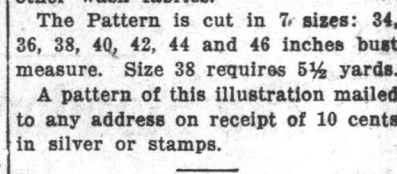

**Allies May Advance
Into Germany.**

**Revolutionists Paying Big Wages--
About to Abandon Russia--Mine
Disaster in Colorado.**

MARSHAL FOCH'S AUTHORITY.
LONDON, March 31.
The Evening News says it under-
stands that reliable information has
been received in London that in case
the German delegates refuse to sign
the peace treaty, Marshal Foch has
authority to order a general advance
of the Allied armies along the Rhine.

**REIGN OF LAW AND ORDER UN-
DISTURBED.**
BUDAPEST, March 30.
The plunge of Budapest into anti-
capitalism continues with feverish
effect. To show that the reign of law
and order is undisturbed the city is
outwardly quiet since the first few
days in which there was much loot-
ing, especially of jewelry shops. As
a result of the looting it is reported
1,506 persons were executed by the
new regime, their communistic ideas
apparently being too violent.

CZECHS CAPTURE TOWNS.
BUDAPEST, March 30.
The town of Kaschau and several
other ports in Southern Slovakia
have been captured by Czechs, who
are fighting the Hungarian Commu-
nists. German colonists in Western
Hungary and Transylvania are hos-
tile to the Communists and are mak-
ing an effort to gain their independ-
ence.

ALSACE'S GRATITUDE TO FRANCE.
STRASBURG, March 31.
A few days after the entry of the
French troops into Alsace, a com-
mittee was formed to raise money to
assist the devastated Northern Pro-
vinces of France. The committee to-
day forwarded 1,000,000 francs to
President Poincare as a testimony of
the gratitude of Alsace to France.

NOT BONA FIDE.
LONDON, March 31.
The publication by the Daily Her-
ald, the new labor newspaper, of a
report that those in power in Russia
had made comprehensive peace pro-
posals to the Allied and associated
Powers, caused no stir in diploma-
tic circles in London to-day. Those in
a position to speak authoritatively on
Russian affairs, say that if such new
proposals were made they will be
doubtless considered as not being
bona fide as have been other propos-
als or feelers put forth by Premier
Lenine.

WAGES IN BUDAPEST.
VIENNA, March 31.
The daily wages of laborers in
Budapest have been fixed at twenty
crowns for men, twenty-five for wo-
men, and twenty for children. The
normal exchange value of the crown
is twenty cents. Thousands of law-
yers, small business men and officials
are out of employment as a result of
the revolution, and are applying for
work as laborers.

RETURN OF CANADIANS.
OTTAWA, March 31.
In the House of Commons to-day, in
reply to a question by Mr. LaPointe,
of Kamouraska, Minister of Militia
Mowburn said that arrangements had
been made for the return of the Si-
berian Expeditionary Forces. The
date is being kept secret on the re-
quest of the British Government.

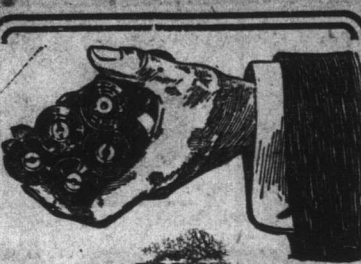

Why Raise Your Hat?

Many of the customs in everyday
life have long since lost their real
purpose. Take, for instance, the
practice of shaking hands. When
two foes were making a truce it was
deemed necessary to guard against
treachery. So they held each the
weapon-hand of the other. Then
gradually this became the mode of
greeting friends, as they were friends
when a truce was declared.
Why does a gentleman raise his hat
on greeting a lady friend? In the
strenuous life of long ago, when men
wore armour, the helmet was only
doffed in the presence of friends.
Hence the raising of the hat is a
complimentary sign of the wearer's
regard.
Courtesy is not now so popular
as it was years ago. Then the vil-
lage dames "bobbed" in greeting to
the squire's lady, but the rising gen-
eration is above this. The curtsy
is a relic of the time when women
went on the knee to beg mercy from
men of rank, and is therefore a tact
acknowledgment of inferiority.

New Ship's Propeller.

To increase the efficiency of the
ship's propeller, it is suggested by an
inventor to place a smaller propeller,
but with a steeper pitch, in front of
the usual propeller, and on the same
shaft. The smaller radius of the
auxiliary screw compensates for the
greater pitch, reducing the resistance
to the screw.
The inventor of this double pro-
peller claims that the auxiliary screw
causes a better utilization of the en-
gine's power. The small screw placed
in front of the usual propeller acts
upon the water near the shaft, where
the larger screw exerts but little pow-
er. He contends that the addition of
the smaller screw will not increase
the burden placed upon the engine of
the ship, and that, with the same mo-
tive force it will add from 25 to 30
per cent, to the driving power of the
propeller.
There is no doubt that the addition
of another screw of greater pitch
would increase the driving power of
the propeller a great deal, but it is
by no means clear how this can be
produced without adding to the bur-
den of the ship's engines.--Popular
Science Monthly.

Freak Strikes.

Two examples of freak strikes in
New Zealand were mentioned in the
course of a recent speech by Mr. F.
M. B. Fisher, for some time Minister
of Customs and Imports in that col-
ony.
On one occasion, he said, the crew
of a boat struck because in the ar-
ticles it was provided that Worcester-
shire should be served. As a matter
of fact, the supply ran short and an-
other brand was supplied, with the
result that the men declined to take
the vessel out of the dock.

The Price of Fat.

With the arrival of the s.s. Sable I on Sunday, the price of fat was, by arrangement, fixed yesterday at the rates already announced in the Telegram, viz. \$8 and the rise for young seals, and \$6 for old. Last year, it will be remembered, the arrival of the first sealer was the signal for a big burst on the part of the Government papers, each one endeavouring to outdo the other in their instructions to the sealing crews to hold back their shares for the bigger offer. Even before the feet sailed the "organ" had fixed the minimum price. What a difference this year. No sealers' meetings; no price fixing; no enthusiastic send off; no thronging crowds blocking Duckworth Street; nothing but a few brief words of good bye, covering a eulogy on certain legislation passed by the Government of Sir Edward Morris, by which the crews were ensured better treatment and food than they had enjoyed in former years. Neither the Prime Minister, nor the W. P. was at home to accord the hand shake of farewell to each individual sealer. The former was in Europe giving the benefit of his "sixteen months' education in statesmanship" to the Peace Conference, and the latter was also across the pond gathering information for the promised book. There was no need, consequently for the "silent doctor" to, as was said of him by our political foe, "fumigate his office" though as a matter of fact we have since learned that on the historic occasion referred to, the sealers who called on the member for Trinity at that time, were compelled to fumigate themselves after the visit.

And equally as there were no organized plurgies on the departure of the feet, this year and no headlines, so the absence of the same today is particularly noticeable. The "organ" devotes a couple of inches to the price, and, as if in apology for its brevity, adds to it a two line "Later," that negotiations are still going on in an endeavour to get \$9. Rather a climb down, eh? friend. The appointment of the new councillors to the Upper House is of more importance now than the price of fat. And we notice that the said councillors are not taken from the ranks of the fishermen, neither are they representatives of the outports. Straws show which way the wind blows, and all the evidence now points to a complete renunciation of the policy of "Saum Culque" in its broadest acceptance, by the former exponents of "to every man his own."

Outport Health Report.

Dr. Bethune, of St. George's, wired to town yesterday reporting six more cases of influenza at that place. Dr. Gill, of Brigus, wired that four more cases of smallpox had occurred at Clarke's Beach.

"Standard" Sarcasm.

Touching the attempted sarcasm of our esteemed contemporary, the Harbinger Grace Standard, which reproaches us for calling attention to the practice of outsiders addressing letters to St. John's, Canada, we might state for the benefit of our sealers etc. that we used St. John's in this instance merely as an illustration. We could equally have used Harbor Grace, Carbonear, Grand Bank, Channel, Bonaville, or any other town. The antagonism between the outports and the capital is not by any means so strong as the Standard would have us believe. Evidently our e.c. is in an "outports" condition of mind.

From S. S. Diana.

Reports from the s.s. Diana say that there are fifteen of the crew sick, and a few others ailing, although no new cases were reported yesterday. The ship was 8 or 10 miles off Cape Spear this morning, and was jammed in the ice, thereby unable to get into port. Dr. Campbell has instructed Mr. Oscar Howell, the ship's doctor how to treat the infection, which is declared to be the "flu," and arrangements have been made to send the sufferers to the Fever Hospital upon arrival, and to exercise due precautions to prevent spreading of the sickness. No reports have as yet been received of any deaths. It is quite reasonable to assume that none has yet occurred or the messages would have stated so.

Fishery Reports.

Fishery reports from centres on the South West coast are not nearly as bright as formerly. The fish has evidently struck off from the land, although in one instance at Rose Blanche, the fish was still plentiful. The inclement weather during the latter part of March hampered the movements of the fishermen considerably, and affected largely the catch. The catch to date as compared from the totals given by Rose Blanche, Channel and LaPole districts is about 25,500 qts.

Making Preparations.

The boys and girls of town must have wished the early Daylight bill in force to let them up to see the carts this morning at six to six-thirty dash along the streets on their way to the Aeroplano site at Harbor Grace East—not "Caplin Cove" or "Bear's Cove," if you please—familiar old names but hardly suitable to new conditions as misleading for that part of Harbor Grace so picturesque and aeroplano. Messrs. Reid and O'Driscoll returned here on Monday to finalise arrangements. The only property required we hear of as not yet quite arranged for is that on which Mrs. High Simmonds resides. The work of preparing the ground for the flight began this morning. About 80 men are at work taking down the 400 ft. wall of Mr. Squires, and 30 carmen are assisting in the work and are carting the stone to distance away. More men will be put on likely a little later. There are two or three other walls of about the same length to be removed besides the one at Harbor Grace. Mr. George Walters one of the Reid men versed in constructive work is in charge of the work of removal of obstacles level, filling and other necessary preliminaries.—Hr. Grace Standard.

Sable I. Discharging.

The s.s. Sable I. will finish discharging her seals this evening. Yesterday the average weight of the seals discharged was 94 lbs., while the hoods averaged 46 and 160 lbs. respectively for young and old.

With the idea—as we should wish it—we are in absolute sympathy only we want to know what our Advocate friend means. The first of all the things has too much the look of an election cry. Why will governments consistently neglect the welfare of the country until the last year preceding an election? Three years of four are always spent in absolute indifference to the country, while the fourth is always as full of promises as a Hun is full of "cooties."
However, let us imagine, for the sake of argument, that our friend Advocate, who speaks for the "National" government is really sincere in his proposal, and that the suggestion really means what it says—that is a fund of a million dollars to be devoted to good roads—what kind of roads are referred to?
If the idea is to spend one million dollars on local roads without adequate results.
To throw—for such we should consider it—a million dollars in pastry to Bishop Falls and Botwood, for instance, should be connected by a good carriage road over which it would be possible to drive a motor truck or motor car.
Imagine the difference it would mean to the working man if he could walk from Botwood to Grand Falls over a good road instead of having to

wait indefinitely for a train from Lewisporte.
A similar good road from Lewisporte to Beaverton or Boyds Cove would be of inestimable value to the residents of Fogo, Change Islands and Herring Neck.
Similarly, imagine what a benefit it would be to our friends at Halls Bay if there were a good road from there to Millertown Junction. Put another road from thence to Balger, and the whole bay would be linked by good roads. The result would be a competition which would topple excessive railway rates.
But our million dollars is already outlined. Not one but two or three million dollars thus spent would be worth five times as much as if spent on railways.
For, get this great truth in your head, the main road is FREE TO ALL; whereas the railway is not.
If this is what our scheme means brother Advocate, me for it; but if you mean frittering away a million dollars on existing roads, just watch us grab the brakes and heave them on hard.—Twillingate Sun.

The Possibilities of Aircraft In Newfoundland.

Were the sealers to be able to seal the seals in the purchase of a small airplane and obtain the services of a pilot, this wastage in both time and money would be reduced to a minimum. If not altogether eliminated, the machine could leave here at daylight in the morning, and return in five or six hours, giving the sealers a map of the channels through the ice, with the position of the seals and the quantity seen at each place. When the sealing steamer had cleaned up one area, another trip could be made by the airplane and the information repeated. Less time would be experienced, and a modern aeroplane can easily be operated with wireless at a very small expense, and constant communication between the pilot of the machine and the skippers of the different boats could be made.

Were this scheme to be tried both by the sealers and whalers, the machine would undoubtedly pay for itself on the first voyage. In the winter months of this Island many outports are completely isolated. Mails, a most important item, could be delivered without fail on 90 per cent of the days throughout the year. Dotted throughout the water, in the form of ponds and deeply penetrating, bays the land, as it would be ideal for the successful operation of these services. During the winter months the machine could be fitted with skis. Those words are the plane to land on any modicum of snow or sheet of ice. During the summer, the skis could be replaced by an under-carriage combining both wheels and skis. This arrangement would make it possible to alight on either land or water.

To-day, no very explicit maps of the country are to be obtained. By means of an aeroplane any portion of the country could be brought within two or three hours' distance of St. John's. Much valuable information in regard to its resources, now lacking, could without doubt be easily obtained. Many districts now unknown might be found to be eminently suitable for settlers. To-day that country lies practically waste.

The distance from Sydney to St. John's is about 650 miles by rail and less by water. This could be covered by means of an aeroplane, in a few hours. An average machine could, without difficulty, transport from 3,000 to 3,500 letters from Sydney to here and return with an equal quantity the next day. To business men the reliability and the constant communication, now so frequently interrupted, would largely appeal. Much money spent on elaborate cables could be saved. That, together with the advantage of being able to write a full and explicit letter, alone would make an assured success of such a project. Carrying a full load, an extra charge of ten cents per ounce over the regular postal rates would show an excellent working profit.

These few items will show to your readers the improvements that could be made and the conveniences which would exist, had some small company started a service of this nature on this Island. Commercialism of the air must come. It has already come to a very large extent in other countries, and Newfoundland must not refuse to be left behind in the matter. The first people to take it up to-day will reap to-morrow's benefits. Much in opposition has been said of commercial aviation. Much in opposition was said of aviation itself in its infancy. Those people who foresaw years ago, the possibilities of aviation are to-day reaping the benefits of their foresight. The same will apply to commercial work.

Cannot our Island help itself to some of the great benefits to be derived? To-day you are the centre of the aviation world. Your business men could regain Newfoundland in that position, if they so desired. Are they willing to try and do it?

Wretched Mail Service.

Dear Sir:—Will you kindly allow me space in your paper to say that the inhabitants of here and Otter's Point have every reason to feel proud of the magnificent mail and freight service we now get from the S.S. Glencoe. We are now about three weeks without any mail and freight, as this is the only boat calling there, and not only are we compelled to tolerate this service but we also have to put up with the wretched system of her calling alternately and then cannot rely on that. This, I consider, is a great injustice, when we know that several less important places have the Fortis and Glencoe calling regularly while we had to put up with this system of alternate calling. When the Glencoe used to make the trip every 7 days in Capt. Drake's time, it was then very inconvenient, but now we would rather expect the blue hills of Grand Bruit to topple from their base than expect the Glencoe to make that time.

I may say that while the S.S. Fogota was on the same route for eight months, Capt. Dalton called regularly both ways, which was greatly appreciated by the public, and he could make the round trip in from 9 to 10 days, but as soon as the great palatial liner Glencoe is put on the route we have to put up with the old rot of alternately calling.

Also I understand while the Fogota called regularly, the mail courier service from La Poile was stopped and also the couriers pay, consequently we have now to wait return of the Glencoe from west before getting our mails. We have no telegraph office here and passengers are obliged to unbundle in a being bundled into boats in the middle of the night and put ashore in one remote place La Poile, and in all kinds of weather. However, the inhabitants of here and vicinity are aware that the next polling day is drawing near, and the hand shaking time, but that bluff

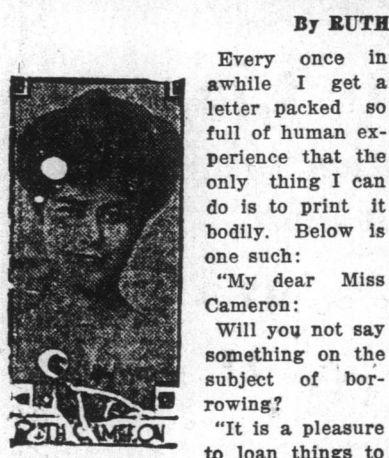

Dreadnoughts of the Air

The Handley-Page machine is the Dreadnought of the Aerial Navy. The sense that up to the present it carries the heaviest armament, the battleship, it needs its square of fast auxiliaries to protect it, except when it can operate by night. It will carry many heavy bombs, and it can release them at will, or all simultaneously if required. This is very formidable, but it must be remembered that a 8-inch shell weighs more than 250 lbs., and that a gun if he has the assistance of a well-posted observer, can put shell after shell on a piece of ground much less in extent than a cricket field, and the airman is by no means so certain of his aim, unless he comes quite low, when his chances of being brought down are vastly increased. In the struggle between aircraft and anti-aircraft guns the progress is by means on one side, a new weapon promises universal destruction, before it is perfect a new defence is arisen, and obliges it to act from distance; and so it comes that the carnage in a modern battle is proportionately much less than in the days of spears and arrows. The armament of the Handley-Page machine is confined to bombs; its crew of five men have each a machine-gun which can operate through a large arc, when there is no load of bombs, the men can be accommodated in fuselage, which is 62 feet long. Large as it is, it does not look like a "voiture de luxe" for that number, rather suggests the proverbial snail-box. There are two twelve-cylinder engines, one on each side of the fuselage between the wings. The speed of course, is not great for an aeroplane, but it can be maintained for many hours. There are 16,000 parts in the machine.

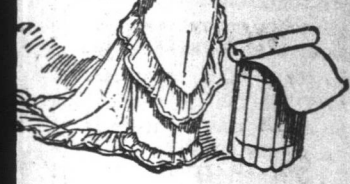

Luckless Names.

The Goeben and Breslau were brilliantly tackled by two of our small destroyers, the Lizard and the Tigress, yet the Admiralty suppressed the names of the commanding officers.

Saluting a Bobby.
The older people were a more difficult problem. At first they were inclined to treat the British soldiers with complete indifference, especially the better classes, among whom one could not help recognising German officers in mufti. No German officers or soldiers are permitted to wear uniform in Cologne, and the only persons in official garb are the civilian police and the station-masters. These are a lordly looking body of men, and the Germans take precious little liberties with them. I assure you, it is no uncommon thing to hear a German civilian say "sir" and touch his hat when addressing a German policeman or station-master. Such incidents as these greatly amused our soldiers, accustomed as they were to the free and easy ways in their own land. The idea of lifting their hats to one of our own going "bobbies" tickled them greatly. "I was a bit sick at the bowing and scraping business, because the rule was strictly enforced if a German civilian or official dared to pass a British officer without lifting his hat or saluting he was immediately placed under arrest. This rule was in all our battalion orders—in order to impress on the German people the fact that the Allied nations are the undisputed victors in the great European War. I am a thorough believer in the Germans being humbled, but I hate this hypocritical servility, nor

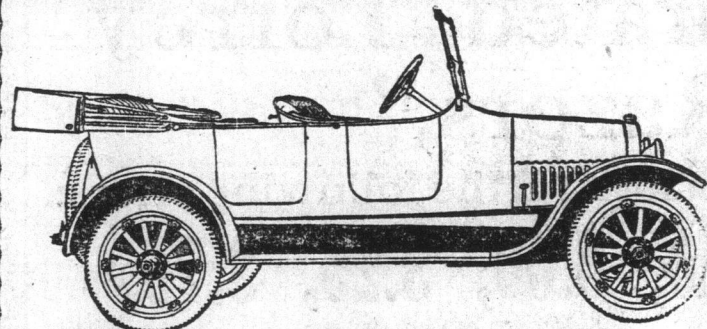

A Famous Traveller.

Lieut. F. W. Engholm Kinematographer of World Wide Reputation is in the City, Was in Five War Campaigns.

Some people it seems have all the luck. Whereas there are thousands who would give almost anything to be enabled to travel even to a few such places as London and New York, there are some—the favored few—who spend their entire lives in visiting every out-of-the-way place on the globe. Among those is Lieut. F. W. Engholm, Royal Navy, Lieut. Engholm, who at present is the star kinematographer of the Jureys Imperial Pictures, Ltd., of London, England, is now in the city for the purpose of kinematographing the start of the Sopwith attempt to cross the "great waste of water" by air within the coming couple of weeks. The actual building of the machine to be used was taken with a cinema machine by Lieut. Engholm, as were also the first tests and flights. It was while making a flight in this Sopwith machine that Harry Hawker broke the record for duration, staying in the air for 9 hours, 15 minutes, and flying at the rate of 110 miles an hour. This record-breaking flight was kinematographed by Lieut. Engholm personally, he following the Sopwith machine also in another machine of Sopwith design and manufacture, namely, the Sopwith-Buffalo machine, the flying equivalent of the tank. To fly in this machine for the purpose of taking a pictorial record of the flight was most courageous of Lieut. Engholm, as those who know anything about the matter will believe. A flight all around England in a Sopwith-Buffalo, which was not at all constructed for such work, was a thrilling as well as difficult feat. It was such nerve, however, which enabled Lieut. Engholm to "bag" so many kinematographic "scopes" as he has during his eventful career. Lieut. Engholm has been through five war campaigns with the cinema camera, and the thrilling, hair-raising adventures and escapades he has gone through in that time would fill a volume from cover to cover. These campaigns were the Boxer uprising, the Boer War, the Russo-Japanese War, the Wars in the Balkans, and the late conflict. He has been official kinematographer for the Serbian and Turkish armies, and once acted in the same capacity for the Bulgarian army. When the Great War broke out he went with the Belgian army, and for sixteen months was the official "camera operator" there. He has been through and kinematographed the bombardments of such cities as Liège, Antwerp (also the evacuations of the latter) the evacuation of Alost, East Flanders, Bruges and Ostend. He has taken many bombardments on the Belgian coast, and in fact obtained a complete record of the Belgian army's part in the Great War. After his withdrawal from the Belgian Government he became attached to the Jureys Imperial Pictures, Ltd., during which time he fulfilled the duties of official kinematographer for the Royal Navy and for the Royal Naval Air Service. Lieut. Engholm possesses numerous passports and permits to enter any Government, Naval or Military establishment or works, where every facility must be granted him. These passports, which the Telegram reporter in his interview with the cinema-man examined, are signed by three of the very highest authorities of all Great Britain.

Among the many wonderful pictures obtained by Lieut. Engholm was the landing at Zeebrugge, and the deliberate standing of the H. M. S. Vindictive. He was fortunately present at this time, and, luckily enough, kinematographed the entire historic incident. Another great moving picture taken by Lieut. Engholm was of the surrender of the German fleet. This, he says, was possibly one of the most impressive sights he has ever witnessed. Miles upon miles of German ships passed through a double line of British naval ships, and each was filmed by Lieut. Engholm as it passed. This picture, when released and shown in England, was about the most wonderful picture ever seen there. Practically every naval officer of importance was shown. Among those were Admirals Beatty, Shiry and Rodman. Entitled: "The Triumph of Britain's Sea Power," the picture closed with pictures of King George. These pictures of the King, which were obtained by special appointment from him, were the only ones ever granted by His Majesty to a filming company.

Still another picture taken by him was entitled "The Triumph of the Air," and showed the entire growth of the R. N. A. S. from its start to the present day. In this picture were thrilling scenes of looping-the-loop, the corkscrew and many others of the same nature. Everything to do with flying was included in the picture, which measures 5,400 feet of film, or 5 reels. The Jureys' Imperial Pictures, Ltd., of Tower Street, London, England, is headed by Sir William

Jureys, the governing director. In Sir William's hands was the Supreme authority regarding the war propaganda by cinema. His was a most important trust, but one which was well fulfilled and always guarded jealously by him. He worked night and day during the war, and it would be safe to say that no one man in England did so much for the winning of the war as he. Sir William Jureys handled all the official war films of the British army and navy, and all passed under his authority. His private business is that of buying film, and he has done more than anybody else to keep the standard of the British Cinema at a high moral and patriotic tone. The Jureys Imperial Pictures have the controlling of all photographing concerning the present Sopwith attempt to cross the Atlantic. No photographs of the machine, pilot or navigator, or of anything connected with the attempt may be taken except by the authority of the Jureys people. The telegraphic address of the Jureys Imperial Pictures is Jureysgraph, London.

Last Night's Lecture.

Under the auspices of the Holy Name Society, H. F. Shortis, Esq., delivered a learned and historical lecture on "Our Oldest Customs—the Spaniards" in the Aula Maxima last night. Introduced in a few pleasing words by Pres. C. W. Ryan, Mr. Shortis for an hour held the attention of his audience with a most graphic description of the times and customs when the Spaniards traded with Newfoundland. He showed by examples the dealings, the trades, the intercourse with the Spaniards in these days. With absorbingly interesting descriptions, depicted in choice diction, he enlightened the audience on a subject of which few of the present generation are cognizant. Rt. Rev. Mons. McMenott, several of the priests and Christians were present, and at the close Rev. Doctor Greene paid a tribute of gratitude to Mr. Shortis for his kindness. With such historians as Mr. Shortis, who loves every story, every clue, every trace of native history, and with the complete record of the Historical Society, 'tis to be hoped that the present generation will learn much more of their Island's history, and thus engender the true spirit of patriotism and love of dear old Newfoundland.

The officer who rode through the Boers to Kimberley and threw himself with his weary men across the path of the formidable Kronje was not likely to stand hesitating upon the banks of the Aisne. His personal opinion was that the enemy meant to stand and fight, but none the less the order was given to cross.

September 13 was spent in arranging this dashing and dangerous movement. The British got across eventually in several places and by various devices. Bullin's men, followed by the rest of the First Division of Haig's Army Corps, passed the Canal Bridge of Bourg with no loss or difficulty. The 11th Brigade of Pulteney's Third Corps got across by a partially demolished bridge, and followed by the 12th Brigade, who established themselves near Bucy. The 13th Brigade was held up at Missy, but the 14th got across and lined up with the men of the Third Corps in the neighbourhood of Ste. Marguerite, meeting with a considerable resistance from the Germans. Later, Count Gischel's 15th Brigade also got across. On the right Hamilton's 16th Brigade, the 8th Brigade crossing on a single plank at Valley and the 9th using the railway bridge, while the whole of Haig's First Corps had before evening got a footing upon the farther bank. So eager was the advance and so inadequate the means that Haking's 5th Brigade, led by the Connaught Rangers, was obliged to get over the broad and dangerous river, walking in single file along the sloping girder of a ruined bridge, under a heavy, thought distant shell fire. The night of September 13 saw the main body of the Army across the river, already conscious of a strong rear-guard action, but not yet aware that the whole German Army had halted and was turning at bay. On the right De Lisle's cavalrymen had pushed up the slope from Bourg Bridge and reached as far as Venizel, where they were pulled up by the German lines.

Heavy Losses.
It has been mentioned above that the 11th and 12th Brigades of the Fourth Division had passed the river in the early afternoon and they at once advanced, and proved that in that portion of the field the enemy were undoubtedly standing fast. The 11th Brigade, which was more to the north, had only a constant shell-fire to endure, but the 12th, pushing forward through Bucy-le-long, found it

Corners in Copper

Why are coppers so scarce in many parts of the country? Is somebody hoarding them by the ton or are they cornered for business purposes? Both operations are possible. In Lancashire a man who made a business of supplying copper coils to retail business houses—the "ran," in fact, a Copper Change—several times succeeded in cornering practically all the pennies and halfpennies in a certain district. Ordinarily he took coppers from gas companies, circusmen, etc., and supplied them to shopkeepers, charging each side a commission for the accommodation, this constituting his profit. But on several occasions he acquired complete control of all the small change "on spot," and thus added materially to his legitimate gains.

An Ingenious Trick.
For a different reason the authorities of a small watering place in Wales once cornered all the coppers in the town. Their object was to force the hand of visitors who stingily (as they thought) gave only one penny to the collection for the local band, and in it they were successful, for, as change became scarcer so the receipts of that institution increased. But their triumph was attended by many awkward consequences, one of which was a plague of three-penny-bits. By a similar expedient a gas company in the Midlands was forced to come to terms with some of its employees who had "downed tools." The strikers proceeded to corner pennies, with the result that, notwithstanding that bronze was largely imported into the town, there was not enough in circulation to keep the slot-meters going. Those instruments had consequently to be emptied more frequently than usual, this involving the employment of much extra labour. So when the struggle had lasted for some time the company considered it prudent to give in.

The Stream Crossed.
The moral effect of the Battle of the Marne was greater than its material gains. The latter, so far as the British were concerned, did not exceed 5,000 prisoners, 20 guns, and a quantity of transport. The total losses, however, were very heavy. Apart from the losses, the mere fact that a great German army had been hustled across 30 miles of country, had been driven from river to river, and had finally to take refuge in trenches in order to hold their ground, was a great encouragement to the Allies. From that time they felt assured that with anything like equal numbers they had an ascendancy over their opponents.
