LY DEFINED.

Defined briefly, a Bolshevist is a erson who believes in the immediate overthrow by force of all existing socal, political, and economic tutions. Thus wrote John A. Embr.

If we ignore the writings of the parlor Bolsheviki which only serve the purpose for which they were written, i.e., to cloud the whole issue, and the writings and public statenents of such men as Nikolai Lenine Leon Trotsky, and Eugene V. Deba t is not at all difficult to get at the substance of the Bolshevist platform. According to these leaders, the tenets of Bolshevism are as follows:-(1) The immediate abolition of

the institution of private property by means of force. All private ownership of houses, land, and all means of production must be immediately abolished. The owners of these things, because of their exploitation of the proletariat, shall receive no compensation for their loss.

(2) There shall be no wages, in the sense of one man's working for another. The only wages will be those paid by the state for productive labor. There will be no rents, no profits, no interest

(3) Nationalization of all industries. The workingmen shall have full control of the industries which shall by nationalization become the property of the whole people. The listribution of the products shall be attended to by the state. "From every man according to his ability, to every man according to his needs."

(4) The consumers' goods now in existence, houses, clothing, food, etc., shall be divided up among the working class which produced them. The former owners of these things shall receive a proportionate share only in case they join in good faith the cause of the social revolution. (5) All who oppose Bolshevism or




