

They All, With Their Satellites, Ex-hibit Phases Like the Moon.

the only thing in the heavens that exhibits phases such as the quarter, the half and the full. As a matter of fact, all planets and their satellites exhibit separately such phases, and most of them can be easily seen with a small power telescope. Thus Mars and Veronus, which are comparatively close to the earth, show through the telescope at times a beautiful crescent, at others a half planet fully as brilliant, considering the distance, as does our satellite. At times also the planets suffer celipse, just as the earth, the moon and the sun, and these eclipses are foreto'll with as great accuracy.

As to just what causes the phases, say of the moon, is easy to comprehend by a homely analogy. the open air and when thoroughly dry they will be as tight as when new, and perfectly clean.

Faded spotes on wood, caused by heat or light can be removed by rubbing with linseed oil or sweet oil mixed with an eighth part of alcohol. Old linen or flannel rags are best to use for this purpose.

Before using raisins or currants in a cake, wash them, put into a wire basket and plunge for an instant into boiling water. If this is done the day before they are used, they will be plump and much sweeter.

When frying in deep fat, never put too much food into the frying basket at once, else the heat of the fat will be reduced and the outer surfaces, instead of becoming crisp and dry, will absorb the grease.

To remove a dent from a table or cabinet, cover it with four thicknesses of paper that has been wet and then set a very hot iron on the surface for a few seconds. The steam will raisot the compressed wood layers.

A quart of sifted flour is a pound. Celery is best cleaned with a small brush.

## THE FORESTRY CONVENTION OPINIONS DIFFER ON

### FOREST PROTECTION

By W. C. J. Hall, Supt. of the Eureau of Forestry, Quebec.

Taking up the adage that the best way to deal with fire was to prevent its getting started. Mr. Woods dealt with some of the preventatives. The forest fires of the past had been crused by sparks from railway locomotives, fishing parties, efforts at blueberry culture and settlers clearing their land. Railway companies had been great sinners, but they had discovered that burned forests ceased to be money earners, and some of the companies were using their best thought to assist in saving what was left.

New Brunswick was especially the home of brook and lake fish. No true fisherman would be guilty of allowing his camp fire to get beyond his control. But there were many imitation sportsmen in the woods between May 1 and June 30, and this was the great danger period. Lovers of this sport should organize themselves into an organization for the purpose of instilling into the unthinking fishermen a few wholesome lessons of the value of the burnt portion, at the same time drawing away all moss or dry material from the cdge of the fire. In this way it is soon starved to death.

This license would compel the holder to report to an officer when and where he was going, and to notify the same officer of his return, so that a record might be kept of all fishing parties. The co-operation of all interested in fishing would greatly assist in the solution of this problem.


