## OBITUARIES.

## EARDLEY H. KOYL, M.A., B.D.,

Second son of Rev. E. L. Koyl, was born in 1857 at Centralia, near London, Ont. His school days, being over a short time was given to business with its young ambitions, and then he felt he was called to the office and work of the ministry. When twenty-one years of age he dedicated his young manhood to the cause of Christ. After circuit work for two years as a probationer he set himself to prepare more thoroughly for his work by taking a college course. When a student he did much work as a preacher and pastor, and thereby, the laborer being worthy of his hire, helped himself to a large extent through college. In 1886 he graduated with high honors at Victoria University, and the same year he was ordained at Woodstock. For the next four years he was stationed at Paris, Beamsville and Ingersoll. In 1890 poor health compelled him to seek rest and change, and he spent a year in Colorado, Utah and Nebraska, teaching and preaching for the greater part of the time. In 1891 he returned to his Conference in Canada, and was stationed at Niagara. The climate of this place did not suit him, and the following year he received an invitation to the Division Street Church, Cobourg, and was appointed to that church by the Bay of Quinte Conference.

For a time the change was followed by a marked improvement in health and strength and his labors were untiring and very successful. Again, after about a year and a half, he was laid aside by complicated ailments of heart and lungs, and finally, after a weakening attack of *la grippe*, he died suddenly of heart failure on December 18th, 1893, in Toronto, where he had been for some weeks for medical treatment.

Death did not take him by surprise or find him unprepared. When suffering acutely his testimony was, "Tortured at every nerve my heart is at peace." When face to face with death the triumph of his faith was complete, and he raised this cry of victory: "If I die, I die happy. God, whose I am and whom I trust, has been very good to me, and He will care for mine."

Brother Koyl was a student and scholar of no ordinary talents and attainments. He was an enthusiastic preacher of the Gospel. He was an unremitting, energetic, hopeful worker in the service of the Church, and he found it hard to understand those who seemed to lack a spirit of enterprise in the good work. We cannot help asking, "What might have been?" if his strong spirit had been served by a strong body. He counted not his life dear unto him when there was work to be done for the Master. He was one of those of whom the world was not worthy.

## ROBERT BROOKING

Was born near Tavistock, Devon, England, in March, 1813. He was orphaned at an early age, earning his own living when only nine years of age, and getting an elementary education at a night-school. He was converted at the age of nineteen, and for some years, in addition to his daily labor as a mechanic, did duty as a local preacher, often walking many miles on Sabbath to preach the Word.

Having offered himself for missionary work in Western Africa, he was sent to Richmond Theological Institute, where he studied about two years, and was specially ordained for that work in November, 1839. We find by his journal that on Christmas day of the same year, just fifty-four years ago, he was on board a sailing vessel, in sight of the Canary Islands, on his way to Africa, and speaks of seeing the churches illuminated in honor of the day. Arriving in Africa, he labored first on the Gold Coast, at Accra, and was afterwards sent to the interior of the kingdom of Ashantee, where his experiences were varied, interesting, and sometimes very awful. In his journal, February 9th, 1842, he says: "Several human sacrifices have been made—have just returned from a walk, and have seen five headless bodies and six heads lying in the street. Thus scarcely a week, or even a day passes, without such scenes being witnessed. One can scarcely go out, but he sees a headless trunk lying in the street or being dragged to the place of deposit!"

After seven years of labor in Africa, a very painful affection of the throat rendered it necessary to quit that climate if he would continue work as a missionary. Returning to England, he spent some time in pleading the cause of missions through the land, but was advised by his physicians to remove to Canada, this climate being considered the best for his throat disease.

After short delay, partly occupied with mission work on the platform, he entered the Canadian Methodist Conference, and became a missionary to the Indians. He had considerable success in winning the confidence of his people on Indian missions. After laboring for several years in Upper Canada, he consented to go to, what was at that time, the most inaccessible region of the great North-West, the Hudson's Bay Territory, and spent nearly seven years at Oxford House and Norway House Missions.

Returning to Ontario, he labored on various missions until the year 1881, when old age compelled him to retire from active work, after seven years of lonely labor among the Africans and thirty-four years among the Indians of Canada. In addition to his labors as pastor, teacher and guide in things spiritual, his mechanical skill was constantly called into use for the general good. On one mission in Ontario, he built a good mission house entirely with his own hands, and superintended the building of both church and school-house, the proceeds of a bazaar held on the spot being the only money available to pay for the stone. He also built a church in Africa, largely with his own hands.

All through his missionary life, he suffered more or less from deafness occasioned by African fever. After all the vicissitudes of this long life, the years of rest and peace in Cobourg were very sweet, nor was he permitted to endure prolonged suffering ere the wheels of life stood still, December 21st, 1893.

## JOHN A. ROGERS,

The son of Anthony and Sarah Rogers, was born in New York, May 11th, 1811. His parents moved to Schenectady, where his father died in 1819, and his mother in 1823.

In 1825, he entered a clerkship in Albany and remained there till he was twenty-one years old. During these years the Spirit of God convicted him of sin and kindled anxiety in his soul. On appealing for light to the minister of the Protestant Episcopal Church, which he then attended, he was referred to the ordinances of the Church. He had been baptized; he was now directed to confirmation and to the Lord's Supper as the means of securing peace to his soul. In 1837 he came to Carleton Island, in the St. Lawrence, and in 1838, he entered the employ of a Mr. Walsworth on Wolfe Island, a godly man, who, by his simple consistent life and his personal advice, induced the young Rogers to try the efficacy of private prayer and to give all his anxieties and troubles to his God. Here he turned to search the Scripture and to earnest, confessional prayer. In 1839, he was made happy in God's pardoning love. At this time, while reading the life of Hester Ann Rogers, and studying the Book of Discipline, his esteem for Methodism began to grow and his heart turned in this direction. In 1840, a local preacher, by name Forrester, came to the Island. Bro. Rogers gave him hearty support in his settlement among them. This man soon pressed Bro. Rogers into the harness of a revival service. In these services his own faith was wonderfully confirmed. In 1841, Thaddeus Lewis was appointed regular preacher to the Island. He proposed that Rogers should take license as an exhorter, and in July, 1842, he acceded with this proposal. In 1843 he went to Lansdowne Township to teach school. While here the occasion offered itself for him to do some work for God. He resolved to do it, and this resolution born of those divinely ordained circumstances was the turning point of his life. He gave himself to this work, and God gave him the mitre of an unquestionable ministry in the conversion of souls and in building up the faith of some of the children of English Methodism, whom poverty had driven to the wilds of this new world, whom isolation from the means of grace had caused to stumble and relapse into sin.

In 1846, he was proposed to be sent to Conference as a candidate for the ministry. He gave himself to the work of God. His first field of labor was Bonnechere, lying along the Madawaska, Bonnechere and Upper Ottawa rivers. Thither he went, his Bible, Hymn Book and Discipline his library; his clothes in his saddle-bags, the love of God in his heart, and his soul great with the theme of Redemption. The Rev. A. Wright was his Superintendent on this charge. In 1847, he attended Conference at Mallorytown. The Rev. Wright was removed to another field and Bro. Rogers returned to Bonnechere alone—alone, but to cover the entire work every two weeks, to preach almost every day and to walk or paddle five thousand miles that year. In 1848, he was sent to Winchester Mission. Here he became acquainted with and in the following year married her who was his companion in his joys, the sharer of his burdens to the very eventide of his life. He always took the

work the Conference gave him. He recognized the Divine authority of a pure Church. He covered in the rounds of his different fields of labor almost all the circuits of the Bay of Quinte Conference.

But in 1879 old age and infirmities sounded the signal for his rest from active toils. For him, as he himself said, superannuation was starvation. But in faith he gave the whole of his cause to God in prayer. A letter came from a sister offering him a home in Lindsay free of rental. He accepted this generous offer and here this good man in the calm seclusion of a retirement hedged in by limitations on every side; this man who had been a joy to many by his kind words and simple life, breathed his last and went home to be with God.

Two days before his death, sister Rogers, in the fulness of years, crowned with respect by all, was called home to the reward of those whose hearts are humble, faithful, pure. Kind friends raised the stricken husband that he might look once more upon the silent form. He sank back into a swoon, only to rally once or twice for a few moments. Life had little more for him. The anchor of earthly ties was removed and cast within the veil. But death came to set him free. He died, December 29th, 1893. Yonder in the cemetery is a double grave. In that grave are two bodies, joined in life by love and in death waiting together for the general resurrection from the dead.

We rejoice in finding an encouraging increase in the membership of the Church, while we regret to report a serious decrease financially.

The present reported membership is 38,832, an increase of 1,281. The condition of the Connexional Funds is shown as follows:

### REPORT OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND COMMITTEE.

(AS AMENDED.)

Your Committee beg leave to report the following: The collections reported this year amount to \$534.41, an increase of \$9.66 in comparison with last year.

By the report of General Conference Treasurer John N. Lake, the receipts from the 23rd January, 1893, to May 31st, 1894, amount to \$8,662.29; expenditure, \$8,610.06; balance on hand, \$52.23.

### REPORT OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to make the following report:

First, that the Fund known as the Sustentation Fund of the Bay of Quinte Conference be continued, the constitution of the Fund to be the same as last year, which is as follows:

1. The object of this Fund shall be to augment the salaries of all ministers and probationers in the active work in the Conference who receive less than the following amounts: ordained married men, \$600; ordained unmarried men, \$350; probationers, \$300. These amounts in every case to include salary, board, fuel and horse keep.

2. The income of the Fund shall be the amounts received from offerings and special collections taken on all our Circuits and Missions.

3. The general management of this Fund shall be entrusted to a Committee composed of one minister and one layman elected to the Annual Conference by each Annual District Meeting when the laymen are

present, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Annual Conference on the nomination of the Committee. This Committee shall transact all necessary business in accordance with the following regulations:

- (a) In making grants from the Fund the Committee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned scale of allowances. No claim shall be entertained which has not been recommended by the Annual District Meeting, and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims for recommendation shall declare their inability to meet their net deficiencies.
- (b) Should the income of the Fund in any year prove insufficient to meet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to make up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to the aforementioned scale. Should there be a surplus over the said claims, it shall be carried forward and included in the total income for the ensuing year.
- (c) A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference annually while in session, including as summary of the business transacted, and an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary to the interests of the Fund, said report as adopted by the Conference to be printed in the Minutes.

Your Committee further recommend that a special effort be made on all the Circuits and Missions during the year, to augment the income of the Fund. And also recommend the appointment of the Rev. W. B. Secombe as Secretary-Treasurer of the Fund for the ensuing year.

#### REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

That having considered memorials from several Districts *re* extension of pastoral term, we therefore further memorialize the General Conference to so alter the Discipline of our Church,

That the time limit of a minister on his circuit or station be five years instead of three years, believing that this extension of the term would be in the interests of our work ;

That, whereas a great deal of expense is incurred in managing our Missionary Society, especially in connection with the travelling expenses of the Central Board,

Therefore resolved, that the General Board of Missions be so altered in composition as to include the General Superintendent, Missionary Secretary and Superintendent of Missions for the North-West, and one minister and layman from each Conference, thereby saving the expenses of about twenty delegates.

Resolution *re* Stationing Committee, Uxbridge District meeting :

Moved by A. D. Weeks, seconded by J. W. Stewart, That this District meeting memorialize the Conference in favor of a change in the constitution of the Stationing Committee so that ministers personally interested in the appointment be ineligible for election to the Stationing Committee. Carried and ordered to be laid before the Committee on Memorials.

This was deemed impracticable.

Memorials *re* price of *Guardian*—One, asking reduction to \$1.50 ; one, asking reduction to \$1.00 ; one, asking reduction only :

Therefore resolved, That we recommend a reduction of the price of *Guardian* to \$1.00, but we submit that before the reduction is made, the necessary subscription to insure success of said reduction be obtained by canvass of Conferences, between the rising of General Conference and the 1st January, 1895.

#### SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

After carefully comparing the statistics of last year with those of the present year, we find the work in the department in a very healthy condition, the number of schools, scholars, and conversions showing a good increase. The financial part of the work is also well up, in some parts in excess of last year. We also find a steady and vigorous increase in the patronage given to the periodicals of our own Church, while at

the same time these periodicals, in matter, in make-up, in pure and unadorned thought, and in the influence for good which they exert, hold a prominent position. It is also right to say that foreign publications are in favor to-day than at any former period.

We call attention to the fact that many of our schools are open during the year only. We therefore respectfully request our ministers and Sunday School superintendents to remedy this wrong as far, and as speedily, as possible.

Present these days when the evils of intemperance, tobacco, and profanity are so clearly seen, we urge strongly the recognition and adoption of the pledge, as found in our Discipline, in all our schools. In the interest of the children of our Church, it is desirable that more attention be given to the formation and endorsement of the work done by the Catechumen class.

There always arises a necessity for our children being familiar with concise definitions of the doctrines of the Bible accompanied by appropriate proof-texts. These are to be found in our Catechism. We earnestly pray all our Sabbath Schools to give a permanent place in their working plans for its being taught regularly.

The Home Work Department is worthy of more than passing mention. This is designed to unite the home more closely to the Sabbath School, by pledging those who cannot attend in person to read the lesson of the day and give it prayerful study during the Sabbath School hour. We recommend that special attention be given to this, that it may be universally adopted throughout our work.

Another pressing need is Teacher-training. In order that this may be accomplished, we recommend that Normal class work be taken hold of by pastors and Sabbath School superintendents, and pushed vigorously, so that our teachers may have a broader view and a firmer grip of their bibles. We are also anxious that the provisions of our Discipline in reference to conventions be observed.

We heartily recommend that Children's Day be continued, and that it be held on, or as nearly as practicable, on the first Sunday in September.

Your Committee are unanimous in recommending the following new departures for your consideration:

First, the advisability of having a conference officer who shall have the oversight of, give direction and inspiration to, the work of the Church in which our young people are more immediately concerned.

Second, we further recommend that the annual report of the Sabbath School Committee be read by the pastor in the congregation, when the pastoral address is presented; also, that it be read and its recommendations be considered at the monthly teachers' meeting, so that the directions of this Committee shall not be without practical effect.

We, in conclusion, nominate the Rev. C. L. Thompson as Secretary-Treasurer for the coming year, and that he be appointed Conference delegate to the Provincial Sabbath School Association.

#### REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE

Your Committee respectfully submit the following report: the material  
That, whereas we are convinced that the greatest enemy to traffic in strong  
and moral progress of our land is the prevailing legalized traffic Reform  
drink, we strongly reaffirm our position in the great Temperance in and under  
as one of uncompromising opposition to the traffic in any form system to be  
every condition of its existence. We believe the license the true laws  
wrong throughout, that it dishonors the Word of God, defeats of political  
of human brotherhood, violates the fundamental principles the individual  
economy, and hence, can produce nothing but evil, both to the society, we must  
and nation. To be true to God, to our brother, to our coun- ss foe, which  
declare war to the death against the relentless and pitiless  
under the guise of a friend is doing such irreparable harm.

We further rejoice in the pronounced victories for the cause of Prohibition in the recent plebiscites in the four provinces voting, wherein over a quarter of a million of our Canadian electors have cast their ballots for the total prohibition of the traffic, and in our own banner Province of Ontario, by a majority of 81,769, have given our legislators a straight and positive statement of their desire to see the iniquitous license system forever abrogated; and further, that for the first time in the history of our Province, the question of Prohibition has found a place in the speech from the throne.

We urge upon our people the desirability of supporting only such candidates for municipal and parliamentary offices as are pledged to the prohibition of the liquor traffic, and we believe that that party which makes the prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating drinks a vital plank in its platform, is worthy of the support of every true Methodist elector.

We pray that the time may soon come when our people throughout the whole Church will place a higher value on great moral principles than upon the exigencies and requirements of party politics, and will dare, in the fear of God, to break their allegiance to any political party, if such allegiance necessitates in the least degree even winking at wrong-doing in any form.

Your Committee would further protest against the transference of the licensing power from the Legislature to the municipalities, believing that of the two the latter would be the greater evil.

We would impress upon all Sunday School Superintendents and Committees of Management the desirability of having a total abstinence pledge in every school, as at present there are many schools reporting no pledged total abstainers. Our young people's societies are also exhorted to form Temperance Committees to aid in every possible way the progressive march of the prohibition hosts, whose victorious tramp is gathering increasing volume from the numbers of those whose only aim is to "look up, lift up" "for God and home and native land," and "for Christ and the Church."

We further recommend that all our preachers be requested to read this report to their congregations as early as possible after Conference, and on the same occasion to preach a sermon on Prohibition.

We believe that no body of men are more heartily and practically at work for the suppression of this great curse than are our ministers, yet we respectfully urge that on every suitable opportunity they continue to present such aspects of this question before the people as will hasten the day when, from the rugged shores of the wild Atlantic to the peaceful slopes of the broad Pacific, our Dominion shall be as free from the curse of strong drink as a well-enforced prohibitory law can make it.

Your Committee met according to the direction of the Conference and present the following nominations for Conference Representatives to the Dominion Alliance in Montreal:

Revs. O. R. Lambly, M.A. and J. C. Wilson, and Messrs. E. D. O'Flynn and H. C. McMullen.

## REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Epworth League Work beg to report that several communications have been carefully considered, and the following recommendations made :

1. That we endorse the plan of holding a Quadrennial Dominion Convention, during the year immediately preceding each General Conference, and that Revs. S. T. Bartlett and D. S. Houck be added to the Committee of arrangements according to the request of our Provincial Young People's Association.

2. We also endorse the proposed plan of organizing the Methodist young people after this year into associations, for the holding of conventions and doing other work along Conference and District lines.

3. That we memorialize the General Conference to provide means whereby our young people may have direct representation on the Epworth League Board of the General Conference.

4. That we approve of systematic Bible study in our leagues, and that we urge our young people to make that study supplementary to our Sabbath School lessons, and also that we favor the appointment of a man to oversee this work as soon as possible.

5. That in order to secure uniformity throughout our Church in the organization and work of our young people's societies, and co-operation with Christian Endeavor societies in conventions, and such other ways as may be desirable, we memorialize the General Conference to make "Epworth League of Christian Endeavor" the official name of our young people's societies.

6. That we urge the formation of a junior society in each congregation as a valuable help to the Church Sunday School and senior society, and that we request the Conference to hear Mr. Bartlett read the communication of T. A. Moore, Provincial Superintendent of Junior Work.

7. That we urge upon our young people the subjects of missions and systematic giving for all purposes.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE BOUNDARIES.

That this Conference reaffirms the resolution passed at the Conferences of 1892, *re* Conference Boundaries, viz.: That we accept the recommendations of the Commission, excepting that part of it which relates to the removing of the Napanee and Tamworth Districts from Conference No. 2 to Conference No. 1, and we recommend that the said Districts be a part of No. 2.

That, should the General Conference form a new Conference as proposed by the Commission, the name of the said Conference be "The Bay of Quinte Conference."

That while we duly recognize the right of petition, we respectfully memorialize the General Conference to enact: 1. That no petition affecting the station of a minister shall be regarded as valid that does not come to the Stationing Committee through the Chairman of the District, signed by the Recording Steward, and certifying that the petition was sustained by at least a two-thirds majority of the Quarterly Official Board at a regular meeting. 2. That it be understood in every case that such petition shall have the force of a request only, and that the Stationing Committee shall exercise discretion as to whether any such request shall or shall not be granted.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

As far as ascertainable the state of our societies is such as affords reason for devout thanksgiving to the great Head of our Church for the past, and bright promise of abundant growth and fruitfulness in the future. The increase in membership, amounting to 1,281, is a gratifying evidence of increasing spirituality among the older members of our Church, and of advancement in the experience of the Biblical and Wesleyan doctrine of holiness.

In view of increased numbers, yet of decreases financially, we are impressed that more may be done by pastors and laity in inculcating systematic beneficence, especially on the part of young converts.

We observe, with regret, the decrease of \$11.03 on contributions for Connexional Funds, but regard it as largely due to monetary stringency, and are assured that in view of the revivals on our charges, and improved prospects in the agricultural sections of our Conference territory, there will be increased liberality in the ensuing year.

We gratefully note increased attention to the study of the Bible, improvement in the numbers who engage in and enjoy family worship, and the increasing numbers and spiritual power of those who delight in the communion of saints—the special Methodist fellowship of the class-meeting.

We note an increase in the average attendance upon public worship. We should, however, have better evidence on this point with an improved schedule. A column for recording the number of those who daily engage in family worship, and who attend class-meeting, would also be helpful.

The Epworth Leagues are growing in numbers and importance requiring the prudent and prayerful counsel of the pastors, with a view to increased spiritual experience and power.

The Sunday School work is finding its sphere as a factor in developing interest in Bible study in adults, and so assisting in husbanding the results of our evangelistic labors.

On the subject of evangelists, we recommend that no evangelist be employed or allowed in any of our Churches but such as shall meet the requirements of the Discipline.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Sabbath Observance Committee beg to report as follows:

We note with pleasure the signal victories of the defenders of the Sabbath as shown in the prevention of the Sunday street cars in many of our cities; also, in the fact that the Christian sentiment of the people of this continent was sufficient, when aroused, to defeat the purpose of the World's Fair authorities, and produced financial failure to the open exposition on the Lord's Day. We realize that the determined effort of those who advocate the ideal Sabbath is injurious to our Christianity and therefore should be opposed, so that the conflict that faces the Church is the defence of the sanctity of the Sabbath. We would urge that special reference be made to this matter in all our pulpits; also, that special sermons be preached enforcing the observance of the Sabbath as one of the strongest pillars of the Church of Christ. We would especially call attention to the efforts of Christian politicians in promoting legislation to this end, and would urge the recognition of those measures and the necessity of their securing the fullest support. We would especially suggest that the attention of parents be called to the necessity of making the Sabbath a day of sacred delight—the brightest and best day of the week in the home—being assured that here, as elsewhere, the most effective results can be secured upon the impressionable heart of the child. We would also urge that the secular newspaper be laid aside, and that wholesome religious literature and bright Christian entertainment be freely introduced into the home.

We would recommend that as far as possible the Church should defend the sanctity of the Sabbath by discouraging Sabbath funerals and Church parades, and that the custom of Sabbath visiting be stamped with the opprobrium it deserves.

## SUPERANNUATION FUND.

*Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending  
July 31st, 1893.*

The Board is gratified in being able to report that all claims have been paid in full, leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$1,719.47.

The balance due Permanent Fund, as per last Annual Statement (principal and interest), amounting to \$1,851.27 and \$500 on commutation, has also been paid.

The receipts are in excess of the previous year: From Circuits, \$2,092.56; from Ministerial Subscriptions, \$480; from Interest on Investments, \$617.51, and from Book Room, \$500, making a total increase for the year of \$3,689.27.

The capital account has been increased by \$2,373 from Ministerial subscriptions, and \$340 from legacies.

On account of the exceptionally large number of ministers who have been superannuated this year, the claims on the Fund for the next year will be increased by about \$3,000.

The Educational Society needs more earnest and practical attention than it has ever yet received from the ministry of our Church. The growth of educational sentiment has been very encouraging since the union of the Methodist Churches of Canada, but it is surprising that over 900 circuits and missions have failed during the past year to report anything beyond collections, while the Constitution requires subscriptions in addition to collections. Men and brethren, help.

It was moved by Rev. E. N. Baker, B.D., seconded by Rev. T. M. Campbell, That we hail with delight the satisfactory report given by the General Secretary of Education, and that we assure him and the Board of our sympathy and support in securing students for Victoria College, and in increasing the subscriptions and collections to the Educational Fund.

## WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

Rev. Dr. Shaw was introduced and addressed the Conference, and presented the following report :

*To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church.*

DEAR BRETHREN :

The Executive Officers of the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, affiliated to the McGill University, respectfully submit to you the following brief report of the work and general interests of the institution :

The past year has been painfully eventful in the death of the late honored Principal, the Rev. George Douglas, D.D., LL.D., whose name will be perennial in the history of the institution. By the unanimous action of the Board of Governors, the Rev. Prof. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., has been called to the vacancy so created, and Rev. J. Cooper Antliff, M.A., (Edin.) D.D., has been added to the staff. The Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., has been granted leave of absence to pursue in Germany a Post-graduate Course in Semitic Literature, and his place has been filled by the Rev. Prof. Richard-on, B.A., B.D., Acting Registrar.

The institution enters upon its new phase of history with the firm determination of its authorities not only to maintain its efficiency, but also to enlarge its work for the Church, and to increase its financial strength.

The number of students registered the past year was seventy-two, including seventeen non-resident. All students in residence attend the McGill University either as undergraduates or partial students. Men whose age and circumstances prove the wisdom of such a course are induced to take the full Arts Curriculum, which requires a residence of four years. At the same time at least equal practical benefit is obtained from the Licentiates' Course, which requires three years of attendance at lectures, and which includes the most valuable part of the University Curriculum, besides a heavy course in Divinity. It has been generally recognized that the College, in carrying so large a number of men beyond the necessarily limited, if not meagre, "Course of study for Probationers," is doing a most valuable educational service for the Ministry of the Methodist Church. After the system of Yale and Drew, and several other leading colleges in America, licentiates completing their course are admitted to the further and higher three years' course for the Degree of B.D.

Financially the condition of the institution is steadily improving. Although a small draft of \$1,600 has been made on the capital, which is sure to be soon replaced, the College may be said to be really out of debt. The Endowment Fund, largely through the successful efforts of the Rev. W. Harris, has been raised to over \$70,000. The income on current accounts the past year was \$6,448.58, and expenditure \$6,487.33. The income and outlay of the Boarding Department are about \$4,000.

There is great need of increased accommodation in both class-rooms, dormitories and Convocation Hall, and the hope is entertained that this want may be supplied without such a delay as may permanently weaken

the institution, and that the valuable land held vacant may soon thus be occupied. The real estate of the College is valued at \$70,000, and is out of debt.

#### THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

Rev. O. R. Lambly read the following report from the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton :

*To the President and members of the Bay of Quinte Conference, Greeting.*

DEAR BRETHREN,—We would like to be with you and to renew our old friendships : failing in this we send you our warmest regards and wishes for your peace and prosperity. Educationally, this has been a very pleasant and successful year. We have had good classes, and of excellent material. We will have fourteen graduates, seven of them with full college course, the others in music, art, etc. As you will know, educational requirements are steadily advancing, and the College is kept fully abreast of all demands. The character of our teachers may be inferred from the fact, that several times in the past few years members of our faculty have been taken to fill chairs in universities. Every teacher on our staff is an honor graduate of a university or college. The character of the work done here should be well-known all through the Dominion. Thousands of young ladies have been educated in our halls, and thousands of homes enriched and adorned by the culture received here. We are proud of the fact that the lady principals of at least five of the ladies' colleges of Canada, were educated here.

Our curriculum is both extensive and practical, embracing every subject taught in any ladies' college in the Dominion. We will not take your time in specifying the several departments in music, art, elocution, etc. Suffice it to say that in every respect the institution will be kept in the very front rank.

We have always kept in mind that education should be the handmaid of religion, and have emphasized the study of the Scriptures, not merely by the Sunday afternoon class, but by the daily lecture of the principal on the Bible and Biblical Literature.

Among the students themselves regular meetings are held for prayer and for conversation on Missions and kindred subjects.

We can assure you, dear brethren, that we are with you heartily in your sublime work; we are trying to aid you, and should you direct some of your young friends to these halls, we pledge you to do our utmost to return them to the Church and to society richer, both in head and heart, than when they came.

#### ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

Rev. O. R. Lambly presented the following report from the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby:

It is with feelings of profound gratitude that we, the directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, at Whitby, present to this Conference our twelfth annual report.

Apart from the large attendance of boarders, the advanced educational work accomplished, and the remarkably good health record, we are pleased to be able to say that the moral and religious atmosphere of the College has been exceedingly gratifying, and it is believed it has been conducive, in many cases, to the formation of sound Christian character.

For many years we have had a laudable ambition to place our College in the foremost position amongst the ladies' colleges of Canada; and we have kept this object steadily in view in the discharge of all our official duties.

We consider ourselves singularly fortunate in having secured such beautiful buildings and grounds, in such a delightful location in close proximity to the city of Toronto. This favorable location has already given us a decided advantage over other competing colleges, and will in future contribute still more largely to the growth and efficiency of our College.

Besides the manifest advantage of securing from the city the best professional talent in music and fine art, and enabling our pupils to hear the great artists that visit Toronto, we have also the privilege of obtaining courses of University lectures from the Professors of Victoria and Toronto Universities, besides participating in entertainments of a social character calculated to train and strengthen our pupils. During the past year a course of six university lectures has been given, besides the popular lectures on Natural Science delivered by the Rev. Dr. Hare, Principal. We expect to double the number next year. Our pupils had the honor of furnishing the musical and elocutionary programme for the students of Victoria University at their annual conversazione in Toronto last December, and subsequently entertaining the Victoria students to a reception in our College.

Whilst not approving of co-education, especially for young students, with its accompanying difficulties and temptations, we do not hesitate to say that we are pleased to be within speaking distance of Victoria, and that an occasional entertainment given by the students of both colleges under the safeguards of culture and religion must be interesting and helpful to all concerned.

As to our literary advantages, we are preparing pupils this year for the second year of Toronto University, first year Queen's University, the Junior and Senior Matriculation Toronto University, third, second and first-class teachers' certificates. We question if any other ladies' college in Canada is doing similar work. Last year two of our students graduated in Toronto University, who had taken the first two years of their university course in our College. One of these won the valedictory in Victoria University.

Our Musical Department is on a thorough conservatory basis. It will be strengthened next year by the addition of a Bachelor of Music, who will reside in the building and give her time to the teaching of harmony and violin. It is our intention to prepare our students for the Bachelor of Music degree to be given by Toronto University.

Our Fine Art, Elocution and Commercial Departments are under the most gifted specialists, and are doing advanced and satisfactory work.

We sincerely thank you, the members of this Conference, for kind co-operation with us in the work in which we are engaged, and trust that our College may continue to prove worthy of your support and patronage. All applications for information relating to our course of study or tuition fees should be made to the Principal.

#### ALBERT COLLEGE, BELLEVILLE.

Rev. Prof. Dyer, Principal of Albert College, was introduced, and presented the report of Albert College, as follows :

*To the Bay of Quinte Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.*

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN.—We are able, through the blessing of a kind Providence, to report a year of considerable prosperity in connection with Albert College. We especially rejoice that the health of both teachers and students has been preserved. A deep spiritual influence has pervaded all the religious exercises of the College, and several of the students have, during the year, decided for Christ; for this we are devoutly thankful.

The year has been one of considerable anxiety owing to changes consequent upon federation, the pulling up of old stakes and the putting down of new. The affiliated relation of Albert to Victoria during the independent existence of the latter was alike beneficial to Albert and Victoria. The Senate of Toronto University has, largely to meet the convenience of the affiliated colleges, placed the Senior Matriculation Examination in June, thus making it possible to continue the Collegiate course which has contributed, in a considerable degree, to the success of Albert College.

This course offers splendid advantages in English, Mathematics, Languages, Science, etc., and at its completion the student not only receives the diploma of Albert College, but has first-year standing in Arts in Toronto University.

Over 200 students have been enrolled during the year. Thirty-three candidates for the ministry wrote at the examination held at the College in April last.

There can be no question that Albert, with its well-known thoroughness

in the English branches and its special classes in the theological subjects of the Conference Preliminary Course, offers just the advantages which these young men require.

The College prepares annually candidates for the different grades of teachers' certificates. It has a well-equipped laboratory and museum, and is in every way able to compete successfully in this class of work with the best equipped Collegiate Institutes.

The departments of Commercial Science, Music, Fine Art and Elocution are thoroughly equipped, and have been well maintained during the year.

The Commercial Department offers the very best advantages in Book-keeping, Shorthand, Typewriting, Practical English, etc., and is a thoroughly equipped Business College. The student can here secure the very best advantages at moderate rates.

The Department of Music has made very great advance during the year under the able management of Prof. Dingle, who is also organist of Bridge Street Methodist Church. The attendance has largely increased, rendering necessary the appointment of assistants for junior work.

The Department of Fine Art has been in charge of Miss Emma Clarke during the past seven years, and the number of certificates and medals secured by her pupils has given the most gratifying proof of proficiency.

Prof. Shepard has had charge of the Department of Elocution since its organization in 1885, and his pupils at Victoria and elsewhere have from year to year captured the prizes in Elocution.

Much of the success of Albert College during these years may justly be attributed to efficient, self-sacrificing and devoted teachers.

The Missionary Societies and the Young People's Christian Associations of the College have been active in their operations and greatly blessed of God during the year. The Young Ladies' Missionary Society is maintaining a girl in the Chinese home at Victoria, B.C. The young men have now on hand \$1,200, which has been gathered by their efforts during the last few years, and they expect to bid farewell, in the near future, to Mr. Livingstone, who, as a graduate in Arts and Medicine, goes as their representative to the missionary work in "The Dark Continent." They feel that Mr. Livingstone, both physically, mentally and spiritually, is pre-eminently fitted for that work, and they are praying that God may so prosper and bless him as to render it desirable and expedient for the Methodist Church to claim him as their missionary. The young men have recently chosen Mr. Wrinch, now a student at Albert College and preparing for missionary work, as their second representative, and are busily engaged raising money for that purpose.

During the year L. W. Yeomans, Esq., of Belleville, treasurer of Bridge Street Methodist Church, has been appointed Bursar of the College. He has undertaken the work with a heartiness which promises good results.

Need we ask that the members of this Conference interest themselves in behalf of Albert College during the incoming year? You have always done so, and we are sure you will not now relax your efforts. We shall aim to do such work as will warrant you in still giving us your active co-operation.

The Conference is profoundly thankful for the success that has attended the labors of the Principal and Faculty, and for the spiritual tone that pervades the institution, and trusts that a special effort will be made at an early date to free the College from debt. And, moreover, we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to aid the Principal and Faculty in bringing the institution to the highest state of efficiency.

#### ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

Rev. Principal Austin, of Alma College, St. Thomas, was introduced to the Conference, and presented the annual report of that institution:

*To the Members of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.*

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—In sending you our annual report of school work, we acknowledge with gratitude that benign Providence which has watched over the lives and preserved the health of students and teachers through the year. The attendance, notwithstanding the stringency of the times, and the financial panic in the United States, has reached 150. Of these, 80 were Methodists; 30, Episcopalians; 24, Presbyterians; 14, Baptists; 1, Friend; and 1, Roman Catholic.

In departments the enrolment was as follows: Preparatory, 18; Academic, 22; Collegiate, 43; Fine Art, 31; Elocution, 38; Commercial, 12; Music, 105.

The policy of the Board of Management has been to offer to all young women seeking the higher or secondary education the best advantages of thorough culture at a moderate cost, with home-like surroundings and safeguards, and under distinctive Christian influence and teaching. In carrying out their policy the Board of Management has asked the Church to provide buildings and furnishings only—the school being self-supporting, and receiving no aid from any church fund. That this policy has met a public demand is evinced by the large patronage bestowed upon the College from all denominations, from all parts of the Dominion and the neighboring Republic—the slight decrease in the enrolment this year being chiefly in the list of students from the United States, and accounted for by the financial depression.

The graduating class will number 16: Literary, 2; Fine Art, 3; Music, 6; Elocution, 4; Commercial Science, 1. A class has also been prepared for the examinations for public school teachers' certificates and will write in a few weeks.

You will be pleased to learn that Alma won three awards in Fine Art at the World's Fair, one in each subject in which she exhibited, viz., Oil Painting, Water Color Painting and China Painting.

The returns are in from the Provincial Art Examinations, and Alma maintains the high standard of past years in the number of certificates and honors won.

The agency, under the vigorous efforts of the Rev. J. P. Rice, has resulted in an increase of subscriptions to the Relief Fund of \$7,500, between the first of July, 1893, and the first of May, 1894. It is hoped that at least \$9,000 in cash or pledges will be added to the Fund this year.

With pleasure we report that the religious services, such as prayer and class meetings, Bible classes, missionary meetings, etc., have been well attended, and that the Missionary Society and Young Woman's Christian Association have been doing good and effective work. Two more of our students have this year entered the foreign missionary field—one in Japan and one in Africa in connection with Bishop Taylor's work—making six in all who are now engaged in the mission field.

We extend our hearty thanks to the Conference for its interest and cooperation in past years, and for the excellent appointments it has made from year to year of associate members of our Board of Management, and would ask for the usual appointments for the ensuing Conference year.

*Resolved*,—That we have listened with great pleasure and satisfaction to the report of Alma College by the Principal, the Rev. B. F. Austin, M.A., Ph.D. We assure him of our deep interest in the important work of educating young ladies, and we are delighted to hear of the success of the students in the arts course, and in all other departments of College work during the past year.

We pray that continued and increasing success may be enjoyed by the College in years to come.

## SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The report of the Superannuation Fund Commission was taken up, and amended and adopted as follows :

### CONSTITUTION OF THE SUPERANNUATION FUND.

#### I.—NAME.

386. The name of this Fund shall be "The Superannuation Fund of the Methodist Church."

#### II.—OBJECT.

387. The object of this Fund shall be to assist in the support of Superannuated Ministers, Ministers' Widows, and Children of deceased Ministers, as hereinafter provided.

#### III.—MEMBERSHIP.

388. All ministers and probationers of the Methodist Church in the Toronto, London, Niagara, Guelph, Bay of Quinte, Manitoba and North-West, British Columbia and Japan Annual Conferences, shall be members of the Fund, save and except—

- (1) Those who are given a supernumerary relation.
- (2) Those who are located.
- (3) Those who have commuted their claims.
- (4) Those whose claims have expired by limitation.
- (5) Those who are native ministers in foreign fields.

#### IV.—MANAGEMENT.

389. The Fund shall be managed by a Board composed of the Treasurer or Treasurers, and sixteen other members, eight of whom shall be laymen who are members of the Church.

390. The delegates from the aforesaid Annual Conferences to the General Conference shall meet under the presidency of a General Superintendent, or of a president of an Annual Conference designated by him, to elect the aforesaid Board of Management, and shall report the same to the General Conference for information. They shall also nominate one or more persons for the offices of clerical and lay treasurer, respectively, and from among those so nominated the General Conference shall elect by ballot the Treasurers of the Fund. The meeting of the delegates shall be held during the session of the General Conference, and previous to the day appointed for the election of General Conference officers.

391. A General Superintendent shall be (*ex officio*) chairman of the Board, but if no General Superintendent be present, the Board shall

elect one of its members as chairman. It shall elect its own secretary. In case of the death or the disqualification of any officer or member of the Board during the quadrennium, the Board is authorized to fill the vacancy.

392. The Board shall meet once a year, and shall have full authority to determine, according to the Constitution, By-laws and Regulations of the Fund, the status, annuity and allowance of all claimants, and the amount to be allowed in commutation of claims, and to make such special appropriations as are permitted by the Constitution, and to consider and determine all matters connected with the administration of the Fund.

393. An Investment Committee, consisting of the Treasurer and five other members appointed by the Board, shall, under its general direction, invest all the capital funds. It shall have authority to call special meetings of the Board, and shall, when requested, advise the Treasurers on matters pertaining to the Fund.

394. Each Annual Conference shall elect a Conference Treasurer, who shall keep an account with the Financial Secretaries, and make a full report of the returns from each district to the Conference and to the General Treasurers.

#### V.—INVESTED CAPITAL.

395. The invested capital of this Fund shall consist of the funds held and reported by the Board as invested or awaiting investment, and of such donations, bequests and legacies as may hereafter be received by the Board, and also of not less than one-fourth of the amount subscribed by the ministers and probationers from year to year.

#### VI.—CURRENT INCOME.

396. The sources of current income shall be the following, viz. :

- (1) Interest on invested capital.
- (2) Appropriations from Book and Publishing House.
- (3) Three-fourths of the annual subscriptions of ministers and probationers, provided this amount is needed to pay claimants in full.
- (4) Contributions from circuits and domestic missions.
- (5) Payments by or on behalf of ministers who are not in the regular pastorate in lieu of circuit contributions.

397. That the principle of assessment for the Superannuated Ministers' Fund shall be \$12.00 on all incomes up to \$600.00; on all salaries between \$600.00 and \$1000.00, 2 per cent. on the amount over \$600.00; on all salaries up to \$1,500.00, 2½ per cent.; and on all salaries over \$1,500.00, 3 per cent. on the amount in excess of the said \$600.00.

398. That the balance required to maintain the Fund in its entirety be levied on the amount raised for ministerial support only.

399. The Missionary Society shall contribute, on behalf of each ordained foreign missionary, in lieu of circuit contribution, the sum of \$70 per annum; and on behalf of each French, Indian or other ordained missionary (except domestic missionaries), the sum of \$50 per annum.

400. There shall be contributed annually, on behalf of each ordained minister in the active service of the Church, who is appointed to a position outside the regular pastorate, by the society, department, institution or Conferences he serves, in lieu of circuit contribution, a sum of \$70.

This law shall apply to the officers of the General Conference, the Missionary Society, the Educational Society and the Superannuation Fund; to the principals, professors, teachers and agents of our educational institutions; to Conference evangelists, and to all ministers appointed to service outside the pastorate.

#### VII.—CLAIMANTS.

401. Claimants shall consist of ministers who are regularly superannuated by an Annual Conference, ministers' widows, and children of deceased ministers, as in each case is hereinafter provided.

402. No application for a superannuated relation shall be granted by an Annual Conference except on the recommendation of a Committee on Conference Relations, consisting of the ministerial members of the Superannuation Fund Board in the Conference, and seven other ministers elected by the Conference to which such application shall have been referred. The said Committee, in making its recommendation, shall not take into consideration anything else than the question, viz.: "Is the applicant really worn out, or temporarily disabled in the itinerant service?" Provided, however, that in case the said Committee report adversely, the Conference may, by the vote of not less than three-fourths of the members present, grant such application.

403. A minister who is superannuated for the year, shall, as a matter of course, return to the active work at the end of that term; if, however, a superannuated relation is then recommended by the Annual District Meeting, his case shall go before the Committee on Conference Relations, and be dealt with on its merits.

404. A widow, whose husband was superannuated at the time of her marriage, shall have no claim on this Fund, unless an annuitant at the time of her marriage, in which case the former annuity shall be revived.

405. A widow fifteen years younger than her husband, and married after he was fifty-five years of age, shall not be paid any annuity, except at the discretion of the Board.

406. A superannuated minister, who is suspended by an Annual Conference, shall receive no annuity from the Fund for the period of suspension.

#### VIII.—COMPUTATION OF ANNUITIES.

407. The computation of annuities shall be based on the number of years spent in the active service of the Church, on circuits or missions, or in the interests of any department, society or corporation within the Methodist Church, by the appointment of the General or an Annual Conference.

408. The period of computing a minister's annuity shall commence from the time of his being received on probation or from another Church, but not more than four years shall be credited on the term of probation; provided always that he shall receive credit for no year in which his personal subscription or the contribution of his circuit is not paid in full.

409. The period for computing the annuities of those ministers who failed to "level up" as per the "basis of Union," shall commence with June 1, 1884.

410. A superannuated minister, whose claim has expired by limitation, or who has commuted his claim, and is restored to the active service, shall have a subsequent claim only for services rendered after such restoration. The same rule shall apply to located ministers who are restored to active work.

411. A minister regularly transferred to a Conference of the Eastern Section of the Methodist Church shall retain, in connection with this Fund, the standing that he acquired previous to his transfer, and on superannuation he shall be paid such a sum annually as, added to his allowance from the Supernumerary Fund of the Eastern Conference, shall make his total annuity equal to that provided by this constitution; and if, when given a superannuated relation, his total years of service would entitle him, under this constitution, to an annuity during his natural life, that part of his annuity, payable by this Fund, shall be payable during his life.

412. A minister of one of the Conferences of the Eastern Section of the Methodist Church, who is regularly transferred to a Conference of the Western Section, in the event of superannuation, may be allowed an annuity from this Fund based on total years of service in the Eastern and Western Sections of the Methodist Church, on condition that the annuity due for years of service in the Eastern Section be remitted to the Treasurers of this Fund; otherwise, he shall receive only for years of service subsequent to transfer.

#### IX.—SCALE OF ANNUITIES.

413. A superannuated minister shall receive from the Fund an annuity according to the following scale; payment to continue as many years as he shall have rendered effective service. Nevertheless, if he shall have rendered twenty-three years of service, the payments shall continue during his natural life; provided, in every case, his relation as a superannuated minister be continued:

414. All superannuated ministers and widows who were annuitants in September, 1890, shall continue to receive annuities according to the scale of 1886, and for the number of years therein provided.

415. Widows of ministers being members of our Church shall receive two-thirds of the amount their husbands would have received, and for the same term of years.

416. If the claims upon the Fund for any year shall exceed the income for the year, the Board may direct the treasurers to deduct from each annuity such a sum as shall be equal to a *pro rata* share of such a deficiency.

417. Each child of a deceased minister shall receive an annuity of \$20 up to sixteen years of age, born during his ministry in the Methodist Church. If a deceased minister leave no claimant widow, but leaves a child or children unprovided for, the Board may make provisions for their support beyond the ordinary children's annuity, but such provision shall not exceed a sum equal to two-thirds of the annuity to which their father would have been entitled. The Chairman of the District, if necessary, shall make special arrangements for the administration of such allowances.

#### X.—COMMUTATION OF ANNUITIES.

418. A minister who, on superannuation, in the judgment of his Conference, is laid aside from the work of the ministry, from causes which do not disqualify him for secular business, may be recommended by such Conference to the Board for the commutation of his annuity.

419. The relation of each superannuated minister of less than twenty-three years' standing, at the close of the third year of his superannuation shall be brought under review by his annual Conference. If there is little hope of restoration to the active work of the ministry, and the cause be such as does not disqualify him for secular business the Conference shall recommend the commutation of his annuity.

420. It shall be the duty of the Board to call the attention of the Annual Conferences to the relation of all claimants of less than twenty-three years' standing, at the close of the third year of their superannuation, and also to all other cases with regard to which a review may be deemed expedient.

421. The Board shall have power to cancel, in whole or in part, the annuity of a superannuated minister who engages in secular business during the period of his continuance in such business; nevertheless, no such action shall be taken without giving the claimant an opportunity to state his case to the Board, or to obtain the recommendation of his Conference for the commutation of his annuity.

422. The minimum allowance in the commutation of an annuity shall be an amount equal to the sum of the claimant's personal subscriptions to the Fund, with five per cent. compound interest on the same, and, in addition, \$10 for each year of post-probationary services.

423. The maximum allowance in the commutation of an annuity that is liable to expire by limitation, shall be equal to the aforesaid sum of a claimant's personal subscription with interest, and in addition, \$20 for each year of post-probationary services.

424. The maximum allowance in the commutation of an annuity that may continue during the natural life of the claimant and then revert to

his widow, shall be an amount equal to the aforesaid sum of his personal subscriptions with interest, and in addition, \$30 for each year of post-probationary service; provided, however, that the total amount paid in commutation of a claim shall in no case be more than \$2,000.

425. The Board, in determining the sum of a claimant's personal subscriptions shall reckon \$10 for each year of service prior to the year 1884, and \$12 from that year to the year 1895, and for each subsequent year, the sum credited shall be as per Article VI. of this Constitution. If the claimant has received one or more annual payments from the Fund, an amount equal to not less than one-half the sum of such payments shall be deducted from the allowance.

426. The Board, in determining the allowance in the commutation of an annuity, shall take into consideration reversionary interests, also the age, health and probable longevity of the beneficiaries, and shall pay the maximum allowance only when the claimant's wife is living, and when there is also a strong probability of both parties surviving their expectancy.

427. The Board shall have authority to commute an annuity only on the recommendation of an Annual Conference, but in any case recommended for commutation, it shall be optional with the Board either to commute the claim or not as it may deem expedient.

428. The commutation of an annuity, shall, in all cases, cancel the reversionary interest of a claimant's wife and children.

#### XI.—REFUNDS.

429. A probationer, who fails in health, or who retires from our work with letters of standing, or who is not received by the Conference into "full connexion" for reasons other than the violation of discipline, shall have his subscriptions refunded.

430. A minister who fails in health before rendering five years of effective service, shall have his subscriptions refunded; all others who leave our work with letters of standing shall have one half of their subscriptions refunded.

431. A minister who is located shall have his personal contributions refunded.

432. A minister, or probationer, who leaves the work irregularly, thereby forfeits all subscriptions paid into the Fund.

433. A minister who is deposed from the ministry, or expelled from the Church, thereby ceases to be a member of the Fund, and forfeits all subscriptions paid into the same, and all claims thereon.

434. In the refunding of subscriptions, the treasurers shall ascertain whether any loans that may have been granted the applicant by the Educational Society have been repaid. If such loans have not been repaid, no refund of subscriptions shall be made until a certificate of payment is furnished. The treasurers shall be authorized to protect the Book and Publishing House in the same manner.

#### XII.—REGULATIONS.

435. The secretary of each Annual Conference shall, immediately on the rising of the same, furnish the treasurers of the Fund with a certified statement containing:

- (1) The name and date of birth of each preacher received on trial.
- (2) The name and date of birth of any minister received from another Church.
- (3) The name and latest P. O. address of each minister or minister's widow that has died during the year.
- (4) The names and addresses of those who have received a superannuated relation.
- (5) The names of superannuated ministers who are recommended to commute their claims.
- (6) The names of ministers who are located, made supernumeraries, dropped, suspended, or deposed from the ministry.
- (7) The names of superannuated, supernumerary, located, or suspended ministers restored to the active work.
- (8) The names of ministers left without an appointment at their own request.
- (9) The name of the Conference Treasurer of this Fund.

(10) The amounts raised on each charge for ministerial support, and for the funds forming the basis of circuit apportionment, as per Article VI.; also the amount paid each minister and probationer, from all sources, for "salary, board and fuel."

436. A superannuated minister who changes his place of residence shall notify the treasurers, and also the President of his Annual Conference of such change within thirty days thereof.

437. The names of subscribers of \$5, or more, annually to the Fund, shall be printed in the Minutes of the Annual Conference, and each such subscriber shall receive a copy of the same.

### MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Rev. A. Sutherland, D.D., Missionary Secretary, addressed the Conference on the work of his department.

Moved by Rev. T. M. Campbell, seconded by Rev. T. W. Jolliffe,

That we have heard with satisfaction the address of our General Missionary Secretary, and pledge ourselves to co-operate with him in pressing forward the work of the Missionary Fund, and in bringing about the reforms he has suggested.

### BOOK AND PUBLISHING HOUSE REPORT.

Rev. Wm. Briggs, D.D., Book Steward, presented the report of his department.

Moved by Rev. J. J. Rice, seconded by Rev. J. Kilgour,

That it affords us gratification and evokes devout thanks to God for the very great success attendant upon the operations of our Book Room and Publishing House during the past year, as we learn from its efficient manager, Dr. Briggs. We hereby pledge ourselves as a Conference to continued interest in, and hearty co-operation with, this valuable department of our Church work, and cordially thank Dr. Briggs for his interesting and satisfactory report.

Rev. Dr. Dewart, Editor of the *Christian Guardian*, addressed the Conference in the interests of his department.

Moved by Rev. Richard Duke, seconded by Rev. O. R. Lambly, M.A., That in the opinion of this Conference the price of the *Guardian* should be reduced to \$1.00 per year, being convinced that the necessary number of subscribers would be thereby secured in order to make the venture financially safe, and that should this reduction be made the clerical members of this Conference will put forth every effort to place the *Guardian* in all the homes of our people.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

A deputation from the Woman's Missionary Society of the Bay of Quinte Conference was introduced to the Conference. Mrs. Brooks, on behalf of the deputation, addressed the Conference in the interests of the work of the Society.

Moved by the Rev. T. C. Cocking, seconded by Rev. J. C. Wilson, That this Conference having heard with delight the admirable address of Mrs. Brooks, the delegate from the Bay of Quinte branch of the Woman's Missionary Society, we place on record our appreciation of, and deep interest in, the grand work being carried on by the Society, and beg to assure its members that we are in hearty sympathy with them, and will do all in our power to aid them, by giving one Sunday each year to seek to promote the interests of the Society and by any other means in our power. We gratefully recognize the blessed results of the work of the agents of the Society both in this and foreign lands, and pray that they may ever be cheered and sustained by the great Head of the Church.

#### MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

##### INDEXING THE JOURNAL.

Moved by the Rev. J. S. Clark, seconded by Rev. R. Duke, That the work of indexing the old Journal having been completed by Rev. C. W. Watch, we direct the Contingent Fund Committee to grant Bro. Watch the sum of fifty dollars as an inadequate expression of our obligations to him for this arduous work.

(NOTE.—Rev. C. W. Watch generously donated the above sum voted him to the Sustentation Fund.)

##### MINUTES OF CONFERENCE.

Moved by Rev. O. R. Lambly, seconded by Rev. N. A. McDiarmid, That the same arrangement be made for the publication of the Minutes as last year, viz.: Each minister to receive one copy at the price fixed by the Book Room, and that the extra copies may be secured at a price between ten and twelve cents, up to date announced by the Book Steward.

##### MINISTERS MOVING.

Moved by Rev. W. J. Sanders, seconded by Rev. J. A. Jewell, That we reaffirm the resolution of last Conference providing that all

ministers moving this year be responsible for the services on their circuits and missions for two Sundays after the rise of Conference.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIAL

Moved by Rev. D. Williams, seconded by Rev. F. B. Stratton,

That we, the Bay of Quinte Conference, memorialize the General Conference to amend sub-section four, under paragraph 174, on page 81, of the Discipline of 1890, so as to permit circuits of more than seven appointments to have as many circuit stewards as there are appointments; and so that the Quarterly Official Board of any circuit may appoint not less than three and not more than five representatives to the Sabbath School Committee of each Sabbath School on the circuit.

#### PRISON REFORM.

Moved by Rev. T. M. Campbell, seconded by Rev. Wm. Johnston,

That the memorial form *re* "Prison Reform" be filled up for the Conference, and signed and sealed on behalf of the Conference by the President and Secretary; and that the President, Wm. Flavelle, Esq., of Lindsay, and the mover, be a committee of this Conference to co-operate with the Central Committee in Toronto to further the interests of Prison Reform.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIAL.

Moved by Rev. S. T. Bartlett, seconded by Rev. W. R. Young, B.A.,

That we respectfully memorialize the General Conference to so amend the present Discipline (Sec. 114) that a layman be eligible for election to the office of Secretary of the Conference.

Moved by the Rev. D. Williams, seconded by Rev. E. A. Tonkin,

That this Bay of Quinte Conference memorialize the General Conference to secure such legislation in the Senate and House of Commons of Canada as is necessary to amend our Model Deed so that:

1. Any Trustee Board may be able to reduce its members to any number not less than five.
2. That any Trustee Board may declare the place of any member of the Board vacant who, in the declared opinion of the Board, absents himself three times in succession from the meetings of the Board without justifiable reason.
3. That any Trustee Board may appoint auditors to examine into and report as to the condition and accuracy of the accounts of the trust.
4. That the words "or on his ceasing to be a member thereof," be inserted after the word "church," in line 34, section 21, of the Model Deed.
5. That it be made obligatory on every Superintendent of a circuit to call a meeting of each Board of Trustees on his charge at least twice a year, unless otherwise legally called together.
6. That in order to the more surely secure the carrying out of the provisions of the Model Deed, the duties of the Superintendent in relation thereto be distinctly set forth among the other duties specified on page 83 of the Discipline.

### JUNIOR LEAGUE WORK.

Rev. S. T. Bartlett read a communication from Rev. T. A. Moore, Superintendent of Junior League Work.

Moved by A. Forster, Esq., seconded by Rev. C. W. Watch, That we rejoice to hear of the success that has attended Junior League work in our Church, believing that in the League we have an organization for training our children in Christian and denominational work.

We would urge the organization of Junior Leagues, and that it be an instruction to the Epworth League officers of the Conference and Districts to give special attention to this department of the work, and we earnestly solicit the active co-operation of all our ministers in this work.

## THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

From the beautiful town of Peterboro' we send you our annual greeting; "For God is our witness, how we long after you all in the tender mercies of Christ Jesus." Remembering the goodness which is ours, we join you in saying "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ."

You will be anxious to know the evidences of our prosperity. Have we visible tokens of God's presence with us, as of old? As to our membership, the spirit of the Lord has been attending the preaching of the Word, and we can report a total membership of 38,832, with a net increase of 1,281. In connection with our Sabbath Schools there are reported 2,009 conversions. The praise belongeth unto God. The Missionary cause has not been forgotten by our people, and for this purpose there has been paid to the General Fund the sum of \$22,754.94; while, in addition to this, the Woman's Missionary Society returns \$4,744.11, as raised for their work. The various other funds have also been well sustained.

But, brethren, while grateful for these evidences of success, we are profoundly impressed with the solemn importance of promoting your spiritual growth. Our deliberations, plans, and labors will prove of little avail unless they aid in promoting your spirituality. The reasons for this are many and weighty. The most precious heritage, short of Christ and heaven, which the Church can enjoy, is a holy membership associated with a consecrated ministry.

The growth of Methodism is one of the marvels of history; but, instead of drifting into a habit of boasting on that account, let us apply ourselves earnestly to the perpetuation and broadening of the progressive spirit. "An oak will grow as long as it has life." No less certainly will vital religion produce soul growth. A living church will be a progressive church; like her Divine Head, she will "Grow in stature and favor with God and man."

We are constantly and emphatically told that these times differ from those which are past. This is true only to a certain extent. Human nature is the same in every age, and the grace of God never changes. But there are times of lesson and responsibility, as well as of gracious opportunity. A general agricultural and mercantile depression has passed over the world; times have been hard, work has been scarce, and in every land a cry has come up of want and loss. While thankful to God that in Canada we have not suffered above what we are able to

bear, yet the lessons of these times are for our study and reflection. God has promised "seed time and harvest," and the earth has always brought forth sufficient for the wants of men. But there are inequalities in the earth; there are iniquities, and crimes, and sins. God has laid down great principles for the governance of life and conduct, but these principles have been ignored, and the consequence is suffering among men. Men still grope in the darkness of unbelief, seeking ways for the betterment of things and finding none. Beloved, the questions pressing for answer, the problems burning for solution, have their answer only in a proper interpretation and application of God's Word. Every question, moral and social, can be made clear by the "law and the testimony." By the Word are all things to be made plain. The Church is the practical exponent of that Word on earth. We are here in Christ's stead, living representatives of Him, to reveal unto men, by our faith and conduct, what is God's answer to every perplexing thing. Jesus is the world's great social reformer. He is our ideal of brotherliness. The mirror in which He reflects himself to this earth is the Word of God. Many read that Word to-day by the light in which we, his professed disciples, interpret it in our actions. We are saved by faith in Christ, "who died for our sins, and rose again for our justification," but we feel not only by our faith in the death of Christ, but also by revealing His life and reflecting His character. What a measure of Divine grace we need that there shall no harm be seen in us!

We are known as a Church pronounced against all evil. We are emphatically a temperance Church, constantly protesting against the legalized liquor traffic; and though it remains until now doing its cruel work, destroying homes, blasting lives and defying truth, we thank God for the part we were enabled to take in securing so large a majority for the Plebiscite in favor of prohibitory legislation. In the midst of our rejoicing it is well to remind ourselves that ultimate victory will not be accomplished until the vote of January last becomes crystallized into law, and such a law can neither be framed nor administered unless we have those in our legislative halls who truly represent the moral sentiment of our people.

It is well we should remember the heritage which is ours in the Methodist Church. How great have been our victories! "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto thy name give glory, for thy mercy and for thy truth's sake." But our opportunities increase with our privileges. We are thankful no schism obtains in our midst.

"We are not divided, all one body we,  
One in hope and doctrine, one in charity."

And yet we never required to more emphatically declare the connexional nature and character of Methodism. God has put honor upon those who in their Church polity have been independent and congregational, but we believe He has throughout our Church history marked with especial blessings our connexional spirit. Individual circuits and stations are but part of the whole Church, and should delight in the perpetuation and success of its connexional life. We regret that a larger number of families do not take our Church organ, for the Church paper

has its place in the cultivation and training of the religious life of the home.

Our Missionary Society has reached its seventieth anniversary, during which time it has founded and sustained Domestic and Foreign Missions according to the direction of the Church. In these days of many organizations and special appeals, it is first of all imperative upon you to give a loyal support to the society to which you owe so much, and which God has delighted to prosper. It is yours to share its work and its success. We commend our sisters of the Woman's Missionary Society. "The Lord giveth the word, the women that publish it are a great host." We congratulate them for a Branch now formed, taking the name and boundaries of our own Conference.

Our educational work is still progressing. A larger number of students were in attendance, at our several colleges, during the past year, than ever before, and the results of the work is most encouraging. Still our Educational Society never needed financial aid more than at present. We pray God to lay this matter upon your hearts.

It is a pleasure to speak of the development of our Young People's Societies. Statistics give us evidence of a healthy activity, and we rejoice in the spiritual life and power manifest among them. The Epworth League presents to our youth opportunities for organized effort and mutual improvement. The advantages of Christian and social intercourse; the systematic study of the Word of God; the study of Church history and polity and biography are all ours in the Epworth League; while a broad and Christian interdenominational fellowship is obtained for our young people without the loss of any denominational advantage in the Epworth League of Christian Endeavour. We ask you to aid us in the organization of an Epworth League of Christian Endeavour at every appointment and, wherever we have a Sabbath School sustained.

Our Sabbath Schools appeal to all of us, and yet in the days of our successes, it is possible to overlook our responsibilities. We would suggest to our teachers, whom we love for their work's sake, that Normal Courses of Study, Institute Classes, and a preparation for teaching is within the reach of all; and if the parents would suffer a kindly word of appeal, by the organization of home classes, and the daily home readings, no family in Methodism should be outside the circle of the Sabbath School.

This suggests to us the sacredness of the Christian home. Neither the Church nor the school can possibly take the place of the home; as it is, so will the life of the Church and the nation be. In a time like this, of multiplied organizations, without condemnation of any society or circle, is it not right that we emphasize the value of home life? Nothing should be allowed to deprive the family of that companionship and helpfulness which it is the privilege of each member to give unto all within the sacred circle. The competition in life is now so keen, men are everywhere contending for place and means—every hour has a monetary value. There is just here a danger that the family altar will be neglected, or, if sustained at all, only in such a way, that seldom can the entire family, at one time, gather around it. The home is a sanctuary within itself, and any neglect of its religious duties and privileges can only be followed by

a declension in spiritual life. No influence, we are persuaded, is more potent, in the conversion of our children, than that of a truly religious home. We pray that you send your sons and daughters forth with the memory of the holy seasons of family worship; teach them diligently the law of the Lord. A proper concern about their preparation for eternity will be the best preparation for the present life. Wealth of grace in the heart will serve them better than wealth of great earthly possessions.

Let no newspaper or book, however good, crowd the Bible out of its place. Guard your home against the pernicious literature with which the land is flooded. Questionable literature is one of the most effective weapons of Satan in his war upon family religion. In every way walk before your family circumspectly as those who have to give an account.

And now, beloved brethren, in speaking to you of the various departments of our Church work, and the privileges which are yours in the Christian home, we must not forget that the appeals of the Word of God are to the individual. What is the Church but a body of individual souls professing to be born of God and sanctified to His service? If the individual life of its members be pure and holy, the life of the Church shall be holy likewise; but if, as individuals, we are untrue to God, then no name nor organization can make us that power for good it is our privilege to be.

We commend you, with ourselves, to "God and his word of grace." "Be steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord." Live in constant communion with Christ. Take pleasure in the social means of grace. Piety is the gauge of power, seek larger bestowments of the Holy Ghost, expect widespread revivals. As sons be obedient to every law of the Divine Father. As stewards be ready for the coming of the Master. "And may the peace of God which passeth all understanding keep your minds in the knowledge and love of God and of his Son Jesus Christ." "And may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Ghost be with you all. Amen."
