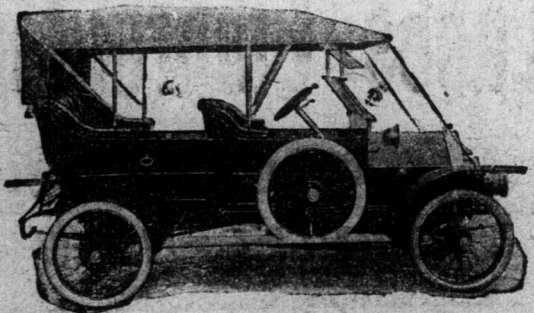

The Evening Chit-Chat

"For the great men are modest, because they continually compare themselves not with other men, but with that idea of the perfect which they have before their minds."
—Milton.

It has always seemed to me that the blind bard might well have added that the great men were great for the same reason that they were modest. I want to tell you to-day a little story about a certain great woman I have had the privilege of knowing. I call her "great" and perhaps you are waiting to hear some famous name, but I don't use the term in just that way. For she has "spent herself in channels which had no great name on earth." But she is great just the same, even if nobody knows it.

This woman, who is now about fifty years old, has brought up a family of seven children. And not only has she been one of the finest of house-mothers to them, but she has also frequently been the financial head of the family. She has been in several lines of work, literary and otherwise and she says to-day, proudly and with absolute truth, "So far, I have never failed."

She has at different times earned a salary of over twenty-five hundred a year, which, if you will recall statistics I have formerly given you, is over twice the wage of the average man. Furthermore she did not have a college course or any specific training—only an ordinary high-school education. Of course, the natural explanation of such a career is that she has an

unusually good mind. Yes, she has that. But I don't think it is chiefly that which has made her success possible. There are many qualities which have helped—a splendid energy, an unusual definiteness and practicality, a never-flagging perseverance, and an agreeable personality, have all played their parts. But the quality which has had the most to do with making this woman successful in whatever she turned her hand to, I think, is just this, "a passion for perfection."

I worked with her once and I have good reason to know. At the time I often smarted and sometimes rebelled at the exactness which she laid upon us both, but now I only wish I had been with her longer.

She never tried to do her work just so that it would "get by." Her superiors were usually her inferiors, and she might have done less careful work and still been praised. But she wasn't working primarily for them or their praise—she was working for herself and her own praise, and her ideal was not to have things "do" but to have them "right."

And the result was that she can say now, "I never failed."

I wish that every girl in this city who is starting on a business or professional career might work under that woman for a few weeks. I am sure she would be a better worker for it all her life.

Everyone cannot have remarkable brains. Everyone cannot have personal charm or ingenuity or manual cleverness, but everyone may have that splendid spur—"a passion for perfection." And, believe me, no one, who has that will ever fall behind into the ranks of the futile and mediocre folks.

Spanish Swindlers in Toils.

American Who Was Fleeced by "Prisoner's Fortune" Story Will go to Madrid.

Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 6.—According to R. D. Jones, of Memphis, Garcia Jimenez, under arrest at Madrid, Spain, is the ring-leader of a band of men who fleeced Jones of several thousand dollars by means of the so-called "Spanish swindle."

Jones has identified the picture of Jimenez as that of the man to whom he paid the sum declared necessary to secure the release of a supposed Russian banker languishing in prison, notwithstanding the fact that secreted in his baggage were many thousands of dollars. Jones says after he paid the sum asked, he was told to leave Spain under penalty of death. The picture of three men arrested at Madrid several weeks ago were forwarded to Attorney-General Newton Estes by secret service agents at Washington, and Jones identified Jimenez as that of a hotel keeper at Valladolid, Spain, ring-leader of the band.

Jones will go to Madrid as a witness.

Was John North's Friend.

An interesting personage has just visited France, and his adventures recall to our contemporaries those of Robinson, as they always describe Defoe's hero. Born at Nice in 1871, Charles Manzoni went to Argentina in 1881 and later qualified as a surgeon. At Buenos Ayres in 1890, he was called to attend a ship's captain who had been wounded in a fight with "hills" sailors.

After the patient's recovery the doctor was retained and embarked upon the "Sainte Marguerite," whose captain was John Orth, the Austrian Archduke, whose fate is a mystery. In the Straits of Magellan on August 25, 1890, during a terrible hurricane, the doctor was swept overboard by a wave and washed upon an island. When he regained consciousness the vessel had disappeared, and the doctor concluded that she and her crew were lost. For eight months he lived on the island on the eggs of sea-birds and fish, and we are told he was less happy than Robinson, because he had no gun. Then a ship appeared and took him to Patagonia.

Household Notes.

When feather pillows become lifeless and the ticking soiled from long usage, place them on the snow for several days. Turn them each day so that both sides will be exposed to the sun. In several days the feathers will be as fresh as if renovated, and the ticking will be bleached and freshened.

If you have a suspicion that gas pipes are leaking, a sure test can be made by applying a paste of soap and water to the joints. If there is a crack or break, bubbles will appear in a little while. This is a safe way to attempt to locate a leak. Neither matches nor a candle should ever be used.

To clean lace yokes without removing from garments, moisten raw starch with cold water to the consistency of a thick paste and apply to lace, being careful to thoroughly cover every part. Allow to remain a day or two. When thoroughly dry remove with a stiff brush. If lace is

much soiled, a repetition of the process may be necessary.

A knife that has been used to pare or cut onions should be immediately put into cold water and then washed before it has had a chance to be used for anything else. Saucepans in which fish or onions have been cooked should be filled with cold water as soon as they are used. After they are washed in hot soapsuds there will be no lingering odor.

Most every woman knows that it spoils the shape of a skirt at the hips to hang it on an ordinary coat-hanger. This difficulty can be overcome by driving two small tacks (one each side of the wire hook), leaving the heads protruding only a little bit. Put the tacks just as far apart as the loops on the skirt. A coat can be hung over this without in the least crushing the skirt.

Gasoline is excellent for cleaning your false hair. Pour some into a shallow pan; hold your switch by the stem and swish it back and forth until it is clean. Rinse it thoroughly in clean gasoline and hang it outdoors to dry. Switches or puffs cleaned in this manner will look much better and last longer than when they are washed in water; continual washing in water makes the hair lusterless and brittle.

Dampen a newspaper and tear it into small shreds, which are sprinkled over the carpet before sweeping, if you have no tea leaves to use for this purpose. Damp bits of paper thrown over matting or hardwood floors will help wonderfully to gather up the dust, when sweeping. A dry sheet of newspaper crumpled in the hands makes an excellent polish for mirrors, windows and lamp globes.

Now that the season for the savory duck is right upon us, the long-suffering housewife, who would almost rather throw away a duck—especially a wild duck—than prepare it for the oven, may greatly lessen the task by the following method: Remove the longest and heaviest feathers, as usual, cutting off the head and wings; melt a cake of paraffine in a pail and dip the duck in it. Let the bird remain until the paraffine hardens; then with a dull knife scrape it clean. To your delight and surprise the duck

"Exclusives" in the Council

In the speech from the Throne there appeared this paragraph:—"At the Imperial Conference in London last summer it was resolved that His Majesty should be approached with a view to the appointment of a Royal Commission representing the United Kingdom and the self-governing Dominions, to investigate and report upon the natural resources and the improvement of the trade of the Empire, and in accordance with the terms of this Resolution my Ministers have been invited to nominate a representative for Newfoundland thereon, and have done so accordingly."

Much speculation arose immediately as to the identity of the nominee. It might have been considered proper for the Premier and his Executive colleagues to have entrusted the announcement to His Excellency in the paragraph we have quoted. This would have been the most dignified course to pursue. But the Ministry did not do so. They preferred to arouse vulgar curiosity, and satiate it in a most questionable way. A less objectionable way would have been to have confided the announcement to the movers and seconders in the set speeches on the day of opening. This course would have added a little spice to the meagre mess of potage which these gentlemen had to dole out to their disappointed listeners. Apparently the Hon. W. C. Job, Hon. J. Angel, Mr. P. F. Moore and Mr. T. LeFevre were considered unworthy of the title, and were passed by as unsuitable mediums of communication. For how could any of the four gentlemen named appreciate the value of an "exclusive" and know how to get the best out of it? Had the announcement been made by the leaders of the two houses, the course would have been merely ordinary, humdrum, official and prosaically correct. This course would have been, extra-ordinary, uncommon, improper and unofficial about it. Sensationalism would have been absolutely absent. This did not fit in with the present scheme of things. No announcement has been made as

yet in the House of Assembly, but, after all, that is only the People's House, and why should the People's Party consider it. The announcement has, however, been made in the Legislative Council, not in the usual way by the leader of the House, the Hon. R. K. Bishop; not by a member of the Executive, like the Hon. M. P. Gibbs; not by any grave and revered senator, but by the baby of the House. He was entrusted with this State secret. It was an "exclusive," and it had to come out, and out it came. How otherwise can this grave breach of etiquette have occurred? How otherwise could it come about that the junior member, and a private member at that, on the occasion of taking his seat the second time, and in his maiden speech should have made an official announcement? If this is not so, the Government must assume responsibility for such an unprecedented, undignified and contemptuous treatment of both branches of the Legislature, and it is passing strange that the Government was not taken to the junior honourables' "exclusive" on the spot.

Boy Badly Bitten

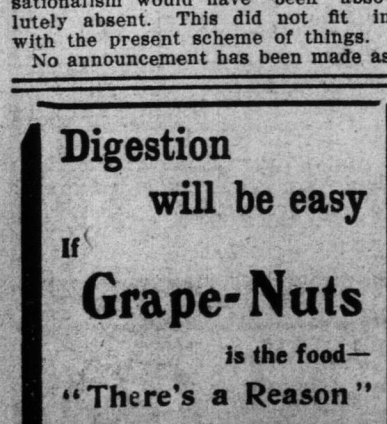

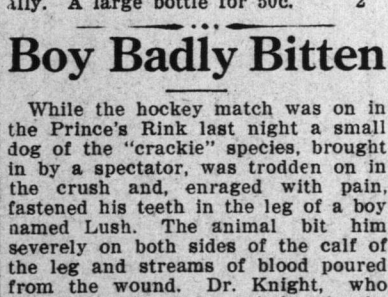

MANCHESTER, To-day. Sir Edward Grey made an optimistic speech here last night on the present relations between Britain and Germany. Referring to the visit of Haldane to Berlin, Sir Edward said:—"Retrospectively the details of a statement made by Asquith, in Commons, and Chancellor Von Bethman Hollweg, in Reichstag, did not imply that there was any lack of cordiality between the two Powers. Something had been achieved which he, Sir Edward, hoped had permanently brightened the sky and which would dispel the mists of suspicion which had arisen from unfounded rumours. The interests of both peoples, Sir Edward declared, made peace between the two countries necessary. He expressed a hope that Asquith in his statements in Commons had forever disposed of the great untruth that Britain meditated an attack on Germany last summer during the tension over the Franco-German negotiations in relation to Morocco."

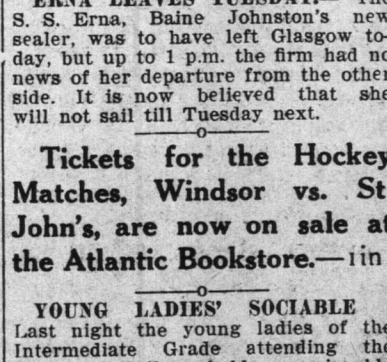

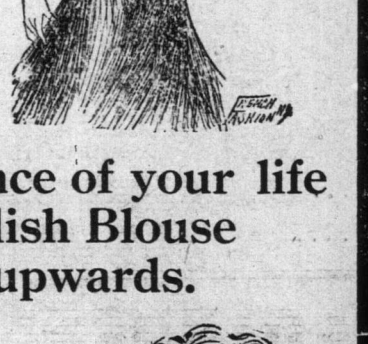

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Feb. 16. It is apparent the Unionists intend to force an issue on the Ministry's promises, made when the Lord's veto Bill passed, to reconstruct the House of Lords later on. They will propose an amendment to the address in reply to the King's speech, declaring it improper to proceed with the vital measures named by His Majesty while the composition of parliament is incomplete and the country deprived of the safeguards of the constitution. When the Parliament Bill is being considered, the Unionists intend to propose the election of members of the House of Lords along similar lines to the election of members to the United States Senate, which they prefer to the present condition which gives power to the Commons to veto the action of the Lords. The Unionists have also decided to accept the challenge thrown out by Asquith to prove the Government guilty of corruption in the matter of the appointment of officials. Bonar Law, leader of the Opposition, will move a vote of censure during the debate which will follow the proceedings dealing with the King's speech, and in the meantime Asquith will be asked to issue the return of all appointments made during the Radicals' term of office.

Herder, for Crescents, was on it with whirlwind speed and taking it back banged in No. 1 for Crescents just 2 minutes from the play off. A minute or two afterwards Herder again did the trick, scoring No. 2. It no longer looked as if the Crescents would win hands down, but the Feildians exhibited a wonderful amount of energy, which heretofore had been dormant and kept Thomas very busy for long while. P. Winter and Pinsen particularly played dashing hockey and the latter, after hot work had occurred in mid-rink, hooked the rubber clear, dashed away and taking it pretty shot landed the equalizer amidst thunderous applause. Both sides now put on a terrific pace and a fine exhibition of hockey was given. After 24 minutes' play Pinsen again found the net. 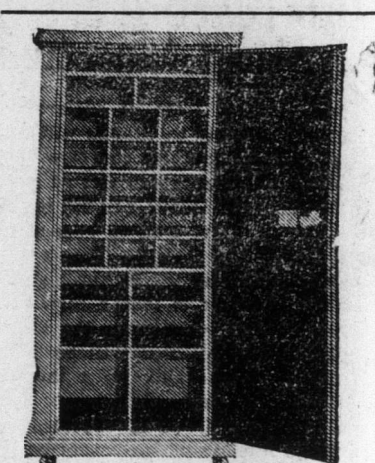

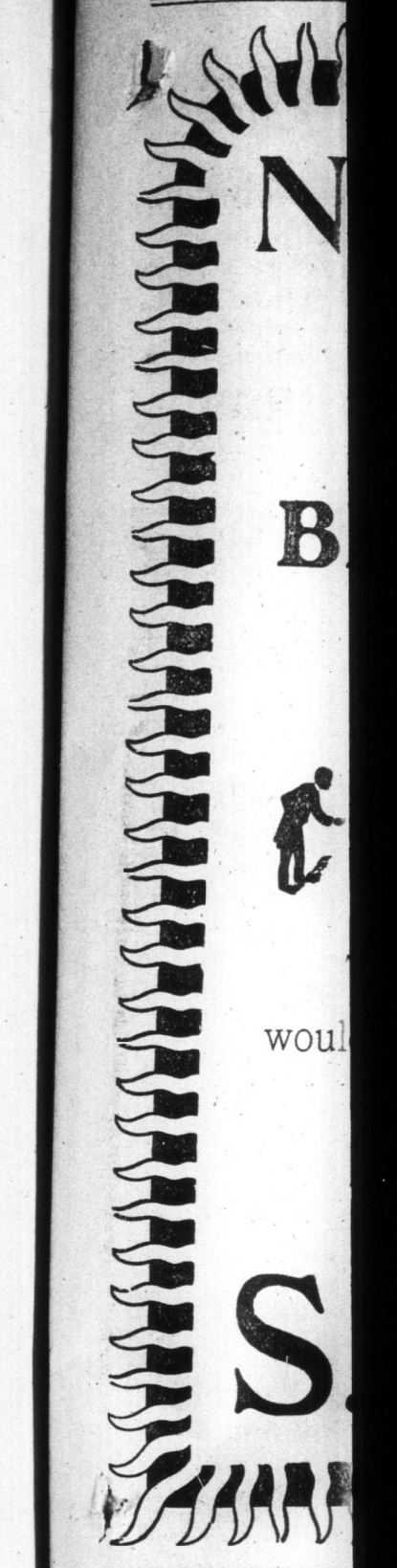

THE DRESSMAKER.

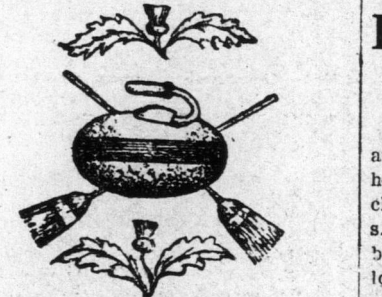

Morris on the Civil Servants.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I should like to add a few words to the comments of "Poor Voter," as published in yesterday's issue of your paper with regard to the Premier's declaration that there shall be no increases in the salaries of civil servants.

Why, I should like to ask, did Premier Morris omit from that declaration the fact that he had already by the surreptitious means of Executive responsibility increased the salaries of a number of officials in the Post Office, including several in the Telegraph branch of that department. If Premier Morris considers that it is not right to ask those taxpayers, who only earn half the wages of public officials, to contribute more money towards increases for the latter, where is his same justification for making the same taxpayers dig deep into their pockets to pay increases which on Executive responsibility he has already granted to a favored few? He would be more honest in his declaration were his record such since his accession to the Premiership that no increases whatever had been granted to any single individual within this period.

Why did he ignore, for instance, those same poor taxpayers when he increased the salaries of Mr. Arthur Martin of the General Post Office and Mr. Geo. Bursell of the Treasury Office? Increases made within the first two years of his term of office as Premier; and why are not these same taxpayers consulted in the raising of the salaries within the past six months of Messrs. Lloyd and Kinsella of the Post Office, and of Messrs. Garland, Meaney, Curtis, Rooney and a few others of the Post-Telegraphs?

Is it right to make the taxpayers pay this increase whether such poor taxpayers like it or not, but wrong to ask them to give honest and decent living wages to many a half-paid public servant included in the poorly circumstant list of policemen, firemen, tidewaiters and other minor servants of the State who only manage to eke out an existence by depending on the charity of business men, who

permit them to accumulate debts which are found impossible of payment.

Pursuing my thoughts further, is it right to make the poor taxpayers consent to an allocation from the public treasury of thousand dollar jobs for such heelers as Gibbs, Rogerson and McGrath, three popular brainy men who were pitchforked into Government jobs since Morris assumed office? If the cost of living has gone up so high as to deem it only fair to give this brainy trio these thousand dollar jobs to live on, then surely it ought not to be wrong to give to more humble though more hard-worked servants salaries within a few hundred dollars at any rate of these three favoured heelers.

Not expecting to see any reasons given in the Government press for this strange conduct of the Premier, I shall only express the hope that the members of the Opposition will ask for these reasons in the House. To repeat the questions I should like to have answered, they are as follows:

(1) Why, with the voice of Jacob, did Morris proclaim that he would not ask the poor taxpayers to give increases to the civil servants when with the hands of Esau he has been giving through the pockets of these very same taxpayers during the past few months, exacting from them the wherewithal to pay increases to the favoured few I mentioned?

(2) Why does he declare that public officials who are doing all the drudgery connected with the public service are not to expect any increases proportionate to the higher cost of living, and yet in the face of this declaration grant thousand dollar allocations to political bunions like Gibbs, Rogerson and McGrath?

More Deserters.

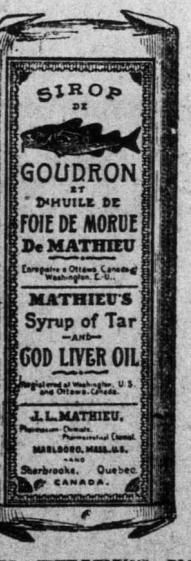

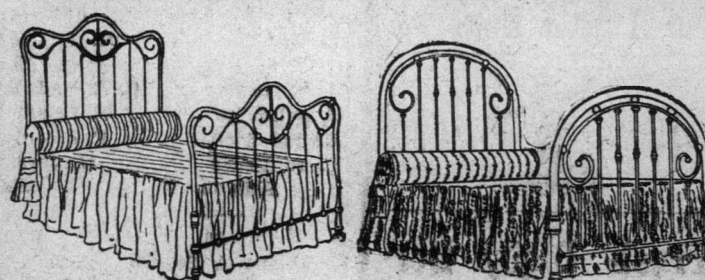
