WITHOUT THE LIQUOR CARTER'S

Whitney Says the Temperance People Responsible for Poor Hotel Accommodation.

Toronto, Feb. 14.-Inadequate fire escapes in rural hotels and the quality of the accommodation in general were the subjects brought to the notice of Sir James Whitney by a deputation of the Commercial Travellers' Association which waited on him on Saturday af-ternoon. Hon. J. J. Foy, Hon. W. J Hanna and Hon. Frank Cochrane were also present at the interview.

G. Cane, who was chairman of the fire-escape contest at the Toronto fair last September, complained that conditions in rural hotels had not been much improved since that time. In some of them ropes were provided, but he didn't think much of ropes. What was needed was a good automatic escape, such as one of those which re-ceived prizes at the contest. In some hotels no provision was made.

Sir James Whitney: "If there is no ire escape, that is against the law." Hon. W. J. Hanna: "We have prosecuted every case that has come before the department."

Mr. Cane thought some of escapes were only excuses.

New Zealand will furnish a Dreadnought, but not unconditionally by any means. The New Zealand Government, whose conduct has been so extolled by Canadians eager to place their own Government in a false light, has driven a keen bargain. The Dreadnought is not to take its place in the North Sea, but it is to be the flagship of the China unit. In return for permitting the Dreadnought to be stationed at a distance, the New Zealand Government demands that two British cruisers, three destroyers and two submarines shall be kept in New Zealand waters in time of peace, and that the flagship shall visit New Zealand at least orce a year. New Zealand pays only for the building of the Dreadnought, not for its annual maintenance. She demands also that seven other ships be stationed off her coasts at the expense of the British Government, and manned as far as possible by New Zealand officers and crews. New Zealand will contribute only \$500,000 yearly toward the navy, and this sum is to be spent, not to relieve the British taxpayers, but to raise the wages of the nicers and men above the British level, which is considered too low.

FRENCH EXPLORER SEES THE SOUTH POLE LAND

Charcot Expedition Reaches New Land in the Antarctic.

Valparaiso, Chili, Feb. 13. - The French antarctic expedition under Dr Joan M. Charcot reached latitude 70 degrees south, longitude 126 degrees west, and discovered 120 miles of new land to the west and south of Alexander Island.

Alexander Island, or as it sometimes is called, Alexander Land, is a small island in the South Atlantic Ocean about latitude 69 degrees south, longitude 75 degrees west, and is considered to be a part of the so-called antarctic continent. It was discovered by Bellingshausen in 1821.

During the first antarctic summer, 1908-9, the expedition was able to complete the French map as far as Adelaide Island, off the north entrance to the Strait of Magellan and the westernmost of the group of Queen Adlaide Islands, and a stretch of new ler Island. The region was explored ock. It afforded no shelter to the exolorers who wintered at Petermann Island.






