Goderich, Oct 16.-Bishop Fallon replied fully today to the attacks which have been directed against him in the recent controversy, and read the following statement, which covers the ground very fully.

"On Sept. 22 last, because of certain articles in the daily press representing me as hostile to the French language and interests of the French-Canadian people.







#### 25,000 Pass Resolution Condemning the Mayor of Rome's Speech.

His grace read parts of Mayor Nathan's speech, which were greeted with cries of "a bas le Juf" (down with the Jew) from all sides of the huge crowd. His grace said the meeting represented the adhesion of a million and a half Catholics to the vicar of Christ and the Vatican.

ed amidst loud cheers:

"To his Eminence Cardinal Merry much time in the water as he does, you'd De Val, Rome: Catholic population of Montreal, at immense public meeting comprsng all classes of society, vigorously protest against the brutal speech of the mayor of Rome, His outrages upon His infallible arouse deep indignation. Sentiments of unlimited devotion and ever-increasing gatitude to the Papacy, umanity's benefactor, long and loudy acclaimed." This was immediately cabled to Rome.







CYCLONE SWEEPS ISLAND OF CUBA

Great Loss of Lite Reported in Big Storm of Yesterday.

THE SHIPPING DAMAGED

Reports Say Disturbance Is Worse Than Big Storm of 1906-Places All Along Coast Were Affected.

Havana, Oct. 17 .- The cyclone that struck the island yesterday is increasing. Its velocity is appalling. Beyond doubt it is far more serious than the hurricane of 1906, which cost many lives and damage to the amount of

millions of dollars. The customs warehouses are flooded and the roof of the main building has been blown away. The national observatory reports that the disturbance is beginning, and will last probably for 24 hours.

Wire communication with the interior is cut off, and the situation outside this city is in doubt. The town of Batabano in this provnce, is said to be many feet under water. A large number of lives have been lost there, according to reports. A report from Regla, across the harbor, says that many persons have

been killed there. It is rumored that a great number of sailors and longshoremen have been drowned in the harbor. Heavy at Pinar de Rio.

It is probable that the most fatalities and the greatest monetary damage has occurred in Pinar de Rio, where the destruction of Thursday and Friday has been added to greatly since last night, it is believed. The sugar crop is thought to have suffered severely from the shifting course of the wind, which had the effect of twisting the stalks.

The gale came today from the southsouthwest with a violence not experienced before in a long time. Rain ell in torrents throughout the night, but let up somewhat at daybreak, although the wind held as strong as All traffic in this city and in the

harbor was suspended today. Scores of lighters and other small crafts had been swamped or wrecked against the bulk heads. The sea before noon had swept the

custom houses for a distance of a half a mile, and carried off merchandise valued at many hundred thousands of dollars. It is impossible to observe definitely what was occurring in the harbor, ow-

ing to the high waves and flying spume, which obscures the view like a fog. It is certain, however, that a number of sailing craft are dragging their anchors, and are in imminent danger of being blown out to sea. Keywest, Oct. 17 .- A gale of 45 miles an hour, accompanied by falling bar-

ometer and high tides, this morning indicated that the West Indian hurricane, which yesterday was loitering about the Gulf of Mexico, has taken a sudden turn, and is movink back in a northeasterly direction. High tides are reported all along the eastern gulf

Three of the wounded are gendarmes. The fighting followed an attempt to prevent attempted frauds in the voting for municipal officers. Much excitement prevails throughout the island.


