

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in

good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

By-law to Raise Funds by Debentures

Mr. A. K. Bunnell, secretary of the nunicipal Board of Education, sent the following communication to City Clerk Leonard this morning. It will be brought up before the Mayor and council at the next meeting.

"Relying upon the opinions expressed by the Mayor, and other members of the council, that funds would be provided for the plumbing at the Cenral school, the board have let the contract for same, and the work is to be completed by September 1st. The cost, including architect's fees for this work, and also for preparing the heating and ventilating plans, which will be very useful in the future, and also including some electrical connecions which will be necessary for ventilation and for incidental work consequent upon tearing up the floors, etc., is estimated to be \$7,000.

2. The cost of King George school on Rawdon street, to date is \$52,302, and there is yet to be provided seats and furnishings, sidewarks and other conveniences, which will cost about \$2,698.00, making a total cost for land, building and equipment of \$55,000. As by debentures issued under By-law No. 1261, there remains still \$5,000

3. The Board ask that a by-law be passed authorizing the issue of de-bentures to cover the two sums named, agregating in all \$12,000."




