WILL INVESTIGATE SINKING OF MAINE. Cofferdam Will Be Used to Raise Warship. Beverly, Mass., Oct. 16.—President Taft intends to settle for all time if possible the question as to the cause of the destruction of the battleship Maine in Havana harbor twelve years ago. This is to be accomplished by the raising of the Maine by the cofferdam method. The plan as adopted by the board of army engineers appointed to consider the removal of the wreck was submitted to the President today by Major-Gen. William H. Bixby, chief of engineers, and was endorsed by Mr. Taft. Gen. Bixby expects to have the wreck uncovered and free for inspection by Feb. 15 next, the thirtieth anniversary of the destruction of the vessel. The impartial spirit in which the work of determining the character of the explosion is to be undertaken as indicated by the fact that Spain has been asked, at the direction of the President, to have a representative present during the entire progress of the work. The same courtesy has been extended to Cuba, and it is practically certain that both governments will accept. President Taft considers the settlement of the question of the explosion as of supreme importance in the raising of the Maine and has directed that everything else be subordinated to it. Not Afraid To Face The Truth. The President obviously intends that this Government shall once and for all free itself of the charge that it has feared to have the Maine raised because of the possible adverse effect upon the findings of the old court of inquiry. This court, appointed soon after the destruction of the battleship, gave it as their opinion, after examining the wreck, with the aid of divers, that it had gone down as the result of an internal explosion. Spain also had the wreck examined, and its representative declared emphatically that the Maine had met its end through an internal explosion. Since then Spaniards and some Cubans have not hesitated to charge that the inaction of the United States in regard to the wreck was due to a fear of the results. Even among some United States army and navy men there has been a disposition unofficially to question the accuracy of the findings of the old court of inquiry, which based its decision of external explosion chiefly on the fact that one of the keel plates was driven through the upper deck. Gen. Bixby conferred with Mr. Taft for about an hour this afternoon and then gave out this statement: "The plan of the board provides for the using of a cofferdam of interlocking steel pilings within which the wreck is first to be exposed by unwatering and afterward to be removed by bulkheading and floating the undamaged portion and by hoisting the damaged portions piecemeal; all

TECHNICAL SCHOOL A GOOD THING FOR LONDON
So Said Judge Meredith to Board of Governors of Western University.
At a meeting of the board of governors of the Western University held on Saturday afternoon, Mr. Justice Meredith, Mr. T. H. Purdon, K. V., Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, K. C., and Capt. T. J. Murphy were named a committee to appear before the royal commission on technical education and give testimony.
"It would be a good thing for London if a technical school were located in this city," said Judge Meredith. "I think it should be placed under the control of the Western University."
Prof. James and some of the members of the board did not think the school would be placed under any authority, but would be independent of both of the boards of governors and the board of education.
However, Mr. Justice Meredith thought the board should be represented at the giving of testimony, and the above-named committee was appointed.
Owing to the small attendance the matter was postponed to be taken up here laid over until Wednesday afternoon next. Those present were Justice Meredith, Samuel Stevely, J. O. Drummond, Capt. T. J. Murphy, John H. Chapman, and Principal James.

A PEN PICTURE OF BISHOP FALLON
A Striking Story of Bishop of London's Character as a Man.

[Toronto Star.]
"Boys, when you go after a man, tackle him hard. Don't let him get up feeling as fresh as when he went down. But, mind you, when he is down, no punching or any other underhand or mean tricks."
That's the advice "Captain" Fallon (as he was then called) gave to his fellow-players. There was a time when Ottawa College Rugby team was known as a "band of wild Irishmen." "Captain" Fallon took charge of the team then and the players continued to be called the same name. He didn't like it by any means, so when he took his team to play a game in Toronto he called to see the sporting editor who first gave them that name, and who still continued to use it.
"Look at me," he said to the newspaperman. "Do I look like a wild Irishman? Now, I want you to come out and see my team play, and if you do not change your opinion my name is not Fallon."
He was right. The paper on the following day paid a tribute to the collegian, and the name "Wild Irishmen" was buried forever.
A Model of Physique.
They say Bishop Fallon, of St. Louis, is the finest-looking prelate in the United States. There is no need to compare him with Bishop Fallon, but at the same time everyone admits Bishop Fallon is the finest-looking prelate in Canada. He is a couple of inches over six feet tall and has a face that might serve as a model for a piece of Greek statuary. If it wasn't Irish, True, there is not a hair on the top of his head, nor for several inches down each side, but while that might act as a detriment to some people, it doesn't do Bishop Fallon any harm. He is to look at him, and one instinctively thinks of a Rugby player, so massive are his shoulders. He's a big man in every way you take him, physically or mentally.
His voice is like the rumbling of a train. That's when he is speaking naturally. Let him get warmed up to his subject, and he is like the crash of thunder. It fairly runs away from him, and one realizes that he is not shouting, but something altogether different, as if there came a whole lot inside that needed to come out in a hurry, and the speediest way seems to be by the voice and throat.

Powerful and all as that voice is, it doesn't serve him enough, and then his energy finds vent in the use of gestures. He makes them all the time after he becomes warmed up to his subject. Get him started on the school question, and he can't keep his arms quiet.
