FROZEN TO DEATH

Woman and Child Perished
in Storm

GIRL MAY RECOVER

W. G. Comeau, Caraquet
Mourns Loss of Wife
and Son

A terrible tragedy occurred at Lower Caraquet last Wednesday, when William G. Comeau, a native of Chatham, lost his wife and son in the storm, finding them next morning dead. Mr. Comeau, who was in rather poor circumstances, removed last year to Lower Caraquet, where he has since lived with relatives of his wife, who was Miss Christine LeBreton of that place.

The couple had three children—a boy of eight years, a girl, five, and a baby six months old.

Several days before the storm, the family had taken up their residence in a tract building that had long been vacant, believing that the winter was about over. When the storm came up in all its strength, they feared the roof would blow off their dwelling, so they started to go to a neighbor's, about four hundred yards distant. When about half way there Mrs. Comeau and the children became exhausted, and could go no further. With the baby in his arms, the father reached his destination, left the infant and at once returned for the rest. Such was the blinding effect of the drifting snow that he lost his way, and all through the night failed to find his wife and children. In the morning the three bodies were found. Mrs. Comeau and the boy were frozen stiff, he being extinct. The little girl lay between the other two, and though badly frozen was still alive. Hopes

were entertained for her recovery. It is long since such a tragic death occurred on the North Shore; and in the neighborhood it is the sole topic of conversation.

No cases of contagious or infectious diseases have been reported to the Board during the year which of course means either that there have been none or that physicians have failed to report them as required by law.

The number of deaths which occurred during the year was 36, which is the lowest death rate in this town for a number of years. Of this number 16 were under 2 years of age and 6 over the age of 70.

BUDGET SPEECH.

Premier Pugsley Says Prospects are Bright.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS

Central Railway to be Taken Over by G. T. P.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley began his budget speech on the 19th. He congratulated the House on the late payment of \$275,000 by the Dominion in settlement of the Eastern Extension claims, and predicted an early settlement of the province's claim on the Fisheries award.

We have, he said, confidence in the new Minister of Justice, Mr. Aylesworth, and have every hope that at an early day this wrong will be righted. If we ever get the opportunity of taking our case before a competent tribunal I have not the slightest doubt that our claim will be recognized and that we will receive a sum in the vicinity of \$2,000,000.

I am happy to be able to say that at the convention recently held in St. John the Hon. Mr. Emmerson announced to be part of his policy to take over branch roads and make them a part of the Intercolonial.

Sir Wilfrid has introduced a resolution for an address by both houses for such a change in the B. N. A. act as will enable the subsidies of the provinces to be increased. Our meeting at Ottawa with the representatives of the Dominion government was the first time in the history of Canada that representatives of the province were called together for consultation with the cabinet. New Brunswick will now receive an addition of \$130,000 to the amount of its subsidy. The new agreement, instead of confining the subsidy of Quebec and Ontario to the population as it was in 1861, will give them 80 cents a head until their population reaches 2,500,000. That is certainly not an unfair arrangement. When the population of these provinces reaches two and a half million 60 cents a head will be paid for the excess. A new arrangement with regard to the provincial subsidy for civil government and legislation is very generous, indeed, to the smaller of the provinces. Ontario receives \$240,000, or about 11 cents a head on its population at the census of 1901. Quebec receives the same sum, equal to 14 cents a head. Nova Scotia, \$190,000, or 41 cents a head, and New Brunswick \$180,000, or 34 cents a head. This province received nearly five times as much per capita as Ontario and four times as much as Quebec. We were glad to get that sum and the people of this country will be glad to get it, for it means an addition to our capital at 4 per cent of \$3,250,000, which is almost equal to the total amount of our net debt. Having said this much, it will now be my duty to take up the accounts of the past year and compare the receipts and expenditures with the estimates.

P. is to pass right through the village of Chipman, and I have every expectation that our road will be either sold or leased to that great line within a few months to be operated as a part of it. These are steps in the right direction. But the farmers, who will have to pay more for horseshoeing will charge more for their own produce; and the horseshoers' employees, having to pay more for food, will demand higher wages.

THE I. C. R.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson's annual statement concerning the Intercolonial, delivered in parliament last Friday, was a very important address, showing the road to be in good condition and with a surplus of \$61,915.34 to its credit during the fiscal year.

NO CURE, NO PAY.

It is said that the Impress Doctor of Chicago—the clever old lady that has ruled that country for more than forty years—pays her physicians only so long as they manage to keep her in good health.

The story, if it be true, shows the superior wisdom of the Man-ha monarch, and suggests to the white man ways in which he might improve.

Doctors should receive fixed and liberal salaries, and be required not merely to cure disease, but to keep the patient free from disease. When they fail to do this, they should be relieved of their duties, by men who are able to fulfil the requirements.

We carry this shipshod principle into other walks of life. In most places the Canada Temperance Act has been used, not to end the sale of liquor as a beverage, but to raise a revenue from the traffic by occasional fines.

Mr. W. H. Wallace was heard before the council in regard to his account for sidewalk and claimed that he had been unfairly dealt with in the matter.

If it was found that the outside line was correct he would be in favor of paying the account even if the inside line was not right on account of the trees being in the way as was claimed. This appeared to be satisfactory and the matter dropped.

After the reading of a number of by-laws the council adjourned.



GOOD NEWS FOR GASPE COUNTY.

One of the most important bills that has been sanctioned by the Lieutenant Governor at the proposition of the Quebec Legislature was "The Magdalen River and Valley Railway Company" supported by Doctor Lemieux, M. P. for Gaspé.

This bill is of special interest to our numerous readers of Gaspé county and Dr. Lemieux deserves credit and thanks for his hard and conscientious work for the interest and prosperity of his electors, since it is due to his influence and activity that this important bill was passed and Gaspé county will soon be able to reap the benefit of another railway.

The Magdalen River and Valley Railway Company which is controlled by a rich American Syndicate of Boston, will be built at a point near the Magdalen River going into the interior of the Gaspé Peninsula where the syndicate possess a limit of four hundred and sixty five miles of pulp wood and also a water power which will develop an electric power of 10,000 horse power.

In connection with the railway the Syndicate intends building a pulp mill and employing to about 300 Gaspésians, besides helping settlers along their railways. Prosperity has at last found its way into the fertile Peninsula of Gaspé.



SILVER CITY ROMANCES.

La Rose, the First Discoverer, Makes \$32,000, Gets a Sweetheart, and Settles Down.

The first man to be made wealthy out of Cobalt was John La Rose, the blacksmith connected with the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway construction gang. He climbed up the steep rocks at the head of Cobalt Lake to get hardwood for his forge fire. While wielding his axe, he slipped, nearly chopping his foot, but making his fortune. The keen steel glancing off the log on to the rock, scraping away the dirt, and lodging against a protruding lead of pure native silver. He did not stake the first claim, however, but imparted the information to somebody else, who registered their "discovery" before La Rose. However, the blacksmith was quick enough to get the property on which he first found the silver, and which is now the location of the valuable mine which bears his name. He sold a half interest in the mine to the Timmins Syndicate, for \$5,000, and subsequently sold the other half for \$27,000. This netted \$32,000 to the first discoverer, not a big sum, in comparison with the fortunes which have been made since. But La Rose was as poor as the average habitant before his find. His tastes were modest, and the \$22,000 was to him a big fortune. It is stated that the blacksmith subsequently won the heart of a French-Canadian lassie, and is now living in a little village near Quebec City, still pursuing his calling. Oblivious of all the millions which are now being made out of the mineral wealth which he discovered, he lives a contented, happy life, as the village blacksmith.

The Indian Tradition.

The story of a still earlier Cobalt romance is as follows: For centuries the Indians roamed the rocky banks of the Mississippian lakes, utterly unconscious of the stupendous wealth they were tramping under foot. When at last they received an inkling of the valuable deposits, jealously of the white man's inroads on their territory prevented their disclosing the secret of the district. It became a tradition among the redskins that he who disclosed the position of the silver deposits to any man with white blood would meet death before the next moon.

Tradition Fulfilled.

Twenty-seven years ago, it is stated, the white men knew in a general way of the existence of deposits of the valuable metal near Lake Temiskaming. All the tribes that could be offered the redskins were not sufficient to induce them to impart the secret. The beautiful daughter of a big chief became the wife of a half-breed near Fort Temiskaming, and told him the secret in heretofore sacred to her full-blooded ancestors. It is said that she was stricken with the "white plague" and died within two weeks. Thus the half-breed, crested with grief, fled himself to a settlement on the Spanish River, where he promised a dealer in liquor to direct him to the silver lodes in consideration of copious drafts of intoxicants. The agreement was that the trip was to be commenced the following morning. That night, however, in a paroxysm of drunkenness, the half-breed was overturned from his canoe into the river—another fulfillment of the tradition. In 1872 lumbermen heard of the silver, and sent experts through the country to make an examination. The reports brought back were discouraging, and no development was attempted.

Book Romances to Come.

Cobalt, with its incalculable rock-bound wealth, will probably be the basis of many a stirring book romance of the future. Already Dr. W. H. Drummond, the author of "The Habitant," and other works that have made him a leader among Canadian writers, has established himself in a small cottage on Kerr Lake, about four miles south-east of Cobalt town. There, overlooking the activities of half a dozen mines, and within ear shot of the never-ceasing dynamiting on a dozen others, he is busying himself with literary works that will probably perpetuate the memory of the greatest silver lode of the generation, perhaps of the century.

A SOLDIER'S GRAVE.

Discovered in London, Ont., in Out-of-the-Way Cemetery Corner.

Dr. H. J. Morgan of Ottawa has been instrumental, with the assistance of Mr. G. B. Harris of Eldershouse, London, Ont., in discovering the grave in that city of an officer who took an active part in the defence of the western frontier of the Province of Ontario (then Upper Canada) during and subsequent to the rebellion of 1837. The grave was found in a plot to be covered with conchases. All traces of it would inevitably have been lost within a few months. Upon a stone, which was found to be broken in three places, was the following inscription:

"Colonel the Honorable John Maitland, C.B., discovered the London and Western Districts, Lieutenant-Colonel of the 32nd Regiment, and youngest son of the Earl of Lauderdale. Died at London, Upper Canada, on the 18th January, 1839. Erected to his memory by the officers of the 32nd Regiment, which he commanded for upwards of twenty years, as a mark of their esteem and regard."

Of the officer above mentioned an account is published in Dr. Morgan's "Celebrated Canadians" (Quebec, 1882). He was the third son of the eighth and the brother of the ninth and tenth Earls of Lauderdale. Born March 5, 1753, he entered the army in 1770 as ensign in the 52nd Regiment, and was present with that corps in the expedition to Copenhagen, under the command of Lord Cathcart. Subsequently he served in Spain and Portugal under Sir John Moore, and was in the "Peninsula" (1809-11) as A.D.C. to Sir William Houston. Returning to England, he was appointed A.D.C. to his uncle, Gen. Sir Thos. Maitland, and accompanied that distinguished officer on his expedition to the Mediterranean and Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands. Here Maitland was appointed inspecting field officer of the forces. In 1814 he obtained a majority in the 52nd Regiment, and in 1818, when not quite 25 years of age, he was gazetted lieutenant-colonel of the 32nd Regiment, which command he continued to hold till his death. Coming with his regiment to North America in 1820, he was appointed Major-General, and in 1824, according to the view taken by the reader of the circumstances, to be present in Canada during the rebellion of 1837. In 1838 he was placed in command of the London and western districts whose military force he organized. His most brilliant exploit was the repulse of a band of American brigades at Point Pelee, on Lake Erie, on March 3, 1837, for which he received from the late Queen a C.B. Contracting a severe cold on the march to Malta, and during the attack on the island, he died, unmarried, a victim to consumption, at the monthly communication with the mounted police posts established on Hudson Bay.

Moving Canada in France.

Monsieur Leo Lefebvre of Paris, France, sent to Canada by the French Government in order to secure moving pictures for public exhibition there, has sailed for Europe. The only Toronto picture he secured was the busy King and Yonge street corner. He has been in Canada four months and a half, and will return to this continent next year, when he will take moving pictures from Seattle northward, and will test the rigors of the Alaskan climate. His present trip has been devoted

chiefly to the lumbering industry. He has taken pictures of timber in every stage of manufacture in the various mills, and has visited some of the greatest mining camps of the West. His experiences in British Columbia were somewhat arduous. He had his dearest instruments carried to camps to which a footpath was the only means of access. The roads were at times rough and dangerous, but he believes the pictures secured will be well worth the trouble.

Besides these very instructive views, Mr. Lefebvre has taken a number which illustrate the beauty of Canada. These include views of Niagara and other Falls, the Thousand Islands, the Rockies from a C. P. R. train, etc. He has also a set illustrative of the cod-fishing industry.

The trips being taken by this French Commissioner are a sign of the progress of France along the lines of free education. The pictures are to be exhibited at what are known as the conferences populaires, which are free illustrated lectures, to which any citizen may gain admittance. The subjects treated include many branches of study, agriculture, geography, the arts, and should prove most useful in raising the standard of national intelligence. "People of France have no idea that Canada is so big," declares Mr. Lefebvre, whose views will be a splendid immigration agent for the Dominion wherever they are shown.

The Kaiser's Appetite.

Escoffier, a famous French chef, who was German Emperor's favorite cook on his visit last summer, tells a Paris reporter that the Emperor eats more at breakfast than at dinner, and that his favorite dish is chicken stuffed with tomato and pakriks dressing. Every chicken served at the Imperial table bears on its breast the Imperial crown and eagle made of stiff white sauce.

Monthly Mails to Hudson Bay.

Steadily the bounds of civilization are pushed northward in Canada. The Prince Albert Advocate, which is published in the north-western part of the Bay, records in a recent issue the fact that "Capt. W. Mackenzie-Walker has returned from a four-months' patrol of the district lying between Winnipeg and Split Lake (a new post just established) within 340 miles of Fort Churchill on Hudson Bay. There are a line of posts that were established by dog trains operated by the police from a point on the C. N. R. to Grand Rapids across the head of Lake Winnipeg to the old Hudson Bay post, Norway House. There a detachment of the Mounted Police is stationed, who take up the trail to Split Lake via Cross Lake and down the Nelson River country and from there the Split Lake detachment will patrol the coast. Then they all return the same way, the whole journey of some 1,500 miles having the object of keeping regular monthly communication with the Mounted Police posts established on Hudson Bay."

COURT-MARTIAL IN ENGLAND.

London papers to hand give the following account of the trial of the British battleship Dominion. On board the Achernar at Chatham on Monday a court-martial was held for the trial of Captain Charles Edward Kingsmill, commanding officer of the Dominion, first-class battleship, Navigating Lieutenant Basil Stratford Noake, and Lieutenant Frederic W. Clarkson on a charge of having negligently or by default suffered the Dominion to be stranded in the River St. Lawrence on Aug. 10, 1906. The accused officers pleaded not guilty.

The Dominion, a new battleship, built at a cost of £1,365,790, left Chatham last summer on her maiden voyage to the coast of the Canadian ports to receive gifts of plate. In steaming up the River St. Lawrence she unfortunately struck a rock and sustained very serious damage.

The circumstantial letter set forth the course taken by the Dominion on leaving Dalhousie at 8:05 p. m. on the preceding Thursday. At 8:20 p. m. Lieutenant Noake observed a light on the port which he assumed to be Souris Point Light, whereas in reality it was a bush fire. At 8:40 p. m. soundings were taken, and the depth of water was ascertained to be 16 fathoms. Instructions were given for soundings to be taken continuously. At about the same time a fixed white light was observed which was taken for Paspébiac Light. The relative positions of the two lights corresponded with the soundings taken. The navigating officer, after checking is supposed position, went to the pier bridge, and observed a fixed white light which was being passed very rapidly. This he mistook for a steamer's masthead light, whereas it was actually Souris Point Light, which had already been mistaken for Paspébiac Light. The navigating officer, not having had the result of the second sounding reported to him, then went to the starboard sounding machine, and noticed that the bottom had been touched with 35 fathoms of wire out. With the officer of the watch, Lieutenant Frederic Clarkson, he immediately gave the order "hard a-port," and stopped and reversed the engines. This he mistook for a steamer's masthead light. It would appear that no allowance was made for the indraught into Cascapedia Bay in laying down

the course to pass three miles south of Souris Point Light, where, as article 91, page 14, of Notes bearing on the navigation of His Majesty's ships clearly states that "in navigating coasts where the tidal range is considerable caution is always necessary. It should be remembered that there are indraughts to all bays and lights, although the general run of the stream may be parallel to the shore." This indraught took the ship so much off her course as to cause her to strike. It also appeared that, although the ship was in such close proximity to the land, both the captain and the navigating officer were off the deck during a great portion of the time between 7:15 p. m. and 8:55 p. m., when the ship took the ground.

After several witnesses had testified, Captain Kingsmill, in defence, pleaded that his actions under the circumstances were such as might be expected from any experienced navigator.

The Court, after a short deliberation in private, found the charge against Captain Kingsmill and Lieutenant Noake, the navigating officer, proved, and adjudged them to be severely reprimanded. The charge against Lieutenant Clarkson was found not proved, and he was acquitted.

BUDGET SPEECH.

(Continued from page 2)

St. John, and if the trains were to part at that point, one going to St. John and the other to Halifax, the former would be in the wharf at St. John ready to be unloaded before the Halifax train had reached Memramcook. We do not propose that this railway shall be sold or leased at a smaller sum than we put into it, and we have the concurrence of the leader of the opposition in that view. That was the time when we were not sure that the railway would go to Chipman or near it. One line was located 20 miles north of Chipman another went south of it, and had either of these lines been adopted our railway might not have been taken over. In urging a new survey we were seconded by the Minister of Railways, and as the result of our efforts a new line was located and goes right through Chipman, which is only 78 miles from St. John.

Some hon. gentlemen opposite say that we ought not to be paying 5 per cent. on a part of our debt, which is in the shape of treasury bills, but these gentlemen have not studied the subject. We could sell our debentures now at 4 per cent., but we do not think it prudent to do so. The great railways are not now issuing bonds but are borrowing money at 5 per cent. interest on temporary notes until the money market shall become more easier.

Among the liabilities incurred by the board of works was an advance on what was formerly the road account. The chief commissioner had pursued a niggardly policy he might have kept down these expenditures but the public services for roads and bridges must be maintained and few people realize how great our responsibilities are in that respect. We have in this province 3,838 bridges of over ten feet span which have to be kept up. These bridges have a total length of 384,184 feet or upwards of 70 miles. The total length of the roads which have to be kept up by the province is 13,168 miles. In Nova Scotia their roads are largely kept up by the municipalities. If you go to Montreal or to Ottawa and propose to drive a few miles into the country you are confronted by a toll gate. In Ontario not only the roads but the bridges are kept up by the municipalities, although the government makes a few special grants. We have no toll gates or toll bridges in this province, everything is free.

The house adjourned at 5.30 p. m., and Mr. Pugsley concluded his speech on Thursday. He felt satisfied with the financial showing of the province. The debt was a little over \$3,000,000, while the forest lands were worth at least \$20,000,000. The late premier had left as much on deposit at Ottawa as he had found. There was an overdraft for public works but no bridge or what would have been omitted. All classes in the province were prosperous. Coal mining royalties in Sunbury, Queens and Kent paid five times over the interest on the bonds guaranteed for building railroads there.

Encouragement had been given to a dry dock at St. John. A strong company had been formed to develop the Grand Falls water power, and would soon commence work. He hoped to see the Grand Trunk Pacific trains operated by electricity generated by Grand Falls. Hoped great things from the development which will follow the building of the International railway. Land on the two sides of the two new railways for one mile each will be kept for the public.

MacKenzie and Mann were about to inspect the St. John Valley with a view to building a rail-proposed trans-continental. He expected that the valley railway would soon be built, giving railway there to form a link of their way conveniences to 70,000 people. No subsidy would be given for such road, but if the government thought it would pay, the bonds would be guaranteed, thus entailing no possibility of loss to the province. He held in his hand a list of subsidies granted to railroads by this province which now form a part of the C. P. R. which he read. Subsidies granted in aid of railroads:

- St. Stephen Railway, \$5,764.57.
 - Woodstock Railway, \$74,800.
 - Western Extension Railway, \$1,180,000.
 - Fredericton Branch Railway, \$227,500.
 - Houlton Branch Railway, \$17,500.
 - St. John Bridge & Railway Extension Co., \$5,500.
 - St. Stephen and Milltown, \$14,000.
 - Tobique Valley, \$70,000.
 - Total \$1,646,064.57.
- Add to this 1,600,000 acres given to N. B. railway from Gibson to Edmonstone at \$3 an acre, \$4,800,000. Total, \$6,446,064.57.
- N. B. and Canada railway stock taken by government, \$240,000. Total, \$6,686,064.57, besides lands given to N. B. and Canada Railway Co.

If instead of giving these moneys and lands the province had guaranteed the bonds they would have lost nothing but the interest for a short time, because the C. P. R. today is paying a rental of \$32,829,74 on a total mileage of 466 miles, equal to 4 per cent on \$80,000 a mile. These figures will show how much we have lost by giving subsidies instead of guaranteeing their bonds. If we had pursued a correct policy this province would now have more than double its net debt to its credit. It will make but little difference to me how this matter turns out, for I have had already all the glory that is to be got out of public life. But before I leave the political stage I would like to see everything done that can be done to develop this country, and among my highest aspirations is to see a railway built down the valley of the St. John river. I believe that we have here as good a country as any part of Canada. We have young men who only wait the opportunity to distinguish themselves. We are blessed with abundant resources, but we must move ahead, create new centres of industry and new cities and towns. We in New Brunswick are a working people, who want nothing more than an honest reward for honest labor. I look forward to our future with the greatest hope. Let us move forward then with confidence and courage. I have faith in this country and in its people, and I am prepared to make up my mind and look forward with hope, confidence and courage so that we may make whatever we undertake a success.

Governor and Mrs. Tweedie. Mrs. W. C. Winslow and Mrs. E. Hutchison presided in the tea room and were assisted by Mrs. Frances Ritchie, Miss Arlie London, Miss Belle Hutchison, Miss Manie Tweedie and Mr. P. Parker, Mr. Fred Tweedie and Mr. Murray Tweedie.

THE NET LICENSE

Quebec, March 25th, 1907.—During the session of the Quebec Legislature which prorogued on the 16th Mr. John Hall Kelly, Local Representative for the County of Bonaventure, laid before the Government the claims of the salmon net fishermen of the County of Bonaventure and Gaspé asking that the amount of license be not increased, and instead of adhering to the tariff which has been enforced in the past, in any change is made that the people be charged so much per thousand lbs and not in proportion to the amount of nets fished by each fisherman. After discussing the question very fully the Government came to the conclusion not to change the tariff for this year but to keep the same tariff during the coming season that has existed in the past. The salmon net fishermen can therefore now rest assured that for this year no change will be made in the tariff and that the old tariff of former years will still apply. The Government wishes to have more time to study the circumstances connected with this very important question and the probabilities are that they will adopt the same tariff which is now enforced by the Federal Government in the Province of New Brunswick.

Mr. Kelly, while speaking to our representative last week, explained that the tariff now in force in New Brunswick is lower than the tariff proposed by the salmon net fishermen at their convention last Fall, and that he is trying to obtain the same tariff as New Brunswick rather than the one suggested by the salmon net fishermen themselves, as it will be easier on the fishermen. The documents asking for the incorporation of the fishermen has been duly placed before the Lieutenant Governor in Council and the letters of incorporation incorporating the salmon net fishermen of the County of Gaspé will issue in the near future.

Mr. Charles Marcell, Hon. Rolaphe Lemieux and Dr. Lemieux worked with Mr. Kelly to protect the rights of the fishermen in keeping down the proposed increase in the amount of license tax.

PROHIBITION AMENDMENTS.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., March 21.—Amendments aimed at strengthening the provincial prohibitory law are now before the legislature. The regulations respecting doctors' certificates and registration of sales by druggists have been made more stringent. The quantity of intoxicating liquors when sold for medicinal purposes by vendors shall not exceed forty-nine ounces at any sale, except ale and porter, which are limited to two gallons at any one sale. In any prosecution under the act no witness shall be excused from answering any question on the ground that the answer may subject him to prosecution under the act.


