Although the advantages of draining a almost universally conceded, yet how rare is, to see in our travels in this country, w drained or thoroughly reclaimed awamps, wet low lands. Such lands, abounding in most every district, when neglected, are only unproductive and unprofitable, substra ing materially from the value of a farm. are unsightly, and more or less prejudicial health. On the contrary, such lands, of others, when reclaimed, are the most intere ing and productive. They have the depos ries of freshets and floods for ages, and be received more or less of the manure and a face soil gradually carried from time to ti from the surrounding knolls and hill sic When thoroughly drained and stirred up proper cultivation, and the inert vegets substance brought into action by the suppl tion of the usual decomposing agents, s lands are distinguished for their enduring

Much money, however, is fruitlessly pended in the operation of draining. V few of our native American farmers are a fel in the art, and like every other branc farming, it will pay best when be-t perfo ed. Draining.

Although the advantages of draining are almost universally conceded, yet how rare it is, to see in our travels in this country, well drained or thoroughly reclaimed awamps, or wet low lands. Such lands, abounding in almost every district, when neglected, are not only unproductive and unprofitable, substractothers, when reclaimed, are the most interesting and productive. They have the depositaries of freshets and floods for ages, and have received more or less of the manure and surface soil gradually carried from time to time from the surrounding knolls and hill sides. When thoroughly drained and stirred up by proper cultivation, and the inert vegetable substance brought into action by the supplication of the usual decomposing agents, such ands are distinguished for their enduring fer-

Much money, however, is fruitlessly expended in the operation of draining. Very lew of our native American farmers are skilfal in the art, and like every other branch of farming, it will pay best when best performed. It is by no means necessary that a bog or swampshould have " a great full," or inclination, to be well drained. It is customary to dig the ditches down to the gravel, instead of digging three or four ditches in depth into the gravel stratum, which, by the bye, is one great secret in draining. Where springs abound, either above or below the surface, they must of course all be let down into under-drains. An expert ditcher will not often be deceived about the location or source of blind springs under the surface, which generally do most mischief. Such springs develope themselves by the peculiar character of the vegetation the tread. The location of drains is of the utmost importance. A STARTLING DISCOVERY,-confirmatory the truth of the book of Jonah, has been made by Mr. Layard. In excavating the city of Nineveh he discovered the name of Jonah inscribed upon the ruins. That prophet, as our readers know, was sent to announce to the people of Minereh the destruction of the city. His sloquence converted many of them, and "God repented him "of the doom. He had pronoueced, and spared the city for that time. Jonah then became the prophet of Nineveh, and was reverenced by the inhabitants. As was the Oriental custom, they doubtless inscribed his name in conspicuous places on the walls of the public edifices, and the inscriptions engraved by Assyrian hands a thousand years be-fore the Christian era, have been found by Mr. Layard. This is one of the most extraordinary demonstrations of the accuracy of Biblical history we have ever heard of .- New York Paper.

GLASS SURFACE FOR IRON WARE .- Iron door panels, iron tubes, iron dinner-plates, saucepans. gridirons, fryingpans, kettles, cauldrons, &c, are now coated with glass. The iron is cleaned with an acid wash, smeared with a glutinous preparation, covered with pounded glass, and placed in a furnace, The glutinous matter evaporates, and the glass becomes incorporated by fusion with the surface of the iron. Dinner-plates (beautifully ornamented in colours) each weigh tour ounces less than plates of earthenware; and as they may tall without breaking, the master's pocket and the mistress's temper are spared. This important invention may hereafter be applied to numerous purposes in decorative building and architecture.-

STRAWBERRIES BY THE TON !- During the four days of last week one hundred and seventy-two thousand baskets of strawberries were brought to New York over the Erie Railroad alone. Calculating each basket to weigh four ounces, the aggregate weight of the whole would be twenty-one and a half tons! The fruit was grown in Rockland county.

LONG TRAIN .- The Hudson River Railroad, or Thursday, the 4th, brought down a train of twenty three large cars, having 1,750 passengers. The train was half a mile in length—the heaviest, probably, ever drawn in this country by a single loco-
