To Encourage Coking Plants

Canadian Press Despato Ottawa, March 25.-A drawback of 99 per cent of the duty is to be allowed on bituminous coal imported into Canada for conversion into coke. This is done, it is announced, to encourage the establishment and operation of up-to-date coking plants in Canada.

It was explained at the finance department this morning that coke now enters Canada free of duty. Coking plants in Canada have been using slack coal for conversion into coke, but the budget introduced yesterday makes the duty on slack coal as high as the regular run-of-mine

Ottawa, March 24.-Duty on slack coal increased to 35c British reference, 45c intermediate and 50c general. Former duty, 10c British preference, 12½c intermediate and 14c general.

'CHOKE" COIL MAY REDUCE TROUBLE

University Professors Announce Results of Interference Experiments.

Static and other interference to radio may be minimized when the trouble has been caused by ozonizers by the introduction of a simple "choke" coil. This prevents the electric vibrations being transmitted in broadcasting. The above decision has been reached by Prof. R. L. Allan and Prof. J. W. Burns of the department of chemistry, University of Western Ontario, who have been working on the problem of radio interference in the district.

Act Will Be Amended To Make This Difficult.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Ottawa, March 24.-Clearer defintion of what constitutes checks and oills of exchange is made in today's oudget provisions. The acting minster of finance stated in the House that the special war revenue act was being evaded by the substitution of documents which did not come strictly within the provision of the act for stamp purposes. A check is now defined to "include any document or writing, not drawn upon or addressed to a bank in exchange for which a bank makes payment of a sum of money except a coupon and a docu-ment made solely for the purpose of settling or clearing any account be-tween banks that such a check shall

be liable to the stamp."
"A bill of exchange transferred or delivered to a bank drawn upon a person outside of Canada shall for the purpose of the value of the stamp affixed thereto, be deemed to be drawn for an amount not exceeding \$2,500, the amendment rules. A stamp for two cents on every \$50 up to \$25.00 must be affixed to such bill of ex-

Money orders or travellers' checks, whether issued by a bank or any other person are liable to the stamp
