TERRIFIC WOLF CHASE.

The following exciting sketch of a Wolf Chase in Hungary, will be read with lively and thrilling interest. The chase—the attack of the hungry pack—the combat—the death struggle—the rescue—form altogether one of the most thrilling scenes imaginable.

One evening his way home led through a desolate morassy wood, which stretched far ten versts on one side of his little farm, and where the track, deep between accumulations of high snow, gave only just sufficient width for the little horse and sledge. Mart's eyes were closed and his senses heavy with weariness, nevertheless he soon began to be aware that the animal was quickening his pace unwontedly again it jerked forward, a quicker still—and a low neighing sound of terror effectually roused the drowsy man. He looked in front; all was as usual a wide snowy forest, standing knee-deep in a bed of snow—the narrow trough of a track winding through it—here and there pyramids of snow which showed the huge ant-hills of the country—the heavens bright—the earth white—a living object but the horse before him. He looked behind—the scene was just the same—whispering snow and leafless trees, and a winding track; but close to the sledge were three dark gaunt animals, heavily galloping, and another was fast gaining behind; the jaws of the foremost, with the lowness of the sledge, were within the reach of Mart's shoulder. He cared not for that—he knew that it was his horse they wanted first; and saw in an instant that all depended on the animal's courage more than on his own. If the frightened creature could have the nerve to keep steady in the track, the chances were much in its favor, for the moment the wolves turned off in order to pass and get ahead of it, the depth of the snow diminished their speed—but should the horse, in his terror, plunge aside and founder in the snow, Mart knew that he would be lost. He leaped forward, called the animal cheerfully by its name, and laid his hand on its back as he went, often went to do, in times of fatigue or difficulty—the poor beast knew the kind voice and hand—raised its ears, which were laid flat back with terror, and fell into an even pace.

Mart shouted violently—but the wolves either too keen or too many—made no impression. It was an awful time both for master and horse. Mart kept his hand on the animal, while his eye watched the ferocious brutes, who were often within arm's length. He had a hatchet, which he always carried on these occasions, to chop the frozen fish; he felt for it and grasped it in his hand, but forbore to use it, for the closer the wolves kept at the back of the sledge, the less were they seen by the horse. Every minute, however, one or more of them broke out of the track in the attempt to pass; and although they instantly lost footing in the snow, yet the unblinkered eyes of the little animal had caught sight of the dreadful foe, and a plunge forward made Mart turn his eyes with anxiety to see that it kept straight in the narrow path.

One of the wolves was more than usually huge and long-limbed, and more than once it had contrived, in spite of the deep snow, to advance nearer abreast of the sledge than any of its companions. Upon this grim creature Mart more especially kept his watch, and caught the green light which played from its eye-balls. It turned off again—the snow laid fester for a space—the wolf kept its footing—it gained—for their pace is enormous—the little horse's eyes glared around at it. Mart drew his hand, wet with the animal's perspiration; the wolf was just beyond arm's reach, but he kept his hatchet in readiness. The horse was now in a desperate gallop, and the wolf just abreast—it suddenly turned sharp towards it—now was Mart's time. He dealt a tremendous blow—the wolf avoided it, but stumbled in the snow and in a few moments was yards behind.

The distance from home was now quickly shortening beneath the horse's hoofs, which continued to carry the sledge at full gallop, till the fear of an overturn became the source of fresh anxiety. Mart was quite aware by this time that there were no common lazy wolves he had to deal with, but sharp set determined brutes, to whom man or beast would be alike welcome. These were not the animals to be deterred by the sight of a man's dwelling, as is usually the case, and there was an ugly yew of wide open space between the outskirts of the forest and his house which he looked to with real apprehension.

They were now at the very edge of the wood—the road became open—the wolves gained on every side—the horse bounded furiously forward, caught the sledge against the stump of a tree—it overturned—was swept away at a tremendous pace, and Mart was left alone in the snow. In a moment a heavy claw hatched the throat, and down the front of his sheepskin—it was well Anno's whippers by so thick beneath. He threw

off the brute and rose—his hatchet had been jerked out of his hand in the fall—he cast a desperate glance around, but saw it not. The horse was now almost out of sight, two of the wolves were close to the defenceless man, and the two others, deserting the animal, were bounding back to him. Mart faced the foremost, he could do no more, and in an instant was surrounded. Here we must leave him, however cruel it may seem. Meanwhile the two women were as usual expecting him anxiously at home—for Mart was late! Anno was sitting beneath the pinewood candle at the spinning-wheel. Liso had risen from her's and gone into the smaller chamber, especially devoted to her. Old Karria Pois was lying before the stove fast asleep. Of a sudden the dog pricked his ears, listened, rose—ran to the door and whined—then, returning to Anno, wagged his tail, ran back and whining again scratched at the door. Karria Pois usually gave signal of Mart's approach, though not in so urgent a way, and Anno opened the door expecting to see her husband. The dog dashed furiously out, but no sign of Mart appeared. The young wife went out into the piercing air—saw and heard nothing, and was slowly returning in, when a sound caught her ear—it was the sound of hoofs striking fall and sharp upon the ground. So had Mart never approached before. But there was no time for wonder, for the next moment the horse galloped up to the door and stopped. Anno saw instantly that something had happened—the animal was dripping with foam and trembling all over—the sledge was reversed, and, above all, Mart was not there.

Anno was but the girl still; she called quick to her grandmother—the old woman did not answer—she flew into the inner room; Liso was standing motionless with her face pressed against the door. There was no light, save from the little snowed up window; but Anno saw enough to know that she stood in prayer. "Oh! Juuma!" (God) said the poor girl to herself, "hear her!" and leaving her undisturbed, she ran again out of the house, gave one look at the trembling horse, and then, all trembling herself, began to retrace the jagged track in which it had come.

We must now return to Mart, whom we have left in a frightful position. He knew what it was to be torn to shreds in games and wrestling matches, and it was such as, shoulder to shoulder, and muscle to muscle, few could withstand. But it was as nothing now, against the heavy weight—the vice-like teeth—the rending grasp that held him down on every side. For a few seconds the desperate violence of a man to whom life is sweet, and such a death most horrible, shook off the pitiless assailants; but his own blood had dyed the snow, and the sight of it seemed to turn ferocity into fury. The blood hounds closed again upon him—they pulled him down!

People say there is no time to think in sudden dangers—they have never known one. There are more thoughts struck from the mind in one moment's collision with sudden and desperate peril than in days of fearless security. The sweets of this earth—the home that lay so near—the mystery of Heaven, swept over Mart's mind; day, even particulars found time to intrude. He thought how Anno and Liso would watch through the night—how his mangled remains would tell all in the morning—Anno's despair—the village lament; he thought of all this, and more, and knew himself in the jaws of hungry wolves! Then those foul lurid eyes glared over him; the tightening of the throat was suffocating him—his senses reeled—when on a sudden—dash came another animal hard-breathing along; throw itself into the midst with one sharp howl, and fastened upon the chief assailant. The wolves relaxed their fury for an instant; Mart reeled giddily to his feet, and recognized his brave dog. For a second he stood stunned and bewildered; when he saw one wolf retreating and all three attacking the dauntless Karria Pois. He turned to help him, and a bright object caught his eye; it was his hatchet lying on the snow within arms length of his last struggle. Mart snatched it up, and was now himself again. Blood was dripping from him, but his limbs were uninjured, and furious were the strokes he dealt.

One wolf soon lay dead at his feet; the other cowed, and retreated, spilling its blood as it went, and held off, shaking round; and now Mart poured his whole fury on the great monster, which held Karria Pois in as stifling a grasp as he had done his master. It was no easy task to release the dog. The hatchet rung on the wolf's skull, rattled on his ribs, and laid bare the gaunt back-bone; but the dog's own body interrupted any mortal wound, and the wolf seemed to feel no other. Poor Karria Pois's case was desperate; his legs were all drawn together, protecting the very part he sought to wound, when suddenly he stretched himself out with some fresh agony, and the hatchet was buried deep in

European Intelligence.

From late English Papers.

GREAT BRITAIN.—There is no excitement whatever respecting American difficulties; interest in the subject is almost extinct, although the papers continue to discuss it editorially.

The London Marine Insurance underwriters held a meeting to discuss the present state of that business, J. Baring presided—discussion adjourned.

Louis Kosuth writes to the press, expressing himself mortified by the recent appeal made by Walter Savage Landor, respecting Kosuth's strained circumstances.

The crew of the Russian frigate Dinna, arrived prisoners at Falmouth.

FRANCE.—The papers continue to publish showers of congratulatory addresses. A review of 100,000 men will be held at Paris to celebrate the signing of Peace; the review is nominally as a compliment to Count Orloff, the only soldier of the Plenipotentiaries. Among the rumours prevalent is one that the Emperors of Russia and Austria have respectively promised to visit Paris soon after the conclusion of Peace.

Six thousand French have embarked at Marseilles for the Crimea, probably to supply sick vacancies.

Napoleon has determined to send an expedition and colonization to Madagascar, and England does not oppose.

SPAIN.—The Queen of Spain performed the annual ceremony of washing the feet of the poor, and so did the Emperor of Austria. Nothing more of the reported Carlist troubles.

ITALY.—The American Mediterranean squadron remained at Genoa.

GERMANY.—The Assembly of Halberg has rejected the project for a Constitution drawn up by the German Diet.

AUSTRIA.—Differences between Austria and Rome, relating to proposed conference to interpret the Concordat, have been mutually arranged.

A very bad feeling is exhibited by Russia and Prussia towards Austria, exhibiting itself in numerous small matters.

PERSIA.—Mr. Murray, British Minister from Persia, is still at Teheran, but it is said that Persia having apologized, he will return to Teheran.

"The greatest grief (chagrin) of my life," said the Count, "now that I know the Emperor Napoleon, is, that my late master, the Emperor Nicholas, did not know him too!—If he had but seen him for half an hour, not only would there have been no war, but the best relations would have been established between the two sovereigns and the two countries. The Emperor Napoleon has precisely those traits of character that would have exercised a great influence over the Emperor Nicholas."

Arrival of the Baltic. Treaty Signed.

New York, April 17.
Baltic arrived—Treaty of Peace signed by all the Plenipotentiaries on Sunday, 30th. Great rejoicings in Paris. English demonstrations, much quieter.
Consols advanced to 93 1/2.
Breadstuffs dull, about "Cambria" quotations.

Arrival of the Africa.

New York, April 19.
The Steamship Africa, arrived with dates to the 5th inst.
Ship Skerwith from St. John, arrived at 10:30; on the passage out saw field ice about 200 miles from coast of Newfoundland, lights on the ice.
Peace proclaimed at St. Petersburg, and favourably received.
Cotton advanced 1/4 to 1/2 on ordinary, and 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 on middling qualities.
Breadstuffs unchanged.
Consols for money 93 1/2.

From the Boston Daily Courier, April 14.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.—At one o'clock on Saturday afternoon an alarm of fire was sounded in the first district. The firemen turned out with their usual alacrity, had upon reaching Sudbury street discovered flames issuing from the sixth story of the Garish Market—a brick structure fronting on Sudbury street, but having entrances on Friend and Portland streets. The height of the fire, as well as the general belief that the market walls would fall the moment the inner timbers yielded, naturally deterred the firemen from combating the flames, and so the two upper stories were burned almost without opposition. The firemen now worked earnestly upon the four remaining stories, but at great disadvantage. The walls of the market building, as was anticipated, fell in and out in great sheets, and with such threatening that no one felt safe within the reach of them. The engineers of the fire department cautioned those under their command, as well as the spectators, to avoid danger.

At two o'clock, Mayor Rice visited the fire and upon seeing the condition of affairs ordered the steam fire engine. That powerful machine was soon upon the ground, and men who saw it in operation will deny that its performances were wonderful. Two streams from it were more than equal to six from the hand engines. These streams were sent upon the burning market, and thus the firemen were enabled to protect surrounding property. Story after story the market walls fell, and the westerly gale and brought down with it the crash and blind establishment of Jerome Hales, 34 Friend street, and the building material storehouse of Jeremiah Dunston, 24 Portland street. Provisionally there was no one injured by the crash.

The market was erected about five years ago, by Mr. George W. Gerrish. It was not a very substantial building, and could not have cost more than \$70,000. Mr. Gerrish has an insurance (in sundry country offices) to the amount of \$40,000; but it is reported that one of his policies is expired recently, so that his loss by this event is increased. The greatest sufferers are the parties who leased portions of the building.

The loss by this fire is very great. It will exceed \$200,000. Besides this, two hundred persons will be thrown out of employment.

A TOWN FOR SALE.—According to the Louisville Democrat, the town of Frankfort, Kentucky, is in a bad fix. The Democrat says:

"The sale will certainly take place at no distant day. That is a fixed fact. The town is irretrievably in debt, and wholly unable to pay little bills of a few thousand dollars, contracted years ago. From the Commonwealth we learn that its liabilities are about \$124,000, something of a dip for a village of a few hundred political gamblers. Its assets consist of water works, gas works (the Capital Hotel), and some stocks in turnpike roads. And although they cost the people some \$240,000, we don't suppose the whole town—including politicians, penitentiary and all—would bring more than six tens under the hammer. However, those who are in the habit of dealing in chips and wheelstons, would do well to attend the sale. They can't injure their business."

ALLIANCE MAN ROBERT ARRESTED.—William F. Merrill, depot and ticket master at Augusta, was arrested on Saturday last in that city, on complaint of Hon. Virgil D. Parry, U. S. Post Office Agent, for robbing the mail of a package containing four land warrants, worth about \$700. He was brought to this city yesterday, and taken before John Rand, Esq. U. S. Commissioner. He was examined, and gave sureties in \$2000 for his appearance on the 23d inst. before the United States District Court in this city.

Hon. George F. Shepley, U. S. District Attorney, appeared in behalf of the government.

The Portland "State of Maine" says, that the mammoth British Steamer, now in process of construction, is to make her first trip to Portland, and perhaps make that port her permanent route. The cost of the vessel is estimated at one million sterling, and the mere cost of launching her at £40,000.

This is to be done by excavating the ground beneath her and letting her drop into the water as she lies.

Provincial Parliament.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.

Legislative Council, April 15.

Mr. McNaughton's Bill to revive an act which was in force in the reign of Henry the Eighth, relative to attending Divine Worship on Sunday, was rejected without a division.

The Bill to amend the law relating to Municipal Corporations passed in Committee. Hence in Supply: Several grants were placed on the Supply Book, which it is understood will be closed to-morrow.

The Bill to abolish the Grant to King's College was taken up in the afternoon.—The Hon. Mr. Fisher proposed his Bill relative to the establishment of a comprehensive system of University education, as an amendment to Mr. O'Connell's amendment, which was supported by Tilley, Hatheway, and Fisher. The original Bill was supported by Smith, Harrington and J. A. Harding.

No other business transacted.

April 16.

The Bill relating to Municipalities, and the Bill relating to the Police of the City of St. John, received a third reading, and were ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council.

The Supply Book was ordered to remain open until to-morrow.

The Bill relating to the debt and property of the City of St. John, was adopted, with certain amendments.

Mr. Tibbits' motion for an address to His Excellency, respecting expenses incurred in the survey of the disputed territory, by A. E. Botsford, and others, was carried without a division.

The College question was not taken up to-day, in consequence of the absence of Mr. Gray.

The House was in Supply nearly all day. Several large grants were placed on the Supply Book, most of which had been recommended by the Trade Committee. The Trade Committee recommended a sum of money to be placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to settle the claims of Brewers and others, arising out of licenses sustained by the operation of the Prohibitory Law. The Report was accepted, but however, without considerable opposition being offered to the recommended appropriation.

Mr. McNaughton's Bill to amend the Election Law stands as the order of the day for Friday.

April 17.

Business rapidly proceeded in the House to-day.

The Bill relating to Sheriff streets in the Parish of Portland, was postponed for three months.

On motion of Mr. Boyd, Monday next was set apart to go into consideration of a Bill to regulate the sale of Spirituous Liquors.

The Bill relating to non-resident Free men of the City of St. John, passed with some slight amendments.

Hon. Mr. Smith introduced a Bill to incorporate the President and Directors of the Shediac Bank.

from His Excellency respecting the appointment of the Sheriff of Carleton.

Mr. Allen spoke for an hour and a half; he endeavored to prove that Government had pursued an unjustifiable course in dismissing Mr. Winslow, and at close of his speech moved a resolution that the act of the Government, has not the approval of the House.

Mr. Connell replied to Mr. Allen and spoke for nearly two hours; he justified the course pursued by the Government in appointing the gentleman who has been annually elected Warden of the Municipality of Carleton, and explained the appointment.

Mr. Tibbits accused the ex-Sheriff of Carleton of exercising an influence on several occasions, and justified the removal.

Mr. Cullen also defended the course pursued by the Government.

Several other members spoke, nearly all of whom regarded the resolution as expressive of want of confidence.

A motion was made by Mr. Gray that progress be reported.

Mr. Steadman moved an amendment that the further consideration of the resolution be postponed for 3 months.

A long discussion followed, when the amendment was sustained by the following division:—

The following Report of a Special Meeting of the Class A Shareholders of the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway Company, held in London on the 27th March, is copied from the Times of the 28th, and will be read with satisfaction by all who take an interest in the Road. From the proceedings it is very evident that Class A are desirous of completing the line to Woodstock, as fast as possible; and the plan proposed for the formation of a new company for this purpose, we have reason to believe meets with success. And we trust that before long, we shall be enabled to announce that the work on the Line is resumed.

ST. ANDREWS & QUEBEC RAILWAY COMPANY.

A special meeting of the class A shareholders of the company was held yesterday, at the office, Parliament street, Westminster, to consider a proposition for the transfer to a company new in course of formation of the rights and privileges now vested in the company, and to pass resolutions in connection therewith; Mr. F. Edwards in the chair.

Mr. Byrne, the secretary, read the report, which stated that the new company proposed to be formed, would have a capital of £600,000 in 30,000 shares of £20 each, of which only 350,000, or 17,500 shares would be disposed of at present, that being the amount required to complete the first section to Woodstock, 90 miles in length. The new stock would be issued in classes A, B, C, and D. Class A to consist of 4,000 shares, entitled to a Government guarantee of 6 per cent. for 25 years, to commence immediately on the completion of the line to Woodstock, with a bonus of 20,000 acres of land, or 5 per cent. share. Interest at 6 per cent. per annum to be allowed on the deposits and calls during construction. The Class B to consist of 7,000 shares, entitled to a bonus of 100,000 acres of land, or 15 acres per share, and 5 per cent. interest on the deposits and amounts paid during construction. The Class C to consist of 4,000 paid up shares, to be allotted to the proprietors of the 4,000 capital stock shares in the existing company, with 60,000 acres of land, or 15 acres per share, to the holders of the 4,000 land shares of the land stock company, for the purchase of that portion of the railway already constructed, including rolling stock, &c., together with all their rights and privileges, but no interest to be allowed on these shares during construction. The Class D shares to consist of 2,500 shares of £20 each, to be paid over to the local Government in right of their advances of £32,000 and of advances to be made. About 3,300 only holding capital stock to be divided *pro rata* in satisfaction of interest, and for transfer of line.

The Chairman said the Scheme was "now before the shareholders, and the books were open to the inspection of any of them who might wish to see them."

Mr. Bates, a member of the Committee, explained that, after a very protracted discussion with the directors on the affairs of the company, they had devised the present scheme for relieving the company from its difficulties. He believed, if carried out, that it would be found satisfactory to all parties. Looking to the traffic prospects of the line, and the high position of the Canada Land shares in the market, he thought there was a fair prospect of success. Some of the shareholders thought the terms were too liberal to the public, but he thought it would have been unwise to offer lower terms.—The terms to the existing shareholders were favorable, and he believed that the rights of all parties had been fairly and properly adjusted. The division of the surplus land among the A shareholders after the other classes were satisfied, would amply recompense them for the loss of interest. He

concluded by moving a formal resolution to the effect that the shareholders approved the arrangement proposed to be granted by the new company for carrying out the line to Woodstock, and authorized the directors to carry out the arrangement.

The Chairman stated that the holders of 1,700 shares out of 4,000 shares had assented to the scheme, and that the holders of 1,000 shares more would assent, making 2,700. The holders of 50 shares only had dissented. The whole of the present A shares, 4,070 in number, with but one exception, had £16 per share paid up. It was necessary to call up the remaining £4 per share, in order to pay off a loan.

Mr. Goodchap and other shareholders expressed their dissent from the proposed scheme for forming the new company, as they were desirous of preserving their present rights. They did not want to belong to a new company.

The Chairman explained, that, unless they completed the line to Woodstock in 1857, they would forfeit all their rights, and the money expended would be lost. About 26 miles of railway from the port of St. Andrews were already finished, and six additional miles could soon be completed, making 32 miles, that might be soon opened for traffic. The cost of constructing that portion of the line had not exceeded £3,000 per mile, and to complete the line to Woodstock, including rolling stock, would be £350,000.—The Government had agreed to subscribe £50,000 towards the undertaking, but had not completed their agreement.

Mr. Greaves thought the plan proposed was the best they could adopt, and, from information he had obtained, he believed if the project were carried out that they would have a very good property.

The Chairman, in reply to a question, stated that Earl Fitzwilliam had assented to be chairman of the new company, and that Lord Ashburton had also assented to the scheme.

The resolution proposed by Mr. Bates was then carried, Mr. Goodchap dissenting.

In reply to a question, Mr. Sharpe stated that the Bill now before Parliament of the British and North American Great Railway and Land Company did not emanate from the St. Andrews company.

The proceedings concluded with a vote of thanks to the chairman.—[Times.]

In consequence of bad roads very few of the farmers have brought produce to market for the last fortnight. Hay is selling for 25 per ton, Potatoes and Oats from 3s. 6d to 4s. per bushel. Butter 1s. 2d. Eggs 5d.

The Steamer Admiral, Capt. Small, made her first trip for the season on Friday last. We are happy to learn that she is as popular as ever. Her gentlemanly officers will always command that patronage for the Steamer, which she has heretofore enjoyed.

Judge Davis, one of the Judges of the State of Maine, refused to acknowledge a newly appointed Sheriff, and would only recognize the former occupant of that office.—The people remonstrated and appealed, but his Honor was brought before the Legislature, and an Address for his removal passed the House 51 to 60, and the Senate 16 to 3. The Judge nothing daunted, has appealed to the Supreme Court to decide between him and the Legislature.

We are informed that the name of the man, supposed to be a pedlar, recently found dead at Lepreux, was John Bowman, and that he has a wife living at Quasco. A list of the articles found in his pack may be seen at this office, and further information respecting them, and his clothes, &c. may be obtained from Mr. Robert V. Hanson, at Lepreux.—[Courier.]

The man in goal charged with having shot Mr. John Walsh had almost escaped on Monday morning. The girl who went to sweep out the cell was astonished at the anxiety he showed, that she should not move a cloth that lay in one corner, and at once communicated her suspicions to the gaoler. An examination was made, and it was discovered that he had buried the floor with a piece of iron procured from his stove, in such a way that to tear out a large piece and get down into the cellar would be but the work of a moment, and once in the cellar the way was open for him. He had been secured by an iron chain from his leg to the floor, but this was fastened by a padlock, which he broke open, and he was just prepared for flight when discovered. He is now in one of the condemned cells. It is really time that something should be done to make the goal a little stronger.—[Freeman.]

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE.—It is only a short time since we had the unpleasant duty to record the murder of a boy by a fellow apprentice, in a fit of passion. We thought at least we trusted—that such an event was of rare occurrence, and it would be long before we would have to record such another. How much we have been disappointed in our expectation will appear from the following:—On the 18th inst. at two boys, named John Carey and John Connell, aged 11 and 13, were playing together with a sleigh, Carey several times in fun overthrew O'Connell, when the latter lifted a piece of iron, and threw it at Carey, who was standing some short distance from him. The iron struck him on the side of the head and fell to the ground. O'Connell ran at once

to assist him, lifted him up and called him by name, but the poor little fellow was unable to answer him. The iron had entered the skull, and caused concussion of the brain, from the effects of which he died on Monday. The Coroner's Jury returned a verdict that Carey came to his death by a blow from a piece of iron thrown by O'Connell without malice.—[Dundas, Canada, Tribune.]
