When asked whether he was ill he said merely that he wanted more air, and that somebody in the house was trying to suffocate him. At dinner he complained that his letter of credit had given out and that he must raise money immediately. This excited surprise, as a friend, who had been at the bank with him in the afternoon, had noticed that he had drawn an exceptionally large sum, of which he had spent very little. In the evening Crocker was erratio in his behavior, and was heard talking loudly and bitterly to his mother. On Monday young Crocker complained of a pain in his head, but otherwise seemed unusually well. He talked with several acquaintances on the front veranda as to his mother's plans for the rest of their time in Europe. Then he jumped up and said: "That reminds me, I must see her at once or it will be too late." He hastened off to Mrs. Crocker's apartments and remained there an hour. He was heard talking angrily, but nothing was thought of it. Then all sounds ceased. A few minutes later something fell heavily in Mrs. Crocker's bedroom. A chambermaid heard groans. Mrs. Crocker was found dead on the floor with the marks of her son's fingers on her throat. Her clothes were not torn nor her hair more than lightly ruilled. Evidently she had been taken by surprise by her son's attack and had little opportunity to struggle before becoming unconscious. Young Crocker made ne effort to escape. He acknowledged his crime, but seemed to have no conception of what he had done. He was examined by physicians and by them was pronounced hopelessly insane.

SOUTHERN SNAKE STORY.

Hundreds of Rattlers Under a Kentucky Cabin.

A Farmer and His Wife Pass a Night at the Mercy of the Reptiles.

GREENUP, Ky., Aug. 18.—Timothy Gates, of Gates Station, recently related his harrowing experiences with rattlers. His wife now lies in a deadly supor, brought on through fright or caused by breathing the sickening fumes arising from the mass of deadly snakes that surrounded them one night. Gates cabin is two feet off the ground. His watch dog aroused him at night. Soon the hissing and rattling convinced them that rattle snakes in great numbers were beneath their cabin. Then the barking ceased, and they were satisfied that the dogs were dead. Mrs. Gates became unconscious.

They were afraid to move out of bed, as there were holes in the floor that the snakes could crawl through, and in their imagination the snakes were in the room all around.

Mr. Gates, a stalwatt man with rayen

Mr. Gates, a stalwart man with raven locks, was scarcely recognizable when he told his story owing to his hair having turned gray by fright. His wite has the appearance of having aged ten years. Mr. Gates reports that upon the light penetrating his cabin he pered around, and, seeing no signs of snakes in the room, got up and looked out. There in the yard were hundreds of snakes lying lazily about. In an hour a neighbor approached on horseback, and nearing the cabin, his horse stopped as if paralyzed. Seeing the monsters, and knowing it would be useless to cope with them unarmed, he gathered the neighbors, armed with clubs and shotgnus. They engaged in a war that lasted for one hour before Gates was released from his cabin. Eleven dogs suffered death during the fight, and numerous others will die from the effects of the bites of the snakes.

After the battle was over it was found that 141 snakes were killed, some of them monsters measuring over six feet in length and having 43 rattles and a button. Several persons were made faint from the peculiar odor arising from the bodies of the reptiles. Hundreds of the snakes escaped to their den in a cleft of rocks in an old quarry near by. 

It already has been found to be a cheaper agen than horses for propelling street cars, and almost every week sees several hundreds of these hard-worked, docile animals worked out of a job through its adaptation to the wants of urban travelers. We look forward to the time when the storage battery will be so improved, cheapened and brought within the reach of everyone that a farmer will be able to attach one to each of his vehicles and heavy implements, and get it to do the work of one or more horses, according to its size, at a tithe of the cost incident to present methods.

Already an electric phaeton has been constructed at Indianapolis, and those who are fortunate enough to attend the World's Fair at Chicago will have opportunity to intercourse. We have seen no valid reason test its adaptability to human wants. The vehicle will carry two passengers on the same seat and the motorman on the same seat and the motorman on the rumble. The motorman will guide with one hand and with the other apply or slut off the electricity, which is generated by six cells located under the main seat. The current is transmitted to a one-half horsepower motor. Probably the next great development of electricity, however, will be in supplying radial railways near large cities and in propelling trains on ordinary railways. NEW WAY TO MEND A TIRE.

In England they have found a way to mend the pneumatic tire in a successful manner. The invention is patented, but our wheelmen can infringe without any danger. Supposing a puncture has been made in the tire, the neccessaries for its repair are a hollow punch, a soild stem of composition, at one end of which is fixed a circular piece of canvas, and this is folded umbrella-like to fit into the punch, and composition included, so that when inserted in the hole previously made by the punch the canvas will be spread out inside the tire, will be glued on to the interior thereof, and the hole filled with the stem of India-rubber. If the puncture is a large one, more than one hole can be made, and aseries of mushrooms inserted till the wound is healed. It will be at once seen that the process is simple, effective and neat.

The Convict Labor War

Startling Reports from Ten nessee Confirmed.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 19.—This was the situation as known at Knoxville at 1:30 this morning: A Journal correspondent has just escaped from Coal Creek to offects, where the wires are now working. His report confirms some rumors sent in earlier in the night

where the wires are now working. His report confirms some rumors sent in earlier in the night.

Gen. Anderson was captured by five men coming under a flag of truce. He was enticed into the village by promise of safety. Turning a corner he met a mob who took him to the hotel and produced a letter to his lieutenant, which was an order for the surrender of the stockade and fort. Though threatened with hanging, the general steadfastly refused to sign the paper, and asked only that he be shot and his grave be marked so that his family could find it. He may be lynched.

The firing which lasted all of Wednesday, was desultory. The miners claim they have killed five men and silenced the firing of the howitzer. It is silent, but probably to save ammunition.

At Offets Gen. Carnes learned that 500 miners awaited him at Knapp's Summit, about a mile from Coal Creek, and that three, cattle guards were filled with dynamite. Hearing this, he left the train and went up on the side of a narrow valley, and is now within two miles of Coal Creek waiting for daylight.

The Journal correspondent, knowing the temper of the miners and of the militia, fears a bloody fight at daylight.




