Any num ber of cylinders may be placed around the places to be defended, in one or several lines. The inventor claims they would mow down ninety per cent. of the attacking forces.

SALONIKI, May 28. Severe tension still exists. The Greek and Bulgarian armies are fac-ing each other at some distance north ing each other at some distance north of this city. Several clashes occurred yesterday, and to-day the Greeks accuse the Bulgars of assuming the aggressive, in spite of a declaration at Sofia that the Bulgarian troops had been ordered to observe a moderate attitude. 
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


