RAILWAY DAMAGES.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA COUNTY OF LUNENBURG. In the matter of the appraisal of damages for lands taken for the Nova Scotia Central Railway. We the undersigned arbitrators duly appointed for the purpose of making said appraisal under the provisions of an Act passed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia on the 19th day of May, A. D. 1891, Entitled, "An Act to repeal Chapter 65 of the Acts of 1880, and to amend Chapter 40, of the Acts of 1873 and amending Acts." Having been first duly sworn pursuant to the requirements of said Act, have appraised the lands, values and damages mentioned in said Act. And we do hereby value, appraise and fix the same, and we do hereby adjudge and persons entitled to lands, buildings, properties and appurtenances taken for the said railway for its tracks and stations, the several sums of money set opposite their respective names as compensation for lands, buildings, trees, damages for loss or impairment of access, easements, privileges and appurtenances, as well prospective as present, including loss for delay of payments. And we do make and publish this as our award under the provisions of said Act. Given under our hands, at Lunenburg in the County of Lunenburg, this 28th day of August, A. D. 1891.

that in my opinion the Town of Lunenburg is entitled to damages for lands taken for the railway within the limits of the town to the amount of eight hundred dollars. As the other Arbitrators, or a majority of them, do not agree that the town is entitled to be paid for these lands, or that the county should be divided upon to pay any person or body of persons for them, they are not included in the foregoing award, and I am consequently obliged to append this minority report concerning them.
