### Regular Meeting Town Council

The last Regular meeting of the present Town Council was held in the Police Court room on Thursday April 15th.

Present—Mayor Doyle, Ald. Crocker, Durick, Fish, Jeffrey, Mackay and Russell.

On motion Captain Barry was heard before the Council, and stated that unless the Local Government would consent to bear one half the cost of maintaining the employment bureau service in the Province, it would probably be discontinued, as the Dominion Government would only pay one half.

He also advanced a number of reasons for its continuation and outlined some of its benefits.

It was moved by Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Crocker and carried that a committee of three be appointed to draw up and forward to the Government, a resolution urging a continuation of the service, on motion the Mayor and Ald. Durick and Crocker were appointed such committee. On motion of Ald. Russell, seconded by Ald. Jeffrey the following resolution was unanimously adopted, viz:—Whereas on the twenty-seventh day of March last, it was necessary to borrow temporarily the sum of \$3000.00 to meet the current expenditures of the Town until such time as the rates and taxes are collected for this year, and whereas under the authority of the Town Council the Mayor and Town Treasurer did on the said day borrow on behalf of the said Town the said sum temporarily from the Royal Bank of Canada for the said purpose and in anticipation of the said taxes, and made the promissory note of the said Town for the said sum payable to the said Royal Bank of Canada, on demand with interest at 6% per annum. Be it therefore resolved that the said borrowing and the making of the said note be and the same are hereby accepted, adopted and confirmed as the act, obligation and note of the Town of Newcastle, and that as soon as the said rates and taxes or so much thereof as are necessary are collected that the said sum so borrowed be repaid by the said Town to the said Bank.

On motion of Ald. Durick seconded by Ald. Crocker the council resolved itself into a committee of the whole to consider the bill of H. A. Russell for a refund for labor expended in Sewerage on Jane St. in 1917.

On the Council re-assembling Ald. Fish, Chairman reported that the Committee of the whole would recommend the payment of \$120.85 to H. A. Russell as a refund on account of expenditure made by him on sewerage on Jane St. in 1917. On motion of Ald. Fish seconded by Ald. Durick this report was adopted and the bill ordered paid.

Ald. Durick presented a report from the Public Works Committee recommending the expenditure of more money in permanent streets and if necessary a bond issue for the purpose if the rate payers so decided. This report was received, adopted and ordered filed.

The Mayor thanked the members of the Council for their assistance and cooperation during the past year Adjourned.

The Civic Election is being held today in the Town Hall, the polls being open from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Mayor D. P. Doyle, who was the only candidate for Mayor was elected by acclamation on Friday 16th inst. Five of last year's council viz: Ald. A. H. Mackay, P. Russell, Wm. L. Durick, R. W. Crocker and Thos. J. Jeffrey Jr., are in the field again and five new men viz:—Edward Dalton, John Witzell, John G. Kethro, William White and H. D. Atkinson are also aspirants for this year's council. Messrs Chas. Sargeant, A. J. Ritchie and C. E. Fish of last year's council are not re-offering their services this year. There being no contest for the Mayoralty, enthusiasm is lacking, and in consequence as large an amount in default taxes will not be collected. It is expected that the vote cast will be a small one, due to the lack of interest which is being shown in town affairs.

The Secretary reported a short course in Domestic Science would be held in the Household Science rooms, Chatham, April 27th, May 7th to which all members of Institutes were invited.

MONTREAL, April 19—With touch of Spring weather prevailing here to day overall movement secured its first adherent. A prominent business man was seen to walk the streets to his office clad like a janitor, with a very dingy coat and hat to round off his overalls.

### Conservative Party Conference In May

Ottawa, April 15—Announcement that the supporters of the federal Conservative party intends to hold a Dominion-wide conference around the tenth of next month was made here tonight by Hon. Robert Rogers former Minister of Public Works in the Borden Government. Interviewed by the Canadian Press, Mr. Rogers stated that all arrangements have been completed for a great-get-together movement.

"During the last few months," said the ex-Minister, "Liberal Conservative organizations in different provinces have been discussing the advisability of a Dominion-wide organization such as we had in 1911. This discussion has borne fruit. It has been decided to hold a round table conference in Toronto on or about the tenth of May next. The delegates to this conference will be selected from the duly organized ranks of the Liberal-Conservative Party in all the provinces of Canada. It will be a national conference of the moving spirits of the Liberal Conservative Party. It will have the advantage of compactness and may be expected to transact business with despatch."

"It is perhaps too soon," continued Mr. Rogers, "to discuss policy but in a general way it may be said that the policy that was good enough for Sir John MacDonald and Sir George Etienne Cartier is good enough for us. This policy which has always governed the actions of the Liberal Conservative Party we could consecrate anew in the hearts and minds of the Canadians bringing up to date, of course as MacDonald and Cartier would do if they were alive today, and putting it abreast of the wonderful opportunities which present them selves to develop our tremendous natural resources."

"This great policy," Mr. Rogers continued, "the national policy, whose magic name, its opponents are trying to steal, has stood the test of forty years. It is a common sense policy and never in Canada's history has there been greater need of courage and common sense on the part of Canada's rulers than there is today. If Canada is to be saved from disaster then disunion, disorganization and distrust must disappear and a policy pursued which will insure stability to Government. We believe that the old policy, with certain necessary modern improvements, is the policy to preserve our Canadian heritage, for the Canadian people. Only by according justice to all classes and all sections can we hope to promote general good feeling and build up our country on a durable foundation."

"Our policy," Mr. Rogers concluded, "does not lose sight of the age-long principles on which civilization has always flourished. We respect every man's right to the reward of his efforts. The measure of that reward is the measure of the quality and extent of his endeavors. While keeping abreast of true democracy we must adhere the false. We have only to look at Russia to realize the disaster which results when private enterprise and intelligence are denied their legitimate rewards."

**Salvation Army Works In Berlin**

Officer Just Returned Tells Of Desperate Conditions Prevailing Among The Poor

Desperate conditions among the poor in Berlin, due to the scarcity of food and also to the inadequate housing facilities, are described by Major Walter B. Mabson, Editorial Secretary of the Salvation Army, who has just returned from four months spent in Germany. "The people in Berlin are rationed more strictly now than ever before," he said, "and the quantity of food allowed has been cut down to less than the lowest wartime ration. As the Salvation Army workers are in constant contact with the very poorest of the poor in Berlin, I had opportunity to learn of the real conditions in that city while I was there. The lack of a sufficient supply of milk for the babies is producing the most serious results.

**Deformed Infants**

War's deprivations have just begun to manifest themselves in a most terrible form. The number of deformed infants born, especially among the poor, is appalling. For the treatment of these, and of the feeble offspring of undernourished mothers, the municipal authorities have taken over one of the largest hospitals in Berlin. "Throughout Germany the milk supply is sufficient for only forty-eight per cent. of the children under six years of age. No child over six can be given milk except on a physician's certificate. There is almost no fresh milk; practically all being either condensed or evaporated.

England has now taken up in earnest the problem of providing nourishing food for the German babies. The British Government has appropriated \$25,000 for milk for the little ones, chiefly those in Berlin, where the need is greatest. The Salvation Army has set aside an equal amount for the same purpose. The distribution of the milk made available by both these funds is to be made by the Salvation Army

"The first cargo had reached Hamburg just before I left, and the German Government had granted the Salvation Army free transportation for that shipment and for all supplies of milk that might follow. Lieut. Colonel Braine, of the Salvation Army International Headquarters, is directing the distribution and is being assisted by the German Salvationists in Berlin.

"Two conditions make the situation bad for the adults in Berlin. The German potato crop was seriously injured by an early frost last fall; and the poor are now forced to live chiefly upon turnips and beets. This was their diet during a good part of the war; but just now the supply is lower than ever before and the rationing more skimmed.

Because of the great rush of people to Berlin from the country districts during the war, that city found itself with a population of 4,000,000 when hostilities ceased; and there were adequate housing

**Finger Prints Show "Crippled" Man's Bad Record**

Again evidencing the value of the Bertillon finger print method of detecting and ascertaining the records of the various prisoners who from time to time come before the police courts, Chief Rideout was on Wednesday in receipt of a communication from E. Foster, Inspector of the Bertillon department at Ottawa, relative to the record of one George MacDonald, who a short time ago was arrested by the Moncton police and charged with begging in the public streets. MacDonald at the time represented himself as having a crippled arm, and with the aid of his alleged misfortune, got next to the purses of a goodly number of residents until one got suspicious and called in an officer. He was brought before Sitting Magistrate MacDougall and given a fine of \$25 or in default, three months in jail. The following communication is self explanatory:

Sir—I beg to inform you that George MacDonald, who was on April 9, 1920, at Moncton, N. E., convicted on a charge of begging and sentenced to 3 months in default of \$25 fine, is, according to his finger prints identical with our No. 3168 George McDon all whose criminal record is as follows:

- 1910—July 15, Berlin, Ont., false pretences, 6 months Ontario Reformatory.
  - 1910—November 10, London, Ont., vagrancy, 6 months Ontario Reformatory.
  - 1913—May 23, Port Arthur, Ont., theft, 2 months jail.
  - 1915—May 18, Cornwall, Ont., vagrancy, suspended sentence.
  - 1915—October 15, London, Ont., theft, 1 month C. J.
  - 1919—June 16, Quebec, Que., drunkenness, 15 days Quebec goal.
- On the fingerprint form received from the Chief Constable, Cornwall, Ont., in May, 1915, it was stated that this man's fingers of his left hand were so badly doubled up as to make the securing of impressions of them impossible. **Light And Power Bill Before Committee**

The Corporations Committee met at 12 o'clock Thursday and took up consideration of the Bill to incorporate the Miramichi Light, Heat and Power Committee.

J. W. Brankley of the Miramichi Lumber Co. was heard. He said he had no objection to the Bill provided that the Company to be incorporated, be required to see that logs passed the dam was not sufficient. Men would have to be employed at the dam to see that logs went through.

Mr. Baxter suggested that the Company be required to move all logs through the dead water which would be created by the construction of the dam.

Alfred V. Tracey Gould one of the promoters of the Bill said that in the past sudden dropping of freshets had stranded many logs. The large body of water which would be held by the dam would greatly assist driving operations by regulating the flow after the freshet.

To Mr. Baxter, Mr. Brankley said that few log jams occurred above the proposed dam-site. This year about sixty million feet of lumber would be driven by that spot.

Mr. Tracey Gould said that the promoters of the Bill had no wish to interfere with the lumbermen.

Hon. Mr. Robinson said that at certain times the quantity of water used to develop power might not leave enough to operate the sluices.

Mr. Baxter suggested that the parties interested should enter privately and reach an agreement in a section.

Mr. Tracey Gould said that he could have no objection to the insertion of the clause providing that the dam should be built on the existing dam-site as authorized in the past. He was willing to provide other booms.

Mr. Brankley suggested that the

power company should provide sheer booms to lead the logs through the sluices. All he wanted was to make sure that the logs would get over the dam. He would like the Company to provide men at the head of the sluices.

Mr. Baxter said the Company had placed itself under stronger obligations to keep the drives moving than might be required of it by the use of the words "By every way possible." If there should not be sufficient water to float the logs over the sluices the Company would have to shut down its plant.

Donald Fraser said he had no objection to the Bill if logs could pass the dam. He thought the Power Co. should pass the logs over the dam and be responsible for any log jams which might occur below the dam. He further thought lumbermen should be protected against breakage of logs in passing the dam.

Hon. Mr. Foster said that he was convinced that the bill gave the lumbermen all protection required.

Mr. Tilley pressed for an agreement between the parties interested before action should be taken by the committee. On his motion the section was stood over for further consideration and the delegation with drew.

**The Premier's View**

Hon. Mr. Foster raised the question whether it was advisable whether the development should be permitted under a private corporation or undertaken by the Government. There were many questions to be considered. One was the limit which might be placed on the issue of securities and it was possible that legislation might be introduced requiring the assent of the Public Utilities Company before it be permitted to issue securities. There also was the question of royalties. It was his opinion that the entire matter should be reported on by experts and that the legislature should await a report by the Water-powers Commission before taking action.

Andrew Wheaton, contractor was called before the Committee and said that he was prepared to make a substantial investment in the project. There was no intention of exploiting the franchise.

After further consideration the Bill was referred for private consideration.

The Committee adjourned at 1:20

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

**Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.**

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

**General Instructions.**

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

**Penalty**

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months imprisonment or to both such fine and imprisonment.





A Wonderful Fishing Region



THE rivers and lakes in the vicinity of Cranbrook, British Columbia, on the Nest line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, are happy and prolific haunts for lovers of fishing. All these waters are well stocked with mountain or cut throat trout, rainbow trout, Dolly Varden trout, bull trout, landlocked salmon, Kamloops trout. Excellent fishing is made in the fishing season. Equally most amongst the fishing waters of this region are: St. Mary's Lake and river, Kootenay River, Moyle Lake and river, Gold Creek, Cherry Creek, Perry Creek Lake, Doyle's Lake, and Premier Lake. Perhaps the favorite rendezvous is Premier Lake. This lake is situated about thirty-eight miles from Cranbrook. It is three and a half miles long and one mile wide. Mountains surround it on every side, and it is very deep. There is no visible outlet for the waters. Springs that rise adjacent to the lake and streams from the mountain sides gush to rest in its placid bed.

On August 12th, 1915, the Game Conservation Board of the Eastern District of British Columbia furnished Premier Lake, along the Kootenay Central Railway, a branch of the C. P. R., with 10,000 Kamloops trout fry, each one then being about three-quarters of an inch long. A prophecy was made that the fry within four years would develop into fish weighing between twelve and thirty pounds. The accompanying illustration shows some of the fish caught when three years old.

**Spraying**

If the fruit grower, vegetable grower, or flower grower does not spray nowadays, he is almost certain to have inferior products in his orchard, small fruit plantation and garden. There are so many injurious insects and diseases which affect a large proportion of the plants he grows that if they are uncontrolled there will either be no crop left or else the value of the crop will be very much reduced.

There are few of these insects and diseases which have been discovered during the past twenty-five or thirty years and which have been well tested by many experiments. Spraying must, however, be thoroughly done if good results are to be obtained. Materials are expensive, and the cost of labour is high, and money will be wasted if the work is improperly done or not done at the right time.

The early sprayings are, a rule, the most important, and those who contemplate spraying as all should who have orchards or gardens, should get everything in readiness to begin at the right time as delay may mean much loss. Spray Calendars are issued by the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture, in which several sprayings are recommended to be applied at certain stages in the development of the leaves, flowers, and fruit. In the case of fruit trees the spray should be applied so that every leaf, bud, and fruit will, if possible, receive some of the material, not only on one part of it but as nearly all over as possible. Every leaf, flower and bud or young fruit missed means a possible starting point for disease or insect pests. In the case of vegetables promptness in the application of a good spray is just as important as with fruits. One does not need to be convinced of the value of promptness in using poisons in controlling the Colorado potato beetle as the results of the spray are immediately apparent in the death of the "bugs", but more faith is required when dealing with diseases and insects which are not so readily seen but which do much harm, and usually the grower is well rewarded for such faith.

The formulae for the mixtures and solutions recommended should be followed as closely as possible. If a man knows the chemical composition of the materials he uses, and has made a study of spraying, he may alter them slightly to meet certain circumstances, but if he knows little about them he should follow closely the instructions given on the Spray Calendar. He should, also, spray as early as possible at the time suggested. A delay of a few days may mean practically the loss of the mixture or solution used as there might be no return for the labour and expense. Write to either the Dominion or Provincial Departments of Agriculture for a Spray Calendar.

**Says The Outlook Is Excellent For Prohibition Law**

A meeting of the executive of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance was held in St. John. A good deal of important business was transacted. The secretary, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, presented his report which was accepted as quite satisfactory. This report follows:

To the members of the sub executive: I began work in July, 1919. The work has been that of education and organization in the interests of prohibition of the liquor traffic in this province, the purpose being to organize every polling district previous to the referendum vote.

Meetings have been held as follows and in nearly all cases organization has been completed.

Sunbury county includes Minto (Northfield), Mangerville, Blackville Corner (Sheffield), Russiagornis (Lindsay), Oromocto and Geary (Burton), Patterson Settlement (Blissfield), and Fredericton Junction, Gladstone York County—Devon, Kingsley, Nashwaakia, Fredericton, Penniac, Marysville and other points previously organized.

Queens county—Gagetown, Chipman and Newcastle Bridge. Charlotte county—Every parish is organized including St. James, St. Stephen, St. David's, Dumbarton, St. George, St. Patrick, Clarendon, Penn Seal and Lepreaux.

Kings county—Hatfield Point, Beulah, Springfield, Belleisle Creek, Penobscue, Sunsex, Hampton Village, Midland and Bloomfield.

Albert county—Hillsboro, Albert Mines, Curryville, Hopewell Cape, Hopewell Hill, Albert, Waterside, Harvey, Alma provided for.

Westmorland county—Moncton provided for, Sunny Brae, Point du Bute, Dorchester, Sackville provided for, Port Elgin, Balfield, Salisbury, Petticoat.

Kent county—Buctouche, McKee's Mills, Coates Mills. Northumberland county—Rogersville, Chalmersford, Nelson, Upper Derby, Lower Derby, Newcombe, Millerton, Chatham, Blackville, Boscawen, Douglastown, Loggieville, Red bank, Black River provided for.

Auxiliary associations are established at St. John, Newcastle, Fredericton, Sunsex, besides various temperance orders affiliated with the alliance.

In almost every county in the province there is an organized county branch of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance.

In visiting a community I have been careful to see as many as possible of the local clergy and leading laymen of all denominations. The cooperation and assistance of the clergy has aided much in the progress of the work and also in its success. Indeed, it has been most gratifying to have the cooperation of

the Catholic priests are in favor with our work.

In general, I may report that there is in favor of the continuance of the prohibition law a very general consensus of public opinion, which awaits a stirring call to action as the date of the poll draws near. In spite of adverse influences, such as the lemon extract abuse, the boot leggers, the few unsympathetic newspapers, the few disloyal doctors, and first importation of liquor for personal use since January 1, the people generally are so impressed by the very evident improvement in domestic happiness, business prosperity and general wellbeing, all following prohibition, the vote is sure to have a large majority in favor of the law. Practically all the churches have officially declared themselves in support of the act.

While much remains to be done to complete the organization of the rest of the province, the prospects are bright that this will be satisfactorily accomplished.

**Sir Robert Expected Back In 3 Weeks**

Current talk in the Parliament lobbies is to the effect that Sir Robert Borden will be back in Ottawa in about three weeks. Word has been received that his health is fast improving and that he expects to be back by the beginning of the second week in May. Sir Robert is at present recuperating in the South.



Winnipeg, Man.—The first paper bag manufacturing company in the west will be established here in the near future. The Western Canada Paper Bag Co. is at present being organized by A. Seabrook...

Charlottetown, P.E.I.—With the slogan of "Spend your vacation in Canada" being taken up everywhere, Prince Edward Island is looking forward to a large holiday traffic and a great influx of visitors.

Virden, Man.—Dairying is making rapid strides in Manitoba. In 1912 55 cars of creamery butter were imported; in 1913 the number dropped to 35; and in 1914 to 20 cars...

St. John's, Nfld.—The Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who has just returned from the United Kingdom and Europe, states that great interest in Newfoundland affairs is being taken in England and that capitalists are more inclined than ever to embark on the exploitation of the colony's natural resources.

Halifax, N. S.—Arrangements have been made to employ a wireless equipped fisheries protection cruiser during the coming season for the purpose of scouting mackerel in order that fishermen may be advised of the arrival of schools, their location, approximate size and direction and movement.

Montreal, P.Q.—A total sum of \$5,093,120 was realized at the fur auction sales here. Prices were proportionately higher than at the New York and St. Louis sales, beaver bringing as high as \$109 each, minkskin \$150, muskrat \$7.50, wolf \$45.25, white fox \$70.00, sitch \$3.30, lynx \$62.50, fisher \$345.00, all-fox \$1,225.00.

Victoria, B. C.—Canadian Holstein cattle are highly regarded in Australia, according to H. A. Simmons, who recently delivered a small herd of these cattle there. He claims that the Holsteins bred in the Antipodes are not as good as the Canadian bred stock and is making preparations to assemble another herd for export.

Regina, Sask.—More settlers are coming into Saskatchewan from the United States this spring than at any time since the outbreak of the war, according to figures which have been received by local C.P.R. officials. While this influx is considerable, it is said by these same railwaymen to be nothing to what may be expected later in the summer. During the first three weeks of the month twenty settlers arrived here from U. S. points on their way to land they had taken up. Five carloads of settlers' effects were registered at Portal as passing through to points in the province and twenty-three cars to Alberta points. Settlers are also coming through Kingsgate and Emerson, the traffic at the latter place being particularly heavy and as many as 46 carloads of effects passing through the port of entry in a day.

NEWSPRINT MAY GO TO \$100 PER TON

Toronto, April 23.—The Toronto World, tomorrow morning will publish an interview with J. G. Gibson, of Gibson and Gibson, representing the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills to the effect that there is no truth in a rumor that the paper output in this country will be cornered in American interests. Mr. Gibson is quoted as stating that newsprint will increase in value, but the Canadian publishers will be looked after. More than eighty per cent of the customers of the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills Company are in the United States, Mr. Gibson said, "and naturally the greatest supply must go where the market is." He added that newsprint will probably go to \$100 a ton.

The Use Of Nitro-Cultures

In the report of the Dominion Botanist for the year ending March 31, 1915, he says:—"During the last month of the year", viz., December 1914, "it was deemed advisable for this division to prepare nitro-cultures of alfalfa, red clover and peas for distribution to the branch farms."

Such was the genesis of the present system of free distribution of nitro-cultures to farmers, begun in the following season of 1916, and now entering its fifth year.

The branch farms, by their example and reports, and the ocular demonstration to visitors given in the condition of their leguminous crops, started the demand of the farming public for these cultures, which it is our endeavour to stimulate, guide aright, and, to the best of our capacity, satisfy.

For the benefit of those farmers, who have not yet studied this question, we propose to briefly explain the term "nitro-culture."

Since the time of the Romans it has been known that the introduction into a crop rotation of a legum that is, one of the plants belonging to the family Leguminosae, of which the most important members from the farming view point are clover, peas, beans, and vetches, somehow or other, greatly benefited other crops. It is only within the last few years that the explanation has been discovered.

The Legumes, as a family in the vegetable kingdom, generally bear on their rootlets small nodules or bumps, of the size of a pin heads upward. Microscopic study has shown that these nodules contain numerous small organisms, known as bacteria. These organisms belong to a particular group with a number of definite strains, each strain apparently confining itself strictly to a particular plant or group of plants. A long series of subsequent experimenting has proved that these bacteria convert the nitrogen of the air into a chemical form which the plant or group of plants can readily assimilate. The association is short of plant and bacteria is decidedly beneficial both to the legumes and the soil. The net result, at the end of the season, is a valuable addition of nitrogen to the farmer's field, at practically no expense.

Now "nitro-cultures" are simply collections of these bacteria ready for use. The proper bacteria are isolated from all others, grown on artificial soil, consisting of a jelly made from an oriental seaweed mixed with chemical salts, and then bottled for sending out.

The farmer, when he receives the cultures, breaks up the jelly, shakes it up with some skim milk or sugar water, and wets his seeds with the resulting liquid. This distributes the bacteria over the seeds, which, when dry, are sown; and, so, plant and bacteria are brought into intimate contact from the very commencement of growth.

Nitro-cultures are prepared by the Division of Botany for alfalfa and sweet clover, red and alsike clovers and peas, and are put up in bottles containing sufficient bacteria for the treatment of about a bushel (50 lbs) of seed. Cultures are supplied free to farmers on application to the Division of Botany, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, Ontario, on their stating the crop for which culture is required, and the quantity of seed proposed to be treated. Only three dozen bottles in all, however, can be supplied to any one applicant.

Farmers Of Nova Scotia Organize Political Party

Truro, N. S. April 14—At the opening session of the farmers' convention held here today the resolution passed previously at Kentville that the farmers of the province form a political party to be known as the United Farmers of Nova Scotia was unanimously endorsed. The constitution of the United Farmers of Nova Scotia was subsequently adopted provisionally.

J. J. Morrison, secretary treasurer, United Farmers of Ontario, outlined the progress of farmers in Upper Canada. From a membership of 243 at the inaugural convention six years ago their membership is now 68,000 working jointly with the U. F. O., they have the farmers' co-operative association which handled trading interests.

Sulphide Pulp And Paper Mills For Province

The Frasers have sprung so many startling deals in the lumber industry lately, that people have become accustomed to the magnitude of their transactions and anything new from them, no matter how great or extensive its scope, is received as a "matter of course," and causes but little commotion in the industrial world.

A bill, entitled "An Act to Incorporate Fraser Paper Company, Limited," was introduced to the Legislature last week, which embodies a project that will doubtless prove the greatest yet undertaken by the Frasers. The capital stock of the proposed company is placed at \$5,000,000, divided into 50,000 shares of one hundred dollars each, but the company shall have power from time to time, to increase their capital stock to the sum of \$10,000,000.

is to be established an industry that will mean much to New Brunswick, that is a sulphite Pulp and paper mill. The Fraser Paper Company will take the raw material and manufacture it into the finished product of newsprint. For years pulp wood has been going from the province to New England States, the labor and markets of the States benefiting thereby. The new venture is purely a New Brunswick affair, and the mills are to be located in the Parish of Perth. It is expected one thousand hands will be required to operate the plants, and a new town is sure to spring up. It is estimated that the whole monetary outlay will be in the vicinity of \$15,000,000, and New Brunswick reaps the benefit.

Slight Opposition.

While there has been some objection made by fishing interests to any proposition to dam the Tobique waters in years past, it is not believed there will be any particularly strong organized effort against the Frasers project. The people in that vicinity, having faith in the Frasers, are convinced it would be more to their advantage to have a stable industry, such as the Frasers are to give them.

It can authoritatively be said the proposition has the very best of wishes from the owners of stumpage on the large areas tributary to the Tobique. There is no question but the project appeals to the public, and especially to the public in that vicinity.

If granted legislative sanction the company propose to at once begin work on their new enterprise. They agree to show an expenditure in development totalling a quarter of a million dollars before two years have elapsed, and to use all possible speed in pushing the work to completion.

## GENERAL NEWS IN BRIEF

**Vancouver, B. C.**—The February  
 catch of fish in the Fraser river  
 (shrike) district was valued at \$34,638.  
 This is almost double the catch for  
 the same month last year.

**Census, Sask.**—The Imperial Oil  
 Company has been awarded a claim on  
 forty sections of land south of here  
 long Battle Creek. Wells will be  
 sunk in the spring.

**Chicoutimi, P. Q.**—Work has been  
 commenced on the erection of the  
 model city of Saguenay by the Price  
 Bros. Company, which will cost  
 about \$20,000,000. It will contain  
 400 houses at the outset, built of  
 brick and will be electrically heated  
 and lighted.

**Huntingdon, B. C.**—Sumas Indian  
 Reserve, comprising 163 acres of  
 and watered by the Little Sumas,  
 has been purchased by the Soldier  
 Settlement Board for soldier settle-  
 ment and will be divided into four  
 farms.

**Winnipeg, Man.**—A sale of farm  
 land, amounting to a quarter of a  
 million dollars, was effected recent-  
 ly to Charles Applegate of Min-  
 neapolis, representing a number of  
 Iowa farmers. The land sold is in  
 the Humboldt district, and the pur-  
 chasers will arrive over the C.P.R.  
 in time to get the seed in this  
 spring.

**Toronto, Ont.**—Growing condition  
 in the province are reported on all  
 sides as very favorable, fall wheat  
 being in very good shape and pre-  
 parations for seeding well under  
 way. Fruit growers are optimistic  
 over the season's prospects. Many  
 farms are changing hands and wages  
 of farm help has reached the record  
 of from \$500 to 750 per year.

**Vancouver, B. C.**—The steel  
 freighter, S.S. "War Charger," built  
 by J. Coughlan and Sons, was recent-  
 ly sold to Greek operators for \$1,  
 800,000.

**Ottawa, Ont.**—It is expected by  
 industries interested that there will  
 be introduced at the present session  
 of parliament legislation permitting  
 private firms to manufacture in-  
 dustrial alcohol. This is at the pre-  
 sent a government monopoly and the  
 production is considerably short of  
 the supply, the patent industry among  
 others being badly affected.

**Asask, Sask.**—Gold was found in  
 a shallow well on a farm ten miles  
 west of here, and already twenty  
 five claims have been taken out in  
 the sector. The gold was assayed at  
 Calgary and declared to be the  
 genuine metal. The well is located  
 near an old creek or river bed and  
 is said to be ideally situated for  
 placer mining.

**Yorkton, Sask.**—Two local men  
 have started a Belgian horse farm  
 and secured their nucleus of seven  
 animals from George Hupp of Lamp-  
 man, famous all over the American  
 continent as a breeder of high-class  
 Belgians. They also purpose bring-  
 ing stock to the province from the  
 big farms of the United States.

**Quebec, P. Q.**—Five new agri-  
 cultural districts have been created  
 in the province for the advancement  
 and further development of modern  
 farming. These districts are sup-  
 plied with agricultural experts who  
 give advice on all branches of the  
 pursuit and encourage up-to-date  
 farming methods.

**Fredericton, N. B.**—An insistent  
 demand has been made that a  
 thorough investigation of the pos-  
 sibilities of harnessing the tides at  
 the head of the Bay of Fundy, as a  
 power development proposition, be  
 made. It is believed that with the  
 help of the railways the project  
 could be carried out successfully,  
 and some investigation work has  
 been undertaken.

**Fredericton, N. B.**—The transfer  
 of the crown lands held by the  
 estate of the late Sir William Van  
 Horne a former president of the  
 C.P.R. to the Dalhousie Lumber Co.,  
 a subsidiary of the International  
 Paper Co. of New York, has been  
 accomplished. The lands consist of  
 122 1/2 square miles in Northumber-  
 land County, on the Serpentine.

**Calgary, Alta.**—Arrangements have  
 been made by the Belgian govern-  
 ment for credits amounting to ten  
 million dollars for the purchase of  
 western Canadian cattle. Since the  
 signing of the armistice, a large  
 trade in livestock has been main-  
 tained with Belgium and France.

### BONE-DRY MOTION IN LOCAL HOUSE
