## TWO MILLIONS STARVING IN CHINA

### An Alarming Report as to Famine Conditions Among the Chinese: Half a Million Dollars Needed at Once.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Unless relieved, 2,000,000 people in China will die of starvation predicts American Consul-General Wilder at Shanghai, in a cablegram today to the American National Red Cross Society. He appeals for quick assistance for the suffering people, and says that a half million dollars is needed immediately. There will be no crops until the last of May, and Chinese relief is inadequate. The scenes in the famine district are

horrifying. Children are being given away by the afflicted people. Dead lie by the roadsides and the misery of the sufferers is being increased by severe cold and snow. The famine area stretches over a territory of 300 to 150 miles, close to the plague district. The Shanghai relief committee, which has been formed to alleviate the conditions of the starving inhabitants, is trustworthy, the Consul-General adds.

## AGED BY ASSAULTED NEWCASTLE STREET

### In Broad Moonlight, and Early in the Evening—Rescued Just in Time to Prevent Most Serious Consequences.

Between nine o'clock and half past nine on Saturday evening, in the bright moonlight which was almost as light as day, Mrs. Harvey Phinney, here from the West on a visit to her sister, Mrs. T. W. Crocker, was, while taking a short walk around the block, assaulted on the Opera House lane by a young man apparently very much under the influence of liquor. The villain had followed her down King street, and into the lane, and as she stood aside to let him pass he pushed her off the sidewalk, knocking her down into the snow, and brutally assaulting her while Mrs. Phinney was bravely defending herself in spite of his efforts to smother her cries. Miss Jean Allen, who was passing near, discovered what was going on and called a neighbor, Miss Gifford,

who immediately ran to Mrs. Phinney's assistance, the brute retreating quickly. Mrs. Phinney was escorted home by Miss Gifford and was nearly exhausted. She has since been confined to her bed with nervous prostration due to the attempted outrage. Had rescue been delayed the result would probably have been fatal. Mrs. Phinney, although much younger in appearance, is about seventy years of age, and came east to recuperate her health. Although badly shaken up she is in a fair way to recover her usual strength. From the lady's description of her assailant, suspicion fell upon Patrick Carroll, aged twenty years, and he was arrested yesterday and lodged in jail.

## JAS. H. WILBUR

### Prominent Western Hotel Keeper Dead in the West.

Mr. James H. Wilbur, a native of Newcastle and son of the one-time proprietor of the hotel in Newcastle, afterwards known as the Waverly and also of the Wilbur House in Bathurst and a hotel of the same name in Woodstock, but lately proprietor of the Ellis House in Manitowish, died a few days ago. Mr. Wilbur was about 45 years of age and was one of the most popular young men of Woodstock. He came to Woodstock with his father from Bathurst in 1886, and his father bought out and continued the Wilbur House until his death. His son formed a partnership with H. L. Stevenson in 1900 in the management of the Albert Hotel, but a few years after went west where he has been a successful hotel keeper.

## MOOSE VANISHING FROM MAINE

That moose are vanishing from the big game wilds of Maine is the opinion of guides and hunters, notwithstanding the big kill of the 1910 open season. A very respected and aged resident of Red Bank passed away at her home, Feb. 6th. The deceased had almost reached her 78th birthday and had only been confined to her bed but a few weeks, but her death was unexpected to those around her. Her loss will be deeply lamented not only to her own family but by all friends and acquaintances. She leaves to mourn her loss five sons, five daughters, five sisters, one brother, thirty-five grand-children and eight great-grand-children, viz. Allen, Albert and Percy of Redbank, Alexander and Mervin of Mosqui and Dunton, Colo., Mrs. Phebe Barret of Methuen, Mass., Mrs. John Whitney of Whitneyville, Mrs. John Jardine of Allison Settlement and Mrs. Chas. Mullin and Mrs. Wm. McAllister of Redbank, Mrs. Wm. Matchett, Mrs. Peter Russell, Mrs. Robert Holmes, Mrs. John Holmes, and Mrs. Margaret McAllister, Mr. Wm. Johnston of Lyttleton. The funeral service at the house and grave was conducted by the Revs. Worden and Mowatt, interment took place in Whitneyville cemetery.

## LITTLE TWINS FREEZE TO DEATH

Woodstock, N. B., Feb. 11.—Two twins, aged two years, children of Alfred Lyons, who lived near Littleton, Me., twelve miles from Woodstock, died yesterday from exposure to the cold. Three other children of Lyons had their hands amputated. While the parents were away the house was burned and the children forced out, suffering terribly from the frost. They escaped the fire and toddled to the house of the nearest neighbor, but the people were not home and the little ones were found half frozen when the folks arrived.

## VACCINATION AGAINST TYPHOID

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 7.—The first inoculation for the prevention of typhoid in Ottawa was successfully made on Saturday when J. A. Macleod, submitted himself to the treatment at the hands of Dr. Laidlaw. This form of vaccination as a guard against fever is comparatively little known, but was employed with great success at several encampments of the United States army. The patient, after the anti-toxin is administered exhibits for a couple of days all the symptoms of typhoid, but these pass away leaving him in his usual state of health. Mr. Macleod is today quite recovered from its effects.

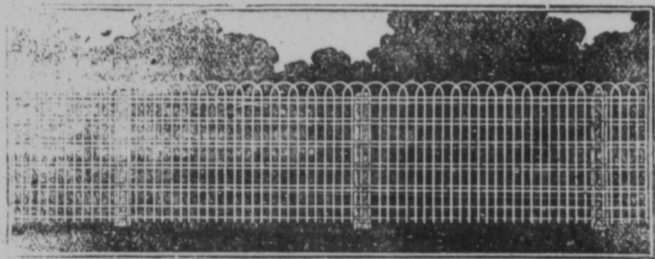

**INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY TENDER**

Sealed tenders, addressed to the undersigned, and marked on the outside "Tender for Buildings," will be received up to and including Wednesday, February 15th, 1911, for the purchase and removal from the railway property of certain buildings in the town of Chatham, N. B.

**CONDITIONS**

The Railway reserves the materials in foundations below the sites of the buildings.

The buildings must be entirely moved off the Railway property on or before the first day of May next.

A plan showing the location of the buildings and descriptive list may be seen, and forms of tender and specification for removal, may be obtained at the office of the chief Engineer, Moncton, N. B., and also at the office of the station master at Chatham, N. B.

A tender made for all or any of the buildings.

Each tender must be accompanied by a cheque equal to the amount of the tender. This cheque must be marked "Accepted" by the bank on which it is drawn, and made payable to the Honorable Minister of Railways and Canals.

If the tender is not accepted the cheque will be returned.

The Railway Department will not be bound to accept the highest or any tender.

All the conditions of the specification must be complied with.

**NEW METHODS NEEDED.**

(Graphic.)

Is there any reason why the School Trustees should hold their meetings in secret? We ask this question owing to the fact that at present the Board deliberate in the office of the Secretary who has notified the GRAPHIC that he will not allow their representative in HIS office to report the proceedings. It has always been understood that the School Board was a public body acting for the public weal, and as such would seek all the publicity they could get, but in our Trustees' case it seems the reverse. If the Secretary is acting on behalf of the Board what right have they to refuse the privilege of the press? We are here for the express purpose of reporting the proceedings of all public meetings for the benefit of the general public; and for the good of the parents as well as the benefit of the School Board we consider these reports should be made, therefore if the Trustees continue to meet in the privacy of some person's office, such meeting is not constituted as a public meeting. This matter we put before the ratepayers as it seems to be a very high-handed proceeding, and if the Board are at fault we ask them to remedy the matter at once by meeting in one of the many public places they can have for the asking; if however it is the over-zealousness of the Secretary, we leave that to the Trustees and would like to know why he can use the authority of the School Trustees to do as he likes. To go further, legislation should be sought to change the manner of election to the Board. The ratepayers have no direct representation on the School Board and as a result have no say in the matter as to whom they would desire to represent them. Even allowing the three members appointed by Government to remain, the others should be elected by ballot in the same way as the Town Councillors. This is the procedure in lands beyond the sea, and it has always been found to work well, the best men being approached and only those who were interested in education coming forward as Candidates.

The Conservative members of the Public Accounts Committee in Parliament are being obstructed in their efforts to solve the mystery of the changed telegram which caused some \$30,000 of dredging to be done at Dalhousie, N. B., when it was intended that the work should be done at Bathurst, the work at Bathurst also being done by the interested firm and paid for by the Government. This sort of thing happens so often that it might almost be thought members of Parliament had a personal interest in preventing the people from knowing how and why their money was mis-spent.

#### NOT ANTAGONISTIC

The reciprocity agreement and the British preference are not hostile each to the other. They may even become close working partners. It was a far-sighted view to which Sir Richard Cartwright gave expression fourteen years ago when, on the introduction of the British preference, he said:

"It may well be that the States at a while, after second, sober, better thought, will consent to treat with us and maybe with England on better terms than they have heretofore treated. Sir I do say that it is a great step if our proposition is responded to toward making the British Empire a reality as well as a name. I say that it is a great step toward the federation of all the countries that owe allegiance to the British Crown, and I repeat, even at the risk of some misconception, that I am not without hope that in its ultimate issue it may lead to a practical alliance between all the members of the English race."

The frank acceptance by the United States of the Canadian policy of preference to the Motherland and the making of a reciprocity agreement that does not interfere with the British preference are events of the utmost importance in world-politics, and do much to justify the prophecy of Sir Richard.—Toronto Globe.

#### MILITARISM DENOUNCED.

That the representatives of more than a million organized workers voted unanimously at Leicester, England, recently, for a resolution denouncing militarism and war and declaring for the arbitration of all international disputes is heartening news. It was at a special conference for disarmament prior to the annual conference of the Labor party that this action was taken, and Keir Hardie's resolution, in favor of the universal strike as a means of preventing war, was defeated by only six votes.

A clause of the resolution adopted calls upon the workers of Great Britain to take organized action with their fellow-workers in Germany and elsewhere to bring about disarmament and the reduction of militaristic burdens. There is a significant warning in this to statesmen of all nations, for this means that English working men have taken precisely the same position as the followers of Bebel in Germany, that is if the politicians cannot stop the frightful waste of preparation for war, the people will. There could be no more gratifying evidence of the advance of the working classes, so long the helpless and hapless "Kanonenfutter" of those in high places. For them war means only misery and death without glory or real reward, and the piling up of burdens for future generations.—St. John Standard.

#### JOSEPH McMASTER

The sudden death occurred at the home of James Sullivan, Kouchibouguac, on the 4th inst., of Joseph McMaster, one of the oldest residents of that village. Mr. McMaster retired on Friday evening in his usual health, but when Mr. Sullivan entered his room to awaken him in the morning he found him in a dying condition. Mr. Sullivan at once summoned the other members of the family and in a few minutes Mr. McMaster passed away. He is survived by two brothers, Thomas and James, who reside at Black River, Northumberland county. The funeral at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. G. G. Livingstone.

#### SHEEP OR DOGS

If Farmers Want to Raise Sheep They Must Look After the Dogs Better.

At the meeting of the Commissioners appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate the Sheep Industry, at Woodstock Thursday, the general opinion was that the only reason why sheep-growing had declined in this country was the number of sheep killed by dogs. Some ten years ago, in one season, 500 sheep were killed in the neighborhood of Woodstock by dogs. Many farmers have since gone out of the sheep business.

#### NOT ENFORCED.

The local government passed a good law against dogs, but it was in the power of the county councils to allow dogs to be kept, and the law is unworkable to a considerable extent, owing to the permission so given. There is no way to get compensation for losses. Farmers would go into sheep-raising at once if they were free from the depredations of dogs.

W. W. Hubbard said he had never yet been able to get a meeting of farmers to vote for dog tax. The popular sentiment of farmers was against a dog tax. They seem to prefer dogs to sheep. There was at present a tax of \$5 on bitches. It is the duty of the county councils to collect the tax on bitches, but he knew of no council that was enforcing it. He felt that if the county councils would enforce the dog tax, sheep growing would materially improve in this country. The commissioners on Saturday held a meeting in Bathurst.

#### VICTIMS OF CONSUMPTION.

MOTHER AND TWO CHILDREN AT MUSKOKA FREE HOSPITAL.

Are Now Under Treatment—Husband, Too, Had Been a Patient—A Tragedy in Real Life—Heavy Debt on Institution.

A story from the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives tells of a mother who, with her two children, is now under treatment in that institution. The husband had been a patient, but the case was an advanced one when the patient entered, and he has since passed away. There is little doubt but that the wife was infected as a result of caring for her husband, and now she is in the Muskoka Hospital. Her little girl, about five years of age, and a boy of ten are with her, both being afflicted with this dread disease.

The words of the mother are pathetic. She writes: "I went to a doctor and got him to examine my lungs to see whether there was anything wrong with them, and he said that the right lung was affected. A little rest, he hoped, would build me up. I have a little girl, about five years old, and the doctor says that if I could take her up with me it would do her ever so much good, as she is not very strong. I have three more children, and one of these, a boy of ten, seems also to be afflicted, and it is advisable that he should enter the hospital."

These three are of the 104 patients who are residents in this deserving institution and being cared for without money and without price. The sorry part of it is that the trustees are carrying a debt of something like \$40,000, incurred largely through the additions that have been made within the past year, and that have more than doubled the accommodation of the institution, together with the heavy cost of maintaining so large a number of free patients. ### PULPMEN'S WAGES

#### WILL BE PAID

Orders authorizing the Miramichi Pulp Mills liquidators to pay the wages due the employees, and also authorizing them to sell the property of the company, were issued by Mr. Justice Barry at Fredericton on Wednesday. The liquidators are W. B. Snowball, of Chatham, and A. H. Hanington, K. C., of St. John. Mr. Keyes has offered to advance the funds required to pay the employees and all other creditors. The offer has been accepted by the liquidators, and nobody except Mr. Keyes will lose any money on the company. The sale of the company's property will not recompense for the amount involved. Judge Barry's order allows the liquidators to grant an option on the property for three months at \$345,000, \$15,000 to be deposited within 30 days. If the option is not executed, this amount will be forfeited.
