TAKE GOOD CARE OF MILK **BOTTLES AND PRICES WILL** FALL, SAYS DISTRIBUTOR

Breakages During Last Year Meant Loss of \$3,000—Cardboard Caps Cost Him \$1,600—People Have Remedy for High Cost in Their Own Hands.

"If the people of London want to keep down the price of milk they ought to take good eare of the bottles," said a milk distributor to The Advertiser today.

"You would be surprised at the loss from breakages alone. Last year our firm lost \$3,000 from broken bottles. Of course frosty weather has a lot to do with it, and as this has been a milder winter the damage may not be so great; but if our customers would co-operate with us in promptly returning bottles, and in taking proper care of them while in their possession, it would have an immediate tendency to still further reduce the price of milk.

"It may surprise many people to know that an empty pint bottle is worth more than the milk which may be put into it, while a quart bottle is worth about just as much as the fluid it contains. "Then, there are other incidental items of expense which milk consumers





Paris, March 4.—On Lake Majeur, in Northern Italy, the Italian aeroplane builder. Gianni Caproni, is testing the biggest waterplane yet built. Its passenger capacity is one hundred persons, and with it Signor Caproni hopes to find a type of waterplane capable of making regular trips across the Atlantic.



Eight motors of 400-horsepower each are used and the speed obtainable is estimated at 150 kilometres an hour. The crew will consist of three pilots and two mechanics. In the cabin, which has the appearance of a large motor launch, there are seating accommodations for 100 persons.



the island.

In 1866 he sold his woolen business and sought a new location for a mill, eventually locating in Truro, Nova Scotia.

This young man was the late C. E. Stanfield, the founder of the woolen industry in Truro, and the father of John and Frank Stanfield, now the President and Vice-President of Stanfield's, Limited.

In 1896, when Charles E. Stanfield was setting up in years, the Truro factory was still small and making too many lines. He felt that he was ready to lay aside the reins of business and sold out his interest in the mill to his two sons, John and Frank.

John Stanfield, after learning all his father could teach him in his own mill, had gone afield for further knowledge, working in the woolen mills in Upper Canada and in the United States, while Frank had devoted his time to the office and sales end of the

The new partners had little capital, but they had practical experience and an untouched market for knitted goods of quality. They decided to specialize on knitted goods and sold the cloth machinery, putting the money obtained into machines for making underwear. At the end of the first year, there were 17 employees, the sales were \$24,000 and profits \$2,250. Practically all of the first year's profits were put into advertising, and the new firm decided to go in for quality and printers' ink. In the words of the Vice-President, "these three words are responsible for our suc-

cess."



VALUE OF TABLE SCRAPS. A flock of 20 late-hatched pullets were purchased by a resident of Ottawa, in December, and he sold them the first of the following May. Count-ing the value of eggs at prevailing prices, during the four months, the pullets laid him a net profit of \$26.88 over the cost of feed. He bought them at the cost of feed. He bought them at meat prices, paying 12 cents a pound, or \$6 for the 20, and received 20 cents a pound for them in the spring, or \$11.40. They were White Leghorn pullets and had grown considerably during the winter. Incidentally it was shown that the garbage from a family of three, when turned into new-laid eggs, was worth \$1.50 per month, \$6 for the four months, January till April.



Wreck Placed On Long and Block.

> VALPARAISO, Ind., March 4 .- Resons in the train wreck Sunday night Railways was placed on the Michigan Central engineer and fireman at the inquest held today by Dr. H. O. Seipel, coroner of Porter County, and they were formally charged with involuntary, manslaughter.

Dr. Seipel, after several witnesses to the disaster had testified that the signals were against the Michigan Censignals were against the Michigan Central, swore out affidavits against the men—william Long, Niles, Mich., the engineer, and George Block, Michigan City, Ind., the fireman—and ordered them bound over for trial. They were released late tonight on bonds of \$5,000 and \$3,500 respectively, furnished by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, which sent a special representative from Cleveland, prepared to give bonds up to \$100,000. They declared the union would assist in the defence of Long and Block.

Neither Testified.

Neither Long nor Block testified at the inquest, although both attended. They issued a formal statement through their attorney, however, declaring the signal at the derail switch, 210 feet from the crossing, gave them a clear track, although the distance block, 4.600 feet away, showed a yellow light, which meant that they were to bring their train under control. This was done, they said.

Charges that the railroads were largely to blame for the disaster in maintaining a crossing which they termed a death-trap were made by the enginemen.
