THE PUBLIC INTEREST.

If the people of a community do not show an active interest in matters affecting their common welfare they become the prey of individuals and corporations seeking to get rich at their expense. Public apathy is responsible for deals that sacrifice public interest for private gain. The need of public utilities gives profiting gentlemen a fine field of operation, of which they never fail to take full advantage. They will go just as far as it is safe to go in exploiting the public, and they flourish most where there is the least evidence of public spirit. That people grumble does not worry them at all. Grumbling leaves no mark, and the noise is drowned in the clink of the coin of profit. If the people are to guard their own interests they must be alert, watchful, organized, and ready to defend. Monday evening's public meeting at the board of trade will be a good starting point for the citizens of St. John to take a new grip of their own affairs. Believing them to be asleep, the New Brunswick Power Co. has launched a scheme to get dividends on watered stock by increasing the cost of gas, electric light and power, and street car service. Because some people were not asleep, or even dozing, the city council found it expedient to ask some questions and get a report. The MacIntyre report has exposed the whole game, though it failed to get all the facts, because Mr. MacIntyre was denied access to books which would have given names and amounts and other information the public desires very much to get. It is now the duty of the people to act on the information already given them, and protect themselves from an unwarrantable extortion. We are told that at the last meeting of the New Brunswick Telephone directors only routine business was transacted. Let that be accepted as correct, but keep an eye on the telephone company and certain active promoters. Some cohorts which come from Halifax are interesting. And meanwhile the company already has one application before the Public Utilities Commission in which business men are very much interested. St. John ought to be made a rather poor field for proponents of high finance. The whole province should be aroused to a keener interest in all that relates to public franchises and public utilities. All applications for legislation respecting them should be scrutinized with the greatest care.

THE POTATO MARKET.

The United States department of agriculture has deemed it necessary to advise dealers in potatoes to sell. Although the crop in that country last year was 442,536,000 bushels, or the largest ever produced there, the price has ruled higher than in any previous year of which there is record, with the exception of last year when the crop was abnormally short. The amazing fact is stated that up to Dec. 31 not more than one-third of the marketable surplus had been moved. In other words, two-thirds of the American potato crop of 1917 was still to be moved at the end of the year. Very little has been moved since then. Hence the department says: "The present reserve stocks are so widely distributed that the transportation problems presented do not appear to be acute. Generally speaking, more potatoes could be moved if offered for shipment. The situation demands energetic and vigorous action on the part of all concerned in the movement of this crop. Unless dealers promptly move the stocks on hand in order to speed up distribution and bring the large reserve still on the channels of trade, heavy wastage of the crop appears certain to result later in the season. It is believed that dealers will in the end find it wiser to move present holdings without profit or even at some loss rather than to risk destructive wastage later in the season. At the same time, present retail prices must be somewhat reduced if potato consumption is to be stimulated as it should be. "Prices at point of production have generally declined since planting began and many dealers are reputed to hold large stocks purchased at prices higher than those now prevailing. This may account in some measure for the present slow rate of movement out of some of the heaviest producing areas and for the abnormally wide difference between present wholesale prices to the grower and retail prices to the consumer. "Under existing and prospective conditions no material quantity of potatoes can be exported or converted into perishable products this season. The crop cannot be carried over. It must be consumed or wasted. The food situation throughout the world demands that it be consumed effectively to relieve the existing strain on the supply of cereals. It is the one great food resource of the world upon which there is now danger of a heavy loss and the department is of the opinion that the situation demands that the farmers sell freely; that the larger dealers move their stocks rapidly; and that the retailer control himself with the smallest possible margin of profit, realizing that he is now the most important factor in speeding up potato consumption."

THE KINDERGARTEN.

The adoption of a resolution at the recent Rotary conference in this city declaring that the kindergarten should be made a part of the public school system showed clearly the growing public sentiment in favor of that course. In the meantime, so far as St. John is concerned, the Free Kindergarten Association must continue its work and depend upon voluntary contributions. For nearly fifteen years a small committee of ladies, backed by subscriptions from the citizens, have conducted free kindergartens, and enlarged the scope of the work, all the time pleading that it be given its rightful place in the public school system. Their patient devotion has been of immense value in helping not only children but families; and the people have gradually come to recognize the need of placing the kindergarten where it belongs—in the public schools. Over and over again it has been urged that the conservation of child life is of vastly more importance than that of other animal life, or of forests, or of material resources of any kind; but the people have been slow to learn the lesson. They have been learning it, however, and now the war has placed a special emphasis upon the need of child-welfare work, from infancy to the threshold of manhood and womanhood. In most European countries, in the United States, even in China and Japan, the value of the kindergarten is recognized; as it is also in an increasingly large number of places in Canada. We are told that Japan, after a study of ten ahead of the college, believing foundation work to be of most importance. It is worthy of note that at last year's kindergarten convention in Boston, at which St. John was well represented, not less than a thousand primary teachers in public schools were present to show their sympathy and co-operation in kindergarten work and methods. It is the testimony of teachers generally that the kindergarten pupil makes the brightest pupil in the first grade of the public school. Much emphasis is now laid upon manual training. It begins in the kindergarten. The little child's eye and ear and hand are unconsciously trained and its faculties developed through what is really delightful play. St. John people should not rest content with a contribution to the free kindergarten. They should follow a generous contribution with an organized effort to get the work established in the public schools, as a part of the regular school system. They owe much to the devoted women who have so long labored under great difficulty to carry on the work as at present established.

THE CAPTURE OF JERUSALEM

Sir E. Allanby Tells of Completion of Task Begun By the Crusaders of By-gone Centuries

Sir E. Allanby in his despatch describing the fall of Jerusalem gives the following account of the operations. The situation on the Palestine front in the second week of July, 1917, was as follows: The Turkish army in Southern Palestine held a strong position extending from the sea at Gaza, roughly along the main Gaza-Bethsheba road to Beersheba. Gaza had been made into a strong modern fortress, heavily entrenched and wired, offering every facility for protracted defence.

In fifteen days our force had advanced sixty miles on its right and about forty on its left. It had driven a Turkish army of nine infantry divisions and one cavalry division out of a position in which it had been entrenched for six months, and had pursued it, giving battle whenever it attempted to stand, and inflicting on it losses amounting probably to nearly two-thirds of the enemy's original effective. Over 2,000 prisoners, about eighty guns, more than 100 machine guns and very large quantities of ammunition and other stores had been captured.

The situation was now as follows:—The enemy's army, cut in two by our capture of Junction Station, had retired partly east into the mountains towards Jerusalem and partly north along the plain. On our side the mounted troops had been marching and fighting continuously since October 31st, and had advanced a distance of seventy-five miles measured in a straight line from Asala to Jaffa. The troops, after their heavy fighting at Gaza, had advanced in nine days a distance of about forty miles, with two severe engagements and continual advanced guard fighting. The 52nd (Lowland) Division, which stands nine miles in this position.

On the 21st a body of infantry moved north-east by a track from Kurat at Enab through Biddu and Kisuwa towards Jaffa. Progress was slow, but by evening the ridge on which stands Nebi Samuil was secured. Favored by a continuance of fine weather, preparation for a fresh advance against the Turkish positions west and north of Junction Station proceeded rapidly. The date for the attack was fixed as the 8th December. Welsh troops, with a cavalry regiment attached, had advanced from their positions north of Beersheba to the Hebron-Jerusalem road on the 4th. No opposition was met, and by evening of the 6th the head of this column was ten miles north of Hebron. The infantry were directed to reach the Bethlehem-Jaffa area by the 8th. Tel el Khuffeif was to be attacked at dawn on the 6th, and the troops were to endeavor to reach the Tel el Khuffeif-Rijm el Dhib.

The attack progressed rapidly, the enemy's extreme left with great dash; and soon after noon the London and Irish troops commenced their attack. Sheria Station was captured before dark. Some 600 prisoners were taken and some guns and machine guns captured. The bombardment of Gaza had meanwhile continued, and another attack was ordered to take place on the night of the 6th-7th. The attack on Outpost Hill and Middelex Hill met with little opposition, and as soon as they had been taken, as patrols could be pushed forward, the enemy was found to be gone. East Anzian troops on the left also found dawn that the enemy had retired during the night, and early in the morning the main force occupied the northern and eastern defences of Gaza. It soon became obvious from the reports of the Royal Artillery Corps, that the enemy was retiring in considerable disorganization, and could offer no very serious resistance if pressed with determination. Direct Pursuit By the 9th, therefore, operations had reached the stage of a direct pursuit by the main force as could be supplied so far in front of railhead. Orders were accordingly issued to press the pursuit and to reach Junction Station as early as possible, thus cutting off the Jerusalem army. Operations on the 10th and 11th showed a stiffening of the enemy's resistance on the general line of the Wadi Sukeir, with centre about El Kusineh; the Hebron group, after an ineffective demonstration in the direction of Akar el Henshlye on the 10th, retired northeast of powder consumed.

CONDITIONS IN IRELAND LIKE BOLSHIEVIK RULE

A London Times despatch dealing with conditions in Ireland says—where I, we are, proud to believe, in this country a large class of persons who wish to show that Ireland cannot be governed by British law, and they purpose to achieve their end by a state of anarchy. They are striving with deplorable success to make all feel that the government has become powerless to guarantee the ordinary securities of civilization to any citizen. 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Government in Fear.
"We believe the government's inaction has been due largely to fear of Nationalist newspapers. It has been their policy to make such a clamor over the punishment of political crime that officials at Dublin Castle have been obliged to accept the responsibility of enforcing the law. These newspapers are now beginning to realize that non-enforcement of the law is not a sure way to political supremacy. It is only necessary to add that the belief is widely entertained that this law has the same inspiration which fills the ranks of the Russian revolutionaries."

TOWER CRIPPLED LINER 1,200 MILES
Halifax, Feb. 22.—There are on record many long distance tows by steamers or tugboats, nearly all of them made at season for the year when winds are moderate and the sea is comparatively smooth. The longest tow recorded in the world was made by the Cunard liner Clara, 3,857 tons, dragging on eight stout cables a disabled tugboat for 1,200 miles. The tow was made on the Atlantic coast last Sunday, the Cunarder hauled her heavy and helpless burden. "Tow and time again the lines parted, but there were always some of the eight big hawsers that held until the broken ones could be renewed. Often the towing ship was unable to make headway against the storm, but she kept steadily driving into the great seas, making a knot and then until a lull in the storm would enable her to manufacture a respectable tow.

Besides having established a tow record, Captain Fear and his crew are entitled to the credit of having saved the Clara from the possibility of falling a victim to the U-boats. When her distress signals were picked up in mid-Atlantic she had for days been drifting back towards the danger zone through which she had recently passed in safety. Thus the possible loss of a valuable ship—a national asset—was avoided.

CHATAQUA CIRCUIT FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

CONVOCAATION ORATOR
The Archbishop of York, Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon-Lewis, D. D., D. C. L., L. E. Litt. D., Fellow of All Souls' College, Oxford, will be the next convocation orator at the University of Chicago on March 19. Archbishop Lang was educated at Glasgow University and Balliol College, Oxford, and for three years was Fellow and Dean of Divinity at Magdalen College, Oxford. He received the year of St. Mary's, the University church at Oxford, in 1908, Bishop of Stepney in 1913, and in 1914, Bishop of Queen Victoria. In 1908 he was appointed Archbishop of York. Among his publications are "The Miracles of Jesus, as Marks of the Way of Life, and the Opportunity of the Church of England."

SOLDIERS' VOTE FOR GOVERNMENT

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—Further returns of the soldiers' vote in Canada, show that Quebec is the only province where an opposition candidate received more votes from the men in khaki than did the government candidate. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Quebec East, got 73 votes while Brown, the government candidate only received 42. In Quebec West, Parent, opposition, got 120 votes to 81 for Chase, government. Alphonse Verreille received five votes as against two for the Conservative member in the National Assembly of the soldiers' vote polled. Pelletier, the endorsed Laurier candidate in Mistassini, got a majority of 200 to 100. In the last house got none. They must save with all their might. There was never a time when they had a better chance to do great work than now, and their service lies in field and kitchen."—Mrs. Martin Burrell.

"Waste not—want not." It was one of the first things I learned in life. In England people are brought up not to waste a crumb. They can see so many of the poor around them that they realize the sinfulness of waste. I know at our own home we had regular penitences who called every day for food. The wife of the secretary of state, Mrs. Martin Burrell, believes firmly in the good old-fashioned doctrine of thrift. She thinks the present generation has fallen away from the careful, economical ways of the mothers and grandmothers who spent most of their time within the four walls of their homes, spinning and cooking, and attending to the general work of the household.

"I'm glad I'm not the food controller," observed Mrs. Burrell, when asked what she thought about the question of food conservation. "It's a thankless task, the worst. No matter what a man's intentions are, they are sure to be misconstrued when he has to dictate to the people at large, and especially when it is in regard to what they must eat. It's all very hard matter to say what another person should do, for each one has his own problems. However, I think that the people of Canada are beginning to realize the need of economy."

Mrs. Burrell does not believe much in hard and fast rules for the whole community, such as would be necessary were compulsory rationing introduced. She believes that everyone should do his utmost in saving, according to his circumstances. "There are a great many luxuries in use, which we think of almost as necessities, and we could easily do without—candies and sweets of all kinds for instance," said Mrs. Burrell. "We need a certain amount of sugar, but nothing like the quantities commonly used. Of course, it is easy for one person to say, 'Why don't you do this?' and 'Why don't you do that?' But each individual has to decide for himself what he shall do in his own case. "We are a small family and there is no waste where we are concerned. I make a point of using as little meat as possible, and we substitute fish and eggs wherever we can. I think it is a most excellent thing that the flour has been standardized. It will make it much easier for people to conserve when they know they cannot pick and choose but must use a uniform brand. It surprises me that more use is not made of rye flour. It makes excellent cake. In fact, you can scarcely distinguish it from the other."

HOW HE WON THE VICTORIA CROSS

Pictou Soldier Captured Machine Gun and Killed the Crew—Lost Life in Saving Comrade

(Bangor Commercial). Mrs. W. Quilton Genge of Bangor, wife of the pastor of Grace Methodist church, has received word that her first cousin, Private James Peter Robertson, of the British army, was awarded the Victoria Cross just before meeting his death on the battlefield. Private Robertson captured a German machine gun which was being used by the ranks of a British attacking party, and killing four of the crew, turned the gun on the Germans, demolishing the lives of scores of his comrades. A Reuters dispatch gives the following details of the brave deed which won for him the highest distinction awarded in the British army. The pity is that he did not survive to enjoy the fruit of his heroism: "No. 522965, Private James Peter Robertson of 18th C. M. R., Pictou, N. S., has been awarded the Victoria Cross for utmost bravery and outstanding devotion in an attack, during which his platoon was held up by uncut wire, and a machine gun was causing many losses. Robertson dashed to an opening on the flank, and, alone, rushed the machine gun. After a desperate struggle with the crew he killed four of them and then turned the machine gun on the remainder, who, overcome by the fierceness of his onslaught, were running toward their own lines. His gallant work enabled the platoon to advance. He inflicted many more losses on the enemy, and then, carrying the captured machine gun, led his platoon to the final objective. He there selected an excellent position and got the gun into action, demolishing the enemy by the fire he brought to bear upon them. His courage and coolness cheered his comrades and inspired them to the utmost efforts. We regret, however, that at the completion of the action, while Robertson was carrying back a wounded man, he was killed in front of our trenches." Mr. Robertson died maintaining several traditions of heroism in his immediate family. His eldest brother, Daniel, was one of the outstanding figures of the great Springhill explosion several years ago, when he received a gold medal for distinguished rescue work under conditions probably as difficult as those in which his younger brother achieved his remarkable feat.

with an American-bred horse. This he did in 1881, when Pierre Lejard's Iroquois defeated the best horses in Europe in the most famous race in the world. Pincus was born in Baltimore in 1838 and as a boy went to Charleston, where he became interested in the thoroughbred. After less than a year as an apprentice, and at fourteen years of age, he became a jockey. During his first month in the saddle in 1862 he rode several winners at Charleston and then went to New Orleans, where he attained greater success, and from there to Saratoga, where he distinguished himself by leading all other jockeys in regard to winning mounts. In the decade preceding the Civil War he was considered the best jockey on the American turf. When his days in the saddle ended because of age and weight, he turned his attention to training. And at this he earned immortal fame. He was welcomed everywhere, and on the French and English tracks received courtesies seldom accorded to a foreigner. At one time he trained the horses belonging to the late August Belmont, father of the present chairman of the Jockey Club. So faithful was he to his employer that when old age deprived him of a position Mr. Belmont pensioned him. This pension he enjoyed until his death. Besides being a jockey and trainer, he also was a starter. He held that position for several years at the Monmouth Park, N. J., track.

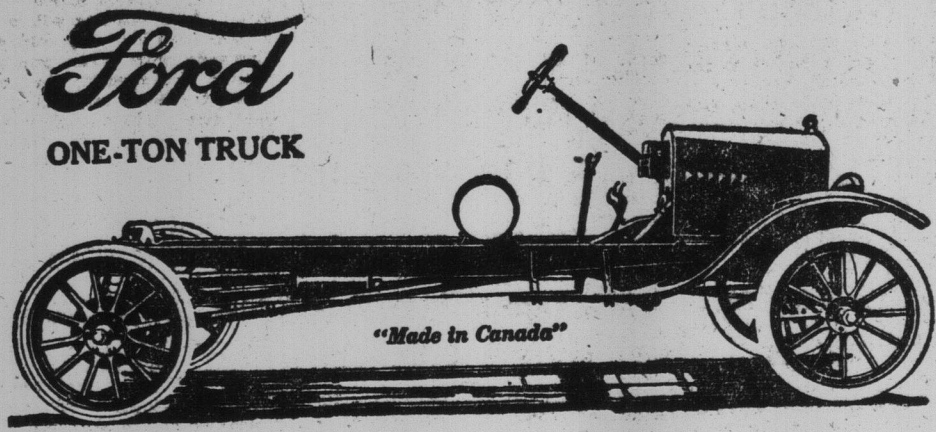

ALEXANDER AFTER PITCHING RECORD

May Be First to Win Thirty Games in Each of Four Straight Seasons—Weegman Boasting

Charley Weegman of the Cubs says his three pitching hunkies—Alexander, Vaughn and Douglas—will win ninety games among them next season. George Tyler, under the same Weegman specifications, will be depended upon to win the other games necessary to make the Cubs champions.

Judging from Weegman's estimate, he has little knowledge of past pitching records. The fact that Alexander won thirty or more games for three consecutive seasons must have brought Weegman to the conclusion that this is an ordinary feat.

As a matter of fact, during the last thirty years only ten pitchers have succeeded in winning thirty games or more in a single season. Alexander will be pitching for a record next spring. If he wins thirty games again in 1918 he will be the first pitcher to string together thirty or more victories for four successive years.

Only two pitchers, Christy Mathewson and Cy Young, have succeeded in winning thirty or more games on four occasions, but neither of these could do so for four successive seasons.

Never Such a Trio.

From Weegman's remarks he expects Alexander, Vaughn and Douglas each to win in thirty games. Throughout baseball history there never was a team with three pitchers who were able to turn in thirty victories apiece. Only twice has a club been so fortunate as to have two pitchers able to win thirty games or more. That was in 1908 and 1909, when both Mathewson and McGinnity of the Giants won over thirty games for two successive seasons.

Only one left-hander in baseball history has won thirty or more games a season—at least going back thirty years. This pitcher was Frank Killen of the old Pittsburghs, who twice during the '90s chalked up over thirty games for the Pirates. To win thirty games, therefore, Vaughn has a task before him that defied the best efforts of the former star left-handers of the generation, including such stars as Waddell, Plank and Rucker. As far as the record goes, however, only one man in their careers were Chesbro and Walsh able to win more than 30 games.

The Pitchers' Hall of Fame.

Young Mathewson and Alexander have pitched 30 or more games four times; Killen, McGinnity and Johnson did it twice, and Walsh, Chesbro and Coombs only once. The records of these pitchers who have won 30 or more games within the last generation follow:

STILL ENSLAVING THE YOUNG BELGIANS

Washington, Feb. 22.—Official despatches to the Belgian legation today told of further commanding by the Germans of young Belgians for military work behind the German lines and the signing of Louis Franck, a Flemish deputy, ten thousand marks for urging the Flemish people to stand steadfast in their resistance to German political intrigues.

Franck was taken before a military tribunal and was threatened with deportation, the despatches said, but despite the German concern over the spread of the movement against the authority of the self-styled council of Flanders, this threat was not carried out. The judgment declared that since the deputy was charged with having incited a spirit of opposition, this was the last time that he could hope to escape with a fine.

States, is bound to be affected by these unsettled conditions. Chances in the United States means difficulty in Canada especially in the fuel problems, and we can only do our best until conditions right themselves," he said.

GOAL PROSPECTS NOT MUCH BETTER FOR NEXT YEAR

"We can't, even with supervision, dispense the miracle of the barley leaves and the fishes," said Fuel Controller C. A. Magrath, who was in the city yesterday, when discussing the outlook on the fuel market for the coming twelve months. The fuel controller visited St. John to consult with Dr. James H. Frink, his district representative, relative to general conditions here and particular problems to be dealt with.

The fuel year in Canada, or what might be termed the fiscal year, begins on April 1, and in spite of the fact that this is "All Fool's Day," the fuel controller is determined to see that it be transferred into an "All Fuel Day" for Canada, when the new scheme for the conservation of the fuel supply will become fully operative.

"No one can tell what fuel conditions will be like in Canada during the next twelve months," he said. "When we are at war anything can happen in the space of twenty-four hours, so it is very nearly impossible to prophesy what conditions we are likely to be up against."

"It is true that we have had practically no supervision of fuel conditions during the past twelve months," he added, "and a close and careful supervision will, of course, conserve the supply of fuel available as well as distribute it more equitably throughout the country."

"In Nova Scotia alone the production of coal has fallen off 1,000,000 tons during the past year. Now perhaps that is a bit startling, but it is nevertheless true. Your industries are going full blast, using a maximum quantity of fuel; new shell manufacturing plants have sprung up over the country and many of the miners have left the mines and are working in the munitions plants where the wage is better. All this has forced production down and the explosion at the Allan shaft, at Stellarton (N. S.) lopped off another splendid producing mine, for a time at least. Under these conditions there is a reduction of 1,000,000 tons for the year just about to close."

Speaking of hard coal conditions throughout Canada, Mr. Magrath said: "I have said before on many occasions that you cannot get a jug of clean water out of a pail of muddy water and I'll make the point to you what I mean. There are 100,000,000 people plunged suddenly into a great war—it is more difficult to organize them than it is to get the machinery working for 4,000,000 or 5,000,000 of people. There is railway congestion and a very severe kind and the people in the United States have not yet completed their organizations. When they do I believe they will make terrific fighters. But with this chaotic condition in the United States it is almost impossible to transport coal supplies through the congested railway area. The people of the United States are suffering more than we are owing to the lack of fuel supplies and strange as it may seem, Canada has managed to get a large quantity of coal in from the United States.

Official Announcement of Functions of New Department of Dominion Government

Ottawa, Feb. 23—Official announcement was made tonight by Sir Robert Borden of the creation of the new department of militia and defence, of which Sir James Loughridge is to be the head and F. B. McCurdy the parliamentary secretary. The appointments were finally dealt with by the cabinet council today. Mr. McCurdy, who has been parliamentary secretary for the department of militia and defence, has resigned that position, in order to undertake these new duties. It is not intended to make any appointment to the parliamentary secretaryship of the militia department.

The prime minister also made public tonight the order-in-council creating the new department and defining its functions, as well as those of the militia department in the care of returned soldiers.

Under the new arrangement the department of militia and defence will be responsible for hospital treatment up to the time when the soldier is discharged. It is, however, provided that during that period he may receive vocational training and instructions under suitable arrangements to be provided for that purpose, and to be agreed upon between the minister of militia and defence and the minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment.

The Military Hospitals Commission will hereafter be known as the Invalided Soldiers' Commission. Mr. McCurdy will be its chairman. Its responsibilities will have been extended to the provision of vocational training and instruction and arrangements for employment and rehabilitation in civil activities of all soldiers returned from the front whether invalided or otherwise.

The Invalided Soldiers' Commission will also have the responsibility and duty of providing hospital treatment and care for all returned soldiers from the date of their discharge.

The distribution of military hospitals between the militia department and the new department has been arranged on this basis and all hospitals, sanatoria and convalescent homes, designed for soldiers requiring continuous treatment for a considerable period, have been assigned to the Invalided Soldiers' Commission, under the direction of the minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment, etc.

It is intended that the new department and the Invalided Soldiers' Commission will work in close co-operation with the provincial governments and with the various commissions which have been established in each province for the purpose of giving aid and of providing employment for returned soldiers.

What the new department will have the disposal of all matters relating to the distribution of military hospitals between the militia department and the new department has been arranged on this basis and all hospitals, sanatoria and convalescent homes, designed for soldiers requiring continuous treatment for a considerable period, have been assigned to the Invalided Soldiers' Commission, under the direction of the minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment, etc.
