2. That non-resident owners of unoccupied lands, shall provide for the removal of the snow and ice, or other obstructions, from the sidewalks adjoining such unoccupied lands.

3. That the owners or occupants of houses so situated that the snow and ice in falling off, or falling from the roofs, may hurt or endanger the lives of persons on the sidewalks or the streets, shall remove, or cause to be removed, from such roofs, all snow and ice as soon as practicable, and within ice, as soon as practicable, and within twenty-four hours of such time as it is deposited on the roof.

4. That this By-law shall not apply to

4. That this By-law shall not apply to the sidewalk commencing at lot one hundred and forty, in Section B. of said village, and extending to the Railway Station at the north side of the village.
