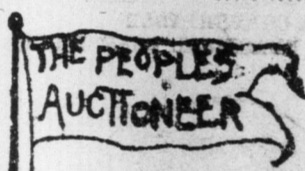

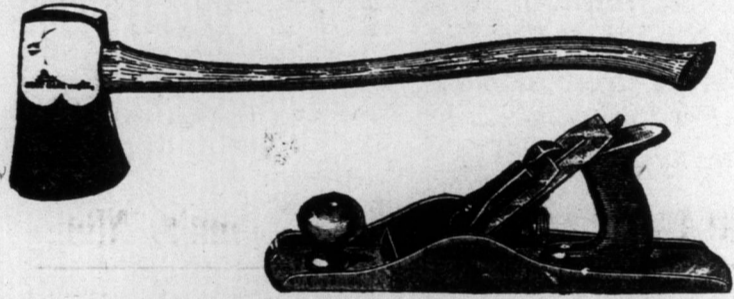

How the little annoyances sting us! How the little disappointments loom like life tragedies! How the little

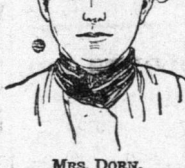

Cannot Accept Borden's Policy.

Montreal, Oct. 15.—"Le Devoir" in an article this evening, signed by Henri Bourassa, and evidently inspired, confirms the news to the effect that Hon. Mr. Monk would resign as soon as the Borden policy is announced.

Mr. Bourassa learns that an urgent contribution of thirty million will be made, and the promise of a plebiscite before a permanent policy is adopted.

Hon. Mr. Monk will retire, adds Le Devoir, if he does not obtain a plebiscite on the urgency vote.

The real friends of the Minister of public works, the Nationalist leader says, and we are amongst them, hope that he will maintain this attitude, although strong pressure is being brought to bear on him to retain his portfolio.

Mr. Bourassa says that on the Keegan school question he was profoundly disenchanted at Mr. Monk's attitude, yet on the question there may have been extenuating circumstances which do not exist to-day.

Mr. Monk is bound by his honour and conscience to demand a plebiscite on any policy of Imperial contribution, and Mr. Monk is not alone. The resolutions at St. Etienne prepared under Mr. Monk's eyes were approved of by the Hon. Mr. Nantel, who condemned the Borden policy of twenty millions contribution, consequently he refuse to believe that the Minister of Inland Revenue will approve of thirty millions, when he condemned the idea of giving twenty millions.

Let the contribution be one of urgency or not, no one can pretend that it is not designed for an Imperial armament. If, therefore, concludes Mr. Bourassa, Mr. Borden and his

The Value Of Radium.

Worth What Owner Can Get For It—Sweep Rents for Fifty Dollars a Day.

There are no very exact statistics of radium available, but according to the United States Geological Survey the whole quantity in the world probably is not over two or three ounces, and its value, like that of the big diamonds of the world, is purely nominal.

It is worth whatever the possessors can get for it. The head of the English corporation producing radium claims that it is worth approximately \$100,000,000 a pound. A year ago this same person had estimated the value of radium at one-third more. However, a little variation of \$50,000,000 is not thought to matter where there is no appreciable fraction of a pound of the precious stuff in sight.

The fact that has more than anything else to do with fixing the price is the existence of several radium banks containing a microscopic speck of radium are rented out to doctors at something like \$50 a day. While it is known to be of some value in treating lupus, which is a form of tuberculosis attacking the tissues, usually of the face, there is little else known about its medical value. It has been claimed on several occasions that radium was valuable in the treatment of cancer, but experiments have not proved this to be an absolute fact.

A short time ago it was reported that the Austrian government had purchased the only two mines under private ownership producing the ores from which radium is made, and thereby gained a monopoly in its manufacture. This report, however, turned out inaccurate. It is true that the Austrian government heretofore have supplied the bulk of the radium salts existing in the world, but at the present time radium is being manufactured in three other countries, the United States included. Sweden is producing radium from kolin, the English are getting it from the mines in Wales, while the United States get it from western Colorado, where there is a large deposit of radium producing ore.

These deposits produce also uranium and vanadium the latter being used for making some of the high grade steel alloys. While the mining pays in vanadium alone the ore produces a certain per cent of radium. Ten tons of it procure only between twenty and thirty milligrammes of radium.

Old Age the Best

There is only one thing we have to do, and that is to grow old. That is the due business of life: it is for that we are put in this world.

The art of living is nothing but the art of growing old. Instead of looking upon old age as a wreck of youth, the pitiful remains of a once valuable life, we should regard it as the masterpiece of life, that for which all preceding stages were but trial essays and preparation.

When Fontanelle was asked what period of life he considered the most fortunate, he replied: "From sixty to eighty. At that age one's place is fixed. Ambition and desires have ceased to torment, and one reaps what he has sown. It is harvest time."

Whether you believe this or not depends upon the point of view you take as to the purpose of human life. If you think a human being is an animal, put in this world to get all the pleasure he can, then naturally you conceive old age to be a calamity. But if you hold that he is a soul, put here in a body in order to perfect and beautify his character, then you must see that old age, when the bodily fires have gone down, and nothing is left but the blue gold of the spirit, is best of all.—Dr. Frank Crane in Woman's World for November.

The Tories Are Cut to the Quick.

The editor of the Chronicle is solicitous of our welfare and is ever anxious to do something for us. We thank him for his courtesy and solicitude and regret we are unable to relieve his anxiety. One day he suggests we should be locked up in the Penitentiary until we repent of our waywardness and wilfulness in criticizing the policy of Sir Edward Morris and another day his humanity suggests our committal to the Lunatic Asylum until we can see eye to eye with him on public matters. We respect the honorable gentleman's suggestion as to the value of medical examination. No editor in the community and few laymen have his experience and can offer such strong personal testimony, and he very naturally writes and speaks of others as men of infirmity like himself. But he is neither an expert criminologist nor alienist, but only a man of infirmity, overfowing with the milk of human kindness, which blinds him to facts and distorts his mental vision. For instance, he tells us our criticism is futile and ineffective. The facts are against him and his vision is oblique. The Premier's petulant threat of the Penitentiary in the House of Assembly and his vicious attack on us at Bonne Bay prove that he is cut to the quick. Our exposures of the picknicking propensities of the Tory parties, their grabbing, and the Morrison exposure in connection with the Anglo-American land grants, the Orange Bay letter, and the whitewashing of Morrison have shaken the Government to its very foundations. Similarly the facts are against him as to his statement that Sir Robert Bond had come in to help us in criticizing the Morrison Agricultural Policy. Mr. McGrath is notorious for painting his objections as facts, and so it is in this instance. Sir Robert Bond was not in the Telegram Office on Tuesday, nor did we see him on Tuesday until hours after we had gone to press, nor have we had any communication or talk directly or indirectly with Sir Robert Bond on the question under reference for months past. On Tuesday last we showed that Sir Edward Morris approved of the policy of a

Scientific Farm in the Spring of 1908, and almost before the echoes of his voice had died away, for the sake of political expediency his party papers and pamphlets were denouncing the man when he was returned to power he wrecked the farm and dismissed the expert, and utilized the money to find a means of livelihood for three members of his party and to satisfy heelers with sops. The policy has become the scoff of the people. Its failure is notorious. The four barrel has not been cut in two Sound potatoes are not in greater abundance than before. There is no excess of hay being converted into meats by stock raisers. The potato canker is alarming agricultural societies. People are crying out for foreign hay. The Government has had to take off the duty and facilitate the sending away of gold that Morris promised should be kept at home. Farmers are asking for a Scientific Farm and an Experimental Farm, a policy which the Tory Government has condemned. What matters it what Sir Robert Bond condemned in 1888? In 1908 he had lived 20 years longer and learned much from his own experience in farming, and his visits to experimental stations and schools matured his opinion. Since then the policy has proved itself. The veritable miracles worked in Denmark, Ireland and Canada by scientific farming, expert advice and co-operative effort have demonstrated the soundness of the policy. Moreover, Sir Robert Bond's opposition as set forth in the amendments quoted by the Chronicle was purely provisional and temporary. Its very terms expressed the opinion that AT PRESENT, i.e., in 1888, the creation of a Board of Agriculture was inadvisable. No reference is made condemnatory of Model Farms, Experimental Stations, or Agricultural Schools in the motion quoted by the Chronicle as made by Sir Robert Bond. There is nothing in this which in any way condemns the principle of the establishment of these institutions. Now what did Morris do, after twenty years maturing of the opinions expressed in 1888? In the Spring of 1908 he approved of the principle of establishing Model Farms, Experimental Stations and the engaging of scientific farming experts. Immediately after he instituted a campaign against his convictions for partisan advantages. After he came in power in 1909 he dismissed the scientific farming expert and has engaged no other expert in his place. Now the farmers are clamouring for such an expert. What greater condemnation of the Morrison policy could be exhibited, than the dismissal of the Experimental Sta-

tion and sold it, and has provided no station in its place. The farmers are clamouring for one. What greater condemnation could be given to the Morrison policy? In reference to this Mr. McGrath suggests the calling in of a lunacy expert. He's not far out. The only difference is as to the persons who should be the subjects of his examination. Most persons would say the persons responsible for the Agricultural Policy of the last three years, and particularly those responsible for the destruction of the policy instituted by Sir Robert Bond and for the spending of \$6,000 a year to provide a livelihood to support three Tory members of the House of Assembly to vote for the master workman who provided this masterpiece of agricultural policy. Whether Dr. Tait will take on the job or not we do not know. But what we do know is that the people will take the case in their own hands next year and prevent the picnic irresponsibilities and the courteous editor of the Chronicle from doing further harm to the lieges of the King.

Found Dead in Fishing Boat.

People who arrived by craft yesterday evening from that section say a man named Thos. Reddy of S. E. Bight, Placentia Bay, a small place in Paradise Sound, was found dead in his boat a couple of days ago. The man who was over 60 years old went out alone on the fishing ground and while there a gale from S.W. by S. sprang up and a heavy sea ran. For two days there was no tidings of him until the boat was found stranded at Merashen. The body lay in the ballast locker and the dead man had grasped the throat so firmly that it took some time to release his hands from it. The weather was terribly cold while he was away and it is thought he died of exposure and hardship. The boat when found was filled with water.

Marine Notes.

The Euphrates arrived here this afternoon and takes a full load of freight for Conception Bay ports to-morrow. The Schr. Rosa May arrived here yesterday from Western Bay with fish and also brought along another shipment of partridge berries. The schr. Rudolph C. Capt. Parsons, arrived to Bishop & Sons today with 2,000 qts. of fish from St. Julien's. The reports fish plentiful along the French Shore but no bait. The Fogota left Horwood at 7.30 a. m. today.

Completely Vindicated.

This morning the charge against Mrs. Collshaw of ill-treating a dog was tried by Judge Conroy. Mr. Dunfield conducted the case. After the complainant's case was complete, the judge said there was no case and did not call on Mrs. Collshaw for her defence. He said the case should never have been brought before the court as the charge was unfounded. Last night we are told, the S. P. C. A. wished to abandon the case on the ground that there was no case to take before the court. Mr. Dunfield advised to the contrary and the result was the charge was dismissed without the accused being called upon for her defence.

Dogs Kill Cattle.

Tuesday night a pack of dogs from Pretty Hr. raided sections of Kilbride killed poultry in some yplaces and tore to pieces two fine young heifers owned by Mr. Nicholas Myler, C. Stanley and J. Muggridge who were out late heard the brutes wrangling over the carcasses and shot three of them. This morning several of the people armed themselves and went through the woods shooting these ferocious brutes. The heifers killed were valued at \$80.

One Boy Dead and Another Seriously Injured as Result of Play With Power Wires.

most in front of his home, while Kujanik followed after. Throwing the wire over the Hydro wire Krolitzki received a terrible shock, and became unconscious while the fingers of both hands and his wrists were burning. His companion clung to his legs in order to share in the shock, and the wire wound round his thigh and he was severely burned.

Electric sparks flying in all directions alarmed the curious boys watching the 'experiment' and Krolitzki's brother, seeing his father returning from work, informed him of his son's predicament. In the meantime the employees of the tire factory and Dr. A. F. Baumann, of Waterloo, who was on the ground, sized up the situation, and decided it would be dangerous to attempt to remove the lads until the power was turned off, and rubber gloves were procured. For half an hour the lads were on the tree while the terrific voltage was passing through their bodies before linemen arrived from the city power station, and removed the bodies. The tree was splintered in two by the shock.

Physicians were summoned and when the lads were examined it was found that there was a spark of life left in each, but Krolitzki expired while Kujanik was restored, and immediately removed to the hospital.

Tim Wants to Know About the War.

When we had a war raging in the olden times, says Tucker, we all met in the evenings after our day's work was over and discussed the doings of the contending parties, had our arguments and spent many the hour chatting over the outcome of the struggle. I don't know, says he, but in those days our people seemed to be more enlightened than they are now, for thirty years ago, when the Russo-Turkey war was on, every man you'd meet would be able to talk on it intelligently. Seems to me, says Tucker, our papers don't tell us enough about these matters. We get a public despatch, but if you started in to pick any sense out of it you'd lose your night and your next day's work tussling with Balkan States and Mohammedans, and you'd be a lot wiser when you started than when you wound up.

Tucker says in the olden times the editor of the paper gave descriptive notices, undid each tangling bit of war news, and in that way 'twas very easy to become intelligent; and most of us, you know, like to acquire knowledge as easy as possible.

Therefore, our party, in solemn session assembled, do hereby ask the learned men who edit the papers to tell us in their own plain language what they know about the war, for Tucker says it isn't square to have a war going on and people not knowing enough to do it but to an odd scrap over it. Come on then and fire along the intelligence, for take my word for it, we can stand a lot of it.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
News from the seat of war tells of continued successes of the allies. The Serbians have captured Novi-pazar and are virtual masters of Kumanya. The victories however have been purchased at heavy sacrifices. The situation in Thrace is becoming clearer and a fight is going on over a wide circular front before Adrianople, upon which town the Bulgarians are gradually closing in on the east. They have occupied Vasilka and Timovo, and are continuing their advance southward. On the west the Bulgarians, according to official Sofia accounts, have reached the Arda River, close to Adrianople which is being vigorously bombarded. Already two outer forts have fallen. Some positions of the north of Adrianople are also said to have been taken, after fighting of the severest character. Of the army in the center, operating in the direction of Constantinople, there was no news and evidently that fortress is still holding out. It is significant that last night's Constantinople dispatch which say that decisive results are expected to-morrow have a less confident tone than previous dispatches from that capital, while they admit heavy struggles. Both sides are showing utmost bravery. Information concerning Montenegrin progress is meagre, but the Turkish authorities say that Scutari has been reinforced and is safe. A Salonika dispatch asserts that Malsori tribes are offended because Montenegrin commanders are proclaiming the sovereignty of King Nicholas in captured Albanian towns. They demand that King Nicholas give guarantee that he will evacuate Albanian territory and secure autonomy for Albania. So far they have received no satisfactory reply, and it is reported they are refusing to fight further for Montenegrins, whose advance has been thereby checked.

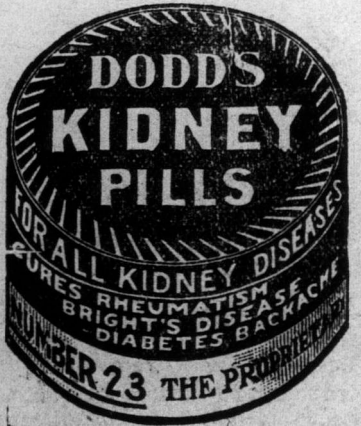

The erection of the pulp mill is progressing satisfactorily and men are now engaged roofing it in. It will be finished by next spring and all the machinery will be installed by the early summer. Work on the concrete dam has progressed very much and the railway track is finished to the pier, an engine and cars running on it daily with construction material. Over 150 men are hard at work there and are receiving good wages.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 23. Heavy fighting is proceeding on the Balkan peninsula. Competent judges are inclined to believe that the conflicts are much more serious than official reports would indicate. While the allied armies of Bulgaria, Serbia, Montenegro and Greece have, doubtless, had the best of the preliminary skirmishes, and continue to take small Turkish fortresses, some doubts still exist as to which side will be most successful in the main theatre of war. Both the Turks and Bulgarians claim to be advancing in the vicinity of Adrianople, and the public is left to choose for itself between the varied statements given in official reports, as all independent observers, the correspondents and military attaches, are being kept in the rare. Everything seems to indicate, however that the Bulgarians have deployed the bulk of their main army from the Mustapha Pasha-Adrianople line to the Djumala Kirk Kiliseh line, and are attacking the Turkish front between the last named place and Adrianople, while enveloping the extreme Turkish right to the east of Kirk Kiliseh. From this latter point reports have reached here of serious battles, of which the details are withheld. The Serbians are more free with news of their operations, and counting their advance. One of their armies has taken the town of Pristina, and another is at the gates of Kumanovo. An official report by the Serbian Commander says that the Turkish troops are offering a desperate resistance, but are falling back fast along the whole frontier in precipitate retreat, leaving behind quantities of supplies and ammunition. Around the town of Novi-Bazar, brisk fighting has been in progress for several days, and the Serbians are said to have suffered heavy losses. They have captured some of the surrounding towns, although Novi-Bazar itself is holding out. Most of the Serbian successes have been won over mixed forces of Albanian tribesmen and Turkish irregulars. They will not come into contact with trained Turkish troops until they reach Uskub.

PARIS, Oct. 23. A cable received here contains the following account of the beginning of the Balkan war. When the Sultan of Turkey gave orders for the mobilization of the army, he sent to the King of Bulgaria a sack of millet, with the following letter:—"Dear Ferdinand:—Mobilize, if you like, but be assured that there are as many soldiers in Turkey as there are grains of millet in this sack. Now, if you wish, declare war." The King's reply was in kind. He sent a very much smaller sack, filled with tiny grains of the most virulent red pepper of the country, and with it went the following dedication:—"Dear Sultan,—Bulgarians are not numerous, it is true, but be assured that to stick your nose into their affairs is like sticking it into our national condiment. Try it, and see. They will sting you so sharply that whole Asia will not be able to save you."

ATHENS, Oct. 23. A battle, which lasted all day yesterday between strong forces of Turkish and Greek troops on the road from the Greek frontier between Eleassona and he Turkish headquarters at the town of Serfida, is being continued today. General P. Danglis, commander of the Greek army, sent a despatch to the War Office from the Turkish village of Desanitz last evening, saying, "Our troops have approached the Turkish position and remained there. Only darkness stopped the battle which will be resumed to-morrow morning."

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ATHENS, Oct. 23 (Later). The Greek Army defeated the Turkish troops this morning beyond Eleassona, after a vigorous attack, and the Turks are now retreating to the west.

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of Serfida, according to a despatch from Crown Prince Constantine, who telegraphs that the Turkish army, composed of twenty-two battalions of infantry, and six batteries of artillery, was compelled to abandon its position and retire before the Greek onslaught. The order was given for a general pursuit. The Crown Prince has established his headquarters at Khanhadjicoge.

VERA CRUZ, Oct. 23. Felix Diaz, nephew of ex-President Diaz, with his whole staff, was captured to-day, and all the rebels were disarmed. The casualties were insignificant, the Government forces occupying the city with very little opposition.

HALLEYBURY, Ontario, Oct. 23. At noon to-day the plant of the Energetic Explosive Company was blown up. Eight were killed and many injured. Something went wrong with the electrical machinery and the mixture caught fire.

MELBOURNE, Oct. 23. What affects any part of the Empire, said Senator Pearce, Federal Minister of Defence, speaking at Trafalgar Bay Banquet here to-day, affects every part of it. The co-operation of all the dominions with the mother country is, and ought to be, our ideal; and with Canada, and New Zealand, and South Africa, we must fight side by side whenever the warning is given. Referring to the Australian navy he said, Australia had made an excellent start. While managing her own affairs, Australia could never forget that she was still part of the Empire.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23. Jack Johnson has been repudiated as a member of the negro race at a mass meeting of negroes here. Resolutions were adopted denouncing the mating of whites and blacks as inhuman and with moral ethics, and negro mothers were urged to encourage their children to be satisfied with their own color and people.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 23. Two hundred Turkish soldiers were killed and three hundred injured by the derailing of a military train on the railway from Smyrna to Aden. The entire train fell over a steep embankment. Every man of the train crew was killed.

TORONTO, Oct. 23. Rev. J. W. Aikens, Field Secretary of the Methodist Department of Moral and Temperance Reform, leaves next Tuesday for a three weeks' tour of Newfoundland, where he states public sentiment favors moral reform strongly.

SOPIA, Oct. 23. Terrific fighting was in progress to-day all along the Bulgarian frontier. Bulgarian forces operating against Adrianople reached the Arda redoubt, situated west of the Turkish stronghold. After a sharp engagement, the Turks fled in disorder, leaving a hundred men killed. To the north of Adrianople several advance Turkish positions have been captured by the Bulgarians, after furious fighting. The Turks fled towards Adrianople, leaving many dead.

LONDON, Oct. 23. The important Turkish town of Novi-Bazar was captured by the Serbians to-day, after severe fighting. The troops suffered heavy loss.

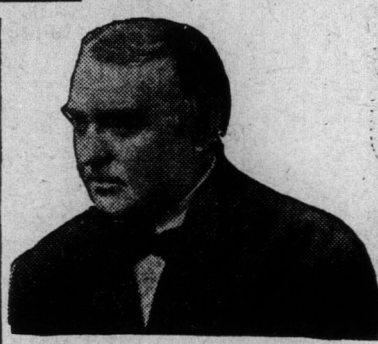

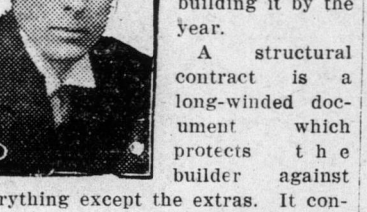

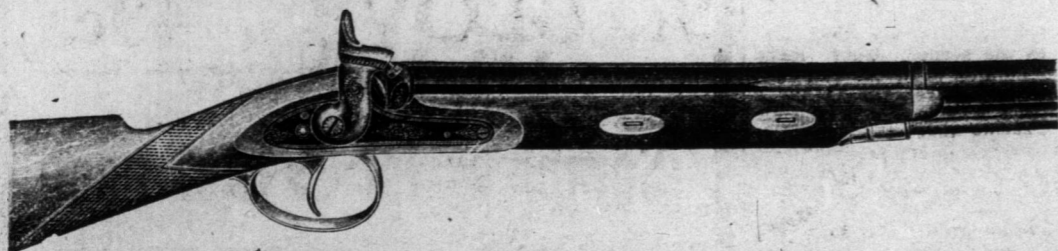
