Detroit, April 27.—Scenes are being patriotism. Cincinnait, O., April 27.—Advices from points throughout the state show that companies of the Ohio National Guard are leaving their homes to unite at regimental headquarters, preparatory to going to Columbus. Everywhere the most intense feeling is manifested. Chicago, April 27.—Over 4,000 fighting men marched out of Chicago last evening, bound for the war. Since the early days of 1861 no such scenes were witnessed in this city as transpired in the regimental armories, in the streets through which the columns marched, and around the trains which bore them to the camping ground at Springfield. The regiments which went to the front were the First, Second and Seventh Infantry, and the First Cavalry. Buffalo, April 27.-The local regiments of the National Guard, the Sixty-fifth and Seventy-fourth, were summoned to their armories tonight, and each man asked if he were willing to volunteer for service under the president's call for 125,000 men. The neutral flag covers enemy's goods with the exflag covers enemy's goods with the exception of contraband of war. 2. Neutral goods not contraband of war are not liable to confiscation under the enemy's flag. 3. Blockades, in order to be binding, must be effective. 4. Spanish merchant vessels in any ports or places within the United States shall be allowed until May 21, 1898, inclusive, for loading their cargoes and departing from such ports or places, and such Spanish merchant vessels, if met at searby any United States ship, shall be permitted to continue their voyage, if, on examination of their papers, it shall appear that their cargoes were taken on board before the expiration of the above term, provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to Spanish vessels having on board any officers in the military or naval service of the enemy, or any coal (except such as may be necessary for their voyage), or any other article prohibited or contraband of war, or the insurgents in the invasion of East-Government. 5. Any Spanish merchant vessel, which, prior to April 21, 1898, shall have sailed from any foreign port or place in the United States shall be permitted to enter such port or place, and to discharge her cargo and afterward forthwith to depart without molestation; and any such vessel, if met at sea by any United States ship, shall be permitted to continue her voyage to any port not blockaded. 6. HOW MERCHANTMEN ARE OVER-

HAULED. A regular line of sentinels is maintained day and night by the fleet. The gunboats are the regular sentinels, but the torpedo boats help. The sentinels steam back and forth in a line anywhere from four to eight miles out from the New York and Iowa. The sailor who is perched continually in the crow's nest at the topmast can see a vessel fifteen miles or so further out, and if it is a Spanish warship the fact can be transmitted to the flagship an hour or so before the enemy comes near enough to give battle. If the strange sail is a merchant vessel, and is heading towards Cuba, or is suspected of coming from a Cuban port, either a gunboat or a torpedo chases her. If she is flying a Spanish flag she is seized and sent as a prize to Key West. If the ship is of another nation, she is given formal notice that Cuban ports are blockaded and that she must keep away.

In 1877, the surgical department of the Wabash treated 959 men in the three hospitals named, and 21,744 persons outside of the hospitals, most of them at their homes. The surgical cases aggregated 2,290 and the medical cases 20,413, while the pre-scriptions filled out to Wabash employes, not in hospitals, amounted to 36,833. Three companies have already been ncorporated in Canada. They have all been controlled by foreign capitalists, and only one of the three is at present operating its property. This organizaion, known as the Canadian Copper Company, has its mines at Sudbury. There the nickel ore is found in plenty. First it is roasted to take the sulphur out of it. Then it is smelted to remove stone and other foreign matter, and the product, known as matte, is broken up and shipped in barrels to New Jersey, where the refining proess is undertaken, and a valuable article of commerce is made ready for

The Province of Ontario and the French penal island of New Caledonia are believed to contain the only known deposits of nickel in the world, hence this Province has a very valuable asset in its mines at Sudbury. 





## Ontario's Great Mineral Wealth

Great Activity in Mining Enterprises the Past Year.

Vast Wealth That Is Waiting for Development

The Gold Output-Iron, Salt, Petroleum Galore. According to the report of the Bureau of Mines for Ontario, the first part of which has just been issued, the mining

Large Increase in Copper and Nickel-

activity of the province in the past year has been most gratifying. The total number of locations sold and leased in the year was 1,255, embracing an area of 115,809 acres, whereas for the five years 1892-96, the number sold and leased was 1,016, with an area of 93,821 acres. The revenue derived by the crown last year from sales and rentals was \$144,299, whereas for the preceding five years it was only \$131,518. Adding the rentals of lands previously leased, the aggregate revenue of the five years was \$146,959, while for 1897 it was \$150,540, or, if the revenue from mining licenses be included, the aggregate for 1897 was \$153,-561. Equally significant was the activity shown in the incorporation of mining companies. In 1897 the number

with a capital stock of \$101,531,000, while

during the previous 29 years only 146

companies had been incorporated, with capital amounting in the total to \$62,-ROOM FOR DEVELOPMENT. "There is room," the report goes on, for large development in the mineral industries of the province. Not only does the varied list include all of the principal and more commonly found metals, such as iron, copper, lead, silver and gold, but it also embraces the comparatively rare metal nickel, the deposits of which in the Sudbury district constitute one of the two sources of the world's supply. In the smelt-ing of iron ore a fair beginning has been made, but the capabilities of expansion in this line has as yet been scarcely more than touched. The magnetite deposits of Eastern Ontario and the hematite and magnetite of Northwestern Ontario, taken together, are away on Sunday. more than sufficient to supply our own needs in the way of iron for perhaps centuries to come.

TWO IMPORTANT INDUSTRIES. "Among the non-metallic substances we posses the basis of two permanent and important industries in our salt beds and petroleum wells. The whole shore of Lake Huron, from the latitude of Kincardine southward, and for many niles inland, is underlaid with beds of salt hundreds of feet thick, supplying the raw material not only for refined salt itself, but for carbonate and bicarbonate of soda, soda ash, bleaching powder, and other essentials for the textile and other industries. The petroleum industry leads all others of a mineral nature in the value of yearly output, and affords an admirable example of what enterprise and skill can do in the profitable utilization of raw material Another instance of this is seen in the cement business, which has undergone satisfactory development during the past few years. "In the products of clay-brick, tile,

terra cotta and sewer pipe-the output is limited only by the market. A new branch of the business has recently been established in the manufacture of paving brick. The use of this article for street purposes seems bound to be very extensive now that Canadian makers have shown that the product of the kilns is comparable in quality with brick from the yards of Ohio and Illinois, besides being lower in price. Natural gas is a substance which in point of value stands high in the list of Ontario's mineral products, although it is to be regretted that so much of It is taken out of the country for consumption. In almost every one of the minerals here mentioned the opportunities for the profitable investment of capital are numerous, and the vivifying touch of enterprise and capital is one wanted to call many other indus-

The prices of both nickel and copper have fallen almost steadily from 1892 to 1897, and these prices bear a close relationship to those of the refined metals. Water Commissioners Pass Their Estimates for the Year.

Largest Receipts Ever Known Expected -London West Mains to Cost \$18,000.

Chairman Jones, Commissioner Little, Secretary Ellwood, and Superintendent Moore attended the water commissioners' meeting last evening.

The estimates for the year were submitted and agreed upon. The gross receipts will be the highest on record, namely \$80,140. The expense account is about \$2,000 more than last year. The estimated suplus is only a couple of hundred dollars less than last year, but the commissioners propose to pay \$1,-831 20 out of the revenue upon capital account for some of the recently purchased land. The statement adopted was as follows:

An Ex-Londoner Writes Interestingly From Tampa-A Feeling Against

Mr. Richard Gray, metal polisher, a well-known ex-Londoner, in writing to a friend in this city, gives the following account of his arrival and stay at Tampa, Fla., where the United States troops are now concentrating: "I arrived just as the soldiers took possession of the town, and the results were disastrous to the business I was about to engage in. The Twenty-first, Thirteenth, Nineteenth and several other regiments are in camp here, and others are coming daily. As a write a trainload is pulling into town. They are greeted by loud and prolonged cheering, coupled with such expressions as 'Take care of Old Glory!' 'Long live the Yankees.' The dispatch telling of the capture of a Spanish boat caused great excitement here. The Twenty-first, from Plattsburg, N. Y., informed us that their trip south was one continuous ovation, the people of the different towns turning out en masse to cheer them on. They are a fine body of men, and many of them arrived gaily decorated with flowers presented by the enthusiastic southern ladies. Their only complaint is of the terrible heat. It is sweitering, and there has been no rain for the past seven weeks." In conclusion Mr. Gray says: "There is a strong sentiment among the merchants against war, as the result, even if victorious (which none question), will lead to embarrassment and failure."
