FIFTEEN BISON FOUND,

Part of a Large Merch Stampeded From Northern Alberta.

Fifteen bison, believed to be part of a large herd, were stampeded by John Laduc, a French-Canadian trapper, said to be the first white man to penetrate the interior of the Hay River country, in the hinterland of Alberta, says an Edmonton with a two-years fur catch from the territory several hundred miles beyond the Arctic Circle. The feeding ground of the buffaloes, which he reports to be as wild as those which roamed the western plains in territorial days, is between the Peace River and the Beaver Hills. The discovery is of importance, as it confirms the belief of naturalists that a herd of buffaloes exist; somewhere in the unknown North, Laduc, who has lived nouth of the litty fifth statement that he has not confused his find with the musk ox or the wood buffalo, seen occasionally inside the Arctic Circle.

Laduc's trapping operations during the two-years' stay in the Far North extended over more than three hundred square miles of territory. From Peace River Crossing he paddled his cance up the Peace River, tramping them across the country to the Clear Hills. He put out a line of traps and

Peace River Crossing he paddled his cance up the Peace River to the mouth of the Cadotte River, tramping them across the country to the Clear Hills. He put out a line of traps and made good catches. Afterwards he journeyed to the west of the Beaver Hills to about forty miles from where the Hay River rises in the Three Hay Lakes. Here is the story in his own words:

"I was making a long trip over the country to the north and west of Beaver Hills in the aummer of 1912. The Beaver Hills consist of a short range, reaching an altitude of two thousand feet. Beyond there is a long stretch of rolling prairie. Though it did not look good to me for fur, I explored for miles around, coming upon the buffalces on my way out there were fifteen in the herd and they were feeding in a coulee as I went over the ridge.

"The animals stampeded the moment they sensed me; but I saw enough of them to convince me they were real buffalces. Late in the winter, fally forty miles from where I saw the buffalces the previous summer, I came upon tracks which must have, been made by a large herd. There were many hoof prints in the head snow.

"The tracks were right in the Beaver Hills, not a great distance from the end of my line of traps. Af-

Although I watched every time I went over that part of the territory, I did not see the animals again. When I return to the north, in a few weeks, hope to obtain more tangible evidence of the discovery of the herd." Widely-known explorers, including Seton, Alien and Hornaday, and big hinterland, believe there are wild but-falces in the district, and from time to time Indian trappers have come out with tales of a large herd. So far, Ladue is the first man to say he saw

Ten Years' Strikes. From Jan. 1, 1901, to Dec. 31, 1912, there were 1,319 labor strikes in Can-ada, in which 319,880 men figured, at a total estimated cost to the country of \$18,000,000, based on the conserva

tive estimate that the average value of the working day is \$2. During the twelve years, nine million working days were lost owing to strikes, or an average of three-quarters of a million days per year for the period taken.

These interesting figures are embodied in a report just prepared by officials in the Labor Department, giving all the most important facts and strikes and lockouts in the twelve years specified. years specified.

Though there were 319,890 men involved, it is pointed out in the report that many of these men may have been involved in strikes or lockouts more than once during the period in question.

question.

The report will, it is said, be something of an eye-opener to legislators and everybody interested in the labor movement in Canada, and may ultimately lead to the framing of changes in legislation dealing with strikes and lockouts now on the statute books.

Lost Carload of Silver Ore.

In June, 1908, there was shipped from the Cobalt district, Canada a car containing 14 tons of ore worth about \$3,000 a ton. The ore was consigned to a smelter at Perth Amboy, and John Black, one of the Cobalt ploneers and the shipper of the ore, just had to have money in a hurry to carry on his operations. It was tha first lot of ore shipped from his mine, and was dispatched in such haste that Mr. Black forgot to take down the number of the car or to get a receipt for his ore. Just what happened to that car Mr. Black has been trying to find out ever since. The ore never reached its destination and search for nearly five years has failed to bring to light a single pound of the ore.



The London Times, renowned in the past for its hostility to everything Irish, is constrained to say editorially that "it is in Ireland that visiting commissioners will find such enlightenment as the British Isles are capable of furnishing on the subjects of their inquiry. Ireland in the person of Sir Horace Plunketh has led the whole English-speaking world in thinking out and working out the problems of rural life, and in inducing others, if only by force of contrast, to recognize only by force of contrast, to recogni agricultural backwardness and

their agricultural backwardness and set about overcoming it."

Sir Horace Plunkett, nearly twenty years ago, originated a wonderful scheme of agricultural co-operation which, benefiting by the later develop-ments of land purchase, financed by the state on behalf of the actual workers, has had immense success.

School for Servants

The first trade school in the world for servants was opened by the Minister of Education of England recently. It has equipment and accommodation for the complete training of sixty servants, and is situated in extensive buildings in the Borough, not far from Southwark Cathedral. The training schools consist of model villas; four students live in each, under the supervision of two mistresses, each villa being run as an ordinary household. All new domestic machines and labor-saving appliances are tried at the school in order that the students may be made familiar with the most up-to-date household mechanical aids.

ROYAL RELATIVES TO WED.

rincess Alexandra To Become Bride of Arthur of Connaught.

England is taking immense interest in the announcement of the betrothal of Prince Arthur of Connaught, 30 years old, and the youthful Princess Alexandra Victoria, Duchess of Fife, who is just 22. The duchess is the elder of two daughters of the late Duke of Fire and holds a unique position in the nobility of Great Britain. She is the wealthiest woman in her own right in the United Kingdom, she is a granddaughter of the late King Edward VII., and hence a niece of King George, and she is titular head of the famous Scottish Clan MacDuff, a distinction of which the handsome young descendant of highland chieftains is very proud. She is also entitled to the precedence and privileges of a princess, as well as a duchees, It will be remembered that in the middle of December, 1911, with her late father, her mother and younger sister, the young princess narrowly escaped death when the Feninsular & Oriental steamer Delhi went ashore on the coast of Morocco. Princess Alexandra was saved by a French sailor from a cruiser standing by, after suffering great hardships.

Her future husband is her second cousin, being the son of the Duke of Gonnaught, the Governor-General of Canada, and a grandson of Queen Vistoria. Prince Arthur is probably the most popular member of the English fly il family, with the possible exception of his sister, Victoria Patricis, more familiarly known as Princess "Pat" She was born on St. Patrick's Day, 1886, and hence her name and the perticular liking for her in Ireland, the country from which she has a sincere affection. The only other sister in the family is Princess Margaret, who married the Crown Prince of Sweden in 1935 and has two sons.

Prince Arthur was a great favorite of his late uncle, King Edward, and is held in high esteem by the present King George. He is a keen and capable soldier, popular with both officers and men, and his diplomatic abilities have been evidenced by the tactful manner in which he has carried out the many important missions to foreign countries entrusted to him by his s

A Romantic Jewel. A jewel with a most romantic his-A jewel with a most romantic history was exhibited at the Royal Society's conversazione recently. It is a priceless ornament of carnelian, lapis lazuli, and turquoise, and was made by order of the Pharson of Egypt 3,400 years before the birth of Christ. It was given by the monarch to one of his favorites, and when the latter died it was buried with him in his tomb. Some years afterwards the tomb was entered by a thief, who was about to steal the precious gem when the heavy slabs that formed its roof fell on him and killed him. In the course of centuries all traces of this ancient tomb were lost, and as a result of frequent sandstorms it lay buried deep under the sand. It was excavated, however, last March by Prof. Flinders Petrie, the great Egyptian archaeologist. The crushed body of the thief in the act of stealing the jewel was found and told its own story, and the beautiful gem was brought to England. It is worth a fortune.

Needn't Pay Wife's Debts.

In the Westminster (Eng.) County Court recently a judge decided that a husband was not liable for his wife's extravagance or for 'the bills which she rah up in order to spite him.

Suit' had been brought by a dressmaker, who claimed \$315 for dresses supplied to Mrs. Harris Browne, the wife of a brewer. Mr. Browne said that he regarded his wife as an attractive woman, and took pride in her appearance. She was, however, extravagant, and also ran up debts deliberately because she thought she had a grievance. Then he tried sheep-farming in Australia, and secured a certain amount of notoriety by performing a skirt dance in the Hobart town hall. Being attracted to the stage, he wrote a musical comedy and performed in it as "Mr. Erie Hope," with luke-warm success.

CATCHING POACHERS.

Policeman of West Coast.

When Capt. Holmes Newcombe, of the Government fisheries critiser Wm. Jolliffe, spent a recent Sunday morning in May in capturing the Seattle fishing boat, Valiant, instead of going to church as a good skipper ought to do, he sealed the burden of hatred that the Seattle fishing fraternity have for his trim, staunch, and powerful craft. He was quietly nosing his craft around a point near Triangle Island off the northwest coast of Vancouver Island when the chase began, which ended in the swift Seattle fishing boat being taken into Vancouver at the end of the Wm. Jolliffe's towline.

The Wm. Jolliffe is one of the most famous tug boats in maritime annals. Twenty-five years ago, when she was a new boat, she was the pride of the Mersey. Many and many a time she left the port of Liverpool loaded up to the gunwales with coal, bound thousands of miles away on a feat of deep sea towing. Sometimes it was to bring home a big vessel that had been salved in the Indian Ocean, or the Southern Pacific. Lying low on the water, her big beam and deep draught shows the weight of powerful-engines and heavy boiler equipment she carries. be able to trawel as fast with a big,
sailing ship at the end of her towline
as without any drag on her heels. On
one memorable occasion she towed a
wrecked vessel stern first all the way
from the Cape of Good Hope to the
Mersey at a speed that was in itself
quite a feat. For the last three years
the Wm. Jolliffe has been engaged in
the fishery protection service on the
Pacific coest, keeping a sharp lookout
for poachers. And here is where the
Wm. Jolliffe aroused the animosity of
the Seattle fishermen, who make their
rendezvous off the banks of Vancouver
Island. At the sight of bad weather
the Seattle boats are wont to run for
shelter to the coves and harbors of
Vancouver Island. Some suspicious
folk think they are glad of the excuse
at times in order to replenish their
bait. They are immune from selsure
so long as the weather is too bad to
enable them to put to sea. At such
a time the Wm. Jolliffe has a nastry
knack of making a trip up and down
the west coast, and leading the way
out to sea for the assembled craft.
If the Jolliffe can put to see, then
they must follow on peril of forfeiture
of their boat and gear. Many and
many is the hot imprecation that is,
hurled at the stout little craft as she
sets the pace for a game of "Molow
my leader" out over the bars of the
west coast harbors.

the eleventh American boat to be captured. When the old Kestrel was in
commission she seized the fine new
schooner North, on its maiden trip
out of Seattle. Under its new name,
Alcades, the North now does good service as a revenue cutter out of Nanaimo. Later the Kestrel seized the
Francis Outting and the Levi Woodbury. The Francis Cutting now plies
as a tug out of Vancouver, but the
Woodbury, which was only made to
hove to by a couple of rounds from
the Kestrel's machine gun, was
bought back by her owners.
