### WESTERN CATTLE IN EUROPE

Demand From United King Constant Since Lifting

Montreal.—Sounding a note of the strongest possible faith in, and optimism for, the future of the agriculturalist in Western Canada, Colonel H. A. Mullins, prominent rancher of Poplar Point, Manitoba, who arrived in Montreal on Sunday, submitted to an interview vestration.

mitted to an interview yesterday.

"The situation on the prairies is rapidly improving," the Colonel declared, "and the Westerner is taking courage. Moreover, many of those who in recent years left the farm are returning. I consider the tide who in recent years left the farm are returning. I consider the tide in Western Canada is beginning to turn strongly from the city to the farm once more. The three prairie provinces especially have a tremen-dous future, and, if due consideration is given to their particular needs, the realization of that future cannot be long deferred.

Asked to mention some of the influences which, in his opinion, would tend to hasten the Golden Age for Western Canada the Colonel unhesitatingly pleaded first for a better understanding between East and West

derstanding between East and West.
"The Western farmer can also do
a great deal to help himself," the
Colonel added. "I consistently advocate that all farmers out there
should go in for raising livestock as
well as other stuff, especially for
raising high-grade stock, and that
those now in that game should stick
to it. They should also story growed. They should also stop erowdto it. They should also stop erowding their shipments—and this applies not only to live lock but to other products, such as grain—into three months or so of the year. Then they won't find themselves forced to take low prices because of the rush, and things will be better for the country generally as well."

Despite many recent setbacks, Despite many recent setbacks, there is, the Colonel is convinced, a world market for good Western cattle. The demand from the United Kingdom, he says, has been constant and heavy since the lifting of the embargo, though it has been affected adversely by the recent closing of Liverpool, Glasgow and some other ports on account of the outbreak of foct and worth disease.

Colonel Makins is in an excellent position to speak with authority on the cattle situation, for he has been shipping cattle overseas steadily and shipped 148 head from Winnipes hipped 148 head from Winnipeg to Contreal. The train, supplemented by ears containing 100: additional lead from Toronto, left the Western sity at 10 p.m. on Wednesday via lanadian Pacific and arrived at the stock-yards here on Sunday morning the Colonel following them up by a massenger train which left Winnipes on Thursday night. The shipment is bound for Dundee via St. John. N.B. The Colonel paid a warm tribute to the Company for the manner in which it had handled his consignment. "The shrinkage in weight was unusually light." he stated. This experience, and my inspection of these yards, has convinced me that ranchers may ship their cattle via Canadian Pacific with confidence that they will be splendidly and rapidly handled."



### Stolen Eggs and the Silk Trade

Production of silk dates far into antiquity, and for worm is given transportation facilities which few other ages the manner of its production was kept secret. Up to the sixth century A.D. all raw silk was imported into Europe from China, but the Byzantine Emperor Justinian induced two monks to travel into China to procure silk worm eggs and though the export of them was punishable by death, these monks succeeded in bringing back a quantity concealed in the hollows of their pilerims stayed.

From Byzantium, silk cultivation spread into Greece and Syria, thence into Spain, and thence successively into Sicily, Naples, Northern Italy and France, being established in Italy in the sixteenth century.

Various determined attempts have been made, principally between the years 1622 and 1839 to establish the silk industry in America, resulting at one time in a not inconsiderable production, but the excessive cost of the labor involved in the rearing of the worms and in the reeling of the raw silk from the cocoons as compared with the trifling cost of such labor in Europe and Asia, has rendered it impossible to produce raw silk at commercial prices on this continent.

Most of the silk imported to America comes from Japan, Italy and China where, also, the humsdity of the atmosphere contributes no little to the success of the industry in those countries. The greatest importation is from the Flowery Kingdom, and this mostly in the raw-silk form as it is reeled from the cocoons.

Silk is valuable. ### Here and There

It is estimated that over 50,000 cres were sown with corn in Alacres were sown with corn in Alberta in 1923, as compared with only 1,000 acres in 1919. This is a good indication of how rapidly corr culture is increasing in Westers Canada in connection with mixed farming operations.

All previous records of Canadian freight transportation were broken when a solid train-load of automobiles reached the Pacific Coast from Windsor, Ont., over Canadian Pacific lines recently. The distance of 2,932 miles was covered in seven days, or exactly 169 hours and 20 minutes. The train, which censisted of 40 cars, each containing 6 Ford automobiles, was mere than a third of a mile long and was handled on practically passenger schedule.

The splendidly sound position of the Canadian Pacific Railway is well shown in the annual report for the fiscal year ended December 31s, 1923, which has just been issued. The gross earnings of the Company for the year were \$195,837,089.61, the working expenses \$158,358,-079.54, and the net earnings, \$37,-479,010.07.

A large party of Scottish farmers, ploughmen, farm workers and their families, is expected to arrive at Montreal in June. The party, which will sail on the Canadian Pacific steamer "Marburn," will be conducted by the Scottish representative of the Canadian Pacific Department of Colonization and Development.

Alberta has maintained an average yield of spring wheat of 19% bushels per acre over a period of twenty-six years, according to a chart prepared by the Department of Agriculture. In addition, winter wheat has averaged over the same period 20.19 bushels; oats, 35.79 bushels; barley, 26.10 bushels; rye, 18.84 bushels and flax, 8.71 bushels.

A feature of the annual banquet and convention of the officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which were held at Quebec on March 22nd, was the representation, in the banquetting hall, of a full-sized locomotive of the latest type emerging from a tunnel. Built of wood at Angus Shops, Montreal, it was in all respects perfect. At a prearranged moment, it emitted steam and smoke, the bell rang and the whistle blew, while the headlight became a moving picture projector. came a moving picture projector.

Indications of a great season in immigration are seen by Canadian Pacific officials in the arrival at St. John, N.B., during the week-end of March 29-30, of 2,441 third-class passengers, aboard the Company's steamers Montcalm and Metagama. The Montcalm had on board 1,584 of these passengers, which constitutes a record for the season.

Out of a total production of 10,730,150 pounds of creamery butter in 1923, Manitoba exported 3,863,264 pounds, valued at \$1,513,-169. Shipments were made to Great Britain, New York, Chicago and Montreal. In addition, about 200,-000 pounds of butter fat were shipped to the United States.

In a speech to the higher officers of the Canadian Pacific Railway on the occasion of the recent convention at Quebec, Mr. E. W. Beatty, President, pointed out that 50 per cent. of the company's stock is held in Great Britain, 21 per cent. in Canada and 20 per cent. in the United States. It is, therefore, a corporation absolutely controlled within the British Empire and, he added, that control is being appreciably strengthened as the years go on.

Quebec's new goldfield in Rouyn township, north of the Des Quinze branch of the Canadian Pacific from Mattawa, is to be made accessible by an aeroplane service to be inaugurated by the Laurentide Air Service Limited, on May 18th. Prospectors, tourists and supplies will be able to cross the fifty mile gan between the end of steel and the goldfields, which formerly required two days to cover, in less than an hour in the flying beats to be used in the service.



### PRIVILEGE OF CITIZENSHIP

The number of votes cast in the civic elections last Tuesday indicates that very little interest is being taken in the affairs of the community. This state of affairs is not a very encouraging sign. Of course, we realize that the reason for such a small vote is because of the large number whose taxes are unpaid, but these taxes should be paid, and then a much better expression of public opinion would be the result on election day. When we arrive at the point where all or nearly all the electors will express an opinion, there is little doubt but that a distinct improvement in the town and its

government will take place. We have at times heard considerable opposition to the principle that no citizen should cast a ballot before they had paid their taxes. If it were otherwis and any man who had no stake in the town, who contributed nothing toward the maintenance of our public services or the interest on our obligations, could have the same privilege of voting as those who pay their taxes, we could not possibly have the same results. There must be some basis of citizenship beyond the mere fact that a man lives within the corporation limits. and we certainly would not get

If everyone on the list would do likewise, there might be different results on polling day, but the results would be the majority opinion of those who had a right to expression by their ballots and whose financial interest in the welfare of the community is unquestioned. The New Town Council should give serious considera tion to this matter and immediate steps should be taken by it to have our large Default Tax List cleaned up as speedily as possible. The town needs the money due it, -the electors need their franchise and the sooner the arrearages are paid up, the sooner will our town become in a healthier condition financially, and the sooner will those, who at present are deprived, be given the opportunity of exercising t he privileges of citizenship.

Amalgamations have had something to do with the change, but the dullness of business is primarily responsible. Daily news papers have decreased from 121 to 114. semi weeklies from 34 to 30, and weeklies from 1,022 to 975. On the other hand, a small in-










### CANADA'S NATIONAL PLAYGROUND
