Tuesday, Sept. 15. The market today was much larger han was expected. Trade was inclined to be slow, yet prices were as a rule There was a large quantity of fruit and vegetables offered and oats were also in evidence.

Grain-The supply of oats was large and the demand firm at \$1 15 to \$1 20 per cwt for new oats. Wheat is steady at 80c per bushel.

Hay and Straw-Sixteen loads of hay were on the stand today. This is smaller number than the normal demand, yet sales were slow at \$10 to \$11 per Straw sold at \$6 and \$6 50 per ton. Butter and Eggs-Butter sold well today, as the quantity offered was small. Prices were steady at 22c to 23c for crocks, and 23c to 24c for pound rolls. The grocers and dealers could not obtain a sufficient supply of eggs, as the supply was exceedingly light at 20c to per dozen in wholesale lots. Vegetables and Roots-Potatoes sold well and prices were higher at 80c to 0c per bag. Cabbages were plentiful and slow at 40c per dozen. Tomatoes were in large supply ata 6 baskets for or 20c per basket. Green tomatoes sold at 30c per bushel. Cucumbers 8c to 10c per dozen for larger or 15c to 20c 100 for picklers. Onions were in fair demand at 75c per bushel for large ones, while the small pickling onions brought &c to 10c per quart. Califlower were more in evidence today

than for some time back Prices were steady ata \$1 to \$2 per dozen. Fruits-Peaches were plentiful and prices varied according to quality. Of course the Crawford is the best variety to sell, for which the dealers asked 85c per 11-quart basket. Smaller stock sold at 60c per basket. Musk. melons sold well at 40c to \$1 25 per lozen. Grapes in fair demand at 25c to 20c per basket. Plums, 50c per basket. Very few were offered. Peaches were in good demand at 75c per bushel for choice ones. Citrons, 10c each.

Poultry-A small supply and the demand fairly brisk. Old fowl sold at 7c to 8c per pound alive, or 9c dressed. Chickens, 8c to 9c per pound alive or 11 dressed


