





Dr. Woods had many friends in Newfoundland, who will sorrow to hear of his passing. Hon. H. J. B. Woods, and Messrs. Sidney nd Chesley Woods are brothers.

IN MINISTRY 55 YEARS. lev. Dr. Frederick Woods Dies at Home in Melrose-Occupied Many Massachusetts Pulpits.

Melrose, Jan. 28.-Rev. Dr. Frederek Woods, who in the 55th years since is admission to the clergy had occupied Methodist pastorates in many Massachusetts churches died this morning aged 80, at his home, 50 Lake Avenue. The funeral will be held at 2.30 Friday afternoon at the Methodist Church, Main Street.

Dr. Woods was born Sept. 7, 1833, n St. John's, N.F. He prepared for college at Sackville, N.B., and Genesco, N.Y., and was graduated from Wesleyan University, Middletown

Joining the New England Conference, he was first assigned to the Methodist Church at South Hadley Falls. He had since in turn been pastor of churches at West Brookfield. Monson, Barre, Lynn, Charlestown, Lowell, Newtonville, Boston, Fitcaurg, Westfield, Springfield, Hyde ark, Chelsea, East Boston, Somerille, Woburn, Lynn and Ispwich, the ast from 1908 to 1911. In 1912 he reired, and he had since lived here.

Twenty-five years ago Rev. Dr oods was given the honorary de ee of doctor of divinity by Allison niversity, Sackville, N.B., when he eturned there to preach a baccalaurte sermon. In 1909 he preached the pniversary of his ordination.

He was married Nov. 10, 1873, and as two sons, William Woods, a memher of the faculty of Fall River High School, and Frederick S. Woods, pro-Miss Alice Woods and Miss Marion Woods. One brother, Henry Woods, is postmaster general of Newfoundand, and another brother, Rev. Alfred Woods, lives in Saugus.



St. Petersburg, Jan. 28 .- The Counil of the Empire was startled to-day y a dramatic appeal from Count Witt, the former premier, to stop the onsumption of spirits, which he declared was leading Russia to ruin. The Council of the Empire recently as occupied with the discussion of a ill aimed at the suppression of in-

Count Witt contends that his sucessors at the ministry of finance ave misapplied the spirit monopoly which he created. His aim, he said. was to suppress drunkenness. Instead of doing this, they have built an enormous cash reserve for the country's defence, and have spent only a small amount on national education. Count Witt declares that the means of defending the country must not be collected through the cultivation of a national weakness
