WAR NEWS

The war situation remains about the same. The British and French troops have made slight advances. The Russians are resting in the Carpathians, while they have successfully bombarded Soldau Station in East Prussia.

The forts near the Turkish town of Balair, midway between the entrance to the Dardanelles and Constantinople, have been shelled by British warships. It is reported to have sent Austria an ultimatum. German losses along the British front since April 17th are between 3,000 and 4,000.

The Prohibition Question

What a way some of our legislators have of twisting things. With every district in the country, except St. John's, a local option one, the majority of the House decided on Wednesday to submit the question of Prohibition to the people. A funny way of dealing with the matter under the circumstances. One would only expect this if things were the reverse.

Politicians sometimes have a knack of shirking responsibility and placing it on the shoulders of the people—except in money matters. They are usually well able to take care of that themselves. It would be interesting to get a photograph of the influences at work in the minds of our 'statesmen' on Wednesday when they voted to have the question of Prohibition referred to the people.

Dr. Lloyd, representing Trinity District, is delightfully frank. He is reported to have said: "I could not be a delegate of any constituency. He would obey the dictates of no person or persons. Men here come to the House to exercise their own judgment to the full." It looks as if we will have to revise the ideas we have held regarding the attitude of our representatives, for, according to Dr. Lloyd, the people are only supreme when they are marking their ballots.

This no doubt accounts for the way the average representative conducts himself. How often do they consult their constituents on any public question? Do they consider themselves such superior beings as to need no advice or suggestions from the people who sent them to the Legislature. If this is so, and we believe it is so, then the people should give them to understand that they were not selected to do as they please.

Thursday Morning's Fire

The shop and store occupied by Mr. Geo. Hierlihy, with all its contents, was entirely destroyed by fire on Thursday morning last about 2:30 o'clock.

The reflections of the fire were seen first by Mrs. E. Russell, sr., who gave the alarm. Immediately after men were on the scene, but the fire had by that time gained some headway. A light northeast wind was blowing at the time, which carried the "flankers" out in the harbor, so that there was very little danger to any other building except the east store, which caught fire and which is somewhat damaged. It was eventually saved by the organization of a bucket brigade.

Several casks of kerosene oil were removed from the wharf, and this no doubt accounts to some extent for no more damage being done. The origin of the fire is unknown. The buildings were owned by Mr. George Bursell, of the Finance Dept., St. John's. We understand the stock was partially, at least, covered by insurance, and the buildings were also insured.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY
SYNOPSIS
Wed., April 7th (Contd.)
Mr. PARSONS felt that everyone in the country must thank His Excellency the Governor, Lady Davidson, and all their enthusiastic fellow-workers, especially the women of Newfoundland, upon the splendid work which they had done for our volunteers. He proceeded to make some comparisons, showing how careful the people of Canada were fostering their fisheries, and how much larger the fishery exports were than our own. We should carefully keep this in mind, and endeavour to follow it.

He desired also to pay a tribute to our Volunteers and Naval Reservists, and to those who worked in recruiting and in other ways. His District, Harbor Grace, had not been backward in doing its duty. He had every confidence in the ultimate victory of the Allied Forces, and it was possible that some of our own boys might gain glory, and that the war cry of "For Newfoundland and Old England" might be heard upon the battlefields of Europe. He paid a tribute to those members of the Naval Reserve who had already died at the post of duty. The whole country joined in sympathy. While we had seen Britain's victories would not cease.

Mr. KENT congratulated the mover and seconder of the motion upon their able speeches. At the present time our minds were filled with the great war which was still occupying Europe. Last session was an emergency one, occupied solely with special legislation to meet war conditions. At that time we were anxious; the German rush towards Paris was not yet stopped, and its result was uncertain. Since then, however, matters had developed, and it was now possible to regard the prospects with confidence of success. The issues of the present war were too vital to permit of any termination "but a complete triumph for the Allies. Our enemies, since they violated the neutrality of Belgium, had almost every day broken some fresh rule of international law, or committed some fresh outrage, and reprisals by the British naval power were fully justified.

There was no question but that the war was long and arduous; no end was yet in sight. But it had served to demonstrate the wonderful unity of the British Empire, and, in the general effort to assist Newfoundland was fully doing her part. Already our own brave Naval Reservists had earned a place in history by laying down their lives for their country. During the coming session the Opposition would, in no way, obstruct or oppose any measure which the Government thought necessary to deal with conditions arising out of the war; but, in ordinary matters, they would do their duty in the way of criticism, though without partisan bitterness. In the matter of Finance, the policy of the country would require great care and caution. We had already a deficit, and it was impossible to tell what the future might bring forth.

He hoped that the scarcity, occasioned by the war, might result in a high price for the fish foods produced by the Colony. In conclusion, he expressed the hope that the war might be over when the House would meet next year.

THE PREMIER congratulated the proposer and seconder of the motion for the Address in Reply, and also the leader of the Opposition upon the able address he had delivered, and especially upon the tone in which he had referred to the Government. He had every confidence that in matters affecting the war the Opposition would give that support which had been received from Oppositions throughout the Empire since the war broke out. He congratulated Mr. Morine upon his return to the House after years of absence. His energy and ability were well-known, and the House would be glad to have him back.

The leader of the Opposition said that we must put our House in order to meet all possible financial eventualities. This had been carefully considered. He, the Premier, was optimistic as regards the future. Care and caution, however, were most necessary under present circumstances. The Reserve Fund in the Bank was placed there to meet such emergencies as the present. \$300,000 of that amount was taken to meet the deficit last year. What deficit there would be this year it was impossible to tell. It would de-

pend on the state of trade. If people were niggardly or timid, and practised economy too much, the revenue must fail; but if people who could properly spend would do so, and would give labour and supplies as usual, then all would be well. Undue economy was an injury to the country at such times as this. Business should be kept going. He did not think we would have any difficulty in turning the corner this year, although no one expected this war; had there been any possibility of foreseeing the war we might have had a larger reserve; but no one in the world foresaw such times as we are passing through this year. However, the clouds would not be over us for ever; he hoped that soon we might be able to see a gleam of hope through them. And if the war had cost much, it had shown that, if the Empire was to continue its work for good, it must be better organized for defence. We could not expect Britain to carry the whole burden of Imperial defence, while Britain's overseas paid nothing towards it. In the future every Colony and Dominion must do its share, must help towards the great Navy and Army which are its sole defence, so that they may be supreme against any possible combination. To talk of perpetual peace and disarmament was idle and absurd. The Magistrate could do nothing without the Policeman; the Empire could do nothing without a great Army and Navy.

He hoped, with the leader of the Opposition, that before next year's session peace would have come upon this satisfactory to the Empire and to Belgium, France, Russia and Serbia, his brave Allies. Material losses could be made good; but there were personal losses for which there could be no consolation, except the knowledge that death had come in the discharge of patriotic duty.

Mr. MORINE thanked the Premier for his kindly personal remarks. It gave him great pleasure to be sitting again for Bonaville. He and the Premier were now the two oldest members of the House. He hoped to be able to do some service in the way of constructive criticism for the good of the Colony, which he loved as if he were a native of it.

Mr. MORINE gave notice of a bill. Messrs. Morine, Kent, Lloyd, Coaker, Stone, Dwyer, Halfyard, Gimes, gave notice of question.

Hon. Minister of Finance gave notice of a bill.

Hon. Colonial Secretary tabled the Report of the Patriotic Committee of Newfoundland, and various financial and other reports.

The Premier gave notice of various bills.

The House adjourned till to-morrow at 8 p.m.

Thursday, April 8th.
The House met at 2 p.m.
The Colonial Secretary tabled various reports.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Coaker, from a number of places, for the appointment of a Board to deal with fish prices.

Various questions were asked and answered.

Mr. MORINE introduced a bill in relation to the sale of codfish on Labrador Coast.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE introduced a bill to amend the Customs Act.

THE PREMIER introduced bills in relation to Naturalization of Aliens, Outport Road Boards, the Sealfishery, and Patents and Trade Marks.

The above bills were read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. DOWNEY tabled the Report of the Committee on the Address in Reply, and moved its adoption.

Mr. CLIFF said that any measures found necessary to deal with matters arising out of the war, would at this session, as at the last, receive the hearty support of the Opposition. Prospects were now a little brighter, but the war was by no means over. We must still be prepared for serious efforts, and Newfoundland, though she

had already done well, must not relax her efforts. He had every confidence that if more men were needed for the Army and Navy they would be forthcoming. We must ever bear in mind the fact that we only exist and carry on our legislation and our daily work because we are under the protection of the British flag, and devotion to the Empire is our paramount duty and privilege. And the State must liberally provide for the dependents of those who died or were taken away for the defence of their country.

He referred to the objects of the Patriotic Fund. These were to assist the families of Reservists or others in sufficiently provided for; to assist sailors or soldiers invalided from active service, until they were otherwise provided for; and, generally, to assist any person suffering through the defense of the Empire by themselves or their families, wherever they had moral claims on the assistance of the public. It was very gratifying to find that the fund had been well subscribed to, but the calls on it might be great, and more would yet be needed. It was also satisfactory to note the large subscriptions for the relief of the gallant Belgians, who had suffered so much in their successful defense of civilization against Germany. We were now faced with a deficit, and with a large reduction in revenue, while, at the same time, we had to make large emergency expenditures towards our Imperial duties. Under these circumstances, every possible economy should and must be made in the public expenditure, and nothing should be expended but what was absolutely necessary. The Civil Servants of the Colony, as a whole, performed excellent work for very small pay, except in a few undeserving cases.

Mr. GRIMES paid a high tribute to those who had enlisted in the Army or Navy, and especially to those who had already lost their lives in the fight against militarism. Newfoundland would not fail in her duty to Britain in this great struggle. Apart from the earnest thought to be doing something for the relief of the poor. The Australian Government was borrowing money, and spending it on public works to relieve the unemployed. Our Government should do the same. Those who carried on the industries of the country were almost as important as those who fought on the battle-field. He thought that boards should be appointed to fix minimum wages in the different trades. Compulsory education should have been taken up, but it had not been. He regretted that the Government had not gone to more trouble to develop the fisheries of the country. Why was the value of our fisheries so much smaller than that of the fisheries of Canada? He was glad to see that provision was to be made for the dependents of those who lost their lives in serving the country.

MR. HALFYARD expressed his pride at the willingness the country had shown to do its share towards the defense of the Empire, which was fighting for the cause of right. We would willingly put up with every sacrifice that might be necessary to ensure victory; and we must not fail to make provision for the dependents of those who fell. He considered that the deficit was the natural result of the reckless expenditure of the Government for the last few years. It was difficult to

Public Notice

Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations.

By direction of the Chief Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:—

1. Cablegrams in authorized editions of A.B.C., Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British, Allied or Neutral Territory on extra European Telegraph System, on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.

2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also counted as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger; and French Morocco. The island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.

3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirty-ninth Edition; Bentley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Broomhall's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.
N.B.—As all messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and censored the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same.



see where the Government would cut down expenditure.

Mr. JENNINGS agreed with previous speeches that we must do everything in our power to help the Empire in this hour of need. He could wish we had done more than we had. He, himself, had done his best, and would himself have been in the ranks if only he were of fighting age and physically capable. He did not wish to see any man stopping bullets for him. He had heard that a large part of the Canadian military forces were men of British birth. He was glad that our own troops were practically all natives of the Colony. He had met many poor people, but he had never heard one yet complain of any taxes for the purpose of the war. They would do their duty for the Empire and they would willingly. It was said that the Civil Servants were underpaid. Why, then, were they so anxious for the Government jobs? If they did not like them, let them leave them. It was harder to get a living at the fishery now than it used to be, and the country could not afford larger salaries. In his own District the herring fishery and timber preservation should be given attention. After years of prosperity often came years of scarcity, and we must provide for the future.

Mr. COAKER did not believe that economy was wrong at present. Why had not the Government obtained a temporary loan of two millions instead of one, and spend it on public works—the remaining branch railways for example? Instead of this the Reid Nfld. Co. had been turning off large numbers of men. Why were not these branches carried on so as to provide work? Why were not some of the earlier branches now working wherever they were complete enough? He knew conditions were very hard, but why did not the Government make great efforts, as had been done in England? Last year we lost 15 million dollars by the short catch of fish, and another 5 million dollars owing to the short price of fish. Still more had been lost by the high price of food consequent on the war. So it was not surprising that there was a deficit; every-

one expected it. There would be another deficiency this year, perhaps half a million dollars. Where would we be the year after? After the war we would require five million dollars to meet our obligations, and if the Premier could raise such a sum, at such a time, he would deserve our gratitude. We should be in a very bad position.

He did not believe in the promised industry on the Labrador. We had had many such promises in the past, which had come to nothing. He would

have liked to see the Combinations and Monopolies Act carried a little farther. There should be a penalty clause in it. There were still several combinations and monopolies in existence. He hoped that if it was necessary to increase duties, the Government would be able to avoid pressing too hard upon the poor. He believed the Government could effect economies in the Public Service amounting to a quarter of a million dollars. Radical economies should be effected.

He did not agree with a statement made in the Upper House, that the price of fish was artificially inflated, and must fall. So long as the war continued, and Norway, Iceland, and other countries did not increase their catches, it appeared to him that the price must remain high. It was a time when we must encourage our fishery. He would like to see the Government attempt something to meet the scarcity of fishery supplies which must naturally exist this year. He called special attention to the serious condition of the people of Conception Bay. The closing of the mines had hit them hard, and the Northern Districts, which were not badly off, would not grumble if special relief grants were made to Conception Bay. There had been complaints that relief was not given out fairly; but he would rather see work given than any relief at all.

He endorsed all that had been said in relation to the efforts of the Colony to help the Imperial Government in time of need. If the need were more fully realized in the support, the response would be even greater. Taxation for war purposes would be gladly supported by the people; without the flag, where would be our freedom and our country? If there were any defects in our constitution, they were due to our own fault. The British constitution, such as ours, were the freest, the British Crown and Flag the best to be found in the whole world. Nothing that the Throne could do for us

H. M. S. Orpesa,
March 24th, 1915.
(Editor the Guardian).

Dear Sir,—Will you allow me a little space in your valuable paper to say a few words. As for our doings or our whereabouts I will be silent as this is war time and we have to be careful. Well, Sir, I was one of the number that left St. John's Nov. 6th on R.M.S. Franconia for dear old England. It just took us 6 days to go across. There were 307 of us, and we were divided into 3 sections, so many for Portsmouth, so many for Chatham, and it fell to my lot to go to Devonport where I spent 3 weeks at the gunnery school. I have been glad to learn that so many of our boys are anxious to fight for their Motherland. England expects every man each day to do his duty, and I am well sure our dear old Terra Nova is doing her bit to-day and doing it with a good heart to fight for Freedom.

New, Sir, we have spent a very good winter, although sometimes it is very stern. We have heard it for an old saying, you will never find all the time smooth sailing, and a man that goes to war must endure the rub. We have a hero of a captain and a fine class of officers, and more than glad to say Nfld. boys has proved themselves to be good seamen. What is it, Sir, they can't do. As far as I can see, Sir, they can stand by a gun as long as any other man. I hope you will excuse this for now, as I don't wish to trespass on too much of your space. Remember me to all friends. 

An Injustice to the Outports

\$25,000 a Year Being Paid out of the General Revenue for the Upkeep of the St. John's Fire Dept. "A Purely Municipal Service." Another \$10,000 Paid for Street Lighting Purposes.

For the past two or three years we have been calling the outport electors and their representatives attention to the annual vote in the yearly estimates of the Government for the upkeep of the St. John's Fire Department. Last year the matter was brought directly before the public when the firemen, while the House was sitting, made a request for an increase in their salaries.

A discussion took place in connection with the matter, during which Sir Edward Morris, one of the representatives of St. John's West, declared that the responsibility for an increase rested with the St. John's Municipal Council, as the Fire Department was "PURELY A MUNICIPAL SERVICE." He might have gone further and said that the salaries should not be paid for out of the general revenue.

Sir Edward actually took the position as to the increase, as we have stated above. Please note, he is one of the representatives of St. John's. What position, you ask, did the outport representatives take?

Well one, Dr. Lloyd, who represents the free (?) and independent (?) electors of Trinity District, actually favored the increase, and if we are not mistaken other outport representatives did the same.

Did any of our outport representatives make any protest against it? Not that we can remember. So far as these matters are concerned we might as well have the 98 members represent St. John's alone.

Just imagine, if you can, 80 men whom the outport people in the various districts elected to look after their interests especially, allowing the matter to be brought up and discussed without entering a protest. These representatives are supposed to be representing numerous towns and settlements that have not even a bucket to fight a fire with.

It seems to us that there is a screw loose somewhere, and we are compelled to ask the question, Does our representatives really represent us? Or is it all sham and pretence?

The H. Grace Standard joined us last year in a protest against an increase. No increase was granted last year. Then why grant an increase this year. We fear that an increase has already been granted, and it is only put in the Estimates now.

Why pay for the upkeep of the St. John's Fire Dept. at all, especially when a town like Bay Roberts, for instance, cannot secure even a bucket. Besides, this is no year for granting increases to anyone. We are facing a critical situation. We should practice economy. In fact, the electors of this country who pay the pipes would be very grateful if a certain percentage was deducted from the salaries of hundreds of civil servants, especially the well-paid ones. Talk about increases. Consider the burdens we are all carrying to-day. If we send a case of eggs or a parcel of anything by freight or express to St. John's or elsewhere we have to affix a two cent stamp to the shipping bill. If we give a cheque in payment of a bill or for labor done we have to stick a two cent stamp on the cheque.
