







# 21 LIVES LIKELY LOST ON TORPEDOED VESSELS

## GERMAN SUBMARINE SUNK BY STEAMER IN THE WHITE SEA

### Eight Lost on British Torpedo Boat Destroyer—Norwegian and Nova Scotia Vessels Sunk—French Lose 4.

A Canadian Port, July 7.—Claiming to have sunk a German submarine in the White Sea just after leaving a Russian port a steamer reached here today with evidences in the shape of a damaged deck of its fight.

The U-boat started to shell the steamer whose guns speedily found the range, and her gunners contented, secured a hit which caused the submarine to founder. The fight took place on June 14.

**Destroyer Destroyed.**  
London, July 7.—A British torpedo boat destroyer was torpedoed by an enemy submarine yesterday in the North Sea and sunk, says an official statement issued today. Eight men were killed.

**Two Steamers Torpedoed.**  
London, July 7.—The Norwegian steamers Havbris of 697 tons, and Bjerkio of 1,872 tons have been sunk, a Central News despatch from Copenhagen reports. Fourteen men of the Bjerkio's crew are missing.

**Nova Scotia Vessels Lost.**  
Halifax, July 8.—The captain and

crew of two Nova Scotia schooners which were sunk by German submarines have arrived home. They belonged to the schooners McLure and the General Laurie, both three masted, engaged in the Mediterranean and South American fish trade.

These vessels were not torpedoed but were sunk by bombs placed on board after the crews were given plenty of time to put away in boats. They were rescued by steamers and landed in England.

**French Losses.**  
Paris, July 8.—The losses among the French merchant vessels, due to submarines or mines, during the week ending July 7 included four vessels of more than 1,000 tons, according to the official statement issued today. The list of ships under 1,000 tons is given likewise as four, with one rightfully belonging to the preceding week's report.

Submarines unsuccessfully attacked three merchantmen, it is announced, and no fishing boats were sunk. Last week's report announced the loss of two vessels of more than 1,000 tons and three of a less tonnage.

**United Baptists Under Leadership of Rev. A. F. Brown Have New Edifice.**

Hawksaw, July 8.—The United Baptists of this community under the able leadership of the Rev. A. F. Brown, B. A., on Sunday dedicated their new church to the service of the Master. The building is of the Egypto-Gothic style of architecture, containing a large auditorium capable of seating four hundred people, a splendid vestry for use of the various societies of the church, a choir alcove. The building is finished in natural woods, stained glass windows, a modern acetylene gas plant has been installed which furnishes excellent light. The pulpit platform is furnished with a beautiful altar stand, and the chairs are quartered oak, finished in leather, as are the chairs in the choir. The carpets are in wood colors to correspond with the wood design in the interior finish of the building. Giving the whole a very beautiful, harmonious and restful effect. The exterior body of the building is painted white with light stucco trimmings, and the roof is deep red. It occupies the eminence of a hill overlooking the beautiful St. John river, within sight of the bridge, the C. F. R. and the Valley Railways.

This church is in the centre of a prosperous farming community and bids fair to become the religious and social centre of the people in the future. It is a building of which the community is justly proud and a credit to the United Baptists of this place and the denomination at large. The Rev. A. F. Brown, B. A., the pastor of the church has a very large place in the affections of the people and is doing a splendid work among all classes in the community. **LABRADOR PEOPLE HAVE GOOD SEASON**

Seals Plentiful, Weather Excellent and Railroad Line May Be Built to Hamilton Inlet.

St. John's, Nfld., July 8.—The steamed Diana from the Labrador coast reports that the population has enjoyed one of the most prosperous sealing seasons known. The people were in good condition all winter and not a single instance of food shortage was heard.

In the Spring whooping cough caused several deaths at Cartwright. Heavy ice packs delayed the opening of the fishing season. The captain of the Diana reported that the Spring was fine and warm in Labrador. There is some interest in the announcement by Bonar Law in the British House of Commons recently that the war cabinet would consider the possibility of Hamilton Inlet, Labrador, as an anchorage and outlet for Canadian produce. It has been proposed to extend the Quebec and Saguenay railway to Hamilton Inlet, about 800 miles, or thirty hours journey from Quebec city. The Quebec and Saguenay is controlled by the government.

**CHARGE GYPSIES WITH BIG THEFTS OF MONEY**

Six Arrested in Gloucester County and Two Women Held for Trial on Charge of Robbing Store.

Bathurst, July 8.—A band of Gypsies which recently entered Gloucester county got into serious trouble at Augustus Corner, a store keeper, and Elizabeth Cormier, L. R. Howard and Thomas Young, also storekeepers of Grand Anse, made complaints against the members of the band. The Cormiers allege that the defendants visited their store and carried away a tin box containing bank notes amounting to nearly \$200, \$50 in gold, a \$50 cheque, a \$50 cheque, certain deeds and mortgages, two gold watches and other articles. The men in the case were discharged as there was no evidence that they were in the Cormier store. The two women, the older eighty years of age, are at liberty under \$2,000 cash bail.
