

Not having had the pleasure of reading this book as yet, I cannot, even if I so desired, offer any criticism on the work itself; but with eference to the statement that by Cranner's recantation of his recantation he rose from a dismal depth to a height of esteem from which he can never be removed, it may interest some of your readers to compare what that great historian Lord Macaulay has to say on this particular point:

"But his martyrdom, it is said, redeemed everything. It is extraordinary that so much ignorance should exist on this subject. The fact is that if a martyr be a man who chooses to die rather than renounce his opinions, Cranmer was no more a martyr than Dr. Dodo.. He died

### IMMIGRATION INTO CANADA.

While much of the contents of the annual report of the department of the interior for the year ended March 31, 1908, has been anticipated in the European branch of the Ananias issued, considerable information that 1s new and valuable is furnished in the volume just issued.

During the twelve months there were admitted into the Dominion to reside here, 262,469 immigrants, of whom 120,182 came from the British Isles, 58,312 from the United States, 3,378 from Newfoundland, and 604 from other British colonies, making German Social-Democrats in a peace a total of 182,476 English-speaking people who came to settle in Canada, as against 79,993 foreigners.

Britishers are turning to the Dominion rather than the United States as in the last century. While the emigrants from the United Kingdom to Canada numbered 120,182, the United States' share was only 93,380. Of the British immigrants who came to this country, 90,380 were English, 22,223 Scotch, 6,547 Irish, and 1,032 Welsh.

Of the Europeans other than British who settled in Canada Austrians came first, with a total of 24,374, Italians 11,212, Russians 6,281, Hebrews 7,712, French 2,671, Germans 2,363, Bulgarians 2,529, Swedes 2,132, Norwegians 1,554, Finns 1,212, Belgians 1,214, Greeks 1,043, Poles 1,598. The Asiatic immigration to Canada in. cluded 7,601 Japanese, 1,884 Chinese, days ago? 563 Armenians, 732 Syrians, 52 Arabians and 2,623 Hindoos, or a total of A MATCH-ONE OF SWINBURNE'S 13,455. The arrivals at Canadian ports during the year for both Canada and the United States numbered 283,592. and of these 1,172, or one out of 242 were denied admission. 





## SENATE TINKERS WITH PAYNE BILL

Makes Further Reductions Where the General Public Is Affected.

#### INCREASES ON LUXURIES

New United States Tariff Measure Under Consideration by the American Upper House.

Washington, April 12.-The senate committee on finance met at 10 o'clock this morning when Chairman Aldrich presented the bill as amended by the

majority of the committee. Many of the revenue producing features will be reported subsequently, as they are intertwined around the adminstrative features of the measure which will be adopted later.

Senator Aldrich, who was requested to make a brief summary of the general character of the changes proposed by the senate finance committee to the House tariff bill, furnished the following statement.

In the main reductions are lower than those in the bill as it passed the House, the actual number of reductions being about three times the number of increases. Such increases as have been made have been largely rendered necessary to preserve the symmetery of schedules

A considerable nuumber of articles in common use have been taken off the dutiable list of the house bill and restored to the free list. The great mass of the rates are be-

low those of the existing law. schedule A (the chemical schedule) the principal changes are in the nature of reductions below the House bill. One is putting distilled oils upon the free

In schedule B (earths and earthenware), the rates remain largely the same. In the House bill, by a change in phraseology from existing law, the duties on common earthenware in two colors are raised from 25 to 60 per

In glass and glassware the rates remain the same as in the House bill. The senate committee restored iron ore to the dutiable list at 25 cents per ton-a reduction of 15 cents a ton from the Dingley rate. The House made large reductions in the schedule throughout, nearly all these reductions having been retained by the senate committee. In addition to those made by the House, the senate committee have made quite a large number of other reductions.

The senate committee has retained the House rate on lead ore 111/2 cents, but has raised the rates on lead products throughout the bill to correspond

with the duty on lead ore. Schedule D (wood and manufactures duty \$1 a thousand on rough lumber, a cover a class of fancy goods and novelreduction of a dollar from the Dingley law, and has retained the House rates on manufactures of woods, nearly all showing reductions from the Dingley

The only important changes in the schedule made by the senate committee was the restoration of imported hardwoods to the free list. The senate committee left the sugar schedule as it came from the House, but reduced the House rate on sugared biscuits and wafers from 50 to 20 per

The tobacco schedule remains un changed. The agricultural schedule, including

meat products, remain practically unchanged from existing law, but where reductions were made by the House, the Senate has restored the Dingley rates in response to rcommends of the farmers throughout the country and the great agricultural interests.






