The Reciprocity Treaty—Its Conditions Unjust towards the Dominion.

To the Editor of the Tribune.

Sir: The Treaty being negotiated between the Dominion and the United States for reciprocal free trade being yet an open question, I beg to offer a few suggestions through your valuable journal. Conceiving that the terms agreed on by the Commissioners on behalf of the two countries are entirely one-sided and unjust towards the Dominion I propose to call attention to these facts, if facts they are found to be.

We have before negotiated treaties with our neighbors and as often awake to the fact that we had got the worst of it.

The North-western boundary question, settled years ago, was a disgraceful compromise of our rights, and the San Juan affair a miserable failure in diplomacy.

The Washington Treaty itself turned out a one-sided affair even with the reserve of damages to be paid us by the United States for the yielding up of the inshore fisheries. The damages it was supposed could not (when assessed) be short of twenty or thirty millions of dollars, and if paid would go far to equalize the terms of the Treaty of Washington.

The American themselves put the value of their fisheries at a much higher figure than this, when complaining of the treaty that secured them to Great Britain.

It appears now by the present negotiations for reciprocity, it is a condition precedent, that these claims against the United States are to be abandoned by the Dominion without corresponding consideration.

If the United States had made a show of justice by yielding the Atlantic and Pacific coasting trade in return for some disposition on the part of the States to deal equitably, although that treaty might be supposed to imply that by their enjoying the privilege of our entire coasting trade.

The condition in this Treaty is, that the Dominion is to construct the canal connecting the Gulf of Lawrence, some miles above Montreal, with Lake Champlain.

This canal is to be a deep canal, large enough to pass ships of one thousand tons. The construction of this canal is a work certain to direct a very large portion of the trade from the Gulf of Lawrence to Montreal, Quebec and Maritime Provinces through the Hudson River, converting the United States into a Dominion sea-board at the expense of the Maritime Provinces, increasing also very materially the Atlantic coasting trade of the United States, which trade they carefully preserve for their own ships and sailors.

The canal, too, will divert a very large portion of the trade of the New England States and the Maritime Provinces from the harbors and towns of the River St. Lawrence to those of Lake Champlain. It will thus divert the life-blood from our Intercolonial railroad, rob the Shelburne and Bay of Fundy canal of a very large portion of its trade, and tend to the prejudice of the Maritime provinces generally in a way that no calculation of figures can estimate. It will not even possess the quality of giving cheaper carrying to the Atlantic for the benefit of the grain growing countries of the West. It simply turns the current of trade from the St. Lawrence to the Hudson River. It is hard to see why these tremendous concessions have to do with free trade.

It will be said that the lumbering interest of the Ottawa, &c., require this canal. If such be the fact, and it is an imperative demand of the lumbering interest, &c., that interest does not require a thousand ton ship canal for ocean vessels. If such a canal were built, the lumber, &c. would be carried to American ports in canal boats or small vessels. A third third of a ship canal would answer for all inter-lake trade. It is only the expense of the two countries that should be taken into account. It is not even a condition of the Free Trade Treaty that the United States should make a bonus to the Dominion for the privilege of free trade.

They yield the coasting trade of the lakes, and get ours in return. They get, and have had, but we have nothing to show the Hudson being open to us. The champion ship canal will make it a light way from the lakes to the ocean as the St. Lawrence is, and why is it not specified as being open to us as the St. Lawrence is to them?

The expenditure of eight millions of dollars for the enlargement of our canal when it secures our consent to a wide and judicious expenditure of Dominion capital, but why it should be made a condition of the Free Trade Treaty is not so easy for the ordinary business man to comprehend. There does not appear any corresponding yielding on the part of the States. The seaboard of the Dominion is equal, if not of greater extent than that of the States, and yet they charitably refuse to reciprocate in the coasting trade. Although enjoying our entire coast trade, they retain their Atlantic and Pacific trade for their own ships and seamen. No! this yielding is not as far as we can learn yet, are not down for the Dominion to perform.

If we are to have Free Trade, why is the Treaty so transmitted with conditions for the Dominion only to perform? Our Dominion suffered no perceptible inconvenience when the United States by their notice suspended the former energies were aroused; trade routes new channels, our progress received no check, our shipping rates prospered, and our resources generally rapidly developed themselves. Experience (that best of teachers) has proved to us that our necessities do not demand a reciprocity treaty at all, and that we may become a highly prosperous people without it. Why then pay so dearly for it? A reciprocity treaty on an extended scale is at best an experiment, if conducted on the most equitable terms, and a few statesmen and well informed business men would indeed rather decline it, than our manufacturers

emerged from their infancy and become capable of coping on equal terms with the older and better established institutions of the United States.

A small protective import duty on manufactured goods is but a trifling contribution by the entire people to the establishment of our infant manufactures on a firm footing, and it needs no arguments to prove how very much of our future success depends upon our manufacturers in time to come.

Shipping Notes. Wrecked—A letter from Wm. M. McLean from Pictou, N. S., 4th inst., reports the loss of the bark Harvest Home of Androssan, on the east point of the Magdalen Islands, about midnight of the 21st ult., while on her passage from Magdalen to Saguenay River, and became a total wreck. Captain Wilson and his crew were saved and brought to Pictou. Mr. McLean, managing owner, was also on board at the time of the loss of the vessel. Her hull and a portion of the materials were saved and sold. The II. H. was 81 tons register and built in this city in 1840.

The sitting of the Assembly to-morrow may possibly result in a dissolution, unless the fear of such a step should restrain the opponents of the Government.

The local train running between New York and New Haven was thrown from the track to-day, by a misplaced switch.
