with tillage. In buying trees one should specify only first grade trees, true to name, free from injurious insects and disease, and not over two years from the bud or graft. The trees should reach the buyer in strong living condition, not shriveled nor giving evidence of improper storage or stunted growth. Trees with the limbs well separated in point of origin are also much preferable to those in which they all come out at about the same height.
