FACE TO FACE WITH DEATH PASSENGERS AND CREW NEVER GAVE UP HOPE

Story of Great Hardships Borne With Patience and Courage.

MORE THAN ONE ACT OF HEROISM MARKED THE LONG VIGIL

Captain Howson Tells Story of the Grounding - Ship Was Groping Her Way Through Blinding Snow Storm -Didn't Hear Fog Whistle on Cape Forchu.

A thrilling tale of hazard and hardship on the wintry see, a story of brave men and heroic women facing the torments of hunger, thirst, bitter cold, and dire peril of the ravening winds, was brought to the city yesterday by Captain Howson, R.N.R., commander of the ill-dated Cobequid, four officers and eleven seamen who reached port on the government steamer Lansdowne at a little after five o'clock last evening. Hudded in two small cabins, with the giant seas crashing over the ship, stripping away the iron refis, emashing boats to kindling wood, burating holes through the stout decks, tearing away the superstructure piecemeal, and threatening to hurl the little cabins—perched high on the bridge deck—bodily into the frensied wash of the waves, where the crowded occupants would have been drowned like rats in a trap, one hundred and six men and women passed two wild days and one night of dread, with little food except dry ship's biscuits, leas water, and only a little fire-smoking in a tin bucket, crowded together in the democracy of common discomfort and danger, singing hymns and making jokes about their plight. Over them the littler north wind howled with dismal menace, the road of the combern bursting against the wrack contributed its ominous note to the wild confusion of counds. The stricken hulk cumbered with vast masses of crystal ice, quivered and greaned to the shocks of the scourging seas, lost in a world without form, a world of freinzied waters, skirling snow and flying frost fog.

When the Cobequid struck her wireless sent out the call for help, but it was twenty-five minutes before she got an answer from the Marconi station on Cape Sable. At first in the darkness of the early morning her officers were not sure whether they were on Brier Island ledges or Trinity ledge, and the first wireless message said she was ashore on Brier Island.

The Greta was 146 tons register, built at Dorchester, N. B., in 1899 and owned by Charles Powell of Dalhousie.





Mill's machine held no commercial possibilities, and the same was true of similar inventions for much more than a century. The first American patent for a typewriter was granted to William A. Burt, a Detroit inventor, in 1829. It was a real typewriter, but it was very rough and crude in construction, and its speed was a neglisible quantity. Only one of Burt's machines was ever built, and that one was destroyed by a fire in the Washington patent office in 1829.

In the meantime several European inventors were working on the writing machine problem, and in 1833 a

In the meantime several European inventors were working on the writing machine problem, and in 1833 a Frenchman, Xavier Proyrin, of Marseilles, produced a machine that embraced many of the principles of the modern typewriter. Ten years later Charles Thurber, of Worcester, Mass. opatented a typewriter that was an improvement on all its predocessors, but it was not as rapid as the pen, and hence had no practical value, except that it served to incite others to improve upon it. A little later a Pierre Foucalt, a blind Frenchman, invented a writing-machine for the blind that had some of the features of a typewriter.



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


