His Brother Protests Against His Treatment by the Hospital Authorities.

Why Was He Sent to the Asylum fer

DELAWARE, Ont., Nov. 13, 1893. My brother, John A. Mitchell, was sen

My brother, John A. Mitcheil, was sent to the London General Hospital as a non-pay (pauper) patient about four weeks ago. This latter fact I was not aware of till Friday, Oct. 27, 1893. Up to this date I had every confidence in the hospital authorities, that my brother would get every care and attention which a sick and dying man should obtain, money or no money. On that date, the 27th ult., after visiting the hospital, I found that steps were being taken to send him to the Asylum for Insane, London East, I at once protested and did everything lawful to prevent his being removed there, My protest was made in the presence of B. A. Mitchell, Drs. Ballour and McDonald, on the following grounds:

1. He was not insane,
2. He was dying.
3. He was sensible.
In face of my protest and arguments of the sensible o

3. He was sensible,
In face of my protest and arguments, on Saturday, Oct. 28, 1893, during the evening, my brother was removed to the Asylum for Insane, where he died Oct. 31, and was buried Nov. 2, 1893, at Woodland. I will not touch on lamily and private matters, but come back to hospital affairs, and let the hard-working public—the masses—those for whom hospitals were intended, judge of the treatment meted out to my brother.

The patient was not properly nursed, as Dr. Hodge, the attending physician of my brother, could testify. His orders were not carried out. Dr. Balfour said they could not nurse him and would have him removed. If they could not give proper care and attention why did they noved. If they could not give proper candidatention, why did they not say so be-ore, or why did they receive him?

fore, or why did they receive him?

On the 27th ult., I effered to get any extra help and to place \$50 in their hands for extra help to nurse him, but, no! So in the face of my prognosis, that he was dying and to let him have every care and comfort. John A. Mitchell, an old London boy, an old and active member of the Seventh Battalion since its inception, was conveyed dying to the ayslum, and worst of all, I am quite certain, knew all that was going on, but could not express himself. I can imagine what thoughts he must have had while passing along his native streets to a madhouse.

I felt it my duty to write this letter of facts, and much more if need be, and also sworn to. If the poor unfortunate sick, without money and friends, be more practically treated and unread, my letter will not have been written in vain. Yours respectfully, F. H. MITCHELL, M.D., C.M.

In these assertions you are not correct. I was associated with other business men of the city for years endeavoring to promote the London Junction road. We were met as every point by the powerful opposition and influence of the Grand Trunk, opposing legislation and otherwise. At the time of the lease, I, with other business men, opposed it to the best of my ability, taking the view that I now hold, that it was in the interests of the Great Western to discovery progress of the Great Western to discovery countries of the Great Western to discovery and the state of To the Editor of the Free Press, City: the view that I now hold, that it was in the interests of the Great Western to discourage carriage of merchandise by water, Wholesale merchants and manufacturers held the view that if the Great Western got control of our local road is meant the closing of the Port Stanley harbor, giving them control of our carrying trade. This is what it was judged to mean, and is what it did mean. As a proof of its meaning I refer you to the closed harbor for nearly the whole period of its lease. It was judged not to be practicable to attempt to force and develop carriage of merchandise by the port, which was in direct hostility to the Great Western. The best legal minds held the same view. Wholesale merchants and manufacturers who support two-thirds of our entire population now hold the same views, believing that should the control of the road pass to the Grand Trunk, the port might as well be on the Pacific coast as at Port Stanley. interests of the Great Western to

While the Government is enlarging our canals for the protection of carriage on our inland waters, it is surprising to find eleading journal in a large inland city advocating the shutting us off from the advantages of navigation. You are given credit for too much intelligence not to understand this, not to understand that the Grand Trunk is in direct opposition to water carriage, and instead of encouraging competition, would in every respect discourage it, and doubtless end in reclosing the Port Stanley harbor.

The police have a mystery to unrayel in the person of Frank Bruce, arreated at 2 o'clock a.m. yesterday by G. T. R. Detective Logan, and charged with stealing baggage checks from the company. Mr. Logan has been looking for Bruce for some time—at least, he has wanted to find a man called Ed Rankin since last Friday, when a person by that name reported to the G. T. R. station agent at Bothwell that he had found an obstruction on the track and had removed it. He stated that it consisted of three reliroad ties, and that they had been placed on the track a mile and a quarter east of Thameaville. The agent notified the authorities at London, and Mr. Logan was set to work on the case. Kankin said that he would come up to London on Friday afternoon and tell what he knew about it. He did not show up, and on Saturday Mr. Logan went after him. Since then he has found that Frank Bruce, Ed. Rankin and Frank N. Watson are one and the same person, and that he has been carrying on a game of duplicity that might have landed him behind prison bars on the more serious crime of bigamy.

When Rankin reported that he had found and removed an obstruction near Thamesville, trackmen were immediately sent out, but could not find any trace of it, although they examined the place carefully. This, coupled with the fact that he had some suspicion, and Mr. Logan went after Rankin. At Thamesville he found that Rankin had shipped his baggage to Paris, and Mr. Logan continued his scarch around the locality in which he had first cropped up. He went to Chatham first cropped up.

Here he found that no person such as described was known as Rankin in that locality, but that the description tallied exactly with that of Frank Bruce, who had been living in Dover Center for six or eight weeks and had made such a good impression on the inhabitants that he became engaged to marry a young woman in that place and the wedding was to occur in May. search around the locality in which he had

At the Police Court yesterday Bruce wept like a child and protested his innocence, stating that he carried a Bible in his pocket. He was remanded until Friday. The couple of checks found on the man are numbered 10597.


