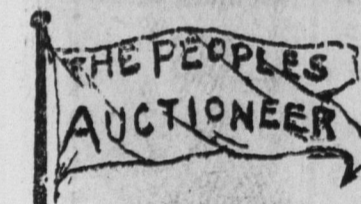

CHARLOTTETOWN, To-day.
Charlottetown was on fete last night with illuminated decorated streets and houses to celebrate the arrival of new Roman Catholic Bishop, Rev. Dr. O'Leary, consecrated last week at Baltimore. He was installed in the pro-cathedral with the usual impressive ceremonies.

LONDON, To-day.
It is generally believed that Serbian and Greek delegates will sign the draft treaty under compulsion. The only hopeful development in the quarrel between the allies is an arrangement whereby the Serbian and Bulgarian Premiers will meet on Saturday on the frontier to confer over the situation.

LONDON, To-day.
Sir Edward Grey has the unanimous backing of Britain in the firm attitude he has taken up with respect to the peace treaty by the Balkan allies. There has been sufficient fencing and shilly-shallying in this matter. The opinion here is the Powers will now compel Serbia and Greece to fall into line. Bulgaria very properly declined to accept the Serbo-Bulgarian treaty. It is time both Serbia and Greece should be told plainly what their duty is, for they don't seem to realize it.

NORTH SYDNEY, To-day.
The three water front areas of the Harbor at Leiches Creek have been purchased by Captain Carter, a big dealer of Boston. The purchase will be followed immediately by the erection of an immense modern curing house, equipped with all the latest devices for bleaching, curing and the preparation of boneless fish. While local capital will be used principally, Boston men will expend fifty thousand dollars. It is understood a large cold storage plant will also be constructed here.

SYDNEY, To-day.
It is understood that the Reid Nfd. Co. is considering the advisability of removing their terminus from North Sydney and having their passenger, mail and freight boats on the Port aux Basques service land here instead of North Sydney. This would be a great saving in time, especially in winter, for at present when the ice packs in, boats failing to get to North Sydney have to go to Louisbourg. Freight has to be hauled round from North Sydney to Louisbourg, a very roundabout trip. Were the terminus here, freight in such a situation as that cited would have to be taken from Sydney to Louisbourg, a comparatively short distance, and prove a great saving of time.

Notes and Comments.

The appointment of Viscount Milner as Inspector of Reforms in Turkey, is a high tribute to the value of the great British proconsul. The Turks have before them the regeneration of Egypt which took place under Earl Cromer, and which is going on rapidly under Viscount Kitchener. Milner himself after some years in journalism and politics, was Under-Secretary for Finance in Egypt under Cromer. After that he was Chairman of the Board of Inland Revenue for five years in England, and later, eight years High Commissioner for South Africa. At Oxford he had a distinguished record, which was followed up by a brilliant record in public affairs. He told the story of England's doing in Egypt in a publication entitled, England in Egypt, 1882.

What is Mr. Devereaux doing about the bench at Trepassay? The people are up in arms about the appropriation of the beach for railway purposes, and are "kicking" hard against the selection made for the site of the station. The query remains what is Mr. Devereaux doing about the premises? He was elected to look after the interests of his constituents. We know he has looked after his own interests well. He was provided with a fine fat salary for a job which has been little more than a sinecure. Indeed, the Act was altered in order to allow him to hold the job and a seat in the House of Assembly at the same time. It is up to Mr. Devereaux to be up and doing and looking after the interests of the people of Trepassay in respect of the matter about which they are complaining.

Sir Jno. Heneker-Heaton states that 200,000,000 letters go abroad and that one-half of this number bear the penny stamp. He is of opinion that in three years a universal penny postage would pay. In 1898 the revenue or gain of the British Post Office amounted to less than £3,000,000. The

The Right Hon. Lord Avebury.

The death of Lord Avebury is of more than ordinary interest. Besides devoting himself to public affairs he has written numerous works that have had a wide circulation. His "Pleasures of Life" is his most popular work, being a reference to some of the sources of happiness open to us and containing thoughts and quotations that bring comfort to those in need of it. Born in 1834, he entered his father's banking business in 1848, becoming a partner in 1856. He became Chairman of the London County Council in 1890, and sat in Parliament from 1870 to 1900, in the latter year being raised to the peerage as Baron Avebury. His name is associated with over twenty important measures, including the Bank Holidays Act (1871). He has distinguished himself by his anthropological researches and observations of insect life, more especially of bees and ants, and some of his further works are "Prehistoric Times" (1865); "Ants, Bees and Wasps" (1882), which has run through fourteen editions; "The Beauties of Nature" (1892); "The Uses of Life" (1894); "Essays and Addresses" (1903); "Free Trade" (1904).

In "The Pleasures of Life" under the heading of "The Choice of Books," he gave a list of 100 Books that he considered the best, that made some stir in literary circles. He was then Sir John Lubbock. He was of the "Old School" and his death removes another link with a generation that has but few of its prominent men left.

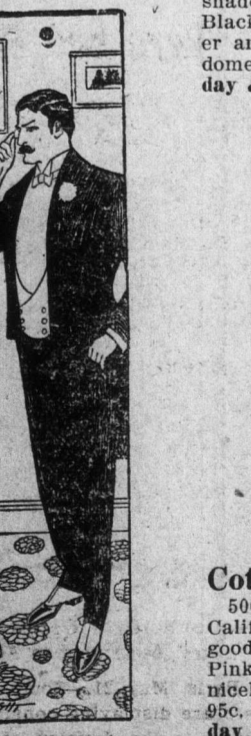

Penny Platform Tickets

Following the example of the London and South Western Railway Co. of charging a penny for admission to station platforms, which, as stated in the Daily Graphic, was inaugurated at Waterloo, the Railway Companies Association recommends the general adoption of the practice.

A similar system is already in vogue on the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway at their Manchester station, and at a number of other stations owned by various companies. It is estimated that the L. and S.W. and L.Y. and Y. companies will derive £1,500 a year each from the partial adoption of the scheme. If applied to all the more important stations on the systems, the big English and Scottish lines would total £386,000 a year. Taking the fifty principal railway companies in the United Kingdom it is estimated that their receipts would be increased by at least £2,000,000 if they adopt the principle of platform tickets generally.

Monuments of 100 Years' Peace.

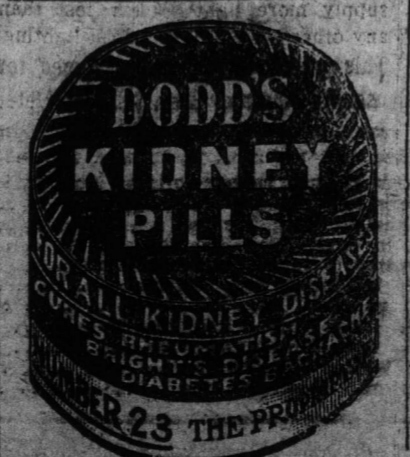
The British delegates to the International Conference which is to arrange the celebration of the centenary of the signing of the Treaty of Ghent last evening considered a proposal for the erection of peace monuments by Great Britain and the United States through popular or private subscriptions.

The schemes provides for the corner-stones of the monuments to be laid on the same day by King George and President Wilson, while simultaneously work in both countries and the colonies would cease for five minutes, the school children taking a prominent part in the celebration.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram, CHICAGO, May 28. Luther McCarthy, the prize fighter, left an estate worth \$30,000.

NOTTINGHAM, May 28. The arsonettes set fire to some lumber sheds of the Great Central Railway depot here. Little damage was done.

LONDON, May 28. The health of the Duchess of Cornwall is so much improved that since Sunday she has been able to spend several hours daily in the gardens of Clarence House. No further daily bulletins will be issued.

MEXICO CITY, May 28. The Senate approved to-night a measure from the Chamber of Deputies authorizing a loan of \$100,000,000. According to a statement from the National Palace, the money will be available immediately.

LONDON, May 28. Entries received for the International Congress of Medicine here from August 8th to August 12th bear out the expectation that at least 7,000 persons will attend the Congress, which will be representative of the world.

BERLIN, May 28. Viscount Milner is to be appointed General Inspector in charge of Turkish reforms, according to the Constantinople correspondent of the Frankfurt Gazette. He will take over his duties as soon as the British Foreign Office consents to his appointment.

LONDON, May 28. The trip of Premier Asquith and First Lord Winston Churchill to the Mediterranean in the Admiralty Yacht Echantillon is being made on other basis on which to discredit the Government. Mrs. Churchill and other women were aboard. Certain M.P.'s intend, if possible, to raise the question in the Commons as to why the Government pays for the entertainment of Churchill's guests.

COPENHAGEN, May 28. Automotons may replace soldiers in the next war, if an invention just patented by a Danish engineer, named Alsen does what is claimed. Alsen says he has a submarine mine which may be placed in harbors, doing no damage until they are fired. The cylinder is operated by electricity from a station four or five miles distant. When a button is pressed, the cylinder jumps two feet from the ground and fires four hundred shots horizontally, the shots being effective at a range of 6,000 yards. Any number of cylinders may be placed around the places to be defended, in one or several lines. The inventor claims they would mow down ninety per cent. of the attacking forces.

SALONIKI, May 28. Severe tension still exists. The Greek and Bulgarian armies are facing each other at some distance north of this city. Several clashes occurred yesterday, and to-day the Greeks accuse the Bulgars of assuming the aggressive, in spite of a declaration at Sofia that the Bulgarian troops had been ordered to observe a moderate attitude. These are apparently preparing for an attack with a view of gaining the complete occupation of a dominant position on Mount Pergaron. They have already placed guns on the crest of the hills, and have occupied the heights commanding the village of Bujakta, south of Lake Dozen, and the town of the same name, which is occupied by the Greeks. It is the belief of the Greeks that the Bulgarians are systematically creating incidents in the endeavor to drive the Greeks to the sea, and to seize the positions vacated by them.

Joe Turner to Meet Olsen.

Swede Wins from Collins in One of the Fastest Mills Ever Staged Here. Joe Turner and "Young" Olsen are to wrestle in Richmond for the championship. As Referee Ralph Cook announced Olsen the winner over Billy Collins, last night, a telegram was handed him from Joe Turner challenging the winner of the bout. The Swede promptly agreed to meet the Washingtonian and Promoter George Herbert announced that he would stage the bout in the local park within the next ten days. Turner met Olsen three times. Turner being the winner twice. The grapplers have agreed to make 158 pounds ring-side.

The wrestling game has gained another foothold in Richmond. A crowd of 700 gathered in Broad Street park last night and saw "Young" Olsen win from Billy Collins after fifty minutes of fast, clean, scientific wrestling.

Collins was forced into submission by the terrible toe-hold, with which Olsen won the final fall within a minute after the men came on the mat. Olsen pinned the abdominal of the Westerner with a combination bar-lock and scissors-hold on the head eighteen minutes after Referee Cook told them to get to work. Collins won the second fall with a head scissors hold in thirty minutes.

When the boys came up for the final decision, Collins was ruling a big favorite with the crowd and there were many willing to wager that the match would go to the St. Louis boy, but Olsen was taking no chances. He went after his adversary like a wild cat, and before anyone knew what had happened had obtained a toe-hold on his rival and had him beaten in less than a minute.

It was the cleanest match ever staged in this city. There was a total lack of "roughing it," no slugging, biting or scratching, the men going about their work with determination and never once showing any disposition to be ugly. After the match Collins, addressing the crowd, said that he wished to take no credit from his conqueror. He was the best man he ever met, he said, and told the spectators that they would see a great match when Olsen and Turner came together here.

The speedy Collins was like a panther on his feet, and with a little more strength might have given Olsen a much harder struggle. While Collins was by far the faster of the two, Olsen excelled in physical development and it was his strength that stood him in good stead in the clinches. Repeatedly Collins had him in tight places when a fall seemed certain, but each time the young Hercules wrenched himself free. The Neno Leader, Richmond, May 21, 1913.

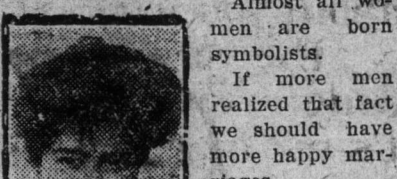

That is why an ordinarily sensible woman will sometimes make a terrible fuss over what seem a very little thing to a man; and that is why an ordinarily kind-hearted man will sometimes be hard and un sympathetic over what seems a very big thing to a woman.

That is why the least sentimental wife always remembers her wedding anniversary; and that is why the most devoted husband forgets the great day.

A young couple I used to know had their first quarrel because he left her to go to a ball game one Saturday afternoon when they had only been married a few months.

She didn't want to go but she professed herself quite willing to have him go, and thinking all was plain sailing, he went. When he came back he found his wife enveloped in that peculiar atmosphere of constraint which every young husband has occasionally encountered. All attempts to break through it proved vain; he was honestly mystified. He really had no idea what was the matter, and after several

efforts grew hostile in his turn. Of course the miserable misunderstanding finally came to a head and pride and formal politeness dissolved into tears on one side and reassurances on the other. When the first trader hung up a sign or scribbled his name above his door he started advertising, and every trader who has been born into the world since has had to follow his example. Many people make the mistake of assuming that because a certain firm does not display bill posters on the hoardings or buy pages in the newspapers it is not advertising. This is not the fact. So long as that firm has any article in its window, or any sign above its door, or any plate screwed on its door, it is, strictly speaking, an advertising firm, though it is advertising in an old-fashioned, outmoded, hole-and-corner fashion.

Once we realize this fact, the universal character of advertising, we see immediately that the one question upon which we should concentrate our mental energies is not whether or no we should advertise—necessity has made us all advertisers—but, rather, how shall we perfect our advertising as an art or a science. The simplest or the oldest tottering of a name outside a shop, or the mere display of goods in a window, are largely outmoded forms of advertising, because in these days the trader knows that all the town is not protruding outside his place of business. The task which the trader's advertising manager is set under modern conditions is to bring the public to the place of business; in other words, to bring the demand and the supply together. Once this has been done the art of advertising has largely played its part, and the supply must speak for itself.

The general channels through which advertisers work are by means of the poster placard, the circular, and the public press. He appeals to the public through the medium of illustration and of the written word. It is in this respect that the art of advertising has so immeasurably improved during the past ten years. When advertising was understood it to-day was in its infancy as an art there was a popular impression abroad that the successful advertiser must deal in broad and exaggerative effect. He was supposed always to overstate his case. It was tacitly assumed that his goods were never so good as he said they were, and he was generally tolerated as a person who indulged in licensed misrepresentation.

To-day the whole situation has changed, and while the art of advertising has improved in both manner and matter, in subtlety, in illustrative beauty, in style, and in technique to an extent beyond recognition, the whole of the new development, which has taken some of the best, the most sensitive, and the brightest brains of the country into its service, is based upon the old but honorable adage that honesty is the best of policy.

The tyro in the advertising world is taught to-day that misrepresentation and stupid exaggeration are the worst foes to good business. Allowing for the average amount of mendacity, it is easy to advertise goods in such a way that you can sell them to a certain public once. But it is now recognized that no first-rate business can subsist on such a principle. To advertise successfully you must advertise in such a way that you can sell your goods to the same public over and over again. You must turn this public, in fact, into advertising agents. In other words, all the art of modern advertising is based upon a more faithful appreciation of the truth as the best weapon in the advertiser's armory than has ever before been the case.

Three Young Men Nearly Drowned.

(Twillingate Sun.)

Young Shave, son of Constable Shave and two young Rendells, nearly lost the number of their mess in an upset of their sailboat on Fogo Harbour on Thursday morning last. It appears that the storekeeper with J. W. Hodge, built a new boat last winter which is rather heavily canvassed. The boys borrowed the boat Thursday morning and although the wind was blowing pretty freshly, were enjoying themselves famously. The two Rendells were seated in the stern, one on either side of the tiller, with Shave amidships. They attempted to bring the boat around but were unable to get her to stay, so decided to wear. Unfortunately they did not stack their sheet and as soon as the boat payed off and took the wind broadside, she went right over throwing them all in the water. The two Rendells got hold of the bottom of the boat but with their weight and the top she kept continually rolling over on them, and before they were rescued they had been under water and regained their hold several times.

Fortunately people on Mr. Hodge's wharf saw the accident as well as men from other parts of the harbour, and as quickly as possible boats went to the rescue. Shave was unconscious when picked up and remained so for some time, while the others were not much better. They were landed at Hodge's wharf and taken into his store where they were rolled on barrels to get the water out of them, when they "came to" were stripped and wrapped in blankets. One of the Rendells recovered sufficiently to walk home but the other was very weak, and Shave's life was despaired of for a little while. Dr. Smith, too, happened to be at the Lion's Den at the time and but for the first aid methods administered by Mr. Harvey Lodge it is likely all three would have succumbed.

The Head.
