WOODSTOCK BUT GARFIELD IS

STILL AMONG THE

Official Executioner Strongly Advocates That All Condemned Men Be Confined in Provincial Prisons -Declares Escape Would Not Have Occurred If Such Procedure Was Followed.

[Special To The Advertiser.] Woodstock, May 27 .- Arthur Ellis, official hangman, is in the city. In an interview with The Advertiser correspondent this afternoon, Canada's hangman stated that "all men under the sentence should be kept in provincial penitentiaries."

"Had Garfield been in Kingston he would never have escaped," tated Mr. Ellis. "I have always contended that county jails are not built or adapted for keeping condemned men, and Garfield's escape proves it. His escape was easy. If he had been in Kingston under proper guards no such thing would have happened. The transfer of condemned men to federal prisons would eliminate the sentiment that is created for convicted men by local conditions and people. Garfield would have been removed from all this sentiment that has been shown here."

Ellis visited Sheriff McGhee this afternoon. "It is not yet June 2," Ellis commented. "Garfield may be caught before that " Ellis came to Woodstock to erect the scaffold that Norman Garfield was to hang on. For the present at least Ellis' job has been postponed.

ALSACE "REPUBLIC" **GOES BROKE WHILE FOUNDERS CAROUSE**

Three Self-Styled Patriots Back of Futile Scheme Are German Adventurers.

FEATHERING OWN NESTS

Fake Noblemenn Lose Pristine Urge After Condemnation For High Treason.

PARIS, May 26 .- The "Free Republi PARIS, May 26.—The "Free Republic of Alsace-Lorraine," through which pro-Germans who were evicted from those provinces since the signing of the armistice hoped to regain their properties as well, as political control there, has gone broke. With the collapse of the movement, which threatened for a time to create a new "Ireland," it has been learned here that the three self-styled patriots who were back of the scheme were little more than adventurers, and were using German funds to further their own purposes, rather than the interests of the rich territories which are now French, and in which which are now French, and in which there is little possibility of a plebiscite ever deciding in favor of self-govern-

Ment.

As a matter of fact, the "republic" never developed enough strength to have even secret headquarters on the French side of the Rhine. It was founded in Munich early in 1919, and with the exception of flooding Alsace towns with circulars, some of which even the tright of the states. with circulars, some of which even found their way into the United States and into Ireland, the French Govern-ment professed to have been caused no worry by it. by it.

As a precautionary measure, however, Count Rapp, Baron Lore and Dr. Muth, who conceived the idea, have been condemned for high treason, and if they are ever brave enough to cross the Rhine they will be locked up, according to the Strassbourg court's verdict, "in a strongly fortified place, where they will work at the vilest tasks to the end of their days." EUROPE IS FORGING AHEAD IN WORLD WAR OF MARKETS

America Slow in Getting Into the Fray.

Washington, D. C., May 26.—The ong predicted commercial war after the var—to capture foreign markets and control of natural resources—is on in earnest among the nations and beginto assume gigantic proportions. est innovations in commercial war-fare, and Secretary of Commerce Hoo-ver has warned congress that the United States should lose no time in perfecting trade weapons to meet the onslaughts of its foreign competitors,

Foreign Capital Invades Markets.
While these foreign governments
are reaching out for control of vast oil and other natural resources enormous combinations of foreign capital are invading the markets of the world to do battle with the scattered and un organized American exporters. At the same time similar gigantic combinasame time similar gigantic combina-tions in European countries are pool-ing their importations from the United States, and by eliminating purchas-ing competition among themselves and taking advantage of the selling competition among Americans, are obtaining American raw materials and manufactured goods at bargain prices.

The conviction is spreading that if America is even to hold its own in this contest. American producers and expenses are all as a contest. ontest, American producers and excontest, American producers and opporters must be allowed to combine in trading with foreigners in the manner prohibited in domestic commerce by the Sherman anti-trust law. The Webb-Pomerene act permitting combinations of exporters in foreign trade is a step in this direction, but a feeble step, it is asserted, in meeting the competition of the foreign combines.

Tells of Commercial Wars. In making his successful appeal for additional appropriations for trade ex-pansion, Secretary Hoover lifted the curtain for the benefit of the House appropriations committee on the comrcial war among the nations.

"The world is faced with an entire-ly new era in foreign trade," said Mr. Hoover. "Due to the economic sit-uation abroad there is a growing ten-dency to consolidate for militant ex-"Due to the economic sitport purposes in practically every country in Europe. This is develop-ing in two directions. The consolidation of industrial concerns by mergers of capital, and in this direction the departments are more general even than in the United States before

cign markets.
Collective Action Needed. "If we are to meet these combina-tions we must secure more collective action on the part of our industries.

I have a feeling that if we are to hold our own we must at least be able to furnish the special information upon which our people can act and such information must be secured under ex-

pert direction.
"There is another new factor in foreign commerce that requires a great deal of study and consideration and that is a new type of foreign combination—combinations for imports. For instance, practically the whole buying of hide and leather for the United Kingdom is now in one organiation. We have similar combinations in coal, food, etc., in many directions. The result of those combinations is to more or less dictate prices within the United States. We must have a gen-

Losing Foreign Oil Fields.
"We have a case in the matter Our own oil resources are estiyears; we are producing now 65 per cent of the worlds oil, and we have an estimated proportion of the world's estimated proportion of the world so oil bearing territory of from 25 to 30 per cent. We are not securing our foothold in foreign oil fields. The matter has been before congress on several occasions, and it is a matter of general agitation throughout the country. The chnical bureaus of the government have developed the technical material with respect to world oil resources, but the information as to the com-mercial action that is necessary is entirely unorganized.

"It seems to me that one of the first functions of the department of com-merce is to see that such problems are taken in hand and that we should se tion on the part of our oil industry British Federation Resolves as to secure our position for the fu-ture. Again it becomes a question of the general staff. One or two men in the department of commerce canno undertake all of these things; we mus have some men who can devote them selves to the development of these

sorts of problems."

Mr. Hoover explained in detail hi plan of co-operation with American ineign trade.

"We are proposing to set up twelve small divisions in the bureau, comprising experts in different industrial groups—machinery, cotton, wool, and textiles, chemicals and dyes, minerals and oils, certain foodstuffs, etc .- with a view to establishing efficient opera-tion with those special industrial groups," said Secretary Hoover. "These divisions are to direct the for-eign service so as to secure the results from the service that are needed by the industries themselves. From these men we will furnish experts for spe-cial investigations into particular trade conditions obroad, requiring spe-cial skill.

"We have in view the setting up o service committees in some of the dif-ferent industrial groups. These com-mittees will be purely voluntary and their object is to assist the bureau in guiding our foreign service to prac-tical results for the industry, and on the other hand, to give encouragement to the industries to push ahead. In order to carry out that plan effectively, we need to have a few men who are experts in their particular branches of industry.

Information for the Trade, "For instance, in the automobil trade—now one of our large exports we need someone in the bureau Washington who is an expert in t and markets, and who can assure distribution of this information back to the trade and can stimulate the trade to take action under it.

"One difficulty now is that a large amount of information comes in and we are not equipped to give it adequate preparation and distribution. Another is that information is collected abroad by men without expert direction from home, having in view the particular necessities of our different industries The foreign service employees endeavor to the best of their ability to secure information that will be of use to the American trade, but who are without proper direction from home. In other words, we lack a general staff in planting and posting out the directions ning and plotting out the directions where we can extend our commerce to the best advantage."

Just as long as a desperado of the Garfield type is at large, it is a serious menace to the public safety, and it is the urgent duty of the Government to provide an effective remedy.

APPLIED SCIENCE.

"I am trying to pound it into the heads of the public that applied science pays," declared Dr. C. E. Saunders, in the course of his speech at the Western University convocation dinner. As the discoverer of Marquis wheat, Dr. Saunders has proved this dictum not only to his own satisfaction, but to that of wheat growers the lawn at 5 o'clock in the morning is the counterand cereal experts throughout the world. The great difficulty which is generally experienced in the "pounding" process, or, in other words, in making people unthat this form of recreation will take the place of lawn derstand that applied science pays, is that they fail to grasp the difference between applied science and theoretical science. This difficulty is perhaps most frequently encountered by those engaged in the teaching and propagation of scientific methods of agriculture, and although a large number of farmers have wisely adopted Dutch Treat Club in New York city: and with benefit to the coutry at large, there are still a good many who look askance at anything which appears to be of college origin. Strychnine is used in infinitesimal quantities in certain medicines as a tonic, with beneficial results to the patient, but an overdose is fatal, and just in the same way certain fertilizers, when misapplied to the soil, through carelessness or ignorance of the husbandman, are fatal to the success of the crop.

Today 90 per cent of the Central and Western Canada wheat grown is Marquis, and in the Northwestern States it constitutes 80 per cent of the total. These facts are in themselves a triumphant demonstration of the assertion that "applied science pays," but in such matters, as in the case of Dr. Saunders' discovery, science must be backed up by perseverance and per tinacity of purpose, if the desired end is to be reached.



and, not infrequently, partially decayed fish might prove an annoying problem for the fishermen, but not for the gulls. The always hungry fowls, however, are on hand the moment a fishing boat pulls up at its dock. Frequently they follow craft for long distances.

As the fish are taken from the nets they are thrown away. They no more than land than they are seized and gob-

bled up. The gulls fight for them as hungry wolves fight for carrion.

Ten years ago the gull was one of the most timid of the birds inhabiting the Lake Erie region. Getting a view of it at short range was an impossibility. But

FAT AT FORTY NO SIGN OF HEALTH

Overweight Puts a Strain On the Heart and Joints.

When a person becomes stout after about 40 years of age, it does not worry him or her, unless the stoutness be so great to cause discomfort or disfigurement. Nevertheless, the statistics of life insurance companies prove that increase in weight with age is not favorable to length of days. Drs. Irving Fisher and E. L. Fisk, the greatest authorities, say that insurance companies prove that increase of weight at 40 should be approximately the weight for the age of 30.

"What are the burdens of obesity, and why does it shorten life?" asks the Journal of the American Medical Association. Various answers, mostly in-

Journal of the American Medical Asso-ciation. Various answers, mostly in-definite in character, may be forthcom-ing in reply to this question. Tissue fat must be carried about like any other incubus. We are reminded that over-weight puts a 'strain on the heart and on the joints, and that it 'pushes up the diaphragm and cramps the lungs.' A gaining adult who is already overweight may find his physical activities re-strained and bodily exertion made lab-ored. Accordingly, with an unchanged food intake the surplus of unused energy accumulates and a vicious cycle is pre-sently established. The obese person inevitably limits his exercise; he grows, heavier from the unused reserves, and his activity thereupon becomes even more restrained and limited. Made \$2,000,000 in Three Months in St. Augustine Alone When Killing of "Waco Kid" Brought End - One Gaming Palace Riddled by Bullets by Ku Klux Klan.

Col. Bob Ammon, the original Wallingford; to Goslin and to the others who operated twenty odd years ago in Wall street, on Broadway and in "520%" Miller's shack in Greenpoint, New York can get an idea of the exploits of a well-organized gang of confidence men that has been plundering the south for the last five years.

Here and in other cities stories are coming to light daily of new swindles, of bribery and corruption on the part of the authorities, of suicide and of murder. The adages, "Murder will out" and "When thieves fall out, etc.," held good in this instance, for it was through the murders of Claude Willard Powell, the 'Waco Kid," in St. Augustine, and Ed Mills in Atlanta that the confidence men have been exposed with a crash that is shaking the entire south and which is instructing thousands of tour-ists as to why they had such a cursed run of luck at the card table or on the wheel in that castlelike club in Daytona, Orlando, Palm Beach, Tampa or St.

MAKE PROMOTIONS ON RECOMMENDATION OF DEPTY MINISTERS

OTTAWA. May 26 .- (By Canadian Press.)—The report of the special par-liamentary committee appointed to onsider the Spinney bill, amending the civil service act, wipes the bill, as it originally stood, out of existence, but proposes the passage of a bill, which, while leaving promotions in the hands of the civil service commission, gives the commission authority to make promotions on the recommendation of the deputy ministers and without examina-tions. Where the civil act originally gave the commission authority to make promotions by examination, amendact, suggested by th committee, will give the commission authoritiy to make promotions by re-ports, tests, rating and recommendalation prescribe."

Another suggested amendment provides for giving the commission power to exempt any person from the regular competitive class as it may consider to be in the public interest. The Spinney bill proposed to take certain classes out of the hands of the commission.

The report sets forth that it has been forced to the conclusion that it would be in the public interest for the com-mission, in consultation with the deputy department heads, to undertake a careful review of the entire service in order to determine what classes of civic ser-vants should be exempted from the jurisdiction of the commission and the civil service act. The committee, says the report, feels that it would be unwise to define these classes by statute, and that the commission should, before the next session of Parliament, come to

The report criticizes the commission nethods of making promotions within the departments, and for the delay in making appointments.
