day of Intercession on June 22nd, and spoke of the need for earnest-minded women to undertake the work of Associates. Canon Bland was called upon to speak and said he wished to impress his hearers with the need existing for the G. F. S. and then to induce them to take up the work. Girls cannot be expected to join unless they are sought out and informed of the Society's aims and objects. There is a great need among us for instructing our girls in the ordinary moral duties of a pure woman's life, and surrounding them with helps in living it. We want Associates who will act as Godmothers to the girls, feeling responsible for them. The first responsibility is prayer, the second, sympathetic work and correspondence with the absent ones. It is impossible to supply the needs without the workers.

Miss Murray then read the report of the Branch in St. John, New Brunswick; Mrs. Hamilton spoke of the work in Ottawa; and Canon Bland, of the Hamilton Branches. He also kindly read the report of Holiday House for the summer of 1899, which is given elsewhere, Canon Bland also spoke of the help it would be to the G. F. S. in Canada if English Associates visiting the country would make themselves known to the workers here and give the benefit of their experience, although at present we are unable to accept the suggestion of having a special speaker sent out to visit our various Branches.

Mrs. Wood spoke of the connection between the Colonial and Parent Societies through their representatives in England who attend the meetings of the Central Council in London, and report them to the Dioceses or countries they represent.

A valuable paper by the Bishop of Vermont on the "Specical Characteristics of the G. F. S.," was read by Miss Boulton. Some questions were then asked and answered and the meeting adjourned.

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The following suggestions were made in answer to the question, How to increase interest among Associates? Be interested yourself, study the literature of the Society so as to become familiar with its methods and capabilities, emphasize the spiritual side of the work.

The following evening a meeting was held in the Guild Room of the Cathedral, at which the Associates and Members of the four parochial Branches in Hamilton were present. The Diocesan President, Mrs. M. Wright, was in the chair and spoke some opening words of greeting, being followed by Canon Bland. The Central President, Mrs. Wood, addressed the Branches, encouraging them to fresh effort and telling of G. F. S. meetings she had attended in various places.

The Central Secretary congratulated the Hamilton Branches on what they had accomplished and spoke of the Society's doings in Toronto, and a short devotional office brought the meeting to an end.

ANNUAL REPORT OF HOLIDAY HOUSE, 1899.

The sixth season of Holiday House opened well under Miss MacKelcan's management at the end of June, and came to a close on the 7th September under Miss Sadlier.

The number who took advantage of this pleasant home was smaller than it should have been, 67 being the total number, of whom 18 were G. F. S. members, as compared with 26 for last year. The rooms on the first floor were

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home total pared were filled all summer and much appreciated, the occupants contributing not a little to the enjoyment of all by their kind thoughtfulness.

Financially, the season has been a successful one, the total receipts being \$295.25, expenditure \$237.55, leaving a balance of \$57.70, \$10 of which, however, had been advanced at the opening of the House.

Hearty thanks are due Mr. Fred. Lumsden for a kind donation of \$13.47, the proceeds of a concert held at his beach residence, and also the G. F. S. Branch of the Church of the Redeemer, Toronto, for a silk quilt, and to other kind friends for various donations.

It is a matter of regret that so few of the Associates of the Branches in Hamilton visited the House during the season, and may afford a partial explanation for the smallness of the number of G. F. S. Members taking advantage of the change and rest afforded by Holiday House.

The Associate in charge, would recommend that some steps be taken to improve the exterior of the House as well as render it more comfortable. The work could be more cheaply done in the fall of the year, and an expenditure of about \$45 would cover these improvements, which would add very much to the comfort and appearance of the House.

Immigration Homes.

We would again draw attention to the Immigration Homes in Quebec and Montreal, where girls can be received on their arrival and find comfortable quarters; also to the Girls' Industrial Institute, corner of Richmond and Sheppard streets, and the new home of the Young Women's Christian Association, Elm street, Toronto, where good board and lodging are provided at very reasonable rates.

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Married Members.

According to the rules of the Society, girls cease to be Members upon their marriage, but those who still wish to continue their interest in it may rejoin the Society as Friendly Helpers, or Honorary Associates. Cards with the Associates' Prayer on the back may be obtained from the Secretary. An Honorary Associate contributes one dollar annually to the funds of the Society, but no fee is asked from a Friendly Helper.

Candidates.

The age for entrance into membership of the Girls' Friendly Society has been set at fifteen years. This seems to exclude girls at an age at which they may profitably be instructed in the value of mutual Christian sympathy and fellowship. To meet this want "Candidate" Classes have been established. These classes are to the Girls' Friendly Society what the Band of Hope is to the Church of England Temperance Society.

The Candidate Classes in which little girls are enrolled, and in which the principles of the Society are early instilled into the hearts of the young, will be found as nurseries, a source of strength to the Girls' Friendly Society, and we confidently recommend their formation in every parish.

The advantages of Candidate work to the Society cannot be overestimated; i.e., (a) the important help of early training in principles of purity, modesty, and unselfishness; (b) the value of preparation for membership; (c) the opportunities it affords for enlisting those who, in some localities, are alone eligible for membership. Candidates pay no subscription, but on enrolment receive a special card, to be obtained from the Secretary.

GENERAL BUSINESS REGULATIONS.

I. Every Branch to organize its own work, manage its own funds, and make its own rules subject to the Central Rules and Regula-

II. Where there is a Diocesan organization, Branch Secretaries tions of the Society. are to obtain Cards, Members' Guides, and other printed matter from their Diocesan Secretary. Where there is no Diocesan organization Branch Secretaries obtain Cards and Guides from the General Secretary, Miss Boulton, 15 Grange Road, Toronto.

III. Where no Branch is established, Associates obtain their own and Members' Cards and Guides from the General Secretary, forwarding subscriptions direct to her.

IV. Members' subscriptions to a Branch should be at the rate of twenty-four cents a year. Where there is no Diocesan organization, half the Members' fees and one quarter of the Honorary Associates' fees go to the Central Fund for printing expenses.

Where there is a Diocesan organization, half the Members' fees and one-quarter of the Honorary Associates' fees go into the Diocesan Treasury, and the Diocesan Secretary pays to the Central Fund, in lieu thereof, \$2 annually for every Branch in the Diocese, towards the printing expenses of the General Society.

V. Working Associates' subscriptions are at the rate of not less than sixty cents a year. Honorary Associates, not less than \$1.00 Working Associates' subscriptions belong to their a year.*

VI. Members' Cards and Guides to be furnished to Diocesan and Branches. Branch Secretaries on application to the General Secretary, at fifty cents a dozen for Guides and Cards. Associates' Cards supplied gratis. Secretaries sending for Cards will please state whether for Working or Honorary Associates.

Note.—The Diocesan President countersigns all Associates' Cards

issued in her Diocese. VII. Where there is no Diocesan organization of the Girls' Friendly Society, Associates wishing to organize Branches in their own neighbourhood are asked to communicate with Mrs. Wood, President of the Toronto Diocesan Council (acting at present as Central Council), and when Diocesan Councils are organized, they will please forward notice of the same to her.

N.B.—All correspondents are requested to write "G.F.S." outside their communications.

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[&]quot;It is hoped that Associates will consider this minimum not the necessary limit of their subscriptions. The more funds are placed at the Society's disposal, the more will be accomplished.

Rules for Associates.

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I. Associates to be *very careful* as to the character of the girls and young women whom they admit or recommend as Members. In most cases a short delay for probation is advised.

II. Associates, on admitting a Member, to give her a Member's Card, duly filled out, and a Guide-book.

III. When a Member leaves a locality to live elsewhere, her Associate should, if possible, transfer her at once to an Associate of the place to which she goes, to whom she shall in future pay her subscriptions. If a Member goes to a place where there is no Associate, her subscription must be sent twice a year to the Associate who admits her, who shall continue to keep up communication with her.

Note.—It would be well for the Associate or Branch that first admits a girl to membership, always to know where she is, and to retain a certain responsibility about her till she ceases to be a Member.

IV. When a Member leaves the Society, from whatever cause, her Card or Guide-book should be returned by her Associate to the Branch (or Diocesan) Secretary.

V. Associates, or Honorary Associates wishing, for any reason, to withdraw from the Society, to return their Cards to the Branch (or Diocesan) Secretary.

VI. When a Branch is formed, every new Associate to be elected at a Branch Meeting.

Rules for Members.

I. No girl who has not borne a virtuous character can be admitted as a Member of the G. F. S.

II. Girls and young women may join the Society, from the age of fifteen and upwards, on the recommendation of an Associate.

Note.—Age to be determined by each Local Society.

III. Members to pay not less than six cents a quarter to the Society; if they refuse to pay their subscription, they lose their Card.

Note.—Members belonging to a Branch Association pay six cents a quarter; half of this sum being retained for the Branch Fund, and half sent to the Central or Diocesan Fund.

IV. Members to make their payments quarterly in advance to the Associate in the place where they may be living, the receipt form in the Guide-book to be signed by her. If not able to do this, they should send their payments twice a year to the Associate, with the Guide-book, which will go in a letter and be returned receipted.

V. Members must always let their Associates know at once if they change their address, and must be careful always to keep the Society's Card and Guide-book in their own possession.

VI. Members cease to belong to the Society on their marriage, unless they continue to be connected with it as Friendly Helpers.

VII. Members leaving the Society, from whatever cause, to return their Card and Guide-book to their Associates.

A Few Words about Branch Secretaries.

First, the Secretary's own heart must be in the work; unless she has confidence in her cause, it is quite impossible to inspire others

The Secretary must be business-like. It may seem a small thing, with confidence. but it is not, for there must be method and arrangement in the work, as no Branch can prosper where the Secretary is unbusinesslike. The Secretary should be very careful about her accounts, to enter in her list at once every fresh Member and Associate; to be punctual in sending the percentage on Members' and Honorary Associates' subscriptions, and the Report Forms annually to the General or Diocesan Secretary, and to be very accurate in keeping her books.

A few rules may be added:

I. Branch Secretaries to be elected for one year, by the Associates of the Branch, and to be eligible for re-election.

II. Branch Secretaries to give notice to the General or Diocesan Secretary on giving up office.

III. Branch Secretaries to send a list of all the Working Associates of the Branch, with their address in full, to the General or Diocesan Secretary, and the number (only) of the Honorary Associates, BEFORE

MAY 1ST. N.B.—It is important for Branch Secretaries to be prompt in filling out the Report Forms and sending them in time, also to write the Associates' names and addresses in a legible nand.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.

FREDERICTON.—Since our last report the Members of our Branch have been able to place in the Bishop's hands the sum of \$25 to be added to the Building fund of the new Church at Marysville. Our little Candidates, too, have contributed \$10 to purchase an altar for the Mission Chapel at Morison's Mills, this amount being the result of more than two years, work by their tiny fingers, and the unwearied efforts of Mrs. Merritt, the Associate who has charge of the class in that locality.

Mrs. Cowper having been obliged to resign, the Secretary has now taken charge of the Members' class which meets at her house on Tuesday evenings, and the Candidates' class in the city. This meets after school hours on Monday afternoons in a room over the Madras school which has been fitted up for the purpose, and where, after the work is over, they are allowed to have a good romp before parting.

St. John.—The weekly meetings of the St. John Branch have been held much as usual. The membership has, we fear, slightly decreased, for our average is thirty with ten Associates. We are not, however, discouraged, for the girls who come are interested and the decrease in numbers may partly be due to the increase of parochial guilds and associations of all sorts.

There are two non-resident Members, living in isolated districts, who had come to our Province well recommended by their English Associates and who have seemed much helped and comforted in their distant country homes by an occasional letter and printed matter. This seems one of the ways in which the G. F. S. can stretch out a helping hand.

The work of the girls has been utilized by their sewing for charitable institutions of our own city such as The Little Girls' Home and The Seaman's Mission, while they have sent gifts to Diocesan and Foreign Missions.

Part of each evening has generally been given to music.

The Annual Service was held on the Feast of the Epiphany and again in Trinity Church, where an admirable address was given by Archdeacon Brigstocke. The service was followed by the usual social gathering at the rooms which was particularly bright and successful in every way. The cards were presented, also some kalendars given by an ever thoughtful Associate.

Early in the year we, in common with the Church at large, sustained a severe loss in the death of Archdeacon Brigstocke, who had always cared most kindly for our interests, both temporal and spiritual. This sad event in our history has also deprived us of the valuable services of Mrs. Brigstocke, who has removed from St. John. There was a resolution of sympathy from Members and Associates forwarded to Mrs. Brigstocke, to which she sent a fitting reply.

Miss Jane Barlow has again kindly taken the Bible Class.

The Day of Intercession for the G. F. S. was marked with us by a service at Trinity Church, where the Archbishop of York's beautiful prayer was used and suitable hymns sung.

One of our Members having suffered severe personal loss in a recent devastating fire, some little gifts were provided by a few of the Associates. She was not only most grateful for what was given, but seemed to value even more highly the sympathy which had dictated the loving service.

One of our Members was married during the year, very happily we believe.

The closing meeting was held on June 10th.

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TORONTO.—The four Parochial Branches of the G. F. S. in the city of Toronto are at present the only ones in the Diocese, but we hope to extend the work.

Six meetings of the Council have been held, including the Annual Meeting held in Holy Trinity School House on October 28th, 1898, at which Miss Ridley, Secretary of one of the Hamilton Branches, was present, and read the report of Holiday House. A summary of the Canadian Report for the year was read, also reports of two meetings held in Montreal at which several of the Canadian Dioceses were represented.

Mrs. Moore's report from England of the meetings held during the anniversary week there was read, and addresses were given by Mrs. Wood and by a former Associate, Mrs. Davidson. Tea was afterwards provided through the kindness of the Secretary of Holy Trinity Branch.

The service on the Day of Intercession was held in St. John's Church, Norway, through the kindness of the Rev. W. Baynes Reed—all four Brauches were present and St. George's, the Church of Redeemer and St. Simon's Branches spent the afternoon in the country and had tea before the service.

The Branches were also invited to attend the Annual Meeting held in the interests of the Blackfoot Hospital and to bring in the collecting boxes taken for it. Their contents amounted to \$50, which was below the sum raised last year.

As many of the Members as could be assembled at very short notice were taken by Mrs. Wood to see the Canadian Historical Exhibition held last June.

Nine Members have been commended to the Toronto Branch during the year, and three married Members introduced.

The death of Miss Evans, Parochial Secretary of the Church of Redeemer Branch, is a great loss to her fellow-workers in Toronto. The Diocesan Council at its last meeting passed a resolution of sympathy with her family and Branch.

A vote of thanks was received from the Committee of Management of Holiday House thanking the Toronto Diocesan Branch for its generous gift of \$20 to the funds of Holiday House last year, and for all the kind interest shown in its welfare.

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ee of Managean Branch for buse last year, Canon Macnab, of St. Martin's, Davenport, has kindly undertaken to give a lecture in Holy Trinity School House on November 30th, on behalf of the Central Fund of the G. F. S.

Holy Trinity.—This Branch worked steadily each week from September, 1898, to the middle of June, 1899, with very few exceptions. Our growth, we feel, is not in proportion to our years as the oldest Branch in Toronto, still we hold our own. The work done each year is much the same, some parochial, some missionary, then we have our evenings for recreation, Bible classes, and an occasional evening at a friend's house. Miss McClean, an artist, kindly came and gave the girls a lesson in Physical Culture one evening, and afterwards invited the Branch to spend what proved a most enjoyable evening with her.

The Annual Festival was held in the Synod Hall, and the attendance was the largest we have The presence of the Bishop was a great source of pleasure, knowing the deep interest he takes in the work of the The Diocesan President, Mrs. G. S. Redpath, was also there, and gave a very interesting address to the Associates and Members, several of the Clergy were present, and the usual programme of music, songs, recitations and speeches, was successfully carried out. Last year at our Festival, we had the pleasure of welcoming Miss Whiteway, G. F. S. Secretary for St. Johns, Newfoundland, but in less than a year after, her work was ended, and she has been called to the rest of Paradise, dying far from her home, in South Africa, where her father, Sir William Whiteway, had taken her in the hope of restoration of her health, her loss will be deeply felt in St. Johns, where she worked so lovingly and so earnestly for the welfare of those around her. To all of us this sad event seems to bring the message, "Work while it is day, the night cometh when no man can work."

The Annual Service was again held in St. George's Church by the kind permission of the Dean, and was well attended. The Rev. Canon Dixon, Rector of St. Jude's, was the preacher on the occasion, taking for his text the words, "She hath done what she could," and applying them to the work of the G. F. S. in a very practical manner. The Dean conducted the rest of the service, and there were also present the Revs. O. W. Howard and Rev. G. Johnson.

Our representative at the Central Council, London, England, Miss Williams, spent the past winter at the Cape of Good Hope, and wrote a most interesting account of a G. F. S. Festival which she attended at Cape Town, and which was held in the grounds of the Hon. Cecil Rhodes. The room in the "Andrews' Home" is still rented by the G. F. S., and is a great comfort to Members when needing a rest, or, when passing through to other places. The last occupant was a Member who had been in the General Hospital.

The Secretary has had much pleasure in visiting the Branches and meeting their Members, and would like to give details of these visits, but they would make the report too long.

She would desire to thank the Secretary and Matron of the "National Immigration Home" on Osborre street, and the Matron and other officials of the "Andrews' Home," for their kindness and courtesy in giving her every assistance with regard to G. F. S. Members who pass through these Homes, and also to mention the kind care our invalid Members receive at that invaluable institution "The Moore Home."

A donation of material from Mrs. Haycock came most acceptably to our enthusiastic workers for Labrador, and in return six Members undertook to dress dolls for the Christmas Tree of the Maisonneuve Mission of our Parish Church.

On October 25th, Mrs. Parker, St. Louis, U. S., a delegate the following week to the Washington G. F. S. Convention, gave us an

earnest and helpful address.

The "Members' evening," a bi-yearly institution in our Branch, came off with much enjoyment on the 10th January. On these occasions the Members' talent furnishes songs and recitations, and the proceedings conclude with refreshments. Another of these social events will mark the close of the season in May.
