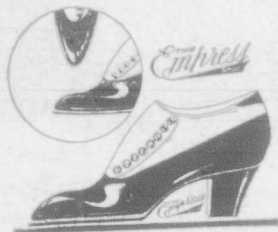

 A very wet spring up to the
 third of May, but early in the
 swelling of buds and the spring-
 ing of the grass. The fruit buds
 have come through the winter
 in good shape and promise a full
 bloom. Trees are about all pruned
 for this year.
 The poor quality of last year's
 fruit added to the poor prices re-
 ceived, have set our orchardists
 thinking. The feeling is becom-
 ing stronger among the farmers
 that they must raise better ap-
 ples and many are expecting to
 grow fewer on the tree. To get
 this state of affairs some have
 determined to thin the fruit in
 July, while others are pruning
 very severely, hoping that the
 desired results of larger, better
 quality of apples may be obtain-
 ed thereby.
 The question of spraying has
 received much more attention
 this last winter discursively at
 the blacksmith shops and village
 stores than ever before, and
 there is no uniformity of opinions
 in the matter. Intelligent or-
 chardists have advanced most
 ridiculous opinions against
 spraying, but we are glad to
 notice that those who sprayed
 thoroughly last season and got
 as a consequence better fruit,
 will spray again this year. Some
 are in favor of returning to the
 use of the old Bordeaux mixture;
 some will make their own lime-
 sulphur, but by far the greater
 proportion, ninety per cent will
 use the easily obtained, easily
 mixed, commercial lime-sulphur,
 and commercial arsenate of lead.
 The future holds out a hopeful
 promise for the market end of
 fruit, but over two-thirds of the
 output of the province, in
 spite of a childish and transpar-
 ently selfish opposition put up
 by a few of the old speculators
 who have made easy money out
 of the farmers in the past. All
 the newly formed societies are
 uniting with the central associa-
 tion and the excellence of the
 pack will soon give it practically
 all the markets and make it the
 greatest organization in Nova
 Scotia. — Canadian Horticul-
 turist.

Experimental Farm System Extended
 Number of Stations Has Been Trebled

Since Hon. Martin Burrell, a practical fruit grower, became Minister of Agriculture, there has been a great extension of the Experimental Farms throughout Canada with a view to increasing their efficiency and of making them of more practical value to the farmers. Until recently certain provinces were served only by farms in adjoining provinces, while conditions of soil and climate in certain districts differed so widely as to require special facilities for the study of agricultural problems. By farms or stations every province has now been reached and in addition substations have been established to serve outlying districts and sections within provinces possessing unusual conditions.

ELEVEN NEW ONES

Recently no less than eleven new farms or stations have been added to the five original farms. These are situated at Charlottetown in Prince Edward Island; Kentville, in Nova Scotia; Fredericton in New Brunswick; Cap Rouge and Ste. Ann de la Pocatiere in Quebec; Rosthern and

...and Sydney in New Brunswick. To these must be added substations situated at Kamloops, in British Columbia, Fort Vermillion on the Peace River and Forts Smith, Resolution and Providence and Athabaska Landing beyond the 60th parallel of latitude where some experimental work is being carried on.

INCREASED THE STAFF

A further recent development of the system has been to greatly strengthen the staff of officers. The number of scientifically trained assistants in all the Divisions at the Central Farm has been materially increased in order to cope successfully with the ever increasing work. The duties and responsibilities of the heads of certain divisions have been increased. Frank T. Shutt, who has been associated with the work of the farms since their establishment in addition to his duties as Dominion chemist has been made assistant director of Experimental Farms. W. T. Macoun has been made Dominion Horticulturist which gives him authority over the Horticultural work of the farms of the Dominion.

AGROSTOLOGY REVISION

Another advance has been made in the creation of a division of Agrostology under M. O. Malte, Ph. D., who is a famous specialist and will devote his attention to the improvement of the quality and yield of the grasses, clovers, alfalfas, roots and other forage crops grown in Canada. In order to give the science of bee-keeping the attention it deserves a trained apiarist in the person of F. W. L. Sladen, of Dover, England, has been appointed and attached to the division of entomology where he will devote his whole time to investigation and educational work bearing on bee-keeping.

The work is shown in the well-marked expansion that has taken place since he took office. Valuable as has been the work of the Experimental Farms in the past it is confidently expected that a far greater future is ahead of the farms.

On June 10th, the University of Bristol, fruit growers are probably familiar with the discoloration and blackening of pear blossom and foliage which is generally to be noticed every spring. This damage is regarded as the work of frost or cold wind. It is not. The trouble has been traced at Long Ashton to be due to bacillus, and a fortunate discovery it is, because now that the origin of this injury is known, it will not be long before Professor Barker and his staff will be ready with an antidote. The organism responsible for the disease has been isolated in the laboratories of the institute, and experiments with pure cultures of the bacteria have proved that the organism is the real source of the trouble. The disease is not limited to pears only. The bacteria have also been found in the institute plantations attacking apples and plums, and producing very similar damage. The result of the attack is that the fruits wither and die off, so that a considerable percentage of the crop is lost. Specimens of similarly attacked pear blossoms have already been obtained from different parts of the country, and in these cases also the organism has been found to be present. There is therefore no doubt that it is widely spread in the fruit-growing districts, and it must cause very considerable loss to fruit growers. The life history and characters of the bacillus are being examined, and in due course a full report of the disease will be published. During the course of the year experiments will be carried on to endeavor to find a method of dealing with the pest.

The particulars referred to in the above report will likely be of considerable interest not only to Canadian fruit growers but also to those who are carrying on experimental work at various points throughout Canada. E. D. ARNAUD, Bristol Eng.

Champion Cow of Canada

Performance of Animal at Garnet Not Equalled in Dominion

Guelph, May 28th. — W. H. Cherry, of Garnet, Ontario, is the proud possessor of the senior two-year-old champion cow of Canada. Peter Carnochan, late of the O. A. C. Dairy School, did the testing, and results, seven days, 21.65 pounds of butter, 14 days 42.70, and 30 days 89.65 pounds have never been equaled by any cow owned in the Dominion.

Tom Fox, a trapper in Bartibogue, N. B., while making the rounds to his traps last week discovered a bear caught in one of them. The bear seeing him made a spring and broke the trap, getting clear, and rushed on him. Mr. Fox, taken by surprise, was not altogether prepared to defend himself, and before he could kill the bear it had given him a few scratches about the head and face. The bear was said to be the largest ever seen in that part of the country.

Useful Hints

If your cake bakes too fast at the top, set a pan of cold water on the grate above.

If there is a bare spot on your lawn where the grass will not grow, sow flaxseed on it.

Before arranging maidenhair fern in vases, soak it for 2 hours in cold water; then singe the ends of the stem with a match. Ferns thus treated are said to last three times as long, and keep quite green and fresh for several days.

Handkerchiefs and white clothes that have become yellow may be whitened in the following simple manner: After they have been washed in the usual way, lay them to soak overnight in clear water, into which cream of tartar has been put. A teaspoonful to a quart of water is the right proportion. When ironed they will be white as snow.

The easiest and quickest way of cleaning paint is to have two pails of water, one cold, to which a tablespoonful of ammonia has been added, and one hot, with the addition of a little ammonia and soap powder. With a soft flannel wash the paint with the soapy water then rinse with the cold water, using a wash leather instead of flannel, and wring the leather fairly dry. Paint washed like this dries with a nice polish which no amount of drying with cloths and using hot water will impart.

British Born Are Killed

Too weak to uphold the burden of nearly 10,000 human beings assembled for the festivities of British Empire Day, the land-end of the big double-deck municipal pier at Long Beach, California, collapsed on Saturday. Hundreds were plunged from the top deck down on the heads of hundreds on the second deck. This deck also gave way and all were dropped down a chute of shatterer woodwork to the sands 25 feet below. Thirty-three persons, mostly women were killed or crushed to death; 50 were seriously injured; the victims were subjects of Great Britain, residents in Southern California.

Canadian Ran Many Blockades

A Paris despatch says the commander of the Turkish cruiser Hamidieh, the "Phantom Ship" which harassed the Balkan Allies so relentlessly is a Nova Scotian, named Bucknam, was the assertion made by Le Messager D'Athenes, the Greek newspaper published here. The journal said that Turkey paid the commander \$75,000 for his work, and added: "European opinion refuses to believe that there is a single Turkish officer capable of navigating a warship in the way the Hamidieh has been navigated."

Bucknam worked for Turkey during the war with Italy and ran a blockade twenty-four times.

While seventy thousand Montrealers do not go to church, there are only a dozen infidels in the city, and very few members of other than the orthodox denominations, according to figures made public by the Montreal home visitation committee, which in whirlwind religious census, visited 82 per cent of the city's homes representing 400,000 people. The largest number of children found in any city family was eighteen in a city home. The census takers reported that aristocratic Westmount has by far the smallest number of homes of any district in greater Montreal.
