AN ADVENTUROUS VOYAGE.

BEAVER LAKE

Nine miles from St. John, on the old Black River road, lies Beaver Lake, the property of the Beaver Lake. The lake is sover a mile long, nearly half a mile wide at some points, and has an arm that is quite a lake in itself. The lake is situated in what are known as The Barrens. Its waters are of a peculiar color, something like that which gave a neighboring stream the name of Brandy Brook; but it is claimed that no finer trout are found in New Brunswick, so far as quality goes, than those caught in Beaver lake. There are islands in the lake, some covered with vegetation, some bare rocks. Just where the arm joins the lake there is an overhanging rock, under which one may seek shelter from the rain. At another, place on the shore there is quite a high bluff of rock. At other places the shore is covered with a growth of spruce, so that the natural aspect of the lake is diversified and attractive.

Urout up to a pound and more are found in Beaver lake. A member of the club, who went out recently, caught 32 his an evening, some weighing over a pound. The club has a rule that no party can take over five dozen in any one day, and this limit has been reached quite a number of times. Of course there are off days on this lake, as on all others, but it yields great sport to its members in the course of a season. Beaver Brook rung from the lake to the Mispeo stream, and thus indo outlet to the Bay of Fundy.

There is a road direct to Beaver lake, and the club hase, a good club house; an ide house, and stables for ten horses. Often several parties are there on the same day. As it is so near the city it is chiefly a day resort, and it is not usual for members to remain over night at the club house.


