NITTI DECLARES THAT ITALY NOT IN FAVOR RUSS INTERVENTION

Italian Premier Says His Government Does Not Want to Meddle in Russian Affairs.

FIUME QUESTION REVIVED

Socialist Makes Heated Reply to Speech of Italy's Premier.

Rome, Dec. 12.—Premier Nitti de-clared in the Chamber of Deputies to-day that the Italian Government does not favor the intervention in the in-ternal affairs of Russia. The premier's remarks were brought forth by a not-able address made by Capt. Guilletti, secretary of the Seamen's Federation, and a Socialist, who was favorable to the war.

Capt. Guilletti, who was favorable to with other officials for the diversion to Fiume of the steamer Persia, which was ostensibly destined to China, discussed the Incident today. It was believed at the time of the Persia incident that the arms on board the ship were to be used against the Russian Bolsheviki. After Capt. Guilletti's speech. Signor Nitti said: 'I wish the name of Fiume would not be mixed up in the political discussion. Fiume represents an ideal sacred to all of us, regardless of party. In my opinion we must not intervene in the internal affairs of Russia. In regard to the Persia, I can guarantee the war materials on board were destined to China and that she would have returned to Italy from Vladivstok with needed supplies. You Socialists have one opinion about Russia and we have another, but I wish it understood we do not intend to mix in Russia's internal politics."



REPORTED IN SINKING CONDITION OFF COAST OF NEWFOUNDLAND

Position Given Is Approximately 430 Miles Off Newfoundland Coast-Radio Message to Boston Says That It Will Be Impossible To Save Vessel.

New York, Dec. 13.—The British steamer Messina today sent out an S. O. S. call which was picked up here. The steamship, Maple Leaf answered, saying she was making three knots an hou and would reach her in 24 hours. The Messina gave her position as latitude 47.22 north and longitude 42.30 west.

This position is approximately 430 miles off the Newfoundland coast. The Messina is a 4,278-ton steamer, and left St. John, N. B. on December 5 for Antwerp. She is owned by the General Line. Limited.

CANADA'S FIRE LOSSES **DOUBLED IN NOVEMBER**

Total Fire Destruction in the Past Month. Was \$2,339,870.

Toronto, Dec. 13 .- The Monetary Times' estimate of Canada's fire losses for November, 1919, is \$2,339,870, com-pared with \$1,023,288 in October, and \$1.059,580 in November a year ago. \$1,059,580 in November a year ago.
A considerable increase is shown in the losses. Two large fires, both in the Province of Quebec, were chiefly responsible for this increase. The Brown lumber mills at Trois Pistoles, with a loss of \$800,000, and the Laval University at Montreal, with a loss of \$350,000, added \$1,150,000 to the total. As can be expected at this time of the year, a great number of fires orig-inate from heating apparatus. Of the causes reported to the Monetary Times for November, which are fairly repre-sentative of the whole total, about 45 per cent started in this way, and there







Municipal Elections

THE MAYORALTY RACE

Notwithstanding the fact that the people of London will not have to vote at the New Year's Day elections on the purchase of the London Street Railway, it is probable that that vexed question will continue more or less to the fore during the coming year.

Whether the people would want to buy the railway is, of course, open to question, but no harm could have resulted if the people had been given the opportunity to express their views; particularly since the cost of such a referendum would have been practically nothing at the regular election.

Ald. E. S. Little, who is in the race for the mayoralty, was one of those who believed that the people could have been trusted to state what they wanted. Personally, he is favorable to public ownership of the street railway if the system can be secured at a price which the people would be justified in paying, and which they would be willing to pay. But the choice, he declares, is one for the people themselves to make, and any council must understand that it is its duty to carry out the directions of the electors.

Recently City Clerk Baker pointed out that a vote on municipal ownership of the system cannot be taken until the regular elections of 1921. But Ald. Little has called attention to the fact that a vote can be taken at any time, if it is deemed expedient, on a proposal to have the system taken over by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission as part of the provincial radial system. Such was the course followed recently in Windsor and the Border Cities, where the people voted for purchase at a special election.

Ald. Little is an adherent to the sane principle that it is safe to trust the people on decisions of importance, and for that reason he advocates referendums when great issues are to be decided.

Sir Adam Beck, in fighting for the purchase of the Windsor railway system, told the people of that city that much could be done under public ownership to improve the service. Mr. Little feels that the same can be said of London, and, if the people should at any time direct the council to take the railway over, he has plans which would doubtless prove of the utmost importance to the betterment of service.

Railways in great cities throughout Canada and the United States today are adopting the so-called safety cars as a means of speeding up service, increasing frequency and keeping down fares. Seattle, Washington, a city of 400,000 population, has used safety cars for some years, and at present is giving the extraordinary service of a car every thirty-seven seconds on the Summit avenue line. There, Mr. Little learns, the use of such high efficiency equipment has increased travel one-half and reduced operating costs onethird. His investigations also reveal that in Houston, Texas, a city of 115,000, service to the downtown district has been increased from 30 to 50 per cent on various lines, and a still greater increase in traffic has accompanied the change.

Sir Adam Beck, in telling the people of Windsor of the plans of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission to improve service there, said, as reported in the Border Cities Star, "The one-man safety car is his choice. This car is the most modern in design and equipment. One man operates it. It cannot be started until the doors are closed. Similarly, should anything happen to the driver the car stops automatically the moment his hand is off the lever. The fact that the cars are one-man operated does not mean that fewer men will be engaged. The increase in the number of cars operated would more than take care of the number of employees."

Mr. Little's information is that the cars make much better time because they start and stop quickly. They are equipped with "door-engines," which open and close doors by compressed air. Automatic life guards make it almost impossible

for anyone to fall under the wheels. Such matters, of course, would require exhaustive investigation, but in the meanwhile Mr. Little has his hand on the pulse of the situation, and if the need arises he is able to point the way to the best solution of London's transportation problems. For that reason, if for no other, London needs

The striking feature of Mr. Little's advanced mayoralty platform is the fact that he not only recognizes the city's needs, but in every instance he has a clear-headed, constructive, practical policy.

R. would gladly bring its passenger train accommodation down town. Then if the London and Port Stanley Railway and trains of the projected system of hydro radials could be provided for—and there is no obstacle—leader would have a union depot. Thus he would construct pavements and other necessary improvements where the people designate, but, if it is expedient, he would hold back other enterprises as a reserve. These would not be undertaken while plenty of employment was available for all citizens, but in the event of hard times he would launch on such construction without delay, thereby providing an effective

safeguard against unemployment and attendant hardships

The garbage department has been the subject of many controversies, but it remains for Ald. Little to cleave to the heart of the Issue. He has consulted the Bureau of Conservation at Ottawa, with a view to ascertaining what science is able to accomplish in the reclamation of such waste as is carried daily to the incinerator at the foot of Waterloo street. Mr. Little points to the fact that at the present time the garbage is put to use in the generation of steam with which to heat Victoria Hospital, thus effecting a saving in coal bills. But he will also ascertain if London's quantities are now sufficient to make profitable the sorting of the garbage for metals, rags, paper and its treatment for the extraction of greases, solder, etc. Certain other cities secure revenue from such processes, and Mr. Little can be depended upon to pursue a course with respect to this Mr. Little can be depended upon to pursue a course with respect to this department that will be in the best interests of the taxpayers.



TEACHERS WILL GET 25 PER CENT MORE IN BRANTFORD SCHOOLS

Board Also Wants Medical Inspection Under Health Officials.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

BRANTFORD. Dec. 12.—At a meeting here this afternoon of the board of education a new salary schedule for all civic teachers for 1929 was unanimously adopted, providing for an all round increase of 25 per cent. The increase will require an appropriation of \$27,000 for next year.

The schedule adopted was as follows: Public school principals, salary \$1,500, maximum \$2,200, increase of 5 per cent per year to the maximum; male assistant minimum \$1,200, maximum \$1,200, annual increase \$75; female assistant. minimum \$1,200, maximum \$1,250, increase yearly \$75. Kindergarten and domestic science teachers, and nurses shall be entitled to the same salary as female assistants.

The salaries of collegiate institute teachers were ralsed to \$2,200 minimum, \$2,500 maximum; assistant male teachers, \$1,250 to \$1,800. Principal Overholt received an increase to \$3,400, and the salary of Inspector Kilmer was fixed at \$2,900.

The board also approved a petition to the Ontario Legislature for achange in the health act, whereby the Kilmer was fixed at \$2,900.

The board also approved a petition to the Ontario Legislature for a change in the health act, whereby the board of health will take over medical inspection in the schools in cities of less than 200,000 population. The inspection has been temporarily placed in the hands of M. O. H. Hutton, pending the action of the Legislature.







BRITISH LABOR AND RUSSIA. The attitude of British labor towards the Russian situation is probably influenced much less by any sympathy with the Bolshevik rule than by the suspicion that Admiral Kolchak, hitherto backed by the moral and material support of the Entente, is nothing but a survival of the worst features of the ozar's regime Kerensky, now an exile in England since his overthrow by the Bolsheviks, says that around Kolchak, Denikin and Yudenitch "are gathered all the scoundrels of the old regime," and that "there is no crime that has not been perpetrated by the agents of Kolchak against the population." This same viewpoint is seen in the petition that recently came from the Czecho-Slovak forces operating with the Omsk Government in Siberfa. "The unbearable conditions," says their memorandum, "cause us to ask the Allies to consider a means of safe conduct to the motherland. . . By guarding and maintaining order, our army has been forced against its convictions to support a state of absolute despotism and lewiessness which has had its beginning here under defence of the Czech arms. The military authorities of the Government of Omsk are permitting criminal actions that will stagger the entire world."

We do not suppose that the sensibilities of the Czecha are particularly fine with regard to the arbitrary exercise of military authority, so that this outburst of disgust with the Kolchak methods would seem to indicate some superiority on the part of Kolchak over his rivals in the way of cruelty and oppression. No one has ever denied that he represents the old regime with all its abuses, and to expect a liberal form of government from a man whose whole antecedents and previous training have been in the line of absolute autocracy is rather more than British trades unionists can swallow. There have been a good many indications of late that the British Government would like to be out of the whole mess. Lloyd George said of Russia recently, "In whichever way we go we are marching into a fog," and he has intimated plainly that when the present credit extended to the Omsk Government is expended there will be no more provided. The sequel will, of Kolchak, who has been kept going only by the contributions of the Allies. Great Britain's expenditure since the close of the war being two hundred millions alone. British labor seems justified, as far as results are concerned at least, in holding to the view that the expendiwould have brought better results.

THE GOOD OLD DAYS.

G. K. Chesterton is out again praising the good old middle ages. Attacking some recent journalist who says that medieval men were full of the fear of death, he urges that the prevalence of fighting in those days is proof that for it, and not, as is the case today, where it so they did not fear death. Perhaps he thinks that the fighting; was also a good thing in it expense. self and a proof of what he describes as the "cheerful world" of Chancer's time.

When medieval men are charged with a fear of death, the meaning generally is that theyfeared what came after death, unless well fortified by absolution and last sacrament. It when he attributed his delay of revenge to the scruple of his conscience in feeling his own death in the enterprise, and what dreams might come to the after-sleeping. He was medieval their own, especially in the far-famed Clydesagain, in part, when he refused the opportunity of killing his uncle engaged in prayer. Medieval men made great financial provision for masses to help their souls. There is no denying that they feared hell and purgatory and in the history of the show. It was a signal feared ghosts. Idle was often miserable with fear of ghosts and devils and witches.

Witch-burning was a cheerful feature of le readily recognized. those happy days, dying out at last, only in the eighteenth century so much abused for its materialism, scepticism and reason. Then there was heretic-bunting and burning. People Whatever may be argued against reading and writing and a little learning, there is no doubt that the minds of vast, illiterate populations were narrow, petty, hard and ignorant. Horrible devastations, such as the Albigensian Crusade and the Black Prince's wars in France and Spain were fairly common. As for the crusades, those wars did away with the tear of death and the hereafter, as soldiers who took the Cross were safe for heaven, though they might sack Constantinople for a bit of amusement and plunder by the way.

Fighting was endemic. It went on all the time, everywhere, on every conceivable scale, Sometimes there was a "truce of God" stopping. or trying to stop, this general occupation for certain days of the week. In conclusion, brethren, there were no potato, tobacco, tomato, ice cream, tea, chocolate, and very little sugar 500 years ago, and yet Mr. Chesterton says it was a more cheerful world than ours! Somewhat similarly, or conversely, Walt Whitman thought the animals happier than men because they had no conviction of sin.

A PATT WITHOUT A POLICY.

The Montani Gazette, commenting on the absence of ministerial support for the Unionist candidate in North Ontario, says it is quite clear that the reason why the Government's candidate received no help from the Ottawa; leaders is that the Ottawa leaders plainly do not know where they are at, that they have no policy, and that as far as the tariff is concerned they are completely disunited. [Turner's Weekly.] Most Canadians believe that industry should be encouraged and initiative smiled upon. We have carried it so far in the past that we have given a lot of money to industries which turned out to be of no particular value to the country. Sometimes the money is well placed. We aid the farmers when they are stuck for seed; that is good business. We aid the soldiers when they want to go on the land: There is one industry that is good business. more than all others which should be encouraged, and that is the industry of getting married. At present it is about as difficult to set up in arriage business as it used to be to build a prewery. The aspiring young man is confronted with the cost of a diamond ring; unless he is a rich relative's left-over, he has little chance of being able to live in a house; if he wants a suit of clothes to get married in, he finds that, if he gets the suit, he'll have to cut out the honeymoon. The result is that a great many young men give it up, and decide to stay single and continue to eat One would think that the paternal government would step in and do something. Instead of encouraging a young man, they fine him the price of a marriage license. The government, apparently, looks upon the business of a man taking a wife as of equal importance with the responsibility involved in purchasing a dog. However, we do not see how the government could do a great deal, and as it has enough to do, we do not ask it to take this seriously Just a word to the old-fashioned employer, who used to declare that a married man was a better employee than a single man: If you have a young fellow who looks like a marriage prospect in employ, tell him that the day he gets married his salary goes up a whole heap.

NIGHT LIFE DIM ON BROADWAY.

[Quebec Telegraph.] Among several other amazing things wrought prohibition is a transformation of the night life of the city. Although word has gone out to the provinces that such a thing no longer exists, the report is inaccurate. It does exist, although it is changed. Nowadays Broadway at 2 o'clock a.m. has many points in common with Main street, Bangor, Me., at that hour. Earnest students of the situation profess to believe that it will have even more resemblance after January, when the amendment to the federal constitution becomes operative. There will still be bright lights and cabaret shows and jazz bands, it is admitted, but that is pretty nearly all.

The old-time crowds still throng the hotels and restaurants at the dinner hour each night, and there has been no dropping off in the size of theatre audiences. But from the time the curtains drop at the close of the last act, the changed conditions are all too apparent. They are most in evidence, perhaps, at the big hotels. Hundreds of supper parties were held in them nightly in the old days. Now the dining-rooms are almost deserted after the theatre. The answer is unmistakable, for none of the big hostelries of the city s selling liquor to patrons now.

The same thing is true at several of the larger Broadway restaurants, but the effect is different, and this is one of the features of the strangely complicated situation which causes the most wilderment at first. Capt, Jim Churchill explains it by saying that the thousands of out-of-town people who are in the city each night flock to the cabarets to see the shows, and incidentally to eat a bite, even though they know that a pine cocktail or a raspberry rasdoodle is the extreme limit in the way of stimulating moisture.

There are other well-known places, however, where pineappple cocktails and their like are not the only liquid refreshment obtainable. At perhaps half a dozen of the more conspicuous cabarets in the theatrical district pretty much anything may be had-at a price. Highballs, cocktails and even mixed drinks of the most elaborate varieties may be purchased at prices which range from 80 cents to \$1 in a buil market. There is no dearth of customers, and the nightly crowds at places of this type show no diminution.

Most of the proprietors frankly state their belief that the chances of running into trouble are remote. They figure that very little effort will be expended by the federal authorities toward a strict enforcement of the anti-liquor edict until after January -and it will be some months after January, most of them are inclined to think, before there will be much danger. In the meantime they propose to reap the harvest. A large proportion of their custom are from out of town.

This fact is accentuated by the increasing bu ness which the better class of neighborhood cafes are doing each night. Persons who live, say, in Washington Heights, who were formerly in the habit of running down on Broadway for a weekly lark, are, many of them at least, averse to paying \$1 for a drink. They can get equally good liquor nearer home for 40 cents, and that is exactly what they are doing. The back rooms of many establishments uptown are crowded with prosp well-dressed men and women now, where in the past the tables were almost empty the greater part of the time.

Both the motion picture theatres and the billiard and pool rooms have reacted to prohibition, so assert the proprietors of many of them. STOCK FEED SITUATION IS SERIOUS AS A RESULT OF SHORTAGE OF SCREENINGS

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 12 .- There wil be no screenings available for either eastern or western Canada until the end of January at least, and in any case the additional amounts available out of the remainder of the 1919 crop will not be large. This was the evidence arrived at at a conference held this afternoon in the board room of the grain exchange. At the conference in October an agreement was made whereby 3,500 standard tons of screenings were to be sold by the terminals to the United Farmers of Ontario and the farmers' co-operative societies of Quebec at a fixed price of \$30 a ton. this being a straight transaction between these societies and the terminal

tween these societies and the terminal elevators.

It has developed that the demand both east and west is much greater than anticipated. The eastern societies have placed all of the 3,500 tons alloted to them, and would like to have secured an additional 8,000 tons, and the West would like 4,000 tons, but even-if 10,000,000 bushels of wheat should pass through the terminals between now and the end of January or the middle of February, it would not yield more than 1,200 tons of standard screenings or stock food, so that it is evident that stock men will have to turn to other foods to supply immediate needs.

The present crop has yielded a smaller percentage of screenings than usual. In addition to this of the 67,000,000 bushels of wheat inspected to December 1, only about 52,000 bushels have reached the lake terminals, the balance being milled in transit or at western points. A committee was appointed by the committee to consider the futher handling of screenings on a commercial basis, when next there is any considerable supply available.

BOLSHEVIK PREMIER LENINE LAUDED BY ITALIAN SOCIALISTS

Importing Adventurers Into Russia.

ROME, Wednesday, Dec. 10.-Russia was to the fore again today in the Chamber of Deputies, when the Social- President of Pittsburg Ulster ists branded Great Britain and the United States as the most plutocratic of all states. Deputy Cicotti declared that an Anglo-American combination existed to make Odessa, Danzig and Flume centres from which to reach out and strangle continental Europe.

The Socialist Deputy Professor Graziade asserted that the war was suspended only temporarily. He said the ourgeoisie had hoped that life would be resumed as before the conflict, but that the general elections had disilusioned them. He declared that the war had had the effect of awakening the strength of the Socialists of all countries. The Catholics were against the war because of the question of temporal power and because they feared the defeat of the Central Empires, he said. All the Socialists applauded, while the Catholics shouted their dis-

while the Catholics shouted their disapproval.

Addressing the Catholics, Deputy Graziade declared: "Your priests and your propagandists were defeatists." All the Catholics rose protesting, Graziade continued: "In fact, you were not at the front." Deputy Caviozani, a Catholic, retorted: "I was there."

Deputy Graziade then took up the Russian situation. "The Entente recruits adventures against Russia and Russian situation. "The Entente recruits adventurers against Russia, and starves Russian women and children as it has already starved those of Germany." he asserted. "We must proclaim our solidarity with Soviet Russia." The entire Socialist group arose and cheered for Nikolai Lenine, the Russian Bolshevik premier, while the Catholics protested.

Deputy Graziade expressed opposi-tion to an Anglo-American hegemony, declaring that for three centuries con-tinental Europe had been covered with blood for the especial purpose of serv-ing England's policy.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The claim the Irish Republic to recognition as a independent government was brought an independent government was brought to Congress again today and was debated in militant fashion through a tempestious all-day session of the House committee on foreign affairs.

A crowd which jammed the committee room and blocked adjoining corridors punctuated the proceedings with cheers and with hoots of disapproval as the opposing speakers presented their arguments and many times threw the session into disorder by yelling gratuitous advice to the committee and witnesses. It included many leaders of the cause of Irish freedom in this country and manifested in many ways its sympathy with the plea for recognition. The occasion was a committee consideration of ability of the constitution of a bill property and the constitution of the committee and without The occasion was a committee consideration of a bill by Rep. Mason (Republican, Illinois), which would appropriate funds for dispatch of diplomatic and consular representatives to the appropriate funds. diplomatic and consular representatives to the government set up by the insurgent Irish republican. Its supporters declared it presented an opportunity for Congress to do all it could constitutionally toward a full diplomatic recognition, and its opponents condemned it as an effort to involve the United States in a dangerous foreign situation.





KENT COUNCIL FOR LIMIT LIABILITY FOR HIGHWAYS DAMAGES

Would Get Other Municipalities To Support It.

CHATHAM, Dec. 12.-Joint action on the part of all county municipalities in making representations to the Govern-ment to limit the liability for damages of highways to gross negligence was recommended at the afternoon session of the Kent County Council. A com-mittee will be named to arrange for a joint conference of representatives of municipalities on the matter.

A recommendation was made to the 1920 council to urge upon the Government the importance of appointing another drainage referee to be permanantly located in this district. WOULD BE AVENGER OF KURT EISNER IS ON TRIAL IN MUNICH

Feature of Trial Is Castigation of Eisner by Bavarian Ministers.

MUNICH, Dec. 2 .- At the trial today of Alois Linder, who is accused of having shot Herr Auer, former minister of the interior, in the Diet last February,

ing shot Herr Auer, former minister of the interier, in the Diet last February, the testimony was given principally by former members of the Bavarian cabinet. This tended to show that Kurt Wisner, the former Bavarian premier, who was assassinated a short time before Auer was shot, and his followers not only intended to shoot Auer, but had planned a wholesale murder of all the Bavarian ministers.

A feature of the trial today was the castigation of Eliner by minister after minister, and grave accusations were made against Elsner's secretary, Stechenbach, a youth who is said to have had great influence with Elsner. The first witness, Heinrich von Frauendorfer, former soviet minister of communications, testified that Auer was regarded as having been of the Elsner stamp, "an incarnation of reaction." It was believed firmly, he added, that Auer was responsible for Wisner's death, and, therefore, it had been resolved to shoot Auer.

Still Very Weak.

In the course of the hearing States Attorney Hasse asked Auer's doctor if Auer might be brought into court to testify. The doctor replied that Auer was still weak and in bed, but that if his presence were absolutely necessary he perhaps could be brought into court on a cot.

Herr von Frauendorfer's evidence tended to reveal Elsner as a weak-willed, conceited and incapable politician. The court listened attentively as von Fraudendorfer declared that in the ministerial council the day betained the impression that Elsner realized that his power had ended, but that his conceit and his ambition to play a leading role in Bavaria led him to attempt to maintain himself by any means, as he had a feeling that Auer wanted to displace him.

The witness testified that the two men quarreled in the council, that Eisner lost self-control and that Eisner repeatedly said: "Auer, I warn you that you don't know what is going on."

Von Frauendorfer added that he drew the conclusion from Eisner's actions that Elsner was prepared to

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 12.—Regional directors of railroads were given authority tonight by Director-General Hines to remove restrictions on the use of light, heat and power derived from coal as soon as the fuel situation warrants. The regional directors also were authorized to restore train service removed or curtailed to meet the shortage of coal due to the bituminous miners' strike as soon as the fuel supply in the various regions justified this course.

The railroad administration received unofficial estimates during the day that from 65 to 70 per cent of the miners had gone back to work. Private reports to operators said that in Indiana nearly all the men had returned, but elsewhere a good deal of delay was being shown.

Fuel Administrator Garfield's resignation, sent to President Wilson yesterday, was discussed by White House officials, who expressed the belief that it would be accepted, though it was not indicated that the president as yet had acted.

THE STRIKE IS OVER!

With This Week's Number The Literary Digest Resumes Its Regular Method of Publication

120 Pages---Many Entertaining Pictures

ness in New York City presented demands to their employers for increased pay, and other conditions so radical that they were necessarily refused. The employing printers offered a temporary increase of \$6.00 a week in wages, instead of the \$14.00 asked for, and expressed a willingness to submit all demands, including that of wages, to arbitration. This was refused by the pressmen, and a general walk-out ensued. A few days afterwards, the typesetters, in sympathy with the striking pressmen, left their employment, ostensibly upon a "vacation." The result was a tie-up of practically every magazine published in New York City, with the exception of THE LITERARY DIGEST, which, as an emergency measure, resorted to the photo-engraving process of publication, and the magazine has appeared ever since in typewriter type-face.

Now the compositors and pressmen have returned to work upon the terms originally offered by the employing printers—the submission of all demands to arbitration.

Consequently THE LITERARY DIGEST, commencing this week, December 13, resumes its old familiar appearance.

It is interesting to know that the "Digest's" experiment in typeless printing has started more than two score inventors to work along this line to perfect methods that may make typesetting superfluous, and render Guttenberg's famous invention of moveable types an outworn device.
