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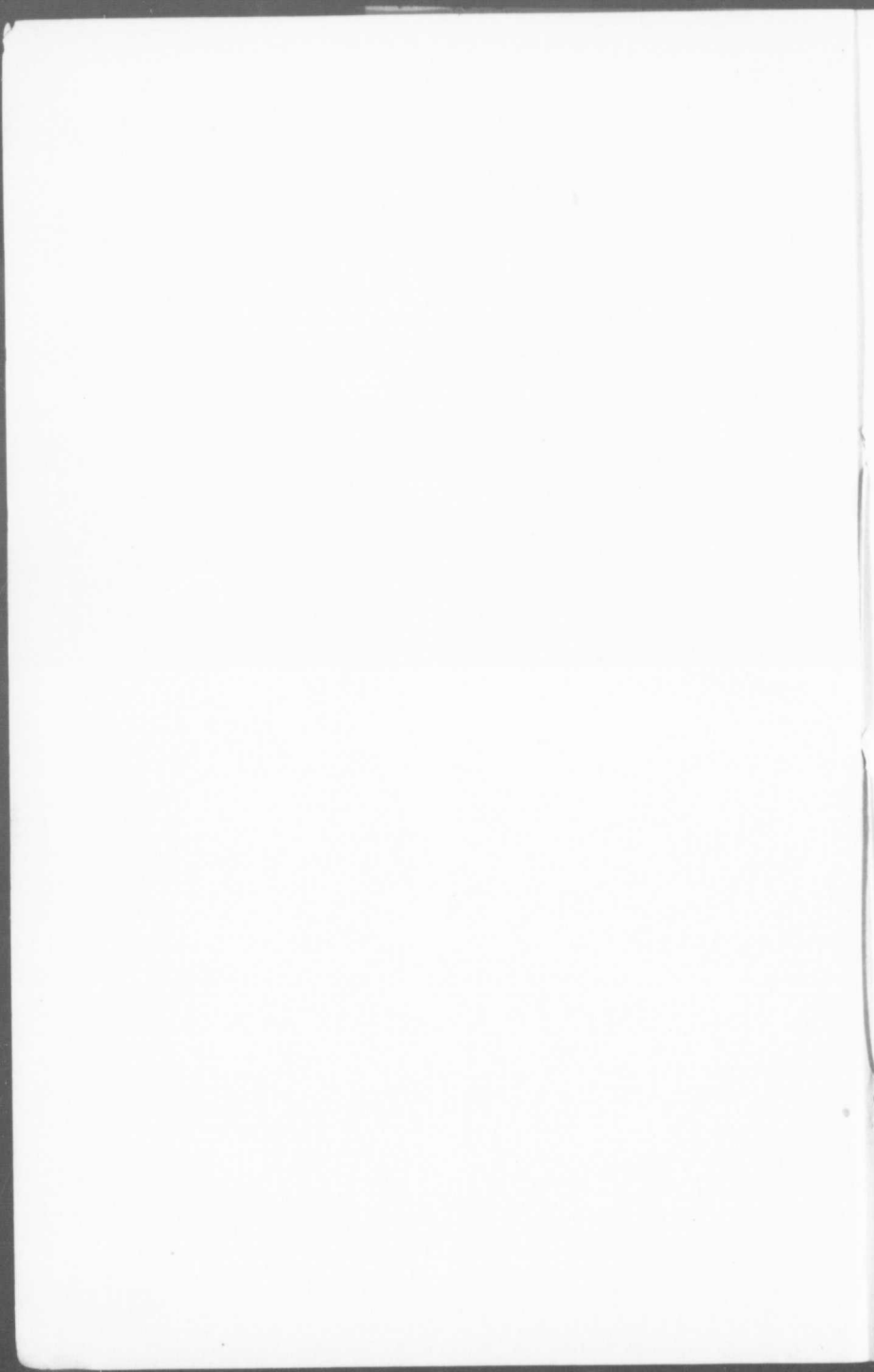

## REPORT FOR EIGHT MONTHS.

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The Board of Directors present this the thirty-fifth report of their proceedings covering a period of eight months from the first of February last, owing to the change made in pursuance of an Act passed at the last Session of the Ontario Legislature, in order that the financial and statistical year of the Hospital may correspond with the Government year.

This change necessitates the holding of the Annual Meeting on the first Tuesday in October of each and every year, instead of as heretofore on the first Tuesday in February.

The Act above referred to also makes such amendments in the Charter as were deemed desirable for the purpose of dealing with real estate.

The income for the above period was as follows :—

The total number of patients received during the eight months was 216, and the number of outdoor patients 162.

The number of days spent in the Hospital was 12,816, showing the average cost of each patient per day to be 48  $\frac{1}{3}$  cents.

They have much pleasure in drawing attention to the gratifying fact, that the last instalment due on the building has been paid and the institution is now out of debt. The Directors hope that the charitable public will continue their liberal contributions in the future, so that the efficiency of the Hospital may be increased.

The amount expended for supplies of meat, bread, vegetables, milk, groceries, fuel, drugs, etc., for the period of eight months was \$6,190.57.



The income for the same period compares very favorably with that of the corresponding period of eight months of the previous year, the former being \$8,172.32, the latter \$7,730.70.

The death of the late efficient and faithful Secretary, Mr. William Cousens, which occurred in the month of April last, was a serious loss to the Institution, and the Directors have to record their sincere regret at the removal of one so long connected with the Hospital, and whose energy, industry and assiduity contributed so much to its success.

At the regular meeting in July the present Secretary, Mr. Charles Macnab, was appointed. The duties during the interval having been efficiently and gratuitously discharged by the Vice-President, Mr. Geo. May.

The Board of Directors desire to express their thanks to the Medical Staff for the faithful discharge of their important duties.

To the following Municipalities, the City of Ottawa, the County of Carleton, and the Town of Perth, for their liberal grants.

To the gentlemen in the city who have acted as collectors, and also to those who undertook the work of soliciting subscriptions in the several Towns in the vicinity of Ottawa.

To the Clergymen who have ministered to the Spiritual wants of the sick and afflicted in the institution, and to the Young Men's Christian Association for their regular visitations and efficient services.

To the members of the Ladies Committee who visited the Hospital and performed so many kind acts.

To the Proprietors of the "Free Press" and "Citizen" newspapers for the valued use of their columns and donations of their respective papers for the use of the patients.

To Messrs. James Lindsay and T. W. Kenny, junior, for their services as Auditors.

To Messrs. Rogers & Son in donating their account for undertaking.

The House Surgeon, Dr. Chipman, continues to discharge his duties with efficiency and zeal, and to merit the confidence reposed in his attentiveness and skill.

The Matrons and staff of both Hospitals attended to their various duties in such a manner as to merit the general approval and confidence of the Board.

As this report covers only a portion of a year, and in view of the very considerable expense which would be incurred, the Directors would recommend that it be not printed until next year when it may be published with the report of the year on which we are now entering.

In conclusion the Directors have to express their thankfulness for the prosperous condition of the Hospital. After years of anxiety the burden of debt has been removed, and they look with cheerful confidence to the future for the blessings and benefits, which they trust the Institution is destined to confer.

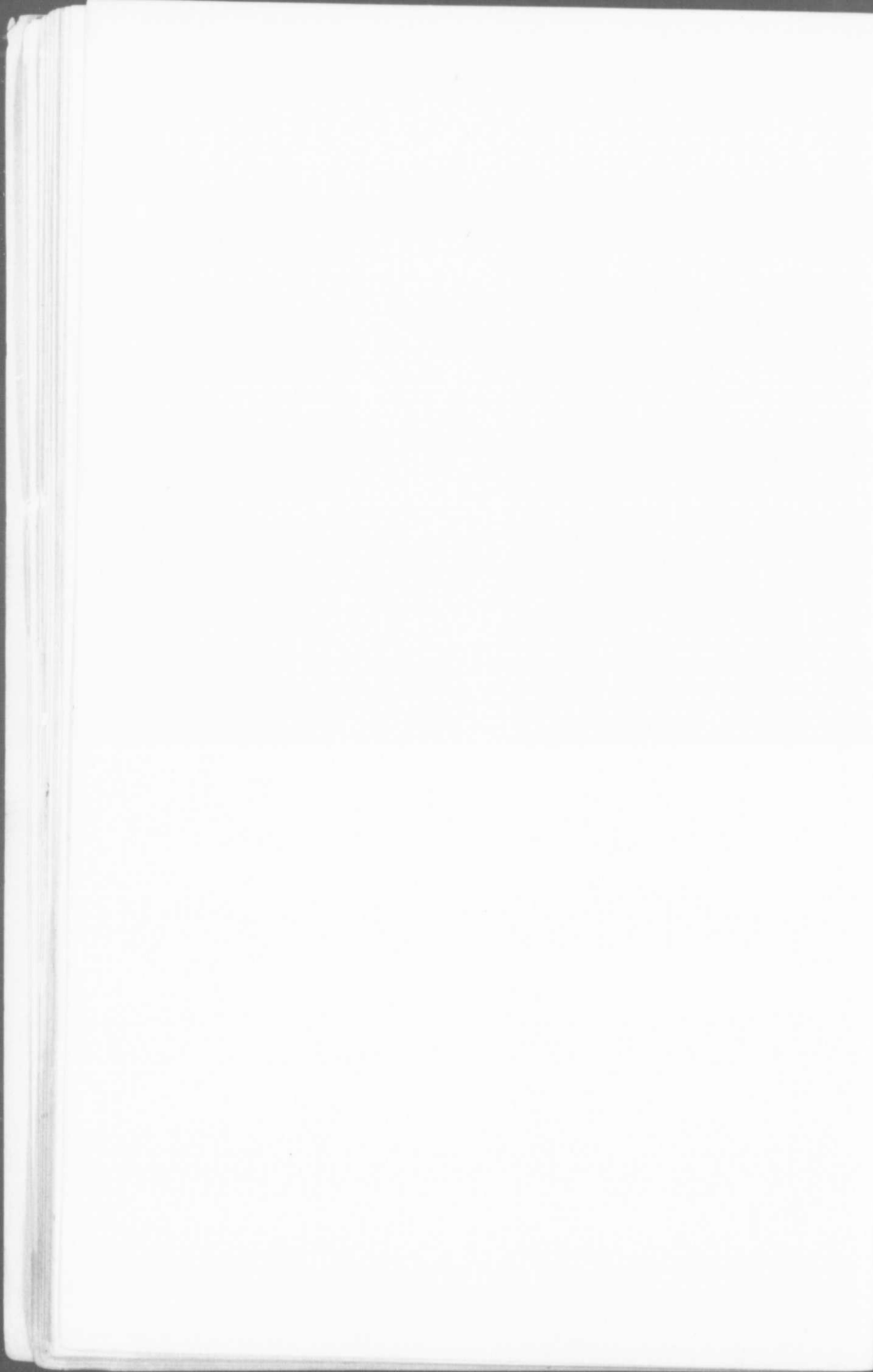

## ANNUAL REPORT.

---

The Board of Directors present this the thirty-sixth annual report of the affairs of the Hospital for the year ending 30th September, 1886.

The amount received during the year from all sources is as follows:—

The total amount expended during the year for supplies, viz.:—meat, bread, vegetables, milk, groceries, drugs, fuel, etc., was \$9,184.07.

The number of patients admitted during the year was 350, and the number of outdoor patients who received medical treatment was 199. The number of days spent in the Hospital by patients was 18,589. The total cost of maintenance for each patient was 48 $\frac{1}{3}$  cents per day.

The actual average cost per day for sustentation and medical supplies was 21 $\frac{1}{3}$  cents for each patient.

It is satisfactory to feel that while the increasing accommodation and efficiency of the institution necessitate an increasing expenditure, the receipts from all sources, as well from the liberal charity of a generous public as from the Ontario Government and the Municipalities of the City of Ottawa and the surrounding Counties, show a corresponding increase, and while in addition to the ordinary outlay for maintenance a large amount has been paid for improvements and repairs, the year closes with a fair balance on hand.



A most important improvement, long and greatly needed, has been effected in the Hospital by a thorough and complete system of drainage, in connection with which many appliances conducive to health, comfort and convenience have been provided, as well in the old Hospital, set apart for infectious diseases, as in the new building.

In addition to this a large amount has been judiciously expended for blankets, napery and other necessary equipments.

Amongst other cases, during the year thirteen persons afflicted with small-pox were received at the Hospital for infectious diseases, all of whom recovered. This speaks well for the medical treatment, and for the management, nursing and judicious care of the matron in charge.

The Directors have to record with extreme regret the death during the year of Mr. John Pennock, one of the Managing Board. Mr. Pennock was for many years one of the most earnest and energetic friends of the Hospital. His wise counsels at the Board, whose meetings he very seldom failed to attend, and his never wearying industry on behalf of the institution contributed in no small measure to place it in its present efficient and prosperous condition.

The Directors are pleased to acknowledge payment of a bequest made by the late Miss Stewart, and a portion of a bequest made by the late Mrs. James Johnston.

To the consulting and attending physicians the Directors desire on behalf of the institution, to again tender their earnest and hearty thanks for their constant and assiduous attendance.

To the Municipalities of the City of Ottawa, the Counties of Carleton and Lanark, the Town of Perth, and the Township of Fitzroy, for generous grants.

To S. Rogers & Son for again donating the full amount of their account for undertaking during the year.

To the Auditors, Messrs. T. W. Kenny and James Lindsay.

To the proprietors of the three city newspapers for daily issues of their respective journals for the use of the patients, and for acknowledgements in their columns of donations received.

To the clergymen of the various Christian denominations, the members of the Y. M. C. Association, and the visiting Ladies' Committee for their ministrations to those afflicted.

To the young ladies of the Floral Mission for the regular supply of flowers for use and gratification of the patients

To the several collectors for their valuable services, and to the many contributors, both in money and kind, a list of whose generous donations will be found in the appendix.

The House Surgeon, Matron and staff of the new building continue, as in the past, to perform their duties to the general satisfaction and approval of the Board.

To conclude, the Directors recognize, with profound thankfulness to a beneficent Providence, that while the pressing needs and requirements of the institution continue to increase, the ever widening circle of its friends and supporters continues to extend, and that having passed through so many years—not a few of which were years of great trial, difficulty and discouragement—it is now in such a prosperous condition.
