Matters must be desperate indeed when popular feeling has acquired strength enough to bend and break the imperial will. Nor could the agitation have been confined to the people, great though their idolatry of Hindenburg is: it must have found considerable echo in the ranks of the army and in the supreme army councils. There is good reaarmy councils. There is good reason to believe that it did. Last January Germany still strongly held the initiative and choice of directing it. Broadly, the choice lay between "finishing Russia" and breaking through in the West. She chose wrongly, disin the West. She chose wrongly, disastrously. Verdun was the colossal blunder of the war. It was followed by another almost as great, the Trentino offensive. To both adventures Hindenburg was strongly opposed and rived and bought at the old prices. Hindenburg was strongly opposed, and their failure has vindicated his judgment. It is the hour of his triumph, but a triumph that brings with it the finite of the course beauty to the strong his course beauty to the strong fruits of the errors he sought to pre-

It is familiar enough in the East, but there has been nothing of the sort on the very different Western front since it first assumed the position that it has preserved almost unaltered for two years. If the Germans withdraw from the salient on the Somme, say from Arras to St. Quentin, they may carry out the movement successfully and take up another and shorter position. On the other hand, it may not be so easy. It cannot be done without much of the open fighting for which the Allies are spoiling. The moral effect upon Germany of such an admission of defeat would be tremendous; what remains to be seen is whether the British and French could add to it a military effect which




