TRAGEDY IN LONDON.

Lord Romilly and Two Domestics Burne to Death.

London, May 24.—At midnight on Saturday Lord Romilly upset a paraffine lamp in the drawing-room of his London residence. He was alone at the time, and vainly attempted to extinguish the fire unassisted. Shortly after the butler smelled smoke, and on making a hurried investigation found Lord Romilly lying senseless in the burning drawing-room, the nobleman having been overcome by smoke and the fumes arising from the burning contents of the lamp. Lord Romilly was subsequently removed to St. George's Hospital, where all attempts to revive him failed.

Several fire engines in response to alarms sent out hastened to Lord Romilly's house, about which an excited crowd had gathered.

FATEFUL FLAMES. \$100,000 Blaze in Montreal-Detroit

A \$100,000 Blaze in Montreal—Detreit

Bas a \$375,000 Fire.

Montreal, May 24.—The most disastrous fire that has occurred in Montreal for a long time broke out shortly after 6 o'clock to-night in Friedmen's liquor warehouse on Debrescles street, and spread to the large stone block of warehouses extending from Debrescles to Notre Dame street near the French Church and occupied by the New England Paper Company; Young & Son, dye manufacturers; the Metropolitan Manufacturing Company; R. Beullac, church ornaments; Pratt, pianos and organs. The flames spread from one store to another with alarming rapidity, and the danger of a vast conflagration was imminent. The entire brigade was called out and for two hours fought the flames. At the time of writing it is under control. Loss estimated at over \$100,000.

\$275,000 Fire in Detreoit.

Detreoit, Mich., May 24.—Fire broke out yesterday afternoon in the second floor of James E. Davis' wholesale drug house on Larned street. The flames quickly gutted the building and spread to Fechleimer & Hart's wholesale liquor store, which was also burned out. Shortly afterward the top floor of the Campan building adjoining Davis' was seen to be in flames. The fire was confined to the two top floors, and only a number of lawyers were burned out. The loss is estimated at \$250,000, partially covered by insurance. The works of the Detroit Screen Company also were partially destroyed by fire this afternoon. Loss \$25,000.

QUEBEC, May 23.—Jackson's pulp mill at St. Raymond was burned Thursday night. The mills cost \$49,000, and there is only one-third insurance.

Forty hands are thrown out of work. The early removal of the Lake St. John workshops and the wiping out of this mill will be a serious loss to St. Raymond.

Early Days in Canada, and What the Forefathers Had

Privations While Lost in the Woods for

Seven Days.

The history of the early settlers of this Province was often one of hardship and privation, not unmixed with the spice of adventure such as the present generation has little conception of. Here and there there still exists an aged pioneer able to recall those early days. One of these lives in the village of Thedford—Thomas Funge Howland, aged 77, whose ancestors were English and lived in the village of Thames, near London. Joseph Howland, great English and lived in the village of Thames, near London. Joseph Howland, great grandfather to this pioneer, had two sons, and in the customary way of the times gave to the elder the greater part of his wealth, while to the younger he gave enough to set him up on a farm. The latter (Samuei) being totally unaccustomed to work of any kind and disposed to take life easy, depending entirely on hired labor, soon found farming unprofitable. This, coupled with a feeling of rivalry towards his wealther brother, caused him to resolve to try his fortunes in the new world. He was married to a Miss Milward and their family consisted of two sons—Thomas F.

they lived for a short time. Finding their surroundings uncongenial, owing to their strong attachments to British institutions, and also to the bitter feeling of antipathy in the hearts of the Americans against the English (as a natural consequence of the then recent revolution), they resolved to migrate to the wilds of Canada. They divided into two parties and were to meet at Gravely Point, now Cape Vincent, opposite Kingston. One party was made up of the ladies under the protection of Samuel Howland, jun., the guide and four men to carry the boat, which was large enough to carry the party and a few valuables, and was made of light cedar boards. They often had to carry the boat and the whole party to walk over portages of considerable distances—at one place nine miles. The overland party consisted

nen of six log houses.

The Howlands settled six miles east of

The Howlands settled six miles east of Kingston on a farm on which they built a sawmill. While living here Governor Simcoe got belated on his route to Little York (Toronto) and stayed over night at their residence. Samuel Howland and his two sons drew 200 acres of land apiece, being U. E. Loyalists. This winter there was a great scarcity of provisions in Canada, as there was but little grain raised, and it had been nearly destroyed with rust the previous season. No flour could be bought at any price, and no bread anywhere except at Fort Henry, and each family could buy one large bake-kettle loaf every week at no less than \$1 per loaf. When navigation opened in the spring a vessel laden with flour for sale sailed into Kingston harbor, but no family could The Lord's Day Alliance.

We are often asked, Did not Christ make wine? He did, and at a wedding, too but was it intoxicating? The Greek word

but was it intoxicating? The Greek word used in the original narrative was "oinos," which like our word wine was generic, and does not specify the character of the wine. Several ancient writers, including Plutarch, Columella, Homer, and Aristotle, speak of an unintoxicating wine, and they use the word "oinos." Josephus speaks of the fresh grape juice as "oinos," and in Revelation vi. 6, the word "oinos" is used for the wine in the cluster. It is clear, therefore, that our opponents cannot claim the word, neither do we. Consequently we must consider the context and the circumstances. 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


