





Dr. Veniot, on the other hand, asserts the Waterways Commission had nothing whatever to do with that agreement.



"We Should Live So, That We Will Not Be Afraid of What Others May Say About Us, and Having Done That, Not to Care a Hang What They DO Say," Advises Dorothy Dix.

THERE is no more difficult question to decide than how far we should be ruled by our neighbors, and where we should draw the line between snapping our fingers in Mrs. Grundy's face, and groveling in the dust before her.

A millionaire's insolent dictum, "The pub-

It isn't enough for us to be good; and act in accord with their conven-tions. There is an unw..tren law that we may not do certain things with-out subjecting ourselves to gossip, and we defy this at our peril.

THE married woman who goes joyriding with slick-haired youths may be, in reality, a devoted wife and mother, and faithful to her husband; the young girl who indulges in petting parties in automobiles parked in front of her house at 3 o'clock in the morning may be merely indiscreet. The married man who takes his stenographer out to lunch may be actuated by only the most altruistic motives, but their clear consciences avail them nothing.

Their neighbors cannot see into their souls. They can only judge by the outside, and make such deductions as appearances seem to warrant. Therefore, we are foolish if we think we can defy our neighbors, and do as we please, and live our own lives regardless of them.

EVERY now and then you find some intrepid individual who tries this experiment: A young girl who thinks she has the right to comfort and console some married man and receive his attentions. A couple who decide to live together without benefit of clergy. A man who scorns to follow the dictates of fashion, and who comes to your parties unshaven and unshorn, and wearing a fiannel shirt and baggy trousers. But sooner or later, the juggernaut of public opinion rolls over all of these people, and leaves them crushed and maimed. They find themselves ostracized, balked of their ambitions, dropped out of everything, and left to go their self-elected way alone.

Now this fear of what "they will say" is the begin Now this fear of what "they will say is the beginning righteousness. It is the hangman's whip that keeps many a weak, tempted brother and sister in the straight and narrow path. And it is a good and wholesome thing for us to entertain a proper respect for our neighbor's tongues, and to so conduct ourselves that we are not afraid of being the subject of conversation when two or three of them are gathered together.

But while we are wise to accord proper defrence to our neighbors' opinions, we are foolish to be slaves to them, and to be so afraid of what they will say about us that we sacrifice all of our independence to them.

For we may be sure that no matter what we do, we will be discussed and criticized, and that we will not be able to please everybody.

THE Joneses will think we stay at home too much; the Robinsons that we gad too much. The Smiths will opine that we are extravagant; the Thompsons that we are tightwads. The Johnsons will hold that we spoil our children; the Grahams that we are too hard upon them. If we have an automobile the O'Reillys will wonder how we can afford it. If we don't have one, the O'Roillys will wonder why we don't. If our household is a devoted one, some of the neighbors will hold us up as an example of a happy marriage, and others will suspect it of being a bluff.

And so it will go. Others will discuss us as we, in our turn, discuss them, and in the end we have to fall back upon the philosophy of the old Dutch merchant who suddenly acquired a fortune, and who, knowing that its origin would be a matter of speculation among his friends, carved over the doorway of the fine new mansion that he built:

"THEY SAY. THEY WILL SAY. LET THEM BE SAYING."

Unfortunately this fear of "what they say" makes such cowards of many people that they will ruin their lives rather than do something that they think the neighbors might criticize. It is at the bottom of what makes men starve along at what they call "white-collar jobs" when they might be making fortunes in some trade. It is what crowds the professions with the unfit who would make successes as carpenters, or bricklayers, or plumbers.

FOR years the fear of what the neighbors would say kept women thread-bare in genteel poverty, and eating the bitter bread of dependence, who were just aching to get out and work and make money for themselves. This dread of what the neighbors will say is still keeping thousands of women who have a genius for cookery that they would love to express, and who thrill at the sight of a pan and pot out of the kitchens they long to be in.

They would a million times rather go out to domestic service than work in factories or clerk in stores, if they weren't terrorized by the thought of what their neighbors would say.

WORST of all, this fear of what "they say" makes men and women ruin themselves by extravagances. They feel that they have to keep up with the Joneses. They haven't the courage to live according to their means. They think they will be criticized if they don't give the sort of parties their friends give, and wear the same sort of clothes and have as good a car. So they run into debt and come to disaster in the end.

And the queer part of it all is that when we are brave enough to be independent, and choose the sort of work we are fitted for by nature, when we roll our own baby carriages and make our own frocks and ride in a flivver and live within our means, our neighbors all praise us for it, and say kindly things, instead of ridiculing us as they do when we pretend and pose.

THE moral of all of which is that we should live so that we will not be afraid of what "they say" about us, and having done that, not care a hang what they do say.

## Scientists To Sumatra For Sun's Total Eclipse

By DAVID DIETZ.

A COLLECTION of costly telescopes, astronomical cameras, spectroscopes and other expensive apparatus is now on the first leg of a journey half-way around the world. It was shipped recently from New York, bound for Singapore.

feet. This will be mounted on concrete piers.

This instrument uses twin lens of six and three-quarter inches aperture. It is a particularly powerful instrument and will be used to photograph both the eclipsed sun and its corona and the stars which become visible in the surrounding sky at the moment of totality.

These photographs will prove para-

At Singapore, it will be placed on another ship and taken to Sumatra, one of the larger islands of the Malay archipelago. The equator cuts through the middle of Sumatra. There are six active volcanoes on Sumatra. Earthquakes occur occasionally. Waterspouts and severe thunderstorms are frequent.

spouts and severe thunderstorms are frequent.

You might wonder, therefore, why expensive astronomical apparatus is being sent to Sumatra. It is because a total eclipse of the sun will be visible there on Jan. 14, 1926.

It is only occasionally that astronomers are lucky enough to have a total eclipse visible over easily accessible territory like the eclipse of last January, which was visible in a track extending from Minnesota to New York city.

Usually astronomers have to carry their instruments to far off places and run the risk of having months of preparations ruined by a cloud or sudden rain at the moment of the total eclipse.
