

Discussion Over This in the Senate Yesterday- Speakers Uphold the League of Nations.

(Canadian Pres)

Ottawa, June 9-Discussion of the League of Nations changed in the senate yesterday to a debate on - Canada's status within the British Empire. Re-fering to the disarmament conferences recently in Washington, it was ques-tioned whether or not Canada had any recently in Washington, it was ques-tioned whether or not Canada had any legal right to representation there. Hon. L. O. David, while paying a tri-bute to the work of Hon. G. D. Robert-son, former minister of labor, declared that if the labor chiefs in France had had their way, France would have been without any protection when war broke out and the German troops would have been at the gate of Paris in a few months. Russia was an example of the triumph of Socialistic ideas. The ques-tion of Canada's status in the League of Nations was a big one and would come up for review before parliament. He endorsed the work of the league. Hon. Thomas Chapais said there were many historic precedents for the léague. The present league was by no means perfect but its effectiveness would in-crease. He gave his wholehearted sup-port to the project. Senator Beique declared that means must be found to prevent other wars. The only known means for this work was the league. Before the war he had believed that such a league was neces-sary and he rejoiced in its formation. Hon B. Dandurand government

Some in Menial Occupations to Get Living-Suicide of Prominent One Who Could Not Support Family.

Berlin, April 18-(Associated Press Berlin, April 18—(Associated Press By Mail.)—Fighting for a post-war ex-istence in civilian life has proved more harrassing than the fortunes of the bat-tlefield to many of the thousands of German officers who survived the war. They numbered some 300,000 at the time of the armistice. While the majority held only war-time commissions, there were a large number of veterans for whom the lifting smoke of the conflict revealed that they had suddenly been uprooted from their chosen careers and were forced to begin afresh in new fields. It was especially difficult for the aged officers, who were no longer vigorous and adaptable enough to battle effective-ly in an economic maelstrom already burdend with keen competition. The German army and navy in peace

burdened with keen competition. The German army and navy in peace times included an active officers' crops of 55,760, of whom 50,960 were in the mili-tary forces. When the war broke out, this 'list was augumented by 270,000 of those who were retired or on reserve. In addition there was the commissioned staff of the medical branches numbering 83,406. The total loss in the corps amounted to about 55,000 killed and 96,-218 wounded.

Dr. Allen Krause Says the Death Rate is Gradually Diminishing-Why Children Take It.

(Toronto Globe.) The progress of medical knowledge and the medical conception of tubercúl-The progress of mental anomaly-sand the medical conception of tubercul-osis during the past century, was the subject of a comprehensive address by Dr. Allen Krause, who is in charge of elinical and research work in tubercul-osis at the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, and has written extensively on this disease. Dr. Krause chose as the title of his address, which was deliver-ed before the Ontario Medical Associa-tion, holding its forty-second annual meeting in University College, University of Toronto, "The Changing Face of Tuberculosis." He explained that the reason for this title was the continual change that was taking place in the med-ical view of tuberculosis. Doctors should not allow themselves to fall into a rut or to follow a rigid method of techni-que in dealing with this disease. They ghould keep abreast of all new know-ledge as to its cure.

He dwelt on the necessity that the doctors should do all in their power to help those who were recovering from tuberculosis up the long hill to health-It needed the touch of man to man and woman to woman more than anything else. Care for years and even for a lifetime was essential before health might



People were infected by inhaling dry dust, according to the old idea. Túber-culosis in children was considered a re-latively rare disease, and pulmonary tuberculosis was thought to be practic-ally non-existent at the time. Phthisis was thought of as a household infection, and no one was thought to be in danger from infection. from infection

pecially common in children. Figures on tuberculosis infection in children, how-ever, showed that it usually occurred between the ages of three and six, when the child was crawling around. The majority of these cases were not caused through direct contact or through bov-ine infection, but through spútum, which is continually bespattering our side-walks and the ground. When one took into consideration the usual habits of the ordinary child in playing in the dirt and putting its hands into its mouth, one should not overlook this important factor. Dr. Krause was strongly of the opinion that spitting should be made unfashionable both by prohibitory re-gulations and through public education, like any other bodily excreta. About seventy-five million persons in the United States were infected with tüberculosis, but of these only one-six-tieth or one-seventieth fell ill. The ma-jority of infection was benign. Prevs on the Poor.

Tuberculosis followed wealth inverse-ly, both as to morbidity and mortality. Poor conditions of living were specially conducive to the spread of the disease. Alcoholism did not have a direct effect

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
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

16 \$500,000 GIFT FOR N.Y. HOSPITAL

Banker Adds to Previous Donation, and \$750,000 Endowment will be Formed---Deficits will be Offset.


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New York, June 10-A gift of \$500,000 to the Society of the New York Hospital by George E. Baker, chairman of the directors of the First National Bank, has been announced by Edward W. Sheldon,

been announced by Edward W. Sheldon, president of the society, at a meeting of the board of governors. A week ago public announcement was made that Mr. Baker had donated \$1,000,000 to the Metropolitan Musem of Art in the form of an endowment fund. The board of governors in accepting the gift unanimously adopted a resolu-tion to establish the George F. Baker Endowment Fund of \$750,000, consisting of the present endowment of a half mil-lion dollars and one of \$250,000 made by Mr. Baker to the society in 1912. The preamble and resolutions were as fol-lows:--

lows:-"The governors of the society of the New York Hospital are profoundly grateful to Mr. George F. Baker for the munificent gift made by him for the purposes mentioned in his letter of May 29, 1922. This is the second time that he has given the institution most liberal and stimulating air. To carry out his wish, expressed in that letter, it was thereupon unanimously "Resolved, That the Society of the New York Hospital gratefully accepts Mr. George F. Baker's gift of \$500,000 of United States Victory Loan 3 3-4 per cent. notes to constitute a part of its endowment fund, the income to be used for the corporate purposes of the soci-ety, and was it was further unanimously "Resolved, That as a permanent me-
