## IN DEADLY PERIL

Three Wrecked Fishermen Clung to a Gas Buoy for 24 Hours.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 18.—Patrick Botkin, Michael Downing and William Dray, fishermen, were rescued in an exhausted condition this morning by the crew of the yacht Kellogg after having clung to a bobbing gas buoy in Lake Erie for 24 hours. The men were fishing near the Seneca shoals, about 20 miles west of here on the south shore of Lake Erie, when their boat was accidentally capsized. Unable to right their craft, the men finally abandoned it and succeeded in reaching the buoy which warns mariners of the submerged shoals. The round sheet iron tank, which tossed about in the heavy sea, offered a very insecure support for the fishermen, but they succeeded in holding on until sighted by the Kellogg this morning. The men were nearly exhausted when taken aboard the yacht, and would have succumbed in a short time.

## FIFTEEN YEARS IN PRISON

Frank C. Andrews, Who Wrecked Detroit City Savings Bank, Sentenced.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 18.—Judge Murphy in the recorder's court yesterday sentenced Frank C. Andrews, who was found guilty on Saturday of having misappropriated and misappropriated the funds of the Detroit City Savings Bank to 15 years at hard labor in Jackson prison. He had previously refused to grant Andrews bail, pending the settlement of the bill of exceptions, which his attorneys will file. An exception to the ruling denying bail, was taken by the defendant's attorneys, and it was announced that they will appeal to the supreme court for a writ of error on this point. Andrews never winced when sentence was pronounced. He was taken back to jail immediately.

## LITTLE WOMEN SAVE BIG MEN

Drag Capsized Sailors into Their Skiff.

## THE HEROINES OF ROCKAWAY

Both Wives of Policemen Out Rowing and Had Nobody to Help Them Either.

New York, Aug. 19.—Two slender women, Mrs. May McDonald and Mrs. Mamie Manchester, wives of Rockaway Beach policemen, are the heroines of Rockaway Beach, having rescued five big, strong men from drowning, the other afternoon. Each is about 25 years old and modest over their joint achievement.

The rescued men are Edward Joyce, 35, of No. 327 West Twelfth street, Manhattan, who confesses that he weighs more than 225 pounds; Joseph Maguire, 27, a guest at the Crystal Beach, Rockaway Beach, who gave his weight as 155 pounds; William Hill, 29, son of Jane Hill, who runs the Robert Emmett House at Rockaway Beach, 170 pounds; John Coogan, 28, East 100th street, and Ninth street, Manhattan, 175 pounds; and John Hopkins, 32, 200 pounds, and more than six feet tall.

STARTED OUT IN CATBOAT. The five men started out in a small catboat from the Four Jacks Fishing Club at Hammel's Station, and sailed down Jamaica Bay, intending to go through the Rockaway Inlet and cross

to Sheepshead Bay. When their craft was off Sheepshead dock the sheet slipped from their hands and the catboat went about and capsized, throwing all the men into the deep channel. Policemen McDonald and Manchester were rowing while the capsized catboat was in a 18-foot skiff. The policemen did not see the boat capsize. Their wives did, and called lustily for help, but their cries were drowned by the blowing of the whistle of the steamer Grand Republic the captain of which saw the accident, but was not in a position to render assistance.

ROWED TO THE RESCUE. Seeing that help was not forthcoming the wives of the two policemen caught up their oars and pulled with all their might to rescue the men, who were fully dressed with the exception of their shoes and stockings, were struggling in the water. Hill was the first man the women pulled into their boat. He was thoroughly exhausted. The little women tackled a rough proposition when they caught John Hopkins and pulled him in, too. Coogan was next pulled into the skiff. Before Maguire and Hopkins were reached both had disappeared for a second time, but the women caught both of them, and with the assistance of the three already in the boat, dragged them to safety. HEROINES' HUSBANDS APPEAR. Policemen McDonald and Manchester came alongside in their catboat, to which the rescued party was transferred. Policemen John Moore rowed out to the overturned catboat and righted her, but the five men refused to go aboard again, and they were provided with old shoes and stockings, and their way back to the Four Jacks Fishing Club after they had thanked their rescuers and given their names to Policeman Moore, who was duty-bound to make a record of the narrow escapes. The women refused to talk of their performance, except that one said: "We have rescued five men if our husbands are policemen, they are not the only ones who can save lives." They were cheered wherever they went.

New York, Aug. 19.—A strike was ordered yesterday by the International Brotherhood of Blacksmiths and Helpers in all shops where an advance of 10 per cent in wages is not granted. The strike affects shipyards principally, and 1,000 men employed in different yards quit work at once as a result of the strike order.

TROUBLE AT HAMILTON. Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 19.—The electrical workers are still out on strike, and those who know say there are poor prospects of arriving at a settlement with the company. The strikers insist on recognition of the union, and the company is not willing to agree to accepting for the strikers, says that if the trouble is not settled today, the electric railway employees will go out on strike within forty-eight hours and tie up every car in the city. The Street Railway Men's Union held a meeting Saturday night and expressed themselves entirely in sympathy with the strikers, but

HELP FROM WALES. London, Aug. 18.—Wm. Abram, member of Parliament for the Rhondda Valley division of Glamorganshire, and president of the South Wales Miners' Federation, in an address delivered today before the Rhondda Valley miners, urged the acceptance of the proposal of a financial contribution to assist the striking miners in the United States, who, he said, were fighting for the cherished principle of arbitration. The meeting passed a resolution in favor of contributions being made by the federation.

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Instances of Total Albinism Always Interest Scientists.

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"I have very often encountered similar cases," said Mr. Saunders. "Albinism among birds is very common. It is rarely, indeed, that a pure white bird is met with, but partial albinism is seen almost every day. You might say that partial albinism occurs ten times where complete albinism occurs only once."

"Albinos are more common among English sparrows than any other bird, and almost all sparrows have more or less white feathers in their plumage."

"One or two ornithologists in North America pay special attention to albinos, and have large collections of them. Their researches have proved that this phase of coloring occurs in every family of birds."

"Another abnormal color occurs once in a while, though very much more rarely than albinism, and that is melanism. In melanism the plumage is all black, instead of all white, but so rare is it that very few people ever see a specimen of it. The same thing occurs in insects once in a while."

"Personally, I do not recall ever having seen an instance of melanism, though I have seen several cases of albinism. I remember having seen two white swallows once that were pure white, and another time I saw a pure white pine grosbeak at Rat Portage."

"Besides these two birds of Mr. Lucas', the parents of which, by the way, member another interesting case of albinism in London about two years ago. Someone came in and told me that there was a white robin breeding out on the sixth concession, east of Adelaide street. I went out to see it, and every one of its young were of normal color, with not a trace of the white plumage or pink eyes of the mother-bird."
