FAMINE AND DISEASE IN THE BRITISH WEST INDIA ISLANDS.—Advices from Bridgetown, Barbadoes, to the 20th ult., announce the arrival of the steamer *Mermaid*, with reports of a great want of breadstuffs at Tobago, Grenada and Trinidad. Quarantine regulations at Barbadoes were rigidly enforced on vessels from Tobago, in consequence of the prevalence of disease resembling the small-pox. The island continued to suffer from drought.

THE SPANISH DIFFICULTY.—The steamer *Vixen*, Commodore Morris, left Washington on Monday for Cuba. Commodore Morris is charged by the President with a firm and positive demand upon the Captain General of Cuba, and the release of the Contoy prisoners. It is believed that the demand will be complied with, if made in due form by Commodore Morris. Of course upon the result of Commodore Morris's mission must depend the future relations of this country towards Spain.

IMPORTATION FROM HAVANA.—Reported refusal of the Cuban Authorities to release the *Contoy* prisoners.—The New Orleans *Picayune* has dated from Havana to the 20th, stating that the American Consul had demanded the release of the prisoners and met a flat refusal. He was openly treated insultingly by the lower classes. The excitement at Havana was very great.

The *Prion*, steam frigate, recently returned to England from three years foreign service. During that period there had been one change among her officers, and two men only had been corporally punished—both of which were afterwards turned out of the ship on the principle that they were a disgrace to the service.

The Bombay papers say.—Sir Jamsetjee Jejeebhoy has just returned from a visit of some weeks to Nowarree, near Surat, the place of his birth; he had been accompanied by his lady and all his family, and during his stay had bestowed the sum of 247,000 sterling on public bequests; having lived, within these twenty years, bested 3,000,000 in all, from the earnings of his own hands, and of his public purposes. The honour hitherto bestowed on him for these matchless acts of high moral magnificence, is a title which perishes with him.
