





Sir Louis Davies Says His Death Will Cause a Vacancy not Easily

> His legal education was obtained in the office of John Sandfield MacDonald, Cornwall, Ont., premier of Ontario. He came to Halifax in 1873, was admitted to the Nova Scotia bar by tice. 




